Re: ROLLCALL 83

I take pleasure in transmitting to you and to the members of the Health Manpower Working Group, the latest edition of our ROLLCALL series, ROLLCALL 83. We have added two new health care personnel groups since 1981, Health Services Executives and Naturopaths. This document contains for 30 groups, numbers, numbers per 10,000 population, rates of change where comparable 1981 data were available, and where possible, a disaggregation of data by specialty or service area.

The reader's attention is drawn to the Overview and Summary commencing on page 5. It is noted that, generally, population:personnel ratios are stable for the two years under study. However, for 8 groups of the 30, the rate of growth was slower than population growth and where there was growth, it occurred mainly in the non-metropolitan regions.

More specific information on each group is found in the report's chapters. While the data in the chapters are disaggregated by regional hospital district, breakdowns by school district, town, or our HMRU regions are also on file and available on request.

The many individual data bases which are amalgamated into ROLLCALL also serve numerous other purposes, both for the Research Unit and Working Group, and for the respective Associations, licensing bodies and manpower groups. As the needs of these users change and grow, improvements and additions are built into the data bases, resulting in a changing (but to the extent possible, intertemporally consistent) publication.

ROLLCALL 83 represents the culmination of two years of file maintenance and updating, topped off most recently with close to six intensive months of coding and editing, consistency checks, table generation, definition and other text verification, proofreading and analysis. The team working on this edition included Susan Chan, Patrick Wong Fung, Brian McCashin, Gordon Wong, (programming and file updating); Cheryl Jackson, Sharon Jansen, Claire Kinnis, Andrea Szohner, (coding, inputting data and proofreading drafts); report-production was coordinated by Arminee Kazanjian, assisted by Claire Kinnis (editing), Brian McCashin (computer analyses), and Andrea Szohner (graphic layout).

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FOREWORD

ROLLCALL 83 is the sixth situation report on health personnel by Regional Hospital District produced by the Division of Health Services Research and Development, The University of British Columbia, This Division is the site of the Health Manpower Research Unit. The production of ROLLCALL is based on the presumption that the data will be used for manpower planning by the principal recipients of the report — the Health Manpower Working Group of the Province of British Columbia and the professional groups and licensing or registration bodies in the Province, Interest in health manpower planning continues to grow as pressures on limited health care resources grow more intense. In the past two years fiscal restraint and cost containment have become familiar concepts not just to planners at various levels but also to the general population. The allocation of an appreciable proportion of public funds to the health sector and the complex process by which the limited dollars are disbursed have put health manpower planning in the forefront of public policy issues.

ROLLCALL 83 is not meant to replace the B.C. components of the national Health Manpower Inventory, produced annually by the Health Manpower Directorate of Health and Welfare Canada; that publication reviews provincial variations, using consistent definitions and national sources; nor is it meant to replace annual Health Manpower statistics issued by Statistics Canada¹. ROLLCALL concentrates on examining the health manpower situation in British Columbia by Regional Hospital District, using official and consistently edited provincial data which have been assembled and analyzed in conjunction with provincial licensing authorities and professional associations.

The Health Manpower Research Unit (HMRU) was initially funded by the Minister of Health in September 1973, as a demonstration project. It was charged with the development of the provincial health manpower data base and creation of models to analyze the forces influencing manpower levels and the effect of certain policy options upon the type and distribution of stock. The Unit has produced a number of reports, directories, and other analyses of manpower data for the professional bodies, the Provincial Health Manpower Working Group, the Federal/Provincial Health Manpower Advisory Committee, Canada Post-Secondary Education and Western Health the Requirements Subcommittee of the Ministers of Education, It provides, on behalf of the professional bodies, tapes and data to Statistics Canada for inclusion in the Health Manpower Statistics series,

Since 1973, a large and varied amount of data has been collected by the Division as a basis for decision making. The manpower components of this data base require varying degrees of maintenance to ensure its quality and currency.

The data bases used in this report are of three broad types;

(a) Computer-based and updated regularly by the Division

Seven data bases are set up in a dynamic mode, edited and updated regularly in cooperation with provincial Associations and Colleges. These are:

Certified Dental Assistants
Dental Hygienists
Dentists
Licensed Practical Nurses

Occupational Therapists Physiotherapists Psychologists

An eighth data base for Medical Interns and Residents is updated regularly by the Division, in cooperation with the Associate Dean's Office (Faculty of Medicine) and the training institutions.

(b) Computer-based and updated regularly by another group

The Registered Nurses' Association of British Columbia, the College of Pharmacists of British Columbia, and the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia have established their own data bases as part of their respective office management systems.

(c) Membership lists collected by the Division

The remainder of the data is collected annually or biennially from information derived from annual registrations. This information is supplemented, where possible, through questionnaire surveys of individuals in certain health occupations.

Only the computer-based groups can be studied to produce transitions within and between regional districts over a period of time.

This report contains data for thirty health manpower groups. Since definitions regarding the boundaries of the health care sector vary, there are inevitably certain groups which might have been included had the boundaries been different (e.g. veterinarians). In addition, there may be small health manpower groups for which we were unable to secure data, because of either the non-existence of a formal licensing body or professional association, or, the absence of a membership list.

All data are reported by Regional Hospital District(RHD). Supplementary breakdowns by school district, by community, and by HMRU designated region are available on request.

While each new edition of *ROLLCALL* reflects improvements in accuracy and detail, at times these improvements render comparisons with the previous *ROLLCALL* reports meaningless. A major problem of using membership as a proxy for stock, where membership is not compulsory, remains for many groups. While comparative data are provided for these groups if there have been no major changes in membership classification, intertemporal inferences should be made with extreme caution.

There is an obvious temptation to regard regional inequalities as indicators of regional deficiencies or excesses; in fact, in certain instances, this may be a correct interpretation. However, since many factors interact in determining optimal mix and numbers of health care personnel in any district, the data provided in the following pages are not a sufficient base from which to identify such deficiencies. The demography and needs of the population, the service functions of institutions and professions within a region, the accessibility and availability of communication and transportation resources, the productivity of the professionals, and the potential of real transfer of functions between members of the formal and informal health care teams must all be kept in mind by those utilizing these statistics.

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OVERVIEW AND SUMMARY

Introduction

The main thrust of this report is to enumerate and describe each of thirty health manpower groups for which data were available. In this section an attempt is made to present a broader perspective by providing relative supply figures and to highlight possible trends for individual groups. Caution is advised, however, in the interpretation and utilization of some of the comparative data because sources of data are varied and the degree of accuracy in some instances cannot be ascertained.

The analyses in this section do not provide conclusive information regarding manpower imbalances. It would be misleading to draw conclusions about maldistribution from interregional comparisons of manpower ratios since regions have varying supply requirements due to differing population characteristics and variations in the complexity of services provided. The population:personnel ratios in the following tables do not adjust for such factors and therefore, should be used only as a basis for informed discussion and further investigation.

Population: Personnel Ratios

An overview of the thirty group-specific chapters of this report is presented in Table 1, page 6. This table provides 1983 supply information for each group and comparative population; personnel ratios for B.C., 1983; B.C., 1981; and the rest of Canada, 1981.

The scope of data presented for each group is outlined in the footnotes Table 1. Where inter-provincial comparisons are concerned varying nomenclature and definitions limit the comparability of the data. As well, since the data are drawn from sources which have varying registration, licensing and membership stipulations, comparisons between groups should be made with caution. Where active registration and/or licensure is a requirement and mandatory by legislation, such as for physicians and dentists, the figures presented are firm and comprehensive. Where registration is not mandatory, as in the case of nurses, figures only represent the registered nurses (RNs), the licensed practical nurses (LPNs), etc. For groups without any registration requirements, information from membership records, usually of a provincial association, has been collected. Membership categories sometimes include active/inactive designations. These, however, refer to membership status only and most probably misrepresent the number of employed personnel in that field of work. The direction and degree of misrepresentation also varies by group; the specification of such variances is beyond the scope of this report.

Bearing in mind such limitations, the data show that registered nurses employed in the field are the most numerous and active physicians and licensed practical nurses employed in nursing are second and third in stock size. The least numerous group remains the osteopaths. There are also fewer

than fifty each of naturopaths (a group included in this report for the first time), podiatrists, and prosthetists/orthotists.

Table 1 also shows that the population:personnel ratios have generally remained stable. It should be noted that 1981 ratios in this report should not be compared to those of *ROLLCALL 81*, since the 1981 population figures used in the 1983 report were obtained from the 1981 census and were not available for *ROLLCALL 81*.

While the B.C. versus rest of Canada comparisons must be interpreted with extreme caution, this table suggests that supply on a per capita basis is greater in B.C. than in the rest of Canada for chiropractors, dentists, medical laboratory technologists, pharmacists, physicians, podiatrists, and public health inspectors; and smaller for dental hygienists, licensed practical nurses, medical radiation technologists and optometrists.

Rates of Change

Table 2, page 8, summarizes annual rates of change in metropolitan and non-metropolitan regions over the period 1981–83. The greatest growth in both metropolitan and non-metropolitan regions is reported for food service supervisors. The second place in aggregate rate of growth is reported for diagnostic medical sonographers. Both of these groups are relatively small in number (see Table 1). Health record personnel, licensed practical nurses, medical radiation technologists, occupational therapists, podiatrists, and psychologists all reported lower rates of growth than the general population (between 2–3 percent lower). Also lower than the population growth were the rates reported for dental laboratory technicians and dental mechanics, bringing the total number to eight groups showing a lower rate of growth than that of the general population. The comparable number of groups for the 1979–81 period was three.

Marked disparities in non-metropolitan versus metropolitan rates of change relative to population growth are shown for audiologists and speech-language pathologists with a 16.6 percent increase in non-metropolitan regions compared to only a 2,9 percent increase in metropolitan regions. Dental laboratory technicians reported faster than population growth in non-metropolitan regions (4.16%) while metropolitan regions showed a slower than population rate of change (-2.18).

In general, reported rates of growth are higher for non-metropolitan regions than metropolitan regions; exceptions are chiropractors, medical office assistants, pharmacists, physicians, and registered psychiatric nurses. However, average annual rates of growth for these groups were relatively small.

Table 3, page 10, provides more detailed information on personnel growth (or lack of it), relative to population growth, for groups which had comparable data in 1981 and 1983. In addition, the number of regions for which each manpower group grew at a pace faster, or a pace slower, than that of the respective regional populations, is reported. The sum of these latter two figures is always less than twenty-nine (the number of Regional Hospital Districts), since rates of growth were not computed in this report whenever the base (1981) stock for a district was less than ten. Where none of the non-metropolitan districts had ten or more personnel of a given type in 1981, non-metropolitan is treated as one district. Thus for dental laboratory technicians, diagnostic medical sonographers and public health inspectors, the non-metropolitan district showed the fastest growth relative to population over the period 1981-83. Non-metropolitan was treated as an RHD, where appropriate, for the purposes of the two right-hand columns of Table 3.

Where only one or a small number of non-metropolitan RHDs had the requisite base of ten personnel, the remaining non-metropolitan RHDs (each with fewer than ten personnel) were treated as the other non-metro RHD. In this situation, if the growth rate of these aggregated districts were to exceed or be lower than that of all districts with the requisite base stock, this district would be designated accordingly. For this period, only one group (optometrists) was so affected, other non-metro was not counted as an RHD for the purposes of the two right-hand columns of Table 3, except in the case of optometrists.

Caution must again be advised in interpreting these data, especially where large rates of change are concerned. Where these calculations are carried out from a small base figure (1981 distribution) small absolute differences appear magnified when only the rate is presented. This type of information may or may not be of value. One such instance is that of registered nurses in Mount Waddington, Table 3 indicates this region reported the highest rate of growth, 9.29 percent in contrast to Greater Vancouver which reported a rate of change slower than that for the population of the district, -2.82 percent. This translates to an increase of only 14 registered nurses in the former and an increase of 243 registered nurses in the latter region (Chapter 28). Population growth in the Greater Vancouver Regional Hospital District (in contrast to that in Mount Waddington) is the obvious cause of the statistical illusion. One can further explain the relatively large increase in the number of RNs in Mount Waddington by examining the increase in bed capacity of that district (from 70 to 82, as a result of an increase in one hospital).

Production Ratios

The figures in Table 4, page 12, are computed by combining data from this report with production figures from *PRODUCTION 83*. The production index is the ratio of the current number of active personnel to the number graduating during 1983. The index is reported only for selected groups which have registration stipulations. Physiotherapists, however, have been excluded because their training program also produces occupational therapists, but graduates cannot be distinguished by discipline (until after 1984).

It is interesting to note that the markedly higher ratio for physicians in 1979 and 1981 has decreased appreciably in 1983, clearly due to the increase in medical school enrollment. The dental manpower groups, by comparison, remain relatively stable, although a slow upward trend in the ratio of dental hygienists and certified dental assistants are detectable. Pharmacists also exhibit the same slight increase in production ratios over the four-year period. Registered psychiatric nurses show a large increase in this ratio due mainly to an increase in the number of registered members.

The slight decrease in the 1983 production ratios of registered nurses and licensed practical nurses can be safely attributed to the small changes in the number of active personnel.

In general, interpretation based solely on this index is impossible. A high ranking may or may not indicate surplus workers already in the field. It is equally probable that too few new personnel are being trained, or that both phenomena are interacting. What the index does portray is training flows relative to existing licensed or registered stock. When combined with other information on growth rates, surpluses or shortages, and/or possibilities for manpower substitution, the index may be employed as a tool in educational program planning.

Inter-Regional Distribution

Tables 5 to 8 illustrate, in different ways, the distribution of health manpower throughout the province in 1983. While personnel:population ratios are problematic as bases for planning purposes because they are not necessarily indicative of underlying needs, they do provide a starting point by identifying areas which require further investigation. Some districts may have high ratios because they contain a specialized facility which is the principal employer for a manpower group, but which also requires a large catchment area. That ratio, in such an instance, would not necessarily indicate a surplus situation, just as low ratios in the other districts of that catchment area need not imply shortages. For certain groups, there may be economies of scale in increasing numbers. In such instances, high population districts may show lower ratios simply because a certain minimum number of personnel are required in low population districts, but in those districts they are not fully utilized (i.e. an increase in population would not immediately necessitate the hiring of additional personnel of that type).

Table 5 is patterned after Table 3, For each group, the districts with the highest and lowest personnel per 10,000 population ratios are reported. Where the lowest ratio was 0.0, but only one district reported no personnel, the second lowest ratio is also reported. Thus, Stikine has no personnel in most manpower categories, but it often has the company of a group with a ratio close to 0.0. Even where it is the only district with that distinction, for groups such as health services executives and medical radiation technologists, the ratio for the second least well-endowed district is also low (<2.0). Greater Vancouver, the most populated district, also claims the highest physician; population ratio (29.4), although the Capital region has the highest ratio of non-postgraduate physicians. The figures for the other districts range all the way down to 8.3 for Peace River-Liard.

The extremely high ratio of registered nurses in the Capital region may be a function of that district's demography. The distribution of registered psychiatric nurses is also interesting. A small number of relatively large employing institutions, located in the Greater Vancouver Regional Hospital District, are situated at close proximity to the border with Dewdney-Alouette. Thus, many of the RPN staff of those institutions likely reside in the latter district, and location of residence was used in this report to allocate RPNs by Regional Hospital District. In contrast to Dewdney-Alouette's 49.0 RPNS per 10,000 population, Greater Vancouver's ratio is a mere 11.7, still well above the provincial figure of 8.8 and, in fact, the fourth highest ratio among the twenty-nine RHDs. Licensed practical nurses also vary widely in distribution ranging from a low of 6.4 in Central Coast and almost as low in Mount Waddington, Squamish-Lillooet, and Stikine, to a high of 30.8 in Cowichan Valley, closely matched by high ratios in Kootenay Boundary and Central Kootenay.

Table 6, page 16, goes beyond looking at the ratio extremes to consider the correlations between personnel:population ratios. In particular, the figures represent the correlation of each group ratio with the ratios across districts of every other group.

As expected, the correlation between physician ratio and other personnel ratios are relatively high; with registered nurses, 0.75; with dental laboratory technicians, 0.57; with occupational therapists, 0.68; and with physiotherapists, 0.55. However, these correlations are somewhat lower than those presented in *ROLLCALL 81*.

Unlike the ROLLCALL 81 results, the personnel:population ratio for dentists shows positive correlation with the ratios of both certified dental assistants and dental hygienists. Registered nurses are highly correlated with a number of other groups.

In Table 7, page 18, metropolitan and non-metropolitan supply ratios are compared. A value of 1.0 for the metropolitan; non-metropolitan ratio would indicate that, for the given group, the personnel:population ratio in the combined metropolitan regions was equal to the ratio for all non-metropolitan regions combined. Again, only groups with at least one hundred personnel in the province in 1983 are included.

In general, the ordinal rankings in the two years are quite similar. Occupational therapists and psychologists showed the most disparity in 1983 even increasing the favouring of metropolitan regions over the two-year period. Dental laboratory technicians and audiologists and speech-language pathologists reported an appreciable shift in the opposite direction, remaining high, nevertheless, in the rank-order list. Lesser shifts in relative supply, moving away from favouring metropolitan areas, were dentists (unlike previous years), medical radiation technologists, diagnostic medical sonographers, and public health inspectors. For the third two-year period in a row, the relative supply of licensed physicians widened slightly in favour of metropolitan regions.

In Table 8, page 20, attention is focused on the twenty-seven non-metropolitan districts, and the twenty-four groups with at least fifty registrants or members in non-metropolitan districts. By comparing the cross-regional standard deviation in personnel:population ratios to the mean, for each group, one gains a sense of their relative degrees of dispersion. Of course, if all districts had identical personnel:population ratios for a given group, the coefficient of variation (standard deviation/mean) would have a value of zero. The larger the coefficient, the less evenly distributed are the personnel.

Large shifts of occupational therapists in and out of several non-metropolitan regions, combined with a fairly small base, account for the appreciable disparity between the 1983 and 1981 coefficients. The fact that registered psychiatric nurses are among those at the top of this list is not surprising in light of our earlier discussion concerning Table 5. Note that the RPNs occupied the top rung in 1979 and 1981. The very large standard deviation for this group is almost entirely a result of the extremely high ratio in Dewdney-Alouette. The groups whose members were most evenly distributed across the non-metropolitan districts were registered nurses and dentists. It is interesting to note that cross-regional disparity in physician:population ratios for non-metropolitan regions has increased since 1981, while that in dentist:population ratios have decreased markedly in the same period. Other groups reporting decreased cross-regional disparity in personnel:population ratios for non-metropolitan regions include food service supervisors, dental hygienists, chiropractors, licensed practical nurses and, most notably, audiologists.

INTRODUCTION TO THE CHAPTERS

The remainder of the report is partitioned into manpower group-specific chapters. All statistics within each chapter pertain to the specified date of record. Contained in most chapters, along with the figures which have been summarized in the Overview, is a map of Regional Hospital Districts whose shaded densities reflect the actual worker/population ratios. The greater the variation of shades in each map the greater the magnitude of differences in ratios among the districts. The legend in each map gives sample densities and their corresponding ratios; these should permit the reader to gain a rapid visual impression of the manpower distribution across Regional Hospital Districts.

Following the thirty manpower group chapters are a number of appendices providing provincial data on population, hospital bed supply, and the number of retail pharmacies.

AUDIOLOGISTS AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGISTS

Definition: (a) An audiologist:

"Provides diagnostic evaluation and rehabilitative services conducts research related to hearing; Administers air and bone conduction and other audiometric tests and examinations to determine hearing efficiency. Co-ordinates audiometric results with medical, social, behavioural and other diagnostic data. Evaluates total response pattern and acoustic tests to differentiate between organic and non-organic hearing loss. Plans, directs and participates in counselling, speech-reading and other rehabilitation programs, Acts as consultant to educational, medical and other professional groups. Conducts research in physiology, pathology, biophysics and psychophysics of auditory system, if required, Designs and develops clinical and research procedures and apparatus, if required."1

(b) A speech pathologist:

"Diagnoses and treats speech, language and voice disorders, and performs related research: Administers tests and observes patient to diagnose nature of disorder and to evaluate degree of impairment. Plans and conducts remedial exercises and programs to stuttering, abnormal articulation and other Provides speech training for patient with communication problems caused by cerebral palsy, surgical removal of larynx, hearing deficiencies or other impairments. Plans individual or group therapy in rehabilitation of communication disorders. Counsels and guides language-handicapped individuals and their families, teachers or employers. Acts as consultant to educational medical dental and professional Conducts research other groups, related to development of diagnostic and treatment techniques and procedures. or design of apparatus."2



CERTIFIED DENTAL ASSISTANTS

Definition: A certified dental assistant (registered dental auxiliary I):

May, in addition to the duties and technical procedures delegated to dental assistants (non-registered chairside dental auxiliaries)¹, be delegated the following duties and technical procedures under the personal supervision of a licensed member of the College:

- "- The polishing of clinical crowns of teeth with rubber cup or brush and polishing pastes.
- The application of topical anticariogenic agents.
- The taking of initial study model impressions.
- The application of fissure sealants.
- The evaluation of dietary habits and provision of nutritional counselling as it pertains to dentistry.
- The provision of simple screening tests for diabetes and hypoglycemia.
- The taking and preparation of oral cytologic smears.
- The taking of bacterial cultures.
- The testing of caries susceptibility in patients.
- The provision of instruction in the use and maintenance of partial and complete dentures and other appliances.
- The removal of sutures.
- The placement and removal of matrices and wedges.
- The performance of first-aid procedures. *2

On successful completion of the orthodontic expanded training module, a certified dental assistant may also be delegated the following duties and technical procedures under the personal supervision of a licensed member:

- " The provision of instructions in placement and care of removable orthodontic appliances.
 - The tying-in of arch wires that have been prepared and fitted intra-orally by a Member.
 - The removal of orthodontic arch wire.
 - The removal of excess cement following cementation of orthodontic bands.

May, in addition to the duties and technical procedures delegated to dental assistants (non-registered chairside dental auxiliaries) and certified dental assistants (registered dental auxiliaries I)¹, be delegated the following duties and technical procedures under the direction of a licensed member of the College:

- " The examination of the head and neck as it pertains to dentistry.
 - The examination of the intra-oral structures.
 - The taking of pulp vitality tests.
 - The placement and removal of temporary restorations,
 - The application and removal of periodontal dressings.
 - The removal of supra and subgingival calculus.
 - The curettage and root planing of tooth surfaces.
 - The recontouring of existing restorations.
 - The desensitization of hypersensitive teeth.
 - After the successful completion of approved training, and performed only under the personal supervision of a licensed Member, the administration of local anaesthetics."²





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DENTAL LABORATORY TECHNICIANS





DENTAL MECHANICS

Definition: A dental mechanic is licensed to perform the following services:

- "(a) To make, repair, reline, replace, or furnish upper or lower full dentures, or both, and carry out the necessary nonsurgical intra oral procedures, including the taking of necessary impressions, without a prescription, or to engage in any of those activities, but only
 - (i) if he has received from the person for whom the service is to be performed a certificate in Form A of the Schedule, completed and signed by a dentist or qualified medical practitioner; and
 - (ii) within 7 days of the date of inspection of the oral cavity of the person by the dentist or qualified medical practitioner as shown on the certificate; or
- (b) To make structural repairs to a removable dental prosthesis, or to replace teeth in a denture without a certificate in Form A of the Schedule where the repairs or replacement can be effected without intra oral procedures or the taking of impressions."¹



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DENTISTS

Definition: A dentist:

"Diagnoses and treats diseases, injuries and malformations of teeth, gums and related oral structures and prescribes and administers preventive procedures:

Examines teeth, gums and other tissues using X-rays and dental equipment. Diagnoses condition and plans treatment, Administers local or general anaesthetic. Fills cavities with amalgam, silver, gold, or other material. Replaces portion of tooth crown with inlay or artificial crown. Performs minor oral surgery, including extractions of erupted or impacted teeth. Takes dental impressions. Designs bridgework and partial or complete dentures. Constructs dental appliances or writes specifications for dental technician. Cleans teeth. Instructs patients in oral hygiene to prevent dental problems. Monitors growth pattern of patient's teeth. Refers patients to specialists."

Date of Record: September 1981 and September 1983,

Source of Data: The College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia,2

Preparation and Updating:

Notification of new registrants or change in location or type of registration is received by the Health Manpower Research Unit from the College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia on a monthly basis. These updates are entered, after careful editing and reconciliation of inconsistencies, into DENTFILE, a dynamic computer-based file.

The tables include licensed dentists who reported a B.C. address at the date of record.

In order to practise as a dentist in British Columbia, it is necessary to be registered by the College of Dental Surgeons and to hold an unexpired annual certificate(licence) under the Dentist's Act.

Definition of Terms:

1. Specialty³

Licensed dentists are allocated to the specialty in which they have been certified by the College of Dental Surgeons. The categories used in Table 1 are:

- (a) Non-specialist
- (b) Endodontics
- (c) Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery
- (d) Orthodontics
- (e) Pediatric Dentistry
- (f) Periodontics
- (g) Prosthodontics
- (h) Oral Pathology
- (i) Oral Radiology⁴

Tables 2 and 3 group categories (a) through (i), since numbers of most specialists are too small to calculate meaningful population ratio and rate of change figures.

2. Analysis of Change

Table 4 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of dentists from 1981 to 1983.

New registrants include all dentists who were licensed as of September 1983 and registered with the College for the first time subsequent to September 1981. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation; i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Schools (O.Can), the United States (U.S.A.), or Other.



Oral Radiology was approved as a dental specialty in B.C. in 1978 and reported for the first time in B.C. in 1983.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those dentists who were not licensed in September 1981 and were licensed in September 1983, but whose date of initial registration fell before October 1981.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those dentists who were included in the 1981 dentist stock, but who, because of death, retirement or non-renewal of licensure, were not included in the 1983 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of dentists between the different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

Definition: A diagnostic medical sonographer:

"Utilizes high frequency mechanical vibrations (ultrasound) to produce diagnostic images of various anatomic structures. A Sonographer may be trained in one or more of the following specialties; Obstetrics/Gynecology, Abdominal, Adult Echocardiography, Pediatric Echocardiography, Ophthalmology, Echoencephalography, Peripheral Vascular Doppler. The training period is usually one year with a previous para-medical degree as a prerequisite."1



DIETITIANS AND NUTRITIONISTS

Definition: A dietitian:

"Plans and supervises food service programs in governmental, institutional, and commercial establishments to provide nutritionally adequate quality food:

Plans diets and menus, and evaluates clients' acceptance, Plans and submits budget, and manages and controls operating costs. Establishes and maintains standards of food production and service. sanitation, safety and security. Supervises workers, and directs efficient use of personnel and equipment, Institutes measures to improve efficiency and quality of food service system. Plans, conducts, and evaluates orientation and in-service programs. Determines food, equipment and supply requirements, Administers established personnel policies. Plans layout designs and determines equipment requirements for new or renovated food services facilities. Prepares material on nutritional value of foods. methods of preparation and recipes, if required."1

A nutritionist:

"Provides consulting services to community, and organizes, plans and conducts programs concerning nutrition to assist in promotion of health and prevention of disease:

Assesses nutritional needs and available resources of community. Develops and implements community programs concerning nutrition. Advises health and other agencies on nutritional and food service standards of their food programs. Counsels individuals and families in nutritional principles, diet, food selection, and economical buying practices. Interprets and evaluates current research relating to nutrition and food service systems management to public and to staff. Conducts or participates in in-service education. Plans, conducts and evaluates nutrition education programs for public. Prepares technical publications, and publications for the public concerning food and nutrition. Plans, conducts and evaluates dietary studies, and participates in studies of diseases with nutrition component. Plans or participates in funding programs, and recommends budget. Manages and controls financial resources."²








HEALTH RECORD PERSONNEL

Definition: Health record personnel:

Include Health Record Administrators(HRA), Health Data Technologists(HDT) and Health Record Technicians(HRT), who work in a variety of health care facilities such as acute, specialized and long term hospitals; community health centres; industrial clinics; provincial or federal health care agencies as well as the health care research field. They contribute to the health information team by: planning information acquisition, maintenance and utilization systems; analyzing and technically evaluating health information and; compiling and applying administrative and health statistics.¹

Date of Record: September 1981 and September 1983.

Source of Data: The Health Record Association of British Columbia (HRABC).2

Preparation and Updating:

The list of members is prepared by the provincial Association, and updated by them on a monthly basis. Only members with a B.C. address at the date of record are included in Tables 1 through 3.

Definition of Terms:

1. HRABC Membership

HRABC membership may be Active, Inactive, Honorary, or Affiliate.

- (a) Active, Inactive and Honorary members may be Certificants or Associates of the Canadian College of Health Record Administrators (CCHRA):
 - (i) CCHRA (Certificant)

The CCHRA, the national body responsible for the education of health record personnel, bestows the additional title of CCHRA (Certificant) for HRA's, upon successful completion of its registration examination. The CCHRA (Certificant) was formerly the Registered Record Librarian(RRL).

(ii) CCHRA (Associate)

The CCHRA (Associate) is an Accredited Record Technician (ART), HRT, or HDT, who has not upgraded to HRA status and passed the certificant examination.

(b) Affiliate members are any persons engaged in a health information setting of a health care or allied facility, who do not have formal qualifications but are interested in advancing the objectives of the association and improving personal awareness of the health information field; or, are students enrolled in a course approved by the CCHRA.





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HEALTH SERVICES EXECUTIVES

Definition: A health services executive:

- (a) Has senior managerial responsibility in a health organization including institution-wide planning, directing, coordinating, organizing, staffing, budgeting and reporting;
- (b) Participates regularly in the formulation and implementation of organization-wide policymaking.

Occupational categories most frequently used for this group include President, Executive Director, (Associate/Assistant) Director/Administrator, Administrative/Executive Assistant.

Date of Record: September 1983.

Source of Data: The Canadian College of Health Service Executives(CCHSE), the Health Administrators' Association of British Columbia(HAABC), and the American College of Hospital Administrators(ACHA).

Preparation and Updating:

This group appears for the first time in *ROLLCALL 83*. The table, derived solely from the membership lists supplied by the CCHSE, the HAABC and the ACHA, includes members of any of these bodies who reported a B.C. address at the date of record. All categories included in the definitions on the following pages are considered part of the work force. There are no *Provisional* members in B.C. at this time.

Definition of Terms:

1. Active, Associate Membership In CCHSE

After initial registration all members remain in the Associate category for a minimum of one year after which those members who have a minimum of five years' experience at the senior level (three years in the case of graduates of master's programs in health administration), advance to the Active category.

Both advancement and continuing membership is contingent upon maintenance of a continuing professional development and education program.

Membership in the College is open to any one of the following:

- (a) senior manager in a health care organization;
- (b) consultant to senior health services managers;
- (c) faculty in Health Administration Programs;
- (d) those with graduate degrees in health administration.1

2. Active, Associate, Provisional Membership in HAABC

An Active member must be a graduate of an approved course in health administration and must hold either a position of senior administrative responsibility in a health care organization or a consultative position in health care administration.

An Associate member is a person who is deemed to have appropriate experience in the health administration field but lacks the educational qualifications necessary to be an Active member.

A *Provisional* member is actively engaged in the field of health administration and is currently in the process of acquiring the educational qualifications necessary to become an *Active* member.²

It should be noted that 13 life and honorary members of the HAABC have not been included in the 1983 total.

3. Membership in ACHA

A candidate for membership is approved upon meeting any one of the following requirements:

- (a) holds a graduate degree from an acceptable hospital or health services administration program and has secured an acceptable health services administrative position;
- (b) holds any other graduate degree and has at least one year's experience in an acceptable health services administrative position;
- (c) holds a baccalaureate degree and has at least three years' experience in an acceptable health services administrative position:
- (d) is a researcher, faculty member or director in a hospital or health services administrative program.

The applicant is admitted to the College as a *Nominee* and remains in that category for at least two years. Within 5 years *Nominees* must meet the following criteria for advancement to *Membership* status:

- (a) participation and leadership in health care affairs;
- (b) personal program of continuing professional education;
- (c) acceptable references from peers;
- (d) successful completion of a Board of Governors Examination.³





LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSES

Definition: A licensed practical nurse:

"Functions under the supervision of a registered nurse. In many settings the licensed practical nurse also works under supervision of a registered psychiatric nurse, Employers follow the Guide issued by the British Columbia Council of Practical Nurses stating what the LPN has been taught and is prepared to perform. The Licensed Practical Nurse is primarily engaged in direct care of clients/patients in a wide variety of health care settings subject to the policies of the employing agency, Health care agencies can be acute, extended, intermediate or

personal care; home care, public health, and/or community health and mental health care."1

Date of Record; September 1981 and September 1983.

Preparation and Updating:

Notification of new registrants or change in location or type of registration is received by the Health Manpower Research Unit from the Council on a monthly basis. These updates are entered, after careful editing and reconciliation of inconsistencies into LPNF/LE, a dynamic computer-based file.





Definition: A medical laboratory technologist:

"Performs medical laboratory tests, procedures, experiments, and analyses for diagnosis, treatment and prevention of disease:

Conducts chemical analyses of blood, urine, cerebro-spinal and other body fluids to ascertain normal and abnormal constituents. Studies blood cells, their numbers, morphological characteristics and coagulation factors related to various physiological and pathological conditions. Prepares tissue sections for microscopic examination using fixation, imbedding, cutting and staining techniques to demonstrate special cellular tissue elements or other characteristics. Studies micro-organisms which cause disease, and their effect upon the human body, using a variety of microscopic and macroscopic techniques. Performs blood group, type and compatibility tests for transfusion purposes. Investigates responses of body to foreign cells or agents."







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MEDICAL RADIATION TECHNOLOGISTS

Definition: A medical radiation technologist:

(a) In diagnostic radiography:

"Operates radiography equipment to produce pictures of body structures for diagnostic purposes:

Explains treatment and reassures patient. Prepares drugs and chemicals for radiologist, Positions patient according to part of body being X-rayed. Affixes shields to protect unaffected areas of patient from radiation. Adjusts equipment controls to collimate beam, to regulate length and intensity of X-ray exposure, and to expose film. Processes and prepares films for interpretation by radiologist. Assists radiologist in fluoroscopy, cine-fluoroscopy and other diagnostic procedures. Operates radiography equipment in operating theatre or other specialized area to assist physician or surgeon."

(b) In radiotherapy:

"Administers radiation treatment to patients as prescribed by radiation oncologist:

Explains treatment and reassures patient. Positions patient according to part of body being treated. Affixes shields to protect unaffected areas of patient from radiation. Adjusts equipment controls to collimate and direct radiation beam. Observes patient through window or on closed-circuit television during treatment. Notifies radiation oncologist if medical problems arise. Assists clinical physicist to prepare patient's treatment plan according to radiation oncologist's prescription. Prepares or assists in preparation of sealed radioactive substances for surface application or insertion into body cavities."

(c) In nuclear medicine:

"Prepares radioactive solutions and reagents operates scanning equipment for diagnostic purposes: Performs assays and quality-control tests on radioactive materials. Calculates doses to be administered by physician. Positions patient, and calibrates scanning equipment. Operates radiation-scanning equipment to produce photographic image of irradiated area. Calculates blood volume and red-cell survival, electroscope. geiger counter. Monitors scintillation-and-position scanner, and scintogram. studies photographic images oscilloscope images and determine if further scanning is required. Performs radioisotope scanning of pathological specimens and blood samples."3







Administers tests and observes patient to assess emotional, mental and physical capacities of patient. Plans and directs programs in creative arts. industrial and vocational manual and recreational activities, remedial games, cultural and educational interests, and play activities for children, Conducts group programs to assist patients in building self-confidence and in adjusting to family and community. Trains handicapped patients in self-care and living activities. Advises and instructs patients specially-adapted household equipment and furnishings. Assesses patients' vocational potential and provides work adjustment and actual work experience. Participates in testing and training of patients with perceptual motor problems, and provides training for children with learning disabilities. Records patients' activities, response and progress. Attends meetings of rehabilitation team."1

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PHARMACISTS

Definition: The pharmacist:

is responsible for the compounding, preparation and dispensing of a prescribed drug, the monitoring of drug therapy and use, the release of the drug to the patient with appropriate consultation, the safe and proper storage of the drug both within and without the pharmacy, and the distribution of specified non-prescription medications.¹

Date of Record: September 1981 and September 1983.

Source of Data: The College of Pharmacists of British Columbia.2

Preparation and Updating:

Pharmacists registered in British Columbia apply annually for a licence from the College of Pharmacists of British Columbia. Notification of new registrants, or changes in location, employer, narcotic signing authority or managerial function are received on a monthly basis by the Health Manpower Research Unit. These updates, carefully prepared by the College of Pharmacists are then transferred into *PHMFILE*, a dynamic computer-based file.

The update of employment data occurs through an annual computer-produced employment profile.

The tables include pharmacists who had a B,C, address at the date of record.

2. Position of Employment

Position of pharmaceutical employment is reported by the registrant in the annual employment profile and responses have been aggregated into the following categories³:

- a) Manager (employer or employee)
- b) Dispensing pharmacist (non-manager)
- c) Other

3. Analysis of Change

Table 4 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of pharmacists from 1981 to 1983.

New registrants include all pharmacists as of September 1983 who registered with the College for the first time subsequent to September 1981. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation; i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Schools (O.Can), the United Kingdom (U.K.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those pharmacists in the September 1983 stock whose date of initial registration fell before October 1981, but who were not included in the September 1981 stock.


Attrition (Attr'n) describes those pharmacists who were included in the 1981 pharmacist stock, but who, because of death, retirement or non-renewal of licensure did not appear in the 1983 pharmacist stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of pharmacists between different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

In addition, a "not answered" group was tabulated (See Note on the last page of this text).

NOTE:

Because of a five-month difference in dates of record for registration and employment data, pharmacists registering between April 1983 and September 1983 did not receive an employment profile to complete. They are included in Tables 2 and 3 in the "not answered" category. The majority of pharmacists in this category, however, did receive an employment profile, but chose not to return It or not to answer the questions concerning employment.



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PHYSICIANS

Definition: A physician in general practice:

"Diagnoses and treats diseases, disorders and injuries of the human body:

Questions and examines patient, Orders and performs laboratory tests, X-rays and other diagnostic procedures. Analyzes reports and findings of tests, X-rays and examination to diagnose condition. Prescribes and administers treatments and drugs. Prescribes physiotherapy other remedial treatments, inoculates and vaccinates patient to prevent communicable diseases. Advises patients to follow good diet, exercise and other health habits to aid in prevention of disease and disorders. Provides pre- and post-natal care, and delivers babies. Reports births, deaths and contagious diseases to governmental authorities. Refers patient to specialists, and assists in surgical procedures. Conducts insurance and pre-employment physical examinations, Performs surgery, if required."1

Date of Record: September 1981 and September 1983,

Sources of Data: The College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia (CPSBC), Medical Services Commission of British Columbia (MSC), and teaching hospitals and institutions in British Columbia.²

Preparation and Updating:

An update tape is received by the Health Manpower Research Unit from the CPSBC on a monthly basis. Included on the tape are new registrants, changes in location, type of registration and specialty status for all physicians previously registered.

These updates are entered into DOCSFILE, a dynamic computer-based file.

In order to practice medicine in B.C. it is necessary to be registered by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of B.C.

An additional file, RESFILE, is maintained with the cooperation of the teaching hospitals and educational institutions, to register and monitor the movement of interns and residents.

The tables include physicians who had a B.C. address at the date of record.

Definition of Terms:

1. Directory Active Physicians

Directory Active Physicians are registered in British Columbia by the CPSBC. At the date of record, they were licensed to practice medicine. Directory Active includes physicians who are on the full, special or temporary registers (temporary includes those who are in postgraduate training or who have a temporary licence to practice).

2. Registration Status

Tables 1, 2 and 3 include those physicians who, at the date of record, were Directory Active:

Non-Postgraduate

Non-Postgraduates are Directory Active Physicians who, according to the records of the CPSBC, are not involved in postgraduate work.

Postgraduate

Postgraduates are Directory Active Physicians who, according to the records of the CPSBC, are involved in postgraduate work. They may be fully registered or on the temporary (educational) register.

3. Specialty

Those physicians who are not in postgraduate training have been assigned to a specialty in the following manner:

The MSC specialty code developed to assess patient profiles is used unless:

a) the physician has certification in Family Medicine from the College of Family Physicians of Canada, in which case the specialty is coded as Family Practice.

b) the physician has no MSC specialty, in which case the most recent Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (RCPSC) specialty will be used.

Tables 4, 5 and 6 group the physicians into broad specialty groups; Tables 7 and 8 disaggregate them.

4. Analysis of Change

Table 9 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of non-postgraduate physicians from 1981 to 1983.

New registrants include physicians who registered for the first time subsequent to September 1981 and were licensed to practice in September 1983. They are recorded according to their place of graduation i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Schools (O.Can), the United Kingdom (U.K.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) include those physicians who, in 1981, were registered but not licensed to practice in B.C. and who were licensed to practice in B.C. in 1983. More specifically, those designated PG to Non-PG (PG-NPG) were registered as of September 1981 and were engaged in postgraduate work. In September 1983 they held non-postgraduate status and were licensed to practice in the province. Other includes Directory Active physicians who were out-of-province, or physicians who were not licensed to practice in B.C. in 1981, but who were licensed to practice in B.C. in September 1983.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those physicians who were included in the 1981 physician stock but who, because of death, retirement or non-renewal of licensure, were not included in the 1983 physician stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of physicians between different regions of the province. The net migration total is therefore zero.





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PHYSIOTHERAPISTS

Definition: A physiotherapist:

programs "Plans and carries out of physical treatment, in consultation with physician and other health care workers, to rehabilitate injured or disabled patients: Administers muscle, nerve, joint and functional ability tests to identify physical problems of patient. Assesses patients' symptoms and capabilities. Directs and aids patients individually or in groups. in exercises designed to assist in muscle restoration and joint mobility. Guides patient in remedial activities involving use of parallel bars, weights, traction and other equipment, Gives whirlpool contrast baths and applies moist packs. treatments, using diathermy, ultrasonic and microwave machines, infra-red and ultra-violet lamps, low voltage generators and other electro-therapeutic equipment. Instructs patients and their families in procedures to be continued at home. Records treatments given and patients' responses and progress."1

Date of Record: October 1981 and November 1983.

Source of Data: Association of Physiotherapists and Massage Practitioners of British Columbia (APMPBC).²

Preparation and Updating:

Notification of new registrants or changes in location or registration status are received three times a year by the Health Manpower Research Unit. These updates, after careful editing and reconciliation of inconsistencies, are entered into PHTFILE, a dynamic computer-based file.

The Health Manpower Research Unit, in cooperation with the Association, distributed a questionnaire and a computer-produced biography to update personal data and employment information. The final response rate (February 1984) was 73.55%.

Preparation and Updating:

Notification of new registrants or changes in location or registration status are received by the Health Manpower Research Unit on a monthly basis. These updates are entered, after careful editing and reconciliation of inconsistencies into *PSYFILE*, a dynamic computer-based file.

In addition, a questionnaire is circulated by the BCPA to each member at the beginning of each year to review the information in the file. Following this the annual *Directory* is published.

The table includes registered psychologists who had a B.C. address at the date of record. Comparison with 1981 figures is suitable because practising psychologists in both years are all registered.

PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTORS

Definition: A public health inspector:

"Enforces laws and regulations governing health standards and provides advice, performing any combination of the following duties:

Locates persons suspected of exposure to communicable diseases to prevent further spread of disease. Interviews exposed persons to secure information concerning other persons who may have been exposed. Advises people to obtain treatment. Inspects restaurants, hotels, cafeterias and other public places to ensure compliance with sanitation laws. Takes samples of water, food and air, and orders chemical, physical or biological tests to determine contamination. Visits plants where food, drugs, cosmetics and similar items are manufactured to investigate sanitary conditions and health and hygiene habits of persons handling consumer products. Destroys subgrades or prohibits sale of impure toxic. damaged or misbranded items. Ascertains that required permits have been obtained and are displayed. Inspects nursing homes and hospitals to ensure conformance with standards and laws governing sanitation, facilities, ethical practices, maintenance of records and competence of personnel. Recommends changes in administrative procedures, facilities and standards to improve efficiency and service to patients, Applies regulations governing manufacture. labelling and sale of upholstered and stuffed articles to ensure use of approved materials, Inspects waste disposal sites to ensure that pollution control regulations are followed. Inspects water wells to enforce provisions of permits. Writes reports and issues violation notices and corrective orders."1



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REGISTERED NURSES

Definition: A registered nurse:

"Chooses to function in any one of the identified roles and performs the functions within his/her chosen role according to academic preparation, experience, established policies of the employing agency, and the terms of contracts in existence in the area of practice.

The Registered Nurse functions in a very wide variety of settings, acute, extended, intermediate and personal care; public health, home care, mental health, doctors' offices; colleges and universities. Choice of roles can be that of Practitioner, Educator, Administrator and Researcher."

Date of Record: June 1981 and June 1983.

Source of Data: The Registered Nurses' Association of British Columbia (RNABC).²

Preparation and Updating:

The tables, derived from the register of the RNABC, include registered nurses who were B.C. residents at the date of record.

²In order to practice as a registered nurse in British Columbia, it is necessary to be registered by the RNABC.

Definition of Terms:

1. Registration Status

Every person registered as a member is entitled to use and assume the designation Registered Nurse (RN). A registered nurse may hold a practising or non-practising membership in the RNABC. A practising registered nurse may or may not be employed in nursing. A non-practising registered nurse who commences employment must make application for a practising membership.

2. Employment Status

Tables 1, 2 and 3 show employment status for practising registered nurses and total numbers of non-practising registered nurses who were B.C. residents at the date of record. The selection method for these categories was modified this year to increase the accuracy of self-reported data. The 1981 figures in this report, therefore, do not agree with those reported in ROLLCALL 81.

3. Place of Employment

Principal place of employment was reported by the registrant on the annual RNABC fee form. Tables 4 and 5 show place of employment for practising registered nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Acute Care Hospital
- (b) Activation/Rehabilitation Hospital
- (c) Extended Care Hospital
- (d) Psychiatric Hospital
- (e) Nursing Homes/Homes for the Aged

4. Field of Practice

Primary field of practice was reported by the registrant on the annual RNABC fee form. Tables 6 and 7 show field of practice for practising registered nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Medical/Surgical General
- (b) Medical/Surgical Specialties (e.g., Intensive Care Unit, Operating Room, Emergency, Dialysis)
- (c) Maternal/Newborn
- (d) Psychiatric
- (e) Pediatric
- (f) Geriatric
- (g) Occupational Health
- (h) Generalized Practice (e.g., float pool, small general hospital)
- (i) Administration
- (j) Research
- (k) Other

5. Employment Position

Employment position was reported by the registrant on the annual RNABC fee form. Tables 8 and 9 show employment position for practising registered nurses employed in the field of nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Director & Assistant/Associate Director
- (b) Supervisor/Assistant Supervisor
- (c) Clinical Specialist
- (d) Head Nurse/Assistant Head Nurse
- (e) General Duty/Staff Nurse/CHN
- (f) Instructor/Professor
- (g) Other

6. Analysis of Change

Table 10 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of registered nurses from 1981 to 1983.

New registrants include all nurses who were active as of June 1983 and who registered with the RNABC for the first time subsequent to June 1981. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation, i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Schools (O.Can), the United Kingdom (U.K.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those nurses who were not practising in June 1981 but were practising in June 1983, and whose date of initial registration was before July 1981.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those registered nurses who were included in the 1981 registered nurse stock, but who, because of death, retirement or non-renewal of registration, were not included in the 1983 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of registered nurses between different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

NOTE:

It is known that a number of registered nurses in B.C. hold dual registration with the RNABC and the Registered Psychiatric Nurses Association of British Columbia (RPNABC). It is not possible to obtain an exact count of such persons but it should be noted that they are included in *both* the registered nurse and registered psychiatric nurse sections of this document.



REGISTERED PSYCHIATRIC NURSES

Definition: A registered psychiatric nurse:

"Gives psychiatric/mental health nursing care to enable individuals, families and groups to function at their optimal level of psychological well-being by developing more effective adaptive behaviours and by increasing their resilience to stress.

The RPN must be competent to provide basic physical nursing skills and must have a highly developed level of communication skills (verbal/non-verbal/written).

The Registered Psychiatric Nurse works with children, adolescents and adults with maladaptive behaviour and/or those who are mentally handicapped.

He/she may work as a member of the health care team or independently, utilizing appropriate consultation.

He/she may be employed in an inpatient facility (institution, psychiatric unit of a general hospital, mental health centre) or, with suitable academic preparation and/or experience, in a community setting."¹

Definition of Terms:

Registration Status

Every person registered as a member of the RPNABC is entitled to use and assume the designation RPN. An RPN may hold either an *Active* or *Inactive* membership. *Active* members may or may not be employed in nursing. *Inactive* members may not be employed in nursing.

NOTE:

It is known that a number of registered psychiatric nurses in B.C. hold dual registration with the RPNABC and the Registered Nurses' Association of British Columbia (RNABC). It is not possible to obtain an exact count of such persons but it should be noted that they are included in *both* the registered nurse and registered psychiatric nurse sections of this document.





RESPIRATORY TECHNOLOGISTS

Definition: A respiratory technologist:

"Administers respiratory therapy to patients in hospital or at home: Discusses patient's treatment with medical and nursing staff. Sets incubators. ventilators. manual resuscitators life-support equipment. Attaches life support equipment to patient. Operates controls of equipment to adjust airway pressure, humidity, blood gas levels, respiratory rate and other factors, Monitors patient's progress and equipment function. Performs pulmonary function tests to assist physician in diagnosis of respiratory illnesses. Takes blood sample from patient and analyzes for blood gas values, if required. Explains treatment procedures and demonstrates equipment operation to patients and personnel. Performs artificial respiration and external cardiac massage, if required, Services and repairs equipment and inspects all medical piping, manifolds and patient alarm system."1




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APPENDIX A MAP OF REGIONAL HOSPITAL DISTRICTS






