Dear Dr. Bigelow:

It is with pleasure that I transmit to you and the members of the Health Human Resources Working Group the latest edition of our ROLLCALL series, ROLLCALL 91. This edition has been expanded to include information on cardiovascular perfusionists and emergency medical assistants, bringing the number of groups covered in the publication to thirty-five. ROLLCALL 91 contains numbers, numbers per 10,000 population, rates of change in number and relative to population change (where comparable data were available), and, for selected groups, disaggregations of data by specialty or service area. Age and gender information for a number of groups for which these data were available have been included for the first time in this edition. As usual, each of the thirty-five group-specific chapters contains information broken down by Regional Hospital District.

Data for the province as a whole suggest that the number of personnel relative to population increased in 1991 for most of the health human resources groups included in ROLLCALL 91. Ratios for specific regions of the province, however, may have increased or decreased as a result of changes in the numbers of personnel and/or varying regional population growth rates. Percentage distributions of health care personnel suggest that while the metropolitan regions of British Columbia comprised about 57 percent of the total provincial population in 1991, approximately 72 percent of the physicians, 68 percent of the pharmacists, and 63 percent of the registered nurses working in the province were resident in these areas. Compared with 1989, this represents a slightly more even distribution of these personnel relative to the province's population, although the current shift in the population toward urban regions may in large part be responsible.

Each new edition of ROLLCALL may differ somewhat from those of previous years as a result of redesigned and improved databases of the professional associations and licensing bodies that provide data for publication. Wherever possible, however, inter-temporal consistency is emphasized.

ROLLCALL 91 represents the culmination of two years of file updating and editing, surveying, text and table production and verification, and data analysis. As in past years, all of the staff of the HHRU were involved in the project. Financial support from the Ministry of Health and the University of British Columbia is gratefully acknowledged. We are indebted to the staff and officials of the professional groups who contributed to the completion of this report.

We look forward to receiving comments and suggestions from the members of the Working Group as well as from other readers.

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FOREWORD

ROLLCALL 91 is the tenth situation report produced by the Health Human Resources Unit (HHRU) at the University of British Columbia. It describes the distribution of selected health personnel in British Columbia by Regional Hospital District. Formerly the Health Manpower Research Unit of the Division of Health Services Research and Development, the HHRU is now part of the Centre for Health Services and Policy Research, which was officially established in July 1991 at the University of British Columbia. Information about the province's health personnel groups is published in **ROLLCALL** in expectation that it will be used for health human resources planning by the principal recipients of the report -- the Health Human Resources Working Group of the Province of British Columbia, the professional associations and licensing or registration bodies in the Province.

Interest in health human resources planning has been extremely high in the past few years, primarily because of increasing concern about the effective use of public monies devoted to health services and because of legislative changes in regulation. Recently, these same issues were highlighted in the British Columbia Royal Commission on Health Care and Costs. In recognition of these issues, this report provides some of the health human resource data that are prerequisite for rational planning purposes and for routine procedures of public accountability.

ROLLCALL 91 provides a snapshot picture of the distribution of health human resources in British Columbia in the last two years. It may contain statistics that do not readily reconcile with the British Columbia component of the national document *Health Personnel in Canada*, due to differences in dates of record and in research methods. That publication reviews provincial variations, using nationally consistent definitions and national data sources. **ROLLCALL** concentrates on examining the health human resources situation in British Columbia by Regional Hospital District, using official and consistently edited provincial data which have been assembled and analyzed in conjunction with provincial licensing authorities and professional associations.

The HHRU's predecessor, the Health Manpower Research Unit, was initially funded as a demonstration project by the Ministry of Health in September 1973. It was charged with the development of the provincial health human resources database and the creation of models to analyze the forces influencing human resources levels and the effect of certain policy options upon the type and distribution of stock. The Unit has produced a number of reports, directories, and in-depth analyses of human resources data for the professional bodies, the Provincial Health Human Resources Working Group and the Federal/Provincial Advisory Committee on Health Human Resources. Since 1973, a large and varied amount of data have been collected by the Unit to provide research support to planning and policy decisions. The human resources components of this database require varying degrees of maintenance to ensure its quality and currency.

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The raw data sources used in this report are of two broad types:

2. Membership lists collected by the Health Human Resources Unit

For the remaining groups, data are collected biennially from information provided by the professional associations. Those data are supplemented, where necessary, through questionnaire surveys of individuals in certain health occupations. However, only the computer-based groups can be examined in a longitudinal fashion to analyze transitions within and between regional districts over a specified period.

Although a variety of organizations have provided the Health Human Resources Unit with the data published in **ROLLCALL**, the Unit is solely responsible for all the material presented in the report (chapter tables, the Overview, and the Appendices).

Readers who have used ROLLCALL in previous years will note several changes and additions to the 1991 edition. Rather than a simple alphabetical listing, the human resource groups covered in ROLLCALL 91 have been reorganized into nine general service areas. This reorganization was undertaken to more easily facilitate comparisons of groups in similar service areas, as well as to help establish a standard format for ROLLCALL and other HHRU publications (ie. PRODUCTION). This year, ROLLCALL also extends its coverage to include data on emergency medical assistants and cardiovascular perfusionists, bringing the total number of groups included in the report to thirty-five. While both groups were included in recognition of the distinct roles they play in the health care system, their inclusion was made possible as a result of the availability of reasonably reliable and comprehensive data. Since definitions regarding the boundaries of the health care sector vary, there are inevitably certain groups that might have been included had the boundaries been different (e.g. veterinarians). There may also be small or large health personnel groups for which we were unable to secure data because of the non-existence of a formal licensing body or professional association, the absence of a membership list or, more generally, the unavailability of an accurate source of required information.

ROLLCALL 91 has also been expanded to include age and sex information on a number of the province's health human resource groups. For three groups, age and gender data were derived from the results of Health Human Resources Unit surveys. For fourteen others, these data were compiled from membership or registration databases obtained with the permission of their professional associations or registration boards. Information on gender was not available for emergency medical assistants, but age data are presented for this group. Analysis of change tables for physiotherapists, registered psychiatric nurses and licensed practical nurses have been added this year as a reflection of the increased stability of licensing databases maintained by these groups.

All data are reported by Regional Hospital District (RHD). Supplementary breakdowns by local health area, by community, and by HHRU designated region are available on request. Because actual census figures are not yet available for British Columbia's regional hospital districts, population estimates made available by the Planning and Statistics Division of the British Columbia Ministry of Finance and Corporate Affairs¹ (see Appendix B) are the basis of many of the statistics that appear in ROLLCALL. All tables showing intertemporal comparisons of personnel per 10,000 population distributions for 1989 and 1991 have been computed using the most recent estimates. The 1989 personnel to population ratios that appear in ROLLCALL 91 differ significantly from those reported in ROLLCALL 89 and ROLLCALL UPDATE 90 because they have been recalculated based on these more accurate estimates.

While each new edition of ROLLCALL reflects improvements in accuracy and detail, at times these improvements may render comparisons with the previous ROLLCALL reports meaningless. The use of membership as a proxy for stock, for instance, is still necessary for many groups where membership is not compulsory. While comparative data are provided for these groups if there have been no major changes in membership classification, inter-temporal inferences should be made with caution.

Regional inequalities may or may not indicate regional deficiencies or excesses. While this may indeed be the case in certain instances, the data provided in the following pages are not a sufficient base from which to identify such deficiencies, since many factors interact in determining *optimal* mix and numbers of health care personnel in any district. The demography and needs of the population, the service functions of

possible transfer of functions between members of the formal and informal health care provider groups must all be considered in the use of these statistics.

ROLLCALL 91 represents the culmination of two years of file maintenance and updating, topped off most recently with six intensive months of surveying, consistency checks, table generation, definition and other text verification, proofreading and analysis. The team working on this edition included Patrick Wong Fung, Kerry Kerluke, Brian McCashin, Harold Yip (programming and file updating); Donna Abbott (coding, inputting data and proofreading drafts); Lars Apland, Laura Wood (surveys of certain groups, editing and updating personnel definitions, compiling statutory information). Computer analyses were run under UNIX SunOS[™] 4.1, DOS[™] machines and the UBC mainframe (IBM[™] 3480), using SAS[™] 6.07, Foxbase[™] and locally written software. Tables, charts and text were produced with Excel[™] 3.0, TEXTFORM[™] (text processing language) and WordPerfect[™] 5.1. A Xerox[™] 9700 laser printer was used for mainframe printing. PC-based printing was done on a QMS 815 Postscript[™] laser printer.

OVERVIEW

I. INTRODUCTION

The main purpose of **ROLLCALL** is to enumerate and describe each of the thirty-five health human resource groups in British Columbia for which reliable data were available. This section is intended to present health human resource group data in a province-wide context by providing relative supply figures. The data are reviewed with the object of highlighting possible trends in the growth of individual personnel groups. In Part III of this section, the data are assessed from the standpoint of how personnel supply compares for metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas of the province. Caution is advised, however, in the interpretation and utilization of some of these comparative data because sources of data are varied and the degree of accuracy in some instances cannot be ascertained.

The analyses in this section do not provide conclusive information regarding health human resources imbalances. To draw conclusions about maldistribution from inter-regional comparisons of personnel ratios would be misleading since regions have varying supply requirements due to differing population characteristics and variations in the complexity of services provided. The personnel to population ratios in the following tables do not adjust for such factors and should be used only as a basis for informed discussion and further investigation. As well, since population estimates for the province's Regional Hospital Districts (RHDs) are from the most recent Projection Model¹, the 1989 figures presented here differ significantly from the corresponding figures that appeared in ROLLCALL 89 and ROLLCALL UPDATE 90. Therefore, caution is advised when interpreting changes in some of the statistics that follow.

II. PROVINCIAL SUMMARY

a) Personnel to Population Ratios

Table 1 presents a provincial overview of the thirty-five group-specific chapters of this report. The table provides information about numbers for 1991 as well as comparisons of personnel to population ratios for 1989 and 1991. Readers are cautioned not to compare these latter ratios with those which appeared in ROLLCALL 89, because the 1991 edition is based on more accurate population estimates.

The source and specifications of data presented for each group is outlined in Table 2. Where intertemporal comparisons are concerned, varying nomenclature and definitions may sometimes limit the comparability of the data. As well, since the data are drawn from sources which have varying registration, licensing and membership stipulations, comparisons between groups should be made with caution. Where active registration and/or licensure is a requirement and mandatory by legislation, such as for physicians and dentists, the figures presented are firm and comprehensive. Where registration is not mandatory, as in the case of occupational therapists, figures only represent the registered members of those groups.

Except for pharmacists, certified dental assistants, dentists, dental hygienists, and physicians, data include only those individuals whose registration signifies employment in their respective fields.

²Active Members are discussed for groups that do not have mandatory registration or licensing requirements but for which provincial associations provide reliable employment data or specify membership criteria and categories that allow identification of those employed in the field. Except for health record personnel and respiratory therapists, data include only those individuals whose membership signifies employment in their respective fields.

For groups without any registration requirements, information has been collected from membership records, usually those of a provincial association. Membership categories sometimes include active/inactive designations. These, however, refer to membership status only and probably misrepresent the number of employed personnel in that field. The direction and degree of misrepresentation may also vary by group. The specification of such variations is beyond the scope of this report.

For groups that were the subject of HHRU surveys, the information presented is drawn from respondents who met HHRU inclusion criteria. These criteria usually entailed employment in the health sector, or employment in a position deemed to have an impact on health services in British Columbia.

In the tables that follow in this section, references to most groups apply only to those registrants who were employed in their respective fields. However, a number of exceptions should be noted. References to certified dental assistants, dental hygienists, pharmacists, physicians, health record personnel, respiratory therapists, audiologists and speech/language pathologists, health services executives, medical radiation technologists, prosthetists and orthotists, and public health inspectors include individuals who may or may not be employed in their respective fields. References to cardiovascular perfusionists, clinical engineers and biomedical engineering technologists and technicians and diagnostic medical sonographers apply to survey populations considered to be essentially comprehensive by the HHRU. References to social workers apply only to respondents to an HHRU survey of this group.²

In view of these limitations, the data in Table 1 show that, as in 1989, registered nurses are the most numerous of the health human resource groups, followed by directory active physicians and licensed practical nurses. (The osteopaths, who were reported in error in 1989 to be three in number, remain at their 1987 total of four; they are not included in any of these overview tables.) The totals shown for cardiovascular perfusionists, clinical engineers and biomedical engineering technologists and technicians, diagnostic medical sonographers and for social workers are based on the results of HHRU surveys. However, in the case of dental hygienists, initial enumeration was derived from registration data maintained by the College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia while subsequent information is based on survey responses. Because of their essential accuracy and comprehensiveness, the survey universes for diagnostic medical sonographers and clinical engineers and biomedical engineering technologists were used for the initial enumeration of these groups. Subsequent information is based on survey responses. Information on social workers is based only on responses to the HHRU survey of this group. All of these survey populations were drawn from lists of employed personnel that had been provided by government, hospitals, professional associations and/or gathered in earlier surveys. The totals for health services executives, health record personnel, dietitians and nutritionists, respiratory therapists, cardiology technologists, and prosthetists and orthotists derive from membership lists of unverifiable comprehensiveness. These totals should be considered as estimates of the health human resource supply for those groups. Comparisons with data from previous years would be misleading and invalid.

In general, the personnel to population ratios reported in Table 1 show slight increases for most groups. The exceptions include food service supervisors, prosthetists and orthotists, and denturists, the numbers of which declined slightly. The largest increase is seen among registered nurses, followed by registered psychiatric nurses, certified dental assistants, physiotherapists, massage practitioners, physicians, and medical radiation technologists, in that order. Given the absence of comparable data, no personnel to population ratios for 1989 are presented for cardiovascular perfusionists, clinical engineers and biomedical technologists, cardiology technologists, prosthetists and orthotists, health services executives, registered dietitians and nutritionists, respiratory therapists, and social workers.

b) Production Ratios

The information reported in Table 3 results from the combination of data from ROLLCALL and data from PRODUCTION 91. The production index is the ratio of the current number of active personnel in that group to the number who graduated in that discipline in 1991. Thus, the ratios for dental technicians, denturists, dentists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and registered psychiatric nurses indicate the number of practitioners employed in the field for every new graduate in the discipline. For all the other groups, the ratios reflect the number of registered and/or licensed personnel relative to the number of new graduates.

Table 3 shows increases in the production indices for certified dental assistants, dentists, licensed practical nurses, pharmacists, physicians, registered nurses and registered psychiatric nurses. In particular, the figures highlight the continued trend of notable increases in the production indices for British Columbia's nursing groups. While there was one new graduate in nursing for every 24.3 registered nurses employed in nursing in 1987 and this index increased to 30.6 in 1989, there was only one new registered nurse graduate for every 36.8 nursing-employed RNs in 1991. The actual production of registered nurses rose over this period, but the continued rise in the production index is likely to be the result of an increased number of registered nurses employed in nursing. For LPNs, the increase in the index is most readily explained by a decline in the number of new graduates coupled with only a slight increase in the number of LPNs employed in the field. As in 1989, the increase in the index for physicians is probably due to an increase in the number of directory active physicians, since slightly more new graduates were produced in British Columbia in 1991 (122 versus 120 in 1989)³.

The decrease in the production index for physiotherapists is the result of a substantial increase in new graduates (from 21 in 1989/90 to 34 in 1991/92) and a moderate increase in the number of physiotherapists employed in the field. The moderate decrease in the index for occupational therapists is the result of an increase in graduates, from 24 in 1989/90 to 32 in 1991/92, and a notable increase in the numerator. The decrease in the production index for dental hygienists stems from another moderate increase in the numerator offset by another increase in new graduates (from 20 in 1987/88 to 38 in 1989/90 to 59 in 1991/92).⁴

The information from this index must be carefully interpreted in combination with other information about growth rates, surpluses and shortages, and/or possibilities for health human resource substitution in order to be used for educational program planning. The index shows the flow of training for selected occupations relative to existing supply; it is impossible to interpret these changes in flow as indicative of surplus employment in a particular field, or of over-production.

c) Age and Sex

Table 4 displays age and sex information about each of the groups for which such data were available. The total number of males and females in each human resource group is organized according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada. Caution is advised when employing some of these figures, particularly where the number of personnel with unknown information is substantial in relation to the total group population, as with the certified dental assistants and the diagnostic medical sonographers.

For more than half of the groups shown in the table, women comprised more than two-thirds of the membership. The highest concentrations of female personnel, in both metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas, were among certified dental assistants, registered dietitians and nutritionists, registered nurses, dental hygienists and occupational therapists. For each of these groups, women comprised over 95 percent of the membership. Other groups with high concentrations of female personnel were licensed practical nurses, physiotherapists, diagnostic medical sonographers, registered psychiatric nurses, occupational therapists, and social workers, in that order. The only groups that were comprised of relatively equal proportions of males and females were pharmacists and psychologists. The only groups with overwhelmingly high concentrations of male personnel were podiatrists, clinical engineers and biomedical engineering technologists and technicians, dentists, and physicians, in that order.

For most groups, the highest proportions of personnel were in the category for 35 - 44 years of age. The exceptions to this norm were the psychologists, of whom approximately 45% were 45 - 54 years old. Certified dental assistants appeared to be the youngest personnel group. As shown in the table, their registration data indicate that approximately 85 percent of the members were under 35 years old, although the proportion should be viewed with some caution because of the large proportion of this group for which age was unknown. Dental hygienists also appeared to be a youthful group, with over 83 percent of hygienists who responded to an HHRU survey reporting that they were under 45 years of age.

The largest male-dominated personnel group was notably different from the largest female-dominated personnel group in relation to the proportion of its membership that was approaching retirement. Almost a quarter of the physician population (24.9%) was over 54 years of age. This was more than double the percentage of registered nurses (11.9%) who were approaching retirement. For pharmacists and psychologists, groups for which there was a fairly equal distribution of male and female personnel, there was also a more even distribution of personnel across most of the age categories. However, there appeared to be a concentration of psychologists in the middle-ranged age groups.

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III. METROPOLITAN AND NON-METROPOLITAN DISTRIBUTIONS OF PERSONNEL

Figure 1 shows the percentage distribution by metropolitan (Greater Vancouver and Capital), nonmetropolitan (the rest of the province) and all of British Columbia for the ten largest groups of health care personnel. All other groups are included in the *Others* category. Across the entire province, directory active physicians and registered nurses account for about 52 percent of the ROLLCALL - reported personnel. Although these figures appear similar to those reported in ROLLCALL 89, a comparison with the 1989 data would be misleading since emergency medical assistants and cardiovascular perfusionists, who were not included in the 1989 enumeration, are included in the total count for 1991.


Personnel per 10,000 population statistics for the ten health human resources groups with the largest non-metropolitan personnel to population ratios are shown in Figure 2. As in 1987 and in 1989, licensed practical nurses and certified dental assistants showed higher ratios of personnel to population in non-metropolitan regions than in metropolitan regions. Compared to the ratio for metropolitan areas, the personnel to population ratio for emergency medical assistants is appreciably higher for non-metropolitan regions of the province. In 1991, the other health personnel groups continued to demonstrate significantly higher ratios for metropolitan regions.


Shifts in personnel to population ratios may reflect varying population growth rates experienced by different regions of the province as much as they reflect policies or programs that have affected the growth or decline in the number of health care personnel. Changes in the number of personnel and in the total population should both be considered in any evaluation of these ratios.

a) Rates of Change

Table 5 summarizes the average annual rates of change in numbers of personnel and personnel to population ratios for metropolitan and non-metropolitan regions in British Columbia between 1989 and 1991. Overall, most groups saw increases in the rate of change in the number of personnel and the rate of change in the ratio of personnel to population. Massage practitioners and occupational therapists experienced the largest rates of growth in numbers of personnel in both metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas. Following these, in metropolitan regions, were podiatrists, physiotherapists, health record personnel, registered psychiatric nurses, medical radiation technologists, and chiropractors, in that order. In non-metropolitan areas, positive rates of growth in numbers were also seen for medical radiation technologists, health record personnel, registered psychiatric nurses, audiologists and speech/language pathologists, chiropractors, and public health inspectors, followed by physiotherapists and podiatrists, who experienced the same rate of change in numbers of personnel over the period. Only denturists had negative rates of change in number for both metropolitan and non-metropolitan regions. Food service supervisors experienced an overall negative rate of change in personnel based solely on occurrences in metropolitan regions of the province.

Again, most health personnel groups showed positive rates of change in the number of personnel relative to change in population across the whole province. The largest such rates were seen for massage practitioners, occupational therapists, podiatrists, and health record personnel. Across the province as a whole, negative rates of change occurred only among denturists. Although food service supervisors experienced a negative rate of change for the province as a whole and for metropolitan areas of the province, the rate of change for their personnel to population ratio was positive in non-metropolitan areas. In addition, audiologists and speech/language pathologists, dentists, licensed practical nurses, and psychologists demonstrated negative rates of change for personnel relative to population in metropolitan areas and positive rates in non-metropolitan areas, with positive rates of change in their personnel to population ratio population ratio was positive rates and positive rates in non-metropolitan areas.

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b) Inter-Regional Distribution

Tables 6 through 10 illustrate, in different ways, the distribution of health human resources groups throughout the province in 1991. While the use of personnel to population ratios for planning purposes is difficult because these ratios do not necessarily reflect underlying population health needs, they can be used to identify areas of health human resources activity which require investigation. As noted earlier, data presented in **ROLLCALL** should be used with caution. For instance, a district which contains a specialized facility that operates within a large catchment area and which is the principal employer for a particular group may show a high personnel to population ratio. The ratio for that district would not necessarily reflect a surplus of workers, just as lower ratios in the districts surrounding that catchment area need not imply shortages. Indeed, for some groups, increasing numbers may be expressive of economies of scale. In these instances, a higher population district might show a lower ratio, but as a minimum number of personnel are required in lower population districts, those personnel may not be fully utilized, so that an increase in the population would not automatically necessitate the addition of personnel from that particular health care group.

Metropolitan vs. Non-Metropolitan Personnel to Population Ratios

Table 6 compares the personnel to population ratios in metropolitan regions to the personnel to population ratios of non-metropolitan regions for each health personnel group. A value of 1.0 for the metropolitan to non-metropolitan ratio would indicate that, for a specific group, the personnel to population ratio in the two metropolitan regions was equal to the ratio for all non-metropolitan regions combined. Only groups with at least 100 personnel in the province in 1991 are included. Groups for which comparable data were unavailable are indicated with an asterisk. Emergency medical assistants showed the greatest disparity in their distribution between metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas, with a personnel to population ratio in non-metropolitan regions almost four times that of metropolitan areas. Clinical engineers and biomedical engineering technologists continued to show a large imbalance in their distribution, but with concentrations opposite to those of emergency medical assistants. Their metropolitan personnel to population ratio was 3.58 times greater than that for non-metropolitan regions. Their services, however, are thought to be supplied to a number of RHDs from centralized locations. Only physiotherapists showed an increase in the ratio. This increase is the result of higher rates of growth in the number of physiotherapists in metropolitan than in nonmetropolitan areas and represents a reversal in the trend for the ratio that dates back to 1985. Twenty groups showed some decrease in the value of their ratios, among them psychologists, occupational therapists, physicians, audiologists and speech/language pathologists, pharmacists, certified dental assistants, dentists, dental hygienists, dental technicians, denturists, massage practitioners, medical laboratory technologists, medical radiation technologists, registered nurses, registered psychiatric nurses, food service supervisors, health record personnel, chiropractors, and licensed practical nurses. The ratios for public health inspectors (0.94), optometrists (0.83), certified dental assistants (0.82), licensed practical nurses (0.67) and emergency medical assistants (0.26) are indicative of personnel to population ratios that are larger in non-metropolitan than in metropolitan regions. Optometrists were the only group for which the ratio did not change between 1989 and 1991. The most notable changes in the order in which groups were ranked, however, occurred among those seen in the middle range of the table.

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Age and Sex

Table 8 reports the gender composition (the percentage among each group that is female) of selected health personnel groups in metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas of British Columbia. Comparative figures are provided for each of the standard age categories developed and used by statistics Canada. Base figures for percentage calculations must be considered when interpreting these figures, as calculations from small base numbers will be less reliable than those calculated for larger groups.

For almost all the groups for which age and sex data were available, there was a higher percentage of women in metropolitan than in non-metropolitan areas of the province. There was a higher proportion of female personnel in non-metropolitan areas only among licensed practical nurses, occupational therapists, and registered nurses, although for the latter group the composition was almost the same in metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas for certified dental assistants and registered dietitians and nutritionists. The greatest differences in gender distribution for metropolitan areas as compared to non-metropolitan areas were seen among the social workers, pharmacists, physicians, massage practitioners, and psychologists, for which the percentage of females was as much as 16.6% greater in metropolitan areas.

While the concentration of female personnel was higher in non-metropolitan areas than in metropolitan areas for physiotherapists who were under 35 years of age, this trend was reversed for physiotherapists who were 35 years or older. Concentrations of female physiotherapists appeared to increase in both metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas until the category for 45-54 years of age, after which the percentage of male personnel in this group steadily grew. For registered psychiatric nurses, the concentration of female personnel was higher in metropolitan regions for individuals under 45 years of age. After that point, the concentration of female personnel was higher in non-metropolitan regions. Among physicians, the gap between the proportions of female personnel seen in metropolitan and non-metropolitan regions lessened across the age ranges. This pattern did not occur with the dentists, the only other male-dominated group showing any distribution of female personnel across all age groups.

The greatest differences in gender distribution between metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas occurred with diagnostic medical sonographers and pharmacists in the age category for 45 - 54 years and psychologists and social workers in the age category for 55 - 64 years. Once again, however, the base figures for calculations must be taken into consideration. In this case, for instance, the base for the diagnostic medical sonographer calculation was only 11, while the others were based on personnel counts of between 112 and 336.

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Personnel and Provincial Population Distribution

Tables 9 and 10 illustrate the percent distribution of selected health care groups in relation to the percent distribution of the population for 1989 and 1991 in each of the province's regional hospital districts. These percentages are also aggregated at the metropolitan and non-metropolitan levels. The percentages can be considered, with a reasonable degree of certainty, to represent persons in each of these groups who are practising and known to be employed in their fields. However, according to surveys undertaken by the College of Pharmacists of British Columbia, the pharmacist group is comprised of a number of individuals who are registered, but are not in practise in the province.

The population estimates and personnel data presented in the tables suggest that 1991 personnel distributions for a number of groups approximated provincial population distributions slightly more closely than in 1989. While the revised estimates indicate that the proportion of the province's population in non-metropolitan areas decreased somewhat, five of the seven health care groups reported in the table show that the proportions of their personnel increased in non-metropolitan areas to more closely approximate provincial proportions. In 1989, for instance, 43.44 percent of British Columbia's population was in non-metropolitan areas, while only 27.65 percent of physicians and 35.96 percent of registered nurses were reported in these RHDs. In 1991, however, the non-metropolitan population fell slightly to 42.97 percent of the total population, while the proportion of physicians increased slightly to 28.44 percent and the percentage of registered nurses grew to 37.06 in these regions. Of the seven groups reported, only licensed practical nurses and physiotherapists became more unevenly distributed in relation to the province's population.

According to the estimates, Greater Vancouver accounted for 47.75 percent of the provincial population in 1991, and for 61.95 percent of the province's registered psychiatric nurses, 60.47 percent of its physicians, 59.39 percent of its pharmacists, 54.88 percent of its physiotherapists and 50.64 percent of its registered nurses. The distributions for medical laboratory technologists, physicians, registered nurses, and registered psychiatric nurses shifted in the period between 1989 and 1991 to more closely reflect the percentage of the provincial population resident in Greater Vancouver RHD. During this same period, however, the gap between the population and health care personnel distributions increased for licensed practical nurses, pharmacists, and physiotherapists in Greater Vancouver RHD. The Greater Vancouver RHD is also unique in that for each of the groups highlighted in Table 10, except licensed practical nurses, the percentages of personnel were greater than the percentage of the population living there in 1991. Licensed practical nurses, however, were the only group that showed a proportion of personnel greater than of the population in a majority of the province's RHDs and in non-metropolitan regions overall.

INTRODUCTION TO THE CHAPTERS

The remainder of the report is partitioned into health personnel group-specific chapters. All statistics within each chapter pertain to the specified date of record. Contained in most chapters, along with the figures which have been summarized in the Overview, is a 3-dimensional map of Regional Hospital Districts which reflects the actual worker/population ratios. The background grid on each map includes shadows of the 3-dimensional bars for each of the regions in the foreground. The bars are labelled with the Regional Hospital District number and the axes reveal the worker/population ratios. These should permit the reader to gain a rapid visual impression of the human resources distribution across Regional Hospital Districts.

Following the thirty-five personnel chapters are a number of appendices which provide provincial data on population, hospital bed supply, and the number of retail pharmacies. .

include Health Record Administrators (HRA), Health Data Technologists (HDT) and Health Record Technicians (HRT), who work in a variety of health care facilities such as acute, specialized and long term hospitals, community health centres, industrial clinics, and provincial or federal health care agencies, as well as the health care research field. They contribute to the health information team by: planning information acquisition, maintenance and utilization systems, analyzing and technically evaluating health information, and compiling and applying administrative and health statistics.¹

Governing Statute:	None.
Governing Body:	None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the Health Record Association of British Columbia (HRABC) is voluntary.
Date of Record:	November 1989 and November 1991.
Source of Data:	The Health Record Association of British Columbia (HRABC).

Preparation and Updating:

The tables, derived solely from the membership list provided by the HRABC, include Active and Inactive members who reported a British Columbia address at the date of record. Affiliate and Honourary members have been excluded from the tables since they do not represent personnel who currently qualify for employment in the field.

Definition of Terms:

1. HRABC Membership

HRABC membership may be Active, Inactive, Affiliate or Honourary.²

(a) Active

The Executive Committee may admit to Active membership any person who makes application thereto and who establishes to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee that she has successfully completed a health record program that is recognized by the Canadian Health Record Association (CHRA).

(b) Inactive

The Executive Committee may grant Inactive membership to those persons who so request it, in writing, and who are no longer engaged in active work in the health care field in British Columbia.


(c) Affiliate

The Executive Committee may admit to Affiliate membership any person (excluding a person who qualifies for Active membership) who makes application thereto and who establishes to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee an interest in the objects of the Society and their advancement. To qualify for Affiliate membership, the person must be:

- (i) engaged in the record department in a hospital or other allied field satisfactory to the Executive Committee; or
- (ii) a student enroled in a health record program that is recognized by the CHRA.
- (d) Honourary

The Executive Committee may grant Honourary membership to HRABC members who have retired from active service.

All membership categories defined on the following pages are working in the field and have been included in the table. Excluded from the table are student, retired, life and other members of these organizations who are not considered to be part of the work force.

Definition of Terms:

1. Executive and Candidate Membership in CCHSE¹

(a) *Executive*

The *Executive Category* is open to individuals in all health services sectors who is employed in:

- (i) an executive level position with senior management responsibilities;
- (ii) a full-time faculty position in a program of health administration; or
- (iii) a non-institutional position possessing either senior management or the equivalent of project leader responsibilities.

Executive members may elect with one year's tenure to take the College's Certification Exam, and if successful are eligible to apply for Fellowship.

(b) Candidate

The Candidate Category is open to individuals in all health services sectors who:

- (i) hold a position with either departmental, consultant, or senior staff level responsibilities; or
- (ii) hold either a baccalaureate degree, an accountancy designation, or an approved certificate in health services administration.

Candidate members fulfilling tenure requirements may elect to take the College's Certification Exam, and if successful become eligible Certified Members of the College.

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2. Membership in the Health Administrators Association of British Columbia²

(a) Active

An *Active* member must be a graduate of an approved course in health or business administration or a combination of an approved course and appropriate experience, and must hold either a position of senior administrative responsibility in a health care organization or a consultative position in health care administration.

(b) Associate

An Associate member is a person who meets all the Active membership criteria except either the appropriate educational qualifications or a position of senior administrative responsibility, or is a person who has been an Active member of the Association and has resigned while in good standing, who is no longer engaged in the field of health administration in this province.

(c) Provisional

A *Provisional* member must be actively engaged in the field of health administration as well as working toward the educational qualifications necessary to become an *Active* member.

3. Membership in ACHE³

(a) Nominee

Applicants are admitted to the College as *Nominees* and remain in that category for a minimum of two years. To advance to *Membership* status, *Nominees* must, within five years, meet criteria which include:

- (i) participation and leadership in health care affairs;
- (ii) personal program of continuing professional education;
- (iii) successful completion of a Board of Governors Examination.

(b) Membership


Membership is approved provided the *Nominee* has an appropriate combination of postsecondary education and employment experience in an eligible health services administrative, management or education position.

(c) Fellowship

Following five years in *Membership*, an affiliate may advance to *Fellowship* after meeting criteria which include:

- (i) employment in an eligible health care management position;
- (ii) participation and leadership in health care and in the community;
- (iii) an approved level of continuing education;
- (iv) completion of a Fellowship project.

CERTIFIED DENTAL ASSISTANTS

Definition: A certified dental assistant (dental auxiliary - level II)

may be delegated the following duties and procedures under the personal supervision of a duly licensed member of the College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia:

- (a) those duties or procedures which a dental assistant (dental auxiliary level I) may perform;¹
- (b) polishing clinical crowns of teeth with rubber cup or brush and polishing pastes;
- (c) applying topical anticariogenic agents;
- (d) taking study model impressions;
- (e) applying fissure sealants;
- (f) evaluating dietary habits and providing nutritional counselling as it pertains to dentistry;
- (g) providing instruction in the use and maintenance of partial and complete dentures and other appliances;
- (h) removing sutures;
- (i) placing and removing matrices and wedges;
- (j) performing first aid procedures;
- (k) applying desensitizing agents;
- (l) removing periodontal dressings;
- (m) performing pulp vitality tests using electric pulp tester and thermal pulp tester;
- (n) taking simple face-bow transfer;
- (o) acid etching prepared cavities;
- (p) applying non-invasive identification discs.²

On successful completion of the specific orthodontic training module concerned, a certified dental assistant may also be delegated the following duties and procedures under the personal supervision of a licensed member:

- (a) instructing in the placement and care of removable orthodontic appliances;
- (b) tying-in arch wires that a dentist has fitted;
- (c) removing orthodontic arch wire;
- (d) removing excess cement or bonding material by means of hand instruments or ultrasonic hand instruments following banding/bonding and debanding/debonding procedures;
- (e) fitting orthodontic bands prior to assessment by a member;



DENTAL HYGIENISTS

Definition: A dental hygienist (dental auxiliary - level III)

... in addition to those duties and procedures which a certified dental assistant (dental auxiliary -level II) may perform¹, may be delegated the following duties and procedures under the direction of a duly licensed member of the College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia:

- (a) examining the head and neck as it pertains to dentistry;
- (b) examining the intra-oral structures;
- (c) placing and removing temporary restorations;
- (d) applying periodontal dressings;
- (e) removing supra and subgingival calculus;
- (f) root planing;
- (g) recontouring existing restorations;



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DENTAL TECHNICIANS

DENTAL TECHNICIANS

Definition: A dental technician is licensed to

- "(a) make, produce, reproduce, construct, furnish, supply, alter and repair a denture, bridge or prosthetic appliance or thing to be used in, on, in connection with, or in the treatment of a human tooth, jaw or associated structure or tissue for a person in accordance with a prescription to perform any of those services for that person; and
- (b) make structural repairs to a removable dental prosthesis, or to replace teeth in a denture without a prescription..."

where the services can be performed without intraoral procedures or the taking of impressions.¹

Governing Statute: Dental Technicians and Denturists Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 91; administered by the Ministry of Health.

Governing Body: Dental Technicians and Denturists Board of British Columbia (DTDBBC). In order to practise as a Dental Technician in British Columbia, it is necessary to be licensed by the Dental Technicians and Denturists Board of British Columbia. Registered dental technicians have exclusive use of the titles: Dental Technician, Certified Dental Technician and Registered Dental Technician.

- Date of Record: September 1989 and January 1992.
- Source of Data: Dental Technicians and Denturists Board of British Columbia.

Preparation and Updating:

The tables, derived from the *Nominal Roll* supplied by the DTDBBC, include information on licensed dental technicians in British Columbia organized according to their last reported address at the date of record. Table 1 includes information on all dental technicians licensed to practice in British Columbia. Table 2 reports information on Registered Dental Technicians only.


Definition of Terms:

A registered dental technician is licensed by the Dental Technicians and Denturists Board.

An apprentice technician is registered by the Dental Technicians and Denturists Board and is licensed to practise under the supervision of a registered dental technician.

A student technician is registered by the Dental Technicians and Denturists Board and is licensed to practise under the supervision of a registered dental technician. After 18 months work experience, a student technician is eligible to undertake the certifying exams to become a registered dental technician.

A temporary registrant (formerly a technician on permit) has not yet completed his/her registration examinations, but is licensed to practise under the supervision of a registered dental technician. Included in this category are new arrivals to the province.

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DENTISTS

Definition: A dentist

diagnoses and treats diseases, injuries and malformations of teeth, gums and related oral structures and prescribes and administers preventive procedures.

Examines teeth, gums and other tissues using X-rays and dental equipment. Diagnoses condition and plans treatment. Administers local or general anaesthetic. Fills cavities with amalgam, silver, gold, or other material. Replaces portion of tooth crown with inlay or artificial crown. Performs minor oral surgery, including extractions of erupted or impacted teeth. Takes dental impressions. Designs bridgework and partial or complete dentures. Constructs dental appliances or writes specifications for dental technician. Cleans teeth. Instructs patients in oral hygiene to prevent dental problems. Monitors growth pattern of patient's teeth. Refers patients to specialists.¹

Governing Body: The College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia. In order to practise as a dentist in British Columbia, it is necessary to be registered by the College, and to hold an unexpired annual certificate (licence) under the Act.

Date of Record: September 1989 and December 1991.

Source of Data: The College of Dental Surgeons of British Columbia (CDSBC).

Preparation and Updating:

The tables were prepared from registration data maintained by the CDSBC and include licensed dentists who reported a British Columbia address at the date of record.

Definition of Terms:

1. Specialty²

Licensed dentists are allocated to the specialty in which they have been certified by the College of Dental Surgeons. The categories used in Table 1 are:

- (a) Non-specialist;
- (b) Endodontics;
- (c) Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery;
- (d) Orthodontics;
- (e) Paediatric Dentistry;
- (f) Periodontics;
- (g) Prosthodontics;
- (h) Oral Pathology;
- (i) Oral Radiology.

Tables 2 and 3 group dental specialties (b) through (i) into a specialty category, since numbers of most specialists are too small to calculate meaningful population ratio and rate of change figures.

2. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on licensed dentists in British Columbia, derived from CDSBC registration information, is shown in Table 4. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

3. Analysis of Change

Table 5 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of dentists from 1989 to 1991.


New registrants are dentists included in the December 1991 stock who registered with the CDSBC for the first time subsequent to September 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation: i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those dentists who did not renew their licence in B.C. in September 1989, but were licensed in B.C. in December 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before September 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes dentists who were included in the September 1989 stock but who, because of death, retirement, suspension, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of licensure, were not included in the December 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration: it records the flow of dentist between different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.



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PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTORS

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PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTORS

Definition: A public health inspector

"enforces laws and regulations governing health standards and provides advice, performing any combination of the following duties:

locates persons suspected of exposure to communicable diseases to prevent further spread of disease. Interviews exposed persons to secure information concerning other persons who may have been exposed. Advises people to obtain treatment. Inspects restaurants, hotels, cafeterias and other public places to ensure compliance with sanitation laws. Takes samples of water, food and air, and orders chemical, physical or biological tests to determine contamination. Visits plants where food, drugs, cosmetics and similar items are manufactured to investigate sanitary conditions and health and hygiene habits of persons handling consumer products. Destroys subgrades or prohibits sale of impure, toxic, damaged or misbranded items. Ascertains that required permits have been obtained and are displayed. Inspects nursing homes and hospitals to ensure conformance with standards and laws governing sanitation, facilities, ethical practices, maintenance of records and competence of personnel. Recommends changes in administrative procedures, facilities and standards to improve efficiency and service to patients. Applies regulations governing manufacture, labelling and sale of upholstered and stuffed articles to ensure use of approved materials. Inspects waste disposal sites to ensure that pollution control regulations are followed. Inspects water wells to enforce provisions of permits. Writes reports and issues violation notices and corrective orders."1

Governing Statute: Health Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 161.

Governing Body: Board of Certification of Public Health Inspectors of the Canadian Public Health Association. No person shall be appointed to the position of public health inspector unless he or she holds a certificate in Public Health (Canada) or the acceptable authorized equivalent. Members of the British Columbia Branch of the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors have exclusive use of the titles: Registered Public Health Inspector, Registered Environmental Health Officer, RPHI, and REHO.







CLINICAL ENGINEERS AND BIOMEDICAL ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGISTS AND TECHNICIANS

Definition: Clinical Engineers

apply physiological theory and engineering theory, methodologies, technology, instrumentation and materials in:

- (a) professional engineering practice in the clinical environment. Typical responsibilities would include incident investigation, investigation of equipment hazards, equipment evaluation, education on equipment safety and operation, design of parts or systems required to meet clinical needs, and administration of repairs, preventive maintenance and performance assurance of clinical equipment;
- (b) teaching clinical engineering practice or biomedical engineering technology at a university or college. Typical responsibilities would include teaching and supervising students engaged in clinical research projects;
- (c) clinical research and development. Typically these engineers would work full time on clinical research projects involving either work on clinical equipment pertaining to a clinical situation, or direct interaction with patients and physicians to obtain data or design apparatus.

Training for clinical engineering consists of an engineering degree (usually Electrical, Mechanical, or Biomedical Engineering), commonly supplemented with graduate work in biomedical or clinical engineering.¹

- Governing Statute: Engineer's Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 109, administered by the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology.
- Governing Body: Association of Professional Engineers of the Province of British Columbia (APEPBC). In order to practise as a professional engineer in British Columbia, it is necessary to be registered by the APEPBC.

Biomedical engineers may also become members of the Canadian Medical and Biological Engineering Society (CMBES) and may be certified as Clinical Engineers by the CMBES.

practice the application of detailed operational systems and methods in the biomedical electronics field. In particular, the field of practice of the technologist is the implementation and development of applied science techniques, while that of the technologist may also take part in systems development, layout and co-ordination of activities and resources.²

Governing Body: None. Compulsory licensure/registration do not exist. Individuals working as biomedical engineering technologists/technicians may be registered with the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of British Columbia (ASTTBC). Members of the ASTTBC have exclusive use of the titles: Applied Science Technologist, Certified Technician, C Tech. It is also possible to be certified by the Canadian Medical and Biological Engineering Society (CMBES) as a Canadian Biological Engineering Technologist (CBET).

Date of Record: February 1992.

Source of Data: Health Human Resources Unit (HHRU) surveys.

Preparation and Updating:

The figures in Table 1 are derived from an HHRU survey of potential employers of clinical and biological engineering personnel and from an informal list of these personnel provided by the British Columbia Chapter of the Canadian Medical and Biological Engineering Society. Data for all other tables are based on responses to a mail survey of this group conducted by the HHRU.

Interpretation of the Data:

The data presented are based on the results of the HHRU surveys and include only those individuals directly engaged in clinical activities through direct employment at hospitals, universities or colleges, or private firms which provide equipment service.

The numbers presented here should be considered as an approximate indicator of the number of the personnel to be found in this field. Because of different methods of data collection, comparison with 1989 figures is of limited value and has not been presented.





MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGISTS

Definition: A medical laboratory technologist

"performs medical laboratory tests, procedures, experiments, and analyses for diagnosis, treatment and prevention of disease.

Conducts chemical analyses of blood, urine, cerebro-spinal and other body fluids to ascertain normal and abnormal constituents. Studies blood cells, their numbers, morphological characteristics and coagulation factors related to various physiological and pathological conditions. Prepares tissue sections for microscopic examination using fixation, imbedding, cutting and staining techniques to demonstrate special cellular tissue elements or other characteristics. Studies micro-organisms which cause disease, and their effect upon the human body, using a variety of microscopic and macroscopic techniques. Performs blood group, type and compatibility tests for transfusion purposes. Investigates responses of body to foreign cells or agents."¹

Governing Statute:	None.
Governing Body:	None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the Canadian Society of Laboratory Technologists is voluntary. The Society administers the certification examination program.
Date of Record:	September 1989 and October 1991.

Preparation and Updating:

The tables are derived solely from the Official Registry of Medical Laboratory Technologists (Canada) supplied by the CSLT.



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MEDICAL RADIATION TECHNOLOGISTS

Definition: A medical radiation technologist

(a) in diagnostic radiography

operates radiography equipment to produce images of body structures for diagnostic purposes. Explains treatment and reassures patient. Positions patient so that relevant body parts are recorded. Affixes shields to protect unaffected areas of patient from radiation. Adjusts equipment controls to collimate beam, to regulate length and intensity of X-ray exposure, and to expose film. Processes and prepares films for interpretation by radiologist. Maintains and operates radiographic and fluoroscopic equipment and accessories under physician supervision. Operates radiography equipment in operating theatre or other specialized area to assist physician or surgeon.¹

(b) in radiotherapy

administers radiation treatment to patients as prescribed by radiation oncologist: Explains treatment and reassures patient. Positions patient according to part of body being treated. Affixes shields to protect unaffected areas of patient from radiation. Adjusts equipment controls to collimate and direct radiation beam. Monitors patient and initiates emergency procedures as required. Assists clinical physicist to prepare patient's treatment plan according to radiation oncologist's prescription. Prepares or assists in preparation of sealed radioactive substances for insertion into body cavities or particular tissues or for surface application.²

(c) in nuclear medicine

is aware of patient needs and cares for patient during *in vivo* nuclear medicine procedures, including observing and responding to changes in status and initiating emergency procedures as required. Carries out *in vitro* tests with understanding of quality control and standards implied; prepares radionuclides, reagents, and radiopharmaceuticals for *in vivo* administration. Prepares radiation sources to be delivered to certain malignant or other tissues by administering suitable radionuclides or chemical compounds containing them; checks calibration of amount of activity; ensures that radiation protection measures are observed in handling and dispensing of radioactive material. Administers prescribed dose of radiopharmaceuticals after appropriate preparation and calibration. Maintains,

calibrates and operates specialized equipment; prepares reagents and pharmaceuticals; performs tests with regard to clinical information available; assesses tests for artifactual anomalies; prepares results; controls quality. Understands and practises measures necessary for radiation safety in respect to patients, public, self and environment. Implements necessary data processing methods.³

Governing Statute:	None.
Governing Body:	None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the British Columbia Association of Medical Radiation Technologists is voluntary. However, BCAMRT membership is restricted to those technologists who pass a certification examination administered by that body, or an equivalent examination.



RESPIRATORY THERAPISTS

Definition: A respiratory therapist

"administers respiratory therapy to patients in hospital or at home. Discusses patient's treatment with medical and nursing staff. Sets up ventilators, incubators, manual resuscitators and other life-support equipment. Attaches life support equipment to patient. Operates controls of equipment to adjust airway pressure, humidity, blood gas levels, respiratory rate and other factors. Monitors patient's progress and equipment function. Performs basic pulmonary function tests to assist physician in diagnosis of respiratory illnesses. Takes blood sample from patient and analyzes for blood gas values, if required. Explains treatment procedures and demonstrates equipment operation to patients and hospital personnel. Performs artificial respiration and external cardiac massage, if required. Services and repairs equipment and inspects all medical piping, manifolds and patient alarm system."¹

Governing Statute:	None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in British Columbia Society of Respiratory Therapists is voluntary. However, registered members have exclusive use of the titles: Registered Respiratory Therapist, Registered Respiratory Technologist or RRT.





EMERGENCY MEDICAL ASSISTANTS

EMERGENCY MEDICAL ASSISTANTS

Definition: An emergency medical assistant

provides first aid, nursing and medical services to minimize disability or loss of life in emergency situations. Depending upon level of training, the Emergency Medical Assistant (EMA) will be skilled in the areas of first aid, general ambulance practices and procedures, basic nursing, patient assessment, specialized diagnostics and treatments.

An Emergency Medical Assistant First Responder (EMA FR) may be employed with a police force, a fire department, or an agency approved by the Emergency Health Services Commission (EHSC). All other EMAs are employed either with the EHSC or with a contractor who has a contract for service with the Commission.¹

- Governing Statute: Health Emergency Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 162; Health Statutes Amendment Act, 1989, Chapter 48, Sections 14-17; administered by the Ministry of Health.
- Governing Body: Emergency Medical Assistants Licensing Board (EMALB). In order to practise as an Emergency Medical Assistant in British Columbia, it is necessary to be licensed by the Emergency Medical Assistants Licensing Board. Licenced Emergency Medical Assistants have exclusive use of the title: *Emergency Medical Assistant*.
- Date of Record: January 1992.

Source of Data: Emergency Medical Assistants Licensing Branch, Ministry of Health.



MANIPULATION Corrections of stress or trauma-induced misalignments of muscle, connective tissue, and the skeletal system.

PHYSICAL MEDICINE The therapeutic use of water, light, electricity, ultra-sound, massage and exercise.

CHINESE MEDICINE Includes the use of acupuncture, electrodiagnosis and Chinese herbology.

PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES Counselling, hypnotherapy, emotional support and biofeedback.²



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

Definition of Terms:

1. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on pharmacists is shown in Table 2. Age information is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

2. Employment Status and Type of Position

Position of pharmaceutical employment is aggregated into the following categories and displayed in Tables 3 and 4:

- (a) Employed in Pharmacy and working either in hospitals or in community pharmacies;
 - (i) Manager dispensing
 - who have and can confer upon others narcotic signing authority
 - (ii) Non-manager dispensing
 - who may have narcotic signing authority but who cannot confer it upon others
- (b) Not Employed in Pharmacy.

3. Analysis of Change


Table 5 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of pharmacists from December 1989 to December 1991.

New registrants are pharmacists included in the December 1991 stock who registered with the College of Pharmacists of B.C. for the first time subsequent to December 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation: i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those pharmacists who did not renew their licence in B.C. in December 1989, but were licensed in B.C. in December 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before December 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes pharmacists who were included in the December 1989 stock but who, because of death, retirement, suspension, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of licensure were not included in the December 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration: it records the flow of pharmacists among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

Preparation and Updating:

An update tape is received by the Health Human Resources Unit from the CPSBC on a monthly basis. Included on the tape are new registrants, changes in location, type of registration and specialty status for all physicians previously registered. These updates are entered into *DOCSFILE*, a dynamic computer-based file maintained by the HHRU.

An additional file, *RESFILE*, is maintained with the cooperation of the teaching hospitals and educational institutions, to register and monitor the movement of interns and residents.

The tables include physicians who had a British Columbia address at the date of record.

Definition of Terms:

1. Directory Active Physicians

Directory Active Physicians are registered in British Columbia by the CPSBC. At the date of record, they were licensed to practise medicine. Directory Active includes physicians who are on the full, special or temporary registers (temporary includes those who are in postgraduate training or who have a temporary licence to practise).

2. Registration Status

Tables 1, 2 and 3 include those physicians who, at the date of record, were Directory Active:

Non-Postgraduate

Non-Postgraduates are Directory Active Physicians who, according to the records of the CPSBC, are not involved in postgraduate work.

Postgraduate

Postgraduates are Directory Active Physicians who, according to the records of the CPSBC, are involved in postgraduate work. They may be fully registered or on the temporary (educational) register.

3. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on non-postgraduate physicians is shown in Table 4. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

4. Specialty

Those physicians who are not in postgraduate training have been assigned to a specialty in the following manner:

- (a) The MSC specialty code, based on billings volume and developed to assess practice profiles, is used unless:
 - (i) the physician has certification in *Family Medicine* from the College of Family Physicians of Canada, in which case the *specialty* is coded as *Family Practice*,
 - (ii) the physician has no MSC specialty, in which case the most recent Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (RCPSC) specialty will be used.
- (b) The MSC specialty code may not necessarily reflect the actual MSC specialty field at the date of record. For September 1989, the MSC specialty codes for September 1988 were used, while for January 1992, the MSC specialty codes for December 1991 were used.
- Tables 5, 6 and 7 group the physicians into broad specialty groups; Tables 8 and 9 disaggregate them.

4. Analysis of Change


Table 10 illustrates key sources of change which may have affected the stock of non-postgraduate physicians from 1989 to 1992.

New registrants include physicians who registered for the first time subsequent to September 1989 and were licensed to practise in January 1992. They are recorded according to their place of graduation i.e., from U.B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.), the United Kingdom (U.K.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) include those physicians who, in 1989, were registered but not licensed to practise in B.C. and who were licensed to practise in B.C. in 1992. More specifically, those designated PG to Non-PG (PG-NPG) were registered as of September 1989 and were engaged in postgraduate work. In January 1992 they held non-postgraduate status and were licensed to practise in the province. Other includes Directory Active physicians who were out-of-province, or physicians who were not licensed to practise in B.C. as of September 1989, but who were licensed to practise in B.C. in January 1992.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those physicians who were included in the 1989 physician stock but who, because of death, retirement, non-renewal of licence or out-of-province relocation, were not included in the 1992 physician stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of physicians among different regions of the province. The net migration total is therefore zero.



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

LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSES

Definition:	A Licensed Practical Nurse
	"may be employed in a wide variety of health care settings and may carry out such nursing duties related to the care of patients as is consistent with her training and ability. All such duties are to be carried out under the direction of a duly qualified physician who is attending the patient, or under the supervision of a graduate nurse who is rendering service to the patient, except in an emergency when the services of a licensed practical nurse may be urgently required. Provided that the attending physician gives directions and assumes responsibility with respect to the ability of the licensed practical nurse (LPN) to carry out such services in a satisfactory manner, an LPN may also undertake nursing service for a patient in a private home." ¹
Governing Statute:	Nurses (Licensed Practical) Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 300; Nursing Statutes Amendment Act, 1988, Chapter 51, Sections 1-3; administered by the Ministry of Health.
Governing Body:	British Columbia Council of Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCLPN). Only persons licensed by the BCCLPN may use the titles: <i>Licensed</i> <i>Practical Nurse</i> or <i>LPN</i> .
Date of Record:	September 1989 and September 1991.

Definition of Terms:

2. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on Licensed Practical Nurses in British Columbia, derived from the BCCLPN registration database, is shown in Table 2. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

3. Place of Employment

Place of employment was reported by the registrant on the annual licence renewal form. Tables 4 and 5 show type of employing institution for licensed practical nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Acute Care Hospital;
- (b) Activation/Rehabilitation Hospital;
- (c) Extended Care Hospital;
- (d) Other Long Term Care Facility;
- (e) Psychiatric Hospital;
- (f) Home Care or Visiting Care Agency;
- (g) Community Health Agency;
- (h) Physician's Office/Family Practice Unit;
- (i) Educational Institution;
- (j) Business/Industry;
- (k) Other.

4. Field of Practice

Field of practice was reported by the registrant on the annual licence renewal form. Tables 6 and 7 show field of practice for licensed practical nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Medical/Surgical General;
- (b) Medical/Surgical Specialties (e.g., ICU, OR, Emergency, Dialysis);
- (c) Maternal/Newborn;
- (d) Psychiatric;
- (e) Paediatric;
- (f) Geriatric;
- (g) Generalized Practice (e.g., Float Pool, Small General Hospital);
- (h) Teaching;
- (i) Administration;
- (j) Rehabilitation;
- (k) Other.

5. Job Title

Job title was reported by the registrant on the annual licence renewal form. Tables 8 and 9 show job title for licensed practical nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) LPN;
- (b) Long Term Care Aide (e.g., Patient Care Aide, Activity Aide);
- (c) Orderly;
- (d) Other.

6. Analysis of Change


Table 10 illustrates key sources of change which may have affected the stock of practising Licensed Practical Nurses from 1989 to 1991.

New registrants include all nurses who were practising members as of September 1991 and who registered with the BCCLPN for the first time subsequent to September 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation, i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.) or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those nurses who did not renew practising membership in September 1989 but were practising members in B.C. in September 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before September 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those Licensed Practical Nurses who were included in the 1989 Licensed Practical Nurse stock, but who, because of death, retirement, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of registration, were not included in the 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of Licensed Practical Nurses among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

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REGISTERED NURSES

Definition: A Registered Nurse

functions as a practitioner, educator, administrator or researcher. The choice of role will be determined by academic preparation, experience, established policies of the employing agency, and the nurse's employment agreement. A few nurses are selfemployed.

These roles are performed in a variety of services and settings: acute, extended, intermediate and personal care; public health, occupational health, colleges and universities, doctors' offices and people's homes.¹

Tables 1b and 4b, derived from the register of the RNABC, include only Licensed Graduate Nurses (LGNs) who were British Columbia residents at the date of record. LGNs are included for the first time in ROLLCALL 91 subsequent to the creation of this category and corresponding licensing requirements under the Nurses (Registered) Act, Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1979, Chapter 302, as revised by the Nursing Statutes Amendment Act, 1988, Chapter 51.

Definition of Terms:

1. Membership Status

A Registered Nurse or a Licensed Graduate Nurse may hold a *practising* or *non-practising* membership in the RNABC. A practising Registered Nurse or Licensed Graduate Nurse may or may not be employed in nursing. A non-practising Registered Nurse or Licensed Graduate Nurse who commences employment in nursing in British Columbia must convert to practising membership.

2. Employment Status

Total numbers of non-practising and practising Registered Nurses, as well as employment status for the latter, are shown in Tables 1a and 2. Table 3 describes average annual rates of change for all Registered Nurses.

Total numbers of non-practising and practising Licensed Graduate Nurses, as well as employment status for practising LGNs, are shown in Table 1b.

3. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on practising and non-practising Registered Nurses, derived from the RNABC registration database, is shown in Table 4a.

Table 4b shows age and sex information on practising and non-practising Licensed Graduate Nurses. In 1991, there were 472 female and 11 male LGNs.

Age information in the tables is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

4. Place of Employment

Principal place of employment is reported initially upon registration, and updated annually from the registration renewal form. Tables 5 and 6 show this information for practising Registered Nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Acute Care Hospital;
- (b) Activation/Rehabilitation Hospital;
- (c) Extended Care Hospital;
- (d) Psychiatric Hospital;
- (e) Long Term Care Facility/Nursing Home;
- (f) Home Care/Visiting Care Agency;
- (g) Community Health Agency;
- (h) Business/Industry;
- (i) Physician's Office/Family Practice Unit;
- (j) Educational Institution;
- (k) Self-Employed;
- (1) Other.

5. Primary Area of Responsibility

Primary area of responsibility is reported initially upon registration, and updated annually from the registration renewal form. Tables 7 and 8 show this information for practising Registered Nurses employed in nursing. Changes made to the categories for reporting Area of Responsibility on the registration renewal form may affect the degree to which these figures can be compared from year to year. In 1989, Critical Care included Intensive Care Unit, Operating Room and Emergency Room. In 1990, Operating Room and Emergency Room were deleted from Critical Care and reported separately, and Post Anesthetic Recovery Room was added as another category. In 1991, Emergency Room was inserted back into Critical Care and Neurosciences was added as a separate category. The categories used by the RNABC in 1991 are:

 - (ii) Post Anesthetic Recovery Room
 - (iii) Neurosciences
 - (iv) Medical/Surgical

- (ii) Nursing Services Administration
- (iii) Other Administration

(c) Teaching

- (i) Teaching Students
- (ii) Teaching Employees
- (iii) Teaching Patients/Clients
- (iv) Teaching Other Education
- (d) Research

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6. Employment Position

Employment position is reported initially upon registration, and updated annually from the registration renewal form. Tables 9 and 10 show this information for practising Registered Nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

- (a) Director;
- (b) Associate/Assistant Director;
- (c) Supervisor/Assistant Supervisor;
- (d) Clinical Specialist/Clinician;
- (e) Head Nurse/Assistant Head Nurse;
- (f) Staff/General Duty Nurse;
- (g) Community/Occupational Health/Home Care Nurse;
- (h) Instructor/Professor;
- (i) Consultant/Counsellor;
- (j) Other.

7. Analysis of Change


Table 11 illustrates key sources of change which may have affected the stock of practising Registered Nurses from 1989 to 1991.

New registrants include all nurses who were practising members as of June 1991 and who registered with the RNABC for the first time subsequent to June 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation, i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.) or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those nurses who did not renew practising membership in June 1989 but were practising members in B.C. in June 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before June 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those Registered Nurses who were included in the 1989 Registered Nurse stock, but who, because of death, retirement, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of registration, were not included in the 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of Registered Nurses among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

A non-practising Registered Psychiatric Nurse or Licensed Graduate Psychiatric Nurse may not actively engage in the practise of psychiatric nursing.

2. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on practising and non-practising Registered Psychiatric Nurses, derived from the RPNABC registration database, is shown in Table 4. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

3. Place of Employment

Type of facility was reported by registrants on the registration renewal form. Tables 5 and 6 show this information for practising Registered Psychiatric Nurses employed in nursing. The categories used are:

6. Analysis of Change


Table 11 illustrates key sources of change which may have affected the stock of practising Registered Psychiatric Nurses from 1989 to 1991.

New registrants include all nurses who were practising members as of June 1991 and who registered with the RNPABC for the first time subsequent to June 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation, i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.) or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those nurses who did not renew practising membership in June 1989 but were practising members in B.C. in June 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before June 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those Registered Psychiatric Nurses who were included in the 1989 Registered Psychiatric Nurse stock, but who, because of death, retirement, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of registration, were not included in the 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of Registered Psychiatric Nurses among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

VII. NUTRITION AND DIETARY SERVICES

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DIETITIANS AND NUTRITIONISTS

DIETITIANS AND NUTRITIONISTS

Definition:

A dietitian/nutritionist

is a professional uniquely prepared for the practice of nutrition care through university education and required practicum in food and nutrition as well as biological, social, and management sciences. The dietitian/nutritionist applies knowledge and skills in normal and therapeutic nutrition and in food service systems management to individuals, groups, institutions, organizations, and the community.¹

Governing Statute:

None.

Governing Body: None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the British Columbia Dietitians' and Nutritionists' Association is voluntary. However, registered members have exclusive use of the titles: Registered Dietitian, Registered Nutritionist, Registered Dietitian/Nutritionist, R.D.N.

Date of Record:

December 1991.

Source of Data: The British Columbia Dietitians' and Nutritionists' Association (BCDNA).

Preparation and Updating:

The tables, derived solely from the registration database of the BCDNA, include registered dietitians and nutritionists who reported a British Columbia address at the date of record. Comparison with 1989 figures, which included members of the Canadian Dietetic Association, is of limited value and has not been presented.

Definition of Terms:

1. Membership Status

Dietitians and nutritionists registered with the BCDNA may hold a *practising* or *non-practising* membership, as shown in Table 1.

2. Age and Sex

Age information on dietitians and nutritionists, derived from the registration database of the BCDNA, is shown in Table 2, grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada. At the date of record, the BCDNA membership included 611 females and 5 males; the distribution of male BCDNA membership is not shown separately.

3. Employment Status

Table 3 displays employment status of practising members of the BCDNA as reported on their annual registration renewal form. Members who reported being employed in nutrition/dietetics are classified as follows:

- (a) full-time;
- (b) part-time;
- (c) casual;
- (d) temporary;
- (e) on leave;
- (f) not known.

Members who reported employment status other than in nutrition/dietetics are classified as follows:

- (a) employed other;
- (b) not employed includes unemployed, retired and student;
- (c) not known employment status not reported.

4. Principal Employing Institution

Table 4 shows type of principal employing institution for practising BCDNA members employed in nutrition/dietetics. The following categories are used:

- (a) General/Acute Care Hospital;
- (b) Extended Care Hospital;
- (c) Rehabilitation Hospital;
- (d) Paediatric Hospital;
- (e) Psychiatric Hospital;
- (f) Continuing/Long Term Care;
- (g) Public/Community Health Agency;
- (h) Voluntary/Non-Profit Agency;
- (i) Education/University/College;
- (i) Business/Industry;
- (k) Self Employed;
- (1) Other Health Care Facility.

5. Principal Position of Employment



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

Definition of Terms:

1. Registration

In order to practice in British Columbia, a psychologist must be registered with the CPBC. The tables include registered psychologists who had a British Columbia address at the date of record.

2. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on registered psychologists, derived from the CPBC registration database, is shown in Table 2. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada. No registered psychologists were reported in the under 24 age category in 1991.

3. Employment Status

Employment status of registered psychologists in British Columbia is shown in Table 3.

4. Primary Work Setting

The primary work setting of registered psychologists employed in psychology in British Columbia is reported in Table 4. The categories used for primary work setting are:

- (a) Educational Facility primary/secondary;
- (b) Educational Facility post-secondary;
- (c) Psychiatric Hospital;
- (d) General Hospital;
- (e) Physical Medicine/Rehabilitation Facility;
- (f) Mental Health Clinic;
- (g) Government;
- (h) Private Practice;
- (i) Consulting Firm;
- (j) Other.

5. Main Psychological Activity

The main psychological activity of registered psychologists employed in British Columbia, as reported in the annual CPBC registration form, is reported in Table 5. The categories used are as follows:

- (a) Direct Service;
- (b) Consulting;
- (c) Administration;
- (d) Teaching;
- (e) Research.

6. Analysis of Change


Table 6 illustrates the sources of change which affected the stock of psychologists from 1989 to 1991.

New registrants are psychologists included in the December 1991 stock who registered with the CPBC for the first time subsequent to December 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation: i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.), the United States (U.S.A.), or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those psychologists who were not registered in B.C. in December 1989, but were registered in B.C. in December 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before December 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes psychologists who were included in the December 1989 stock but who, because of death, retirement, suspension, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of registration were not included in the December 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of psychologists among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

SOCIAL WORKERS IN HEALTH CARE

Definition:	A social worker
	provides services to enhance the social functioning of individuals, families, groups and communities by assessing social problems and facilitating their remediation and prevention. These services include:
	(a) direct counselling within established relationships with clients;
	(b) the development, promotion and delivery of human service programs, in collaboration or consultation with other professionals where required;
	(c) the development and promotion of social policies to improve social conditions and advance social equality; and
	(d) other activities consistent with the objectives outlined or implicit in the above. ¹
Governing Statute:	None.
Governing Body:	None. In British Columbia, social workers may register with the Board of Registration for Social Workers, as indicated by the Social Workers Act (RS Chapter 389, Revised 1989). Registered members have exclusive use of the titles: <i>Registered Social Worker</i> or <i>RSW</i> .
Date of Record:	February 1992.
Source of Data:	Health Human Resources Unit (HHRU) surveys.

Preparation and Updating:

A list of individuals employed in social work-related positions in health care settings was compiled with the assistance of the British Columbia Ministry of Health, the Hospital Social Work Directors' Society of British Columbia, Regional Offices of Alcohol and Drug Programs, Greater Vancouver Mental Health Services and the Board of Registration for Social Workers of the Province of British Columbia. The HHRU drew a population from the list which included social workers, social program officers, counsellors, and therapists employed in the public service, hospitals, health facilities, agencies, private practice and other health care-related institutions in British Columbia. A questionnaire was sent to this target population to collect information about education, employment, and professional affiliations.

The tables include only those individuals employed in social work-related positions in British Columbia who returned completed questionnaires and who were not excluded from the final sample because their reported work setting or job description could not be defined as *social work in a health care setting*.

Comparison with 1989 figures is of limited value and has not been presented.

- (d) Employed in other field.

3. Principal Type of Employing Institution

Type of principal employing institution as reported by respondents to the 1991 questionnaire is shown in Table 4. The categories used in the table include:

- (a) Diagnosis/Treatment Centre;
- (b) Acute Care/General Hospital;
- (c) Drug and Alcohol/Substance Abuse Program/Facility;
- (d) Extended/Long Term Care Institution;
- (e) Facility for the Mentally/Developmentally Handicapped;
- (f) Hospital Psychiatric Facility;
- (g) Community-based Psychiatric Facility (eg. Group Homes);
- (h) Physically Disabled/Rehabilitation Facility;
- (i) Private Practice;
- (j) Other.

4. Area of Service

Principal service group as reported by respondents to the 1991 questionnaire is shown in Table 5. The categories used in the table include:

- (a) Addictions Counselling;
- (b) Children/Family;
- (c) Geriatric;
- (d) Mentally/Developmentally Handicapped;

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AUDIOLOGISTS AND SPEECH/LANGUAGE PATHOLOGISTS

Definition:

(a) An audiologist

"provides diagnostic evaluation and rehabilitative services and conducts research related to hearing. Administers air and bone conduction and other audiometric tests and examinations to determine hearing efficiency. Co-ordinates audiometric results with medical, social, behavioural and other diagnostic data. Evaluates total response pattern and acoustic tests to differentiate between organic and non-organic hearing loss. Plans, directs and participates in counselling, speech-reading and other rehabilitation programs. Acts as consultant to educational, medical and other professional groups. Conducts research in physiology, pathology, biophysics and psychophysics of auditory system, if required. Designs and develops clinical and research procedures and materials/equipment, if required."

(b) A speech pathologist

None.

"diagnoses and treats speech, language and voice disorders, and performs related research: Administers tests and observes patient to diagnose nature of disorder and to evaluate degree of impairment. Plans and conducts remedial programs to correct stuttering, abnormal articulation and other disorders. Provides therapy for patients with communication problems caused by cerebral palsy, surgical removal of larynx, stroke, hearing deficiencies or other impairments. Plans individual or group therapy in rehabilitation of communication disorders. Counsels and guides language-handicapped individuals and their families, teachers or employers. Acts as consultant to educational, medical, dental and other professional groups. Conducts research related to development of diagnostic and treatment techniques and procedures, or design of diagnostic/treatment materials/equipment."²

Governing Statute:

Governing Body:

None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the British Columbia Association of Speech/Language Pathologists and Audiologists is voluntary. However, registered members have exclusive use of the titles: Registered Speech/Language Pathologist, Registered Speech/Language Therapist, Speech Therapist, Voice Therapist, Communication Disorder Specialist, Audiologist.





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OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS

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OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS

Definition: An occupational therapist

plans and carries out treatment programs based on activities such as work, education and recreation to rehabilitate physically and mentally disabled persons.

Administers tests and observes patient to assess emotional, mental and physical capacities of patient. Plans and directs programs in manual and creative arts, industrial and vocational skills, recreational activities, remedial games, cultural and educational interests, and play activities for children. Conducts group programs to assist patients in building self-confidence and in adjusting to family and community. Trains handicapped patients in self-care and daily living activities. Advises and instructs patients on specially-adapted household equipment and furnishings. Assesses patients' vocational potential and provides work adjustment and actual work experience. Participates in testing and training of patients with perceptual motor problems, and provides training for children with learning disabilities. Records patients' activities, response and progress. Attends meetings of rehabilitation team, and seminars, workshops and courses on occupational therapy. Supervises and instructs occupational therapy students and auxiliary personnel assigned to department.¹

Governing Statute: None.

- Governing Body: None. Compulsory registration and/or licensure do not exist. Membership in the British Columbia Society of Occupational Therapists (BCSOT) is voluntary. However, registered members of the BCSOT have exclusive use of the titles: *Registered Occupational Therapist*, (B.C.), *Registered OT*, (B.C.). Occupational therapists who have graduated from a dual program in occupational therapy and physiotherapy may be registered with the Association of Physiotherapists and Massage Practitioners of British Columbia. Such persons are included in *both* the occupational therapy and physiotherapy sections of ROLLCALL 91.



Preparation and Updating:

The tables, prepared from registration data maintained by the APMPBC, include physiotherapists who were full members of the APMPBC and British Columbia residents at the date of record. Physiotherapists who also hold membership in the British Columbia Society of Occupational Therapists are included in both the physiotherapy and occupational therapy sections of ROLLCALL 91.

Definition of Terms:

1. Employment Status

Employment status as reported on the registration renewal form is reported in Tables 1 and 2. The following categories are used:

- (a) Employed in physiotherapy (PT);
- (b) Employed in occupational therapy (OT);
- (c) Employed in combined PT and OT;
- (d) Employed in fields other than PT and OT;
- (e) Not employed;
- (f) Unknown.

Table 3 describes average annual rates of change for all physiotherapists in British Columbia.

2. Age and Sex

Age and sex information on physiotherapists, derived from the registration database of the APMPBC, is shown in Table 4. Age information in the table is grouped according to standard age categories developed and used by Statistics Canada.

3. Registration Status

A physiotherapist may be either a *Chartered* or *Registered* member of the APMPBC. Chartered Physiotherapists differ from Registered Physiotherapists in that Chartered Physiotherapists may not practise except under the supervision of a medical practitioner.² A physiotherapist may work under a temporary membership until his or her registration can be completed. In 1991, there were 97 physiotherapists who held temporary memberships. No temporary members are included in any of the tables. Remedial gymnasts may also register as members of the APMPBC, but are not included in the tables. Membership type is shown in Table 5.

7. Analysis of Change


Table 9 illustrates key sources of change which may have affected the stock of practising physiotherapists from 1989 to 1991.

New registrants include all physiotherapists who were practising members as of December 1991 and who registered with the APMPBC for the first time subsequent to December 1989. New registrants are recorded according to their place of graduation, i.e., from B.C., Other Canadian Provinces (O.Can.) or Other.

Re-activations (Re-Act) represent those physiotherapists who did not renew practising membership in December 1989 but were practising members in B.C. in December 1991, and whose date of initial registration was before December 1989.

Attrition (Attr'n) describes those physiotherapists who were included in the 1989 physiotherapist stock, but who, because of death, retirement, out-of-province relocation or non-renewal of registration, were not included in the 1991 stock.

Migration (Migr'n) describes the net effect of intraprovincial migration; it records the flow of physiotherapists among different Regional Hospital Districts. The net migration total is therefore zero.

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
