Tobacco smoke and the health of hospitality workers

In October 2006, Dr. Chizimuzo (Zim) Okoli, NEXUS Postdoctoral Fellow, was awarded a research capacity development grant from the BC Environmental and Occupational Health Research Network. The purpose of this funding was to develop research capacity by forming a team to explore the health effects of outdoor sources of environmental tobacco smoke exposure.

To this end, scholars from the University of Kentucky (Drs. Ellen Hahn & Kiyoung Lee) and the University of Toronto (Drs. Pam Kaufman & Paul Villeneuve) were invited to Vancouver to meet the investigative team at the University of British Columbia and begin work on a grant proposal



New grant:

Experiences of Heart Disease In Immigrant South Asian Populations

Dr. Paul Galdas, NEXUS Co-Investigator, UBC School of Nursing, has been awarded \$4970 by UBC Health Research Resource Office (HeRRO) through Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research to begin a pilot study: "The experiences and cardiac rehabilitation needs of South Asian myocardial infarction patients."



Working with the cardiac rehabilitation program at Surrey Memorial Hospital, Dr. Galdas will seek to understand how South Asian patients relate to and engage with cardiac rehabilitation services in British Columbia. The study plans to uncover the impact of myocardial infarction (MI) on the participants' lifestyles, work, family roles and relationships, as well as their understanding of coronary heart disease (CHD) and perceived rehabilitation and health care needs following their MI.

Results from this pilot study will provide an interpretive understanding of the social processes associated with the patients' experiences of recovering from MI, and this will be used to help develop specific research questions and objectives for a subsequent CIHR operating grant application. Its ultimate aim is to develop a program of research that will inform existing and future culturally-sensitive cardiac aftercare and rehabilitation services that will better meet the needs of BC South Asians with CHD.

New grant:

Socio-cultural and Structural Forces Affecting Contraception among Youth



Dr. Judith Soon, NEXUS Lead
Investigator, UBC Faculty of
Pharmaceutical Sciences, has been
awarded a BC Medical Services
Foundation Operating Grant for the study
"Perspectives on Contraception Among
Youth: Exploring the Impact of SocioCultural and Structural Forces in Fort St.

James, BC."

Dr. Soon will be working with NEXUS investigators, Drs. Jean Shoveller and Joy Johnson, among others, on this one-year exploratory qualitative study to: (1) Describe youth's perspectives and experiences with accessing and using contraception, as well as perspectives of service providers; (2) Investigate the ways in which socio-cultural factors and structural forces affect local contraception services; and (3) Develop recommendations to tailor and target contraception interventions intended for youth in northern British Columbia.



The research team will work closely with an Advisory Committee, First Nations members, clinicians and participants to improve ongoing service provision and to develop new and targeted, locally generated interventions to address the needs of youth for contraception services.


