Every Volunteer is a valuable member to the Centre and your time and efforts put forth are a contribution to the centre and to the residents of the Downtown Eastside.


I have enjoyed working with the Volunteers of Carnegie Centre, it has been a great learning experience for me, but a good experience working with great people.

Grace McCarthy, the minister responsible for the C.I.P. prgram, has said she won't discuss the future of the program with us because "we don't have anything new to say". The purpose of the workshop, then, was to get ideas for suggestions to make to Mrs. McCarthy. On December 14 a committee will get together to write a report based on the ideas that came out of the workshop.

C.I.P. Awareness recently sent a letter to Mrs. McCarthy stating what our ongoing concerns were. The letter was signed by one thousand people and was also sent to all the daily newspapers in B.C. It was published by The Sun December 1.

Getting the C.I.P. program restored is proving to be a long uphill battle but of one thing we can be sure: the majority of the people in this province are behind us. Let's keep the

CRAB(Create a Real Available Beach committee) took a day trip down to Seattle. Bob Sarti(Sun newspaper reporter) went along to get a story for his paper along with Harold Agnew (CRAB TREASURER) Barry Morris (FIRST CHURCH CRAB LAISON), and Don Larson (CRAB ACTING PRESIDENT).

We left 9 a.m. Wednesday, November 23rd in Barry Morris' rusted red van. The van had no heater. Fortunately the morning weather was travelling weather...cloudy with patches of blue. Three hours later, we hit Seattle and were parking on Elliott Bay Avenue, which was packed with joggers. The park we were there to study was disappointing. Its entirely above ground level and water level, built on a wharf. There are many small shops. Its redeemed by a fountain, a marine museum and a fishing pier. Two young Americans are fishing off of the pier. Yesterday someone had caught a 18 1b.salmon. A reporter takes some pictures of our group with some elementary school children..

Our mission is to compare Seattles Central Waterfront Parks with what we hope to see between the Seabus Terminal and Main street here in the Downtown Eastside. But, this park wasn't like the maps and sketches that we had been given. We climb the stairs and go visit the Pike Street Market. Its alive with color, energy, merchandise and shoppers. Much better than our local Granville Island market. We buy a few books and think about leaving. Suddenly we see that we are not on Pier 70. There is another park further down to the west..

We find it, and its a mile and a quarter long park. It has benches, trees, grass, walkways, and a large stone embankment. The fishing pier is about enough for 75 fishermen. We talk to a pair of young fishermen...they say they catch flat fish for their We learn that a long fishing pier along one of the breakwaters that the Port of Vancouver Master Plan will build... would make a beautiful fishing pier in our city. Fishing is a cheap form of recreation and can even provide dinner food.

The Master Plan for the Port of Vancouver will "come down" soon. We must get a fair sized park. Lets also see a fishing pier on this site; for the water here is clean and alive. People already fish off of the Columbia street-small wharf(there are some plans to tear down this wharf, apparently).

Lets hope that the work of CRAB for the past year and a half is rewarded fairly by the Federal Government. Lets get a walk to, simply, natural, ground level Central Waterfront Park. And I hope that Barry gets a heater for his van for Christmas, it was cold on the way back home..even the bottle of beer and Mexican dinner couldn't keep me warm. BY DON LARSON.
