



The Carnegie Community Centre and the Vancouver Moving Theatre are pleased to welcome the Association of United Ukrainian Canadians (AUUC) as a hosting partner of the 2nd Annual Heart of the City Festival.

The Ukrainian Cultural Centre is a Downtown Eastside/Strathcona cultural institution with roots in the neighbourhood that go back to the completion of the Ukrainian Hall in 1928. In the 1930's, the hall served as a base for the legendary On-to-Ottawa trek and as a hospital for injured and beaten protestors following the Post Office sitdown of 1938.

The Centre has a continuous history of cultural, social and political activities initially revolving around the needs of Ukrainian immigrants, and now evolving with the changing neighbourhood. Supporting the city's longest running folk orchestra, a choir, a dance company and school, the Association encourages and welcomes residents of the community to attend and participate in its programs and events. Bruce Eriksen - Mid-wife of the Downtown Eastside



More than any other individual, Bruce Eriksen was responsible for the rebirth of the neighbourhood we now know as the Downtown Eastside and its recognition as a residential community eclipsing the neighborhood's old image as Skid Road. As the founder and first president of the Downtown Eastside Residents' Association (DERA) in the early 1970s, Bruce's fight to improve conditions in the hotels, especially fire safety, saved innumerable lives, and he was instrumental in the establishment of the Carnegie Community Centre.

With his partner, Libby Davies, he eventually won election to City Council and carried on the battle

there for 12 years. Bruce died in 1997 at the age of 68, but we are still benefiting by the gains in dignity and pride that he made for our community.

The Heart of the City Festival presents a number of events in honour and celebration of Bruce Eriksen's contribution to the neighbourhood. On Thursday evening Oct 27, in conjunction with Theatre in the Raw, a reading of the new play "The Tipping Point" by Bob Sarti will be broadcast live on CFRO 102.7FM. A second reading will be presented on Saturday evening Oct 29 at the Ukrainian Hall. Also - on Saturday Oct 29 and Saturday Nov 5, Bob Sarti will follow the footsteps of Bruce Eriksen in a history walk through the streets of the Downtown Eastside, starting at 10:30am on the steps of Carnegie Centre. ARTS IN ACTION GLOBAL RESPONSES & THE DOWNTOWN EASTSIDE

A two-day forum by DTES artists on community cultural development

Thursday October 20 and Friday October 21, 2005 1pm - 5 pm 29 West Hastings

The Downtown Eastside will be "the" cultural precinct of Vancouver by 2008 with 21 visual art galleries in a few square blocks and increasing pressure to 'clean up the neighbourhood. This two-day workshop poses the question: how can we respond as community to organize and direct the future of our neighbourhood?

The workshop will explore successful art projects from around the world involving communities facing the pressures of gentrification. It looks for comparison at what the local artists and arts groups can do, specifically in the areas of arts production spaces, housing, structural/organizational development, changing City policies and zoning rules, funding and funding priorities.

Thursday Oct 20 1pm Six local people contracted to conduct research about arts in action around the world will present their findings. We are showcasing, in particular, initiatives that can inspire efforts in our Downtown Eastside community. Themes to be addressed include health, housing, arts production (resources/spaces), organizational models, public space and impact of the Olympics. These presentations are the result of a capacity-building project, with the researchers paired up with professional artist/mentors from our community for support in research strategies, presentation and analysis.

Friday Oct 21 1pm The second day will lead off with a presentation by 'City Repair' from Portland (www.cityrepair.org). The City Repair Project is a volunteer, grassroots group of citizen activists creating public gathering places and helping others to creatively transform the places where they live into community-oriented spaces. Following this presentation will be a structured brainstorming session based on input from the previous days "global responses" presentations. We will look at what kind of local cultural initiatives and projects will ensure that market forces do not displace the local community, and that the community has an accessible and sustainable arts base.

Produced by the Community Arts Initiative (CAI) and the Heart of the City Festival as part of the lead-up to the 2nd annual event, with the assistance of the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation, The Morris and Helen Belkin Art Gallery, UBC Curatorial Studies Department, Central City Mission, Gallery Gachet, and other community friends. This forum is part of the World Urban Forum III. The CAI is a group of artists and arts involved organizations from the Downtown Eastside that has been meeting and organizing events together since 2001.

Join architects Joe Wai and James Burton as they talk about how their community activism influences their architecture. Among his many Strathcona/Chinatown projects, award winning Joe Wai designed what is affectionately known in Strathcona as 'Joe Wai Specials'. These affordable houses for people on low incomes were built after the community stopped the destructive urban 'renewal' plans of the early 1970s. History Talk

THE HISTORY THEY SAVED with James Johnstone Tuesday October 18, 2005 7:30pm



In the 1960s, Vancouver's East End was faced with wholesale demolition and redevelopment. Block by block Vancouver's oldest neighbourhood was to be uprooted, its historic houses replaced with project housing. Thanks to the efforts of neighbourhood residents, this project was stopped before its final phase. Though much was lost, what we now know as Strathcona is still home to some of Vancouver's most fascinating old houses. The Downtown Eastside Community Arts Initiative

The purpose of the Downtown Eastside Community Arts Initiative is to support community development and the building of personal and community capacities through the arts. The community arts are one important means for social and economic renewal in the Downtown Eastside, and are recognized as such by the Vancouver Agreement.

There is a rich history of artistic and cultural activity in the community. There is much artistic talent that expresses itself through local non-professional and professional artists. The 100th anniversary of the Carnegie Centre in 2003 and now the Heart of the City Festivals are capitalizing on all this personal talent plus the work of local arts organizations

Through the community arts:


- Local residents are able to expand their talents, knowledge and skills through volunteering and training and employment opportunities in the arts and in arts-related activities: performance, writing, special event planning and logistics, communications and media relations, fund-raising and financial management, set design and construction, costume design and creation, security, food and refreshment services
- New monies and in-kind resources are brought into the community to support new and existing local enterprises.
- Opportunities for collaboration and partnerships are created among a diversity of
 community groups and organizations and between community and professional artists
- Bridges and partnerships are forged with arts, business, and cultural organizations outside the community
- Perceptions are broadened and new understandings and appreciation are gained outside the community about the historic and contemporary importance of the Downtown Eastside to Vancouver
- The voices of residents are given powerful creative expression in shaping the future of their community.

Since 2001 the Carnegie Centre, in partnership with local arts organizations, has been providing leadership to the development of the Community Arts Initiative. Plans call for Carnegie and these organizations to form a new partnership entity to further the work of the arts in the community, The Community Arts Partnership. Carnegie, desmedia, the Firehall Arts Centre, Gallery Gachet, the Vancouver Moving Theatre Company, and the Central City Mission Foundation are in discussions to become the founding bodies. More than 45 other local organizations are also program partners with the Community Arts Initiative. The Community Arts Trust has been established to promote sustainability for the arts in the community with approximately \$30,000 raised in the past two years.
