#### **DIRECTOR'S NOTES**

THE THREEPENNY OPERA by Kurt Weill and Bertolt Brecht was written and first performed in Berlin in 1928. The work is a satire and a polemic against poverty, and

the exploitation of the powerless.

The work is based on John Gay's "The Beggars' Opera" - an opera which was immensely popular in London at the beginning of the 18th Century. The playwrite, Bertolt Brecht, took the story of Lodon's criminal underworld, and updated it to mirror the social and political state of 1920's Germany and Europe.

The story takes place in London, in the time of the coronation of the new Queen Victoria. The setting is the east side slum areas of the city and the characters are the gangsters,

beggars, and prostitutes that frequent the area.

The story centers around the gangster Macheath, who marries Polly Peachum, daughter of one Jonathan Jeremiah Peachum. She is quite possibly his third wife, although he has not divorced any previous "wives". Mr. Peachum provides the beggars of London with begging licenses and suitable clothing in return for a large percentage of their takings. A murderous

and bigamous gangster is his last idea of a son-in-law.

In spite of Macheath's firm friendship with "Tiger" Brown, London's police chief, Peachum conspires with Jenny, a prostitute, to have him arrested. Macheath is a hunted man but he visits Jenny and the other prostitutes at their brothel, where he is turned over to the police. Macheath escapes from his cell at the Old Bailey and Peachum is reduced to blackmailing "Tiger" Brown into arresting Macheath. Peachum will send thousands of beggars to disrupt the coronation if Macheath is not caught and hanged.

Macheath is arrested and is taken to the scaffold. But, because this is an opera and not real life, the story does not end

with his death.
