A Scene on the Dolly Varden Railway

Van. Board of Trade to Visit Alice Arm and Anyox

Approximately 100 members of the Vancouver Board of Trade will make the trip north this year. Rebate on Powder for Prospectors

Free Miners are reminded that a rebate of 25 per cent. is available to them on the legitimate retail cost of powder used in the bona-fide prospecting and mining property in British Columbia, subject to the following regulations:—

(a.) Applicants prove to the Mining Recorder or Resident Mining Engineer that they are bona-fide prospectors.

(b.) Rebates not allowed on more than ten cases of powder each year, except under exceptional circumstances and on written recommendation of Resident Mining Engineer.

(c.) That application shall be made on forms obtainable from the office of any Mining Recorder and shall be witnessed by a mining Recorder, a Deputy Mining Recorder, a Justice of the Peace, or a Resident Mining Engineer of the Department of Mines.

The fact that the Vancouver Board of Trade have decided to include Anyox and Alice Arm in the itinerary of their northern tour is a source of great satisfaction, especially to the latter town. While their time is somewhat limited in Alice Arm, and which does not allow a large amount of sightseeing, no pains should be spared on their behalf by Alice Arm citizens to see that their time is spent in obtaining as much valuable information as possible and to leave pleasant memories of their visit. Committees should be at once appointed, so that the day's programme can be carried through without a dull moment being left at the disposal of the visitors.

The work of the National Committee for the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation is well in hand. The co-operation of the Provincial Governments is assured and considerable interest is being displayed by the leading cities and municipalities. Every city town and hamlet in the Dominion of Canada, will this year make special efforts to celebrate the diamond jubilee of Canada's Confederation. Plans on an elaborate scale as possible have already been formed in almost every city and settlement from the Atlantic to the Pacific and this year the first of July will be celebrated on a scale not heretofore approached.

The Mining Laws of this Province are more liberal and the fees lower than those of any other Province in the Dominion, or any Colony in the British Empire.

Mineral locations are granted to discoverers for nominal fees. Absolute Titles are obtained by developing such properties, security of which is guaranteed by Crown Grants.

Practically all British Columbia Mineral Properties upon which development work has been done are described in some one of the Annual Reports of the Minister of Mines. Those considering mining investments should refer to such reports. They are available without charge on application to the Department of Mines, Victoria, B. C. Reports covering each of the six mineral Survey Districts are published separately, and are available on application. Reports of the Geological Survey of Canada, Winch Building, Vancouver, are recommended as valuable sources of information. SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

Big Trees and Small Families in B. C.

British Columbia has the largest trees and the smallest families in the British Empire: an example of the custom this province has of making records.

The reason why comparatively few babies are being born in the Pacific Coast province are many—and some of them are surprising. Who would imagine, for instance, that there are 20,000 more married men than married women here? Yet the provincial government has not issued a proclamation offering protection to persecuted husbands! In fact, the reason for the presence in our midst of such an army of homeless husbands is that, in order to do better for their families than they could in their own land, they have selected British Columbia as the place in which to make their stake and bring their people when success has been attained. Those who emigrate to go farming need the work of their families, but the work to be done in British Columbia is principally in taking out the timber and ore. Six in every hundred industrial workmen in British Columbia are in the logging camps and that occupation offers few opportunities for family life.

Proposed conversion of Dominion Government steamers on the Pacific Coast into oil burners is meeting with vigorous opposition from Vancouver Island coal mine operators.

The increased consumption of fuel oil on the coast in recent years has been a severe blow to the coal industry, but despite this fact, production on Vancouver Island has shown a tendency towards more stable conditions this year, the output for January and February being considerably larger than during the corresponding period last year.
