Logging Operations are Active at Alice Arm

The logging industry at Alice Arm has been making great strides during the past few weeks.

The work of placing the big standing boom, one mile in length, around the mouth of the Kitsault has been completed by Mr. C. P. Riel. This boom was constructed for the purpose of catching the logs of the Abbotsford Logging Co., which will be floated down stream as soon as sufficient water is available.

Eric Carlson, contractor for the Abbotsford Logging Company is making a remarkable record taking out logs. His logging train is hauling full loads, several trips a day to the landing. He is also yarding into tide water, the several million feet that were yarded to spar trees last season. Very soon he will place one of his donkeys on the bank of the Kitsault river, and yard into the river, which will mean a total landing of two hundred thousand feet per day.

The Granby Co. are making great headway with the construction of their camps. Men are now being boarded at the No. 2 camp up the Dolly Varden Railway, and the dining room is now being operated at the No. 1 camp on the flats. Work of driving piles for the railway trestle on the flats is being proceeded with. Four logging cars arrived by scow on Tuesday from Anyox, and more will follow in a short time. Falling and bucking of logs in the woods is being carried on continuously, and over 2,500,000 feet are now ready to be hauled out. In a few weeks construction of camps will be finished and as soon as material is assembled, logging operations will be carried on full blast.

Anyox Trainman Badly Injured

J. Christoff, trainman, who has been employed by the Granby Company for the past five or six years, was seriously injured when accidentally crushed between an engine and truck, while working in the vicinity of the Smelter, during the early part of the week.

Immediately after the accident First Aid was rendered and he was then conveyed to the Anyox hospital, where he is being treated and where hope is entertained for his recovery.

A native of Macedonia, and 35 years of age, Chris, as he is popularly known, is a great favorite with his fellow workers, and all those with whom he was associated, the news of his serious accident came as a great shock.

Granby Co. Makes Large Copper Shipments

During the month of March, no less than 3,201,705 pounds of "the everlasting metal" was shipped from the Granby Co's smelter, while 1,128,351 pounds has been shipped from the 1st. of April to the 10th.

There will be a considerable increase in ore shipments from both the Premier mine and Maple Bay, in the near future, which will be treated at the smelter.

The Concentrator, with a capacity of turning out 1,250,000 pounds per month, is gradually being put into operation. At present, its production is about one quarter of its possible output.

What Mining Means to District

The future prosperity of this district depends entirely upon the mining industry, and the mining industry alone. Just what the industry means to the north, can be obtained from the reports of the Granby Co., and the Premier Gold Mining Co., published in the Herald a few weeks ago.

The Granby Co. produced 33,159,470, pounds of copper, and 451,479, ounces of silver last year. They also produced a large quantity of coke, and other by-products. The average number of men on the payroll was around 1200, and millions of dollars were spent in wages and the purchasing of material. The operations of the Granby Co., are no small factor in stabilizing the prosperity of the Province.

Next to the Granby Co., the Premier Gold Mining Co., are the next largest mine operators in this district. Last year the Premier Co., produced 117,294, ounces of gold, and 2,746,551, ounces of silver. The payroll for the year was \$753,000, and the average number of men employed was 336 throughout the year. This company also spent \$559,616, in supplies, and 209,908 was spent on freight rates for ore.

With these two examples before us, it is plain to everyone that the development of the mining industry is the only solution of permanent prosperity in this district. Every encouragement should be given the prospector, and small mining companies by the government, for it is due to the efforts of these sturdy pioneers that the big mining companies are able to operate, and distribute wealth throughout the province.

British Blood Predominates in B. C.

When it comes to nationality, British Columbia is not a melting-pot for the misfits of Europe, but we are one of the four provinces of Canada that can show not less than three of every four citizens as British stock. The other provinces are Ontario, Nova Scotia and little Prince Edward Island. The other western provinces are nearer to the half-way mark in this respect. In all our ways the stamp of English custom is upon us, for 221,000, being 42 per cent. of our people, are of English blood. The pioneering Scot is next, to the number of 104,000, a further 20 per cent. of the total, and the ubiquitous Irish are in our midst to the number of 54,000, an additional 10 per cent.

A consideration of these figures shows that we are swiftly becoming one united people of British stock and the growth of our "Yellow peril," the Asiatic, is placed in a rather new light. The different census years give the proportion of our British stock in this province as follows: 1901, 59 per cent; 1911, 65 per cent; 1921, 74 per cent. What better could we wish?

Game Laws Will be Enforced

Fur and trophy pirating will be stopped along the British Columbia-Alaska border this year, state officials of the Game Conservation Board. It is expected that Canada and the United States will agree upon a "dead wall" or game sanctuary for 52 miles on either side of the border in the Stikine and Taku districts. Additional efforts will be made to prevent the killing of game animals for meat and the selling of trophies to disappointed hunters.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

Ore Reserves of World Are Being Rapidly Depleted

Big Companies Will Have to Develop Future Mines

Dr. Victor Dolmage, head of the B. C. office of the geological survey, in a recent address to the Chamber of Mines, Vancouver, said, during his address:

"A second reason why ore finding is becoming more difficult is that unprospective areas are gradually becoming smaller and crowded into the remote sections of the tropical and polar regions where climatic and other difficulties retard the prospector. However, British Columbia is particularly well situated in this respect, for I doubt if there is any section of the earth's surface with equal facilities, such as climate, good mining laws well enforced transportation, both rail and water, which has as many undiscovered ore bodies outcropping at the surface as British Columbia, unless, perhaps, it is northern Ontario. In other words, there is no other field in which the prospector under easily tolerable conditions is as likely to be rewarded for his efforts. And yet I am repeatedly told by representatives of capital that a good proposition is extremely difficult to find."

Not only is ore finding the most difficult problem of the industry, but it is becoming extremely urgent. As the editor of the Engineering and Mining Journal says: "There is only one crop of metals and it is now being rapidly harvested." There are no new deposits of metals being formed. What will happen when the present crop is harvested? Moreover, the consumption of metals of all kinds is increasing enormously."

Production at present is able to keep pace with consumption, and in the case of some metals, such as copper and nickel, at present exceed the rate of consumption, but these conditions cannot last. Even if the rate of consumption did not increase it would not be many years until the production of some of the metals would begin to show signs of lagging. But the rate of consumption is almost certain to increase."

It may be possible for production to almost keep up for a time by speeding up from the known deposits, but this will only hasten the day when production must fall behind. Therefore, with our consumption of metals increasing and our known deposits rapidly depleted, the urgency of the need of finding more ore is painfully apparent."

The companies looking for properties are going to have to lower their standards and take greater chances in buying prospects. There was a time when a mining company would buy nothing but a developed mine; they were willing to take no chances whatever. That time has passed, and they are beginning to realize that, if they are going to get new mines, it will be necessary to lower their requirements with reference to the amount of developed ore on prospects whose purchase is being considered."

The Granby Co. produced more copper last year than the rest of B. C. combined.

Development Work at Dunwell Mine

Portland Canal News

Preparations for employing a much larger crew at the Dunwell are being made, 20,000 feet of lumber, including 10,000 feet of cedar siding, shiplap etc. from Vancouver, having been rushed up while it was still possible to use sleighs. A new bunkhouse is being erected, also a blacksmith shop and an assay office, and the present mess house is being considerably enlarged.

The crosscuts on the No. 3 level driven from the north and south drift to determine the width of the ore body, are finished and the drift is being continued as before, in the country rock along the vein, leaving the ore standing. Each crosscut is 50 feet distant from the main opening where the vein was encountered. The south shows three feet of solid galena and two feet of mixed ore, with a streak of quartz carrying free gold and native silver. The north shows the same width—five feet—of similar ore. No assays have yet been obtained on the galena in the south crosscut, but the same material in the north assays up to \$400 per ton. There two crosscuts define the vein for a lateral distance of 100 feet and at a depth of 500 feet.

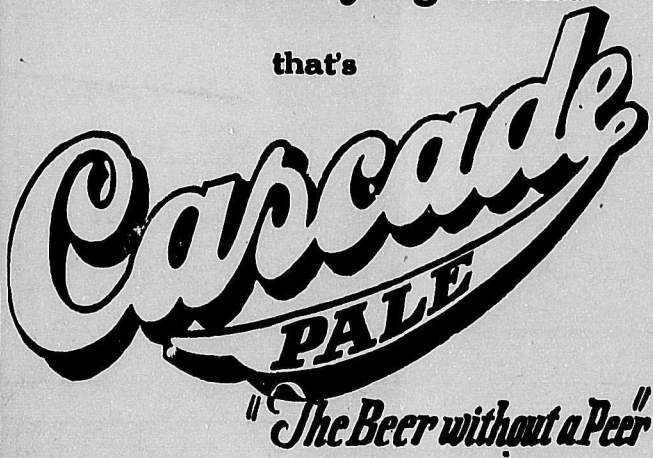
