C. O. Fricker Honored By The Canadian Legion

A full muster of members of the Anyox Branch Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., turned out to a social and smoker in the Legion Hall on Thursday last, May 10th, to do honor to their comrade, C. O. Fricker, who was soon to leave for Northern Rhodesia. A program of music and singing was gone through during the evening and a most enjoyable time spent.

Mr. Fricker, who is a charter member of the Anyox Branch, which was formed in March, 1927, has been one of the mainstays of that body and has held office of one kind or another continuously since its inception. As a token of the great esteem which his fellow-members have for him he was made the recipient of a handsome pen and pencil set, the presentation being made by President J. A. D. Stewart. Mr. Stewart referred to the splendid service which Comrade Fricker had always given to the Legion, and regretted his loss to the community.

Mr. Fricker expressed his regret at having to sever his connection with the Anyox Branch. He reviewed the aims and objects of the Legion, and pointed out the handicaps under which ex-service men had labored since their return from the war. Such men had given perhaps five or six of the best years of their lives, only to find on their return to civil life that their jobs were no longer open to them.

Mr. W. B. Maxwell, Assistant Superintendent of the Anyox plant eulogized Mr. Fricker's work here, and wished him every success in his new sphere. The program included songs by C. West, J. Varnes, E. Phillips, R. Lavery and Len Jenkins, also community singing to the accompaniment of the Legion Orchestra and concluded with the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow." They then adjourned to the home of Mr. C. P. Ashmore, where the ladies of the Collision of Kincolith Chapter, I. O. D. E., were holding a social function.

Makes Inspection of Alice Arm Bridges and Railway

H. MacDonald, general road foreman, for the southern district of Atlin, and who has held the position of road foreman at Stewart for many years, arrived at Alice Arm on Thursday from Stewart in order to make an inspection of the state of the local bridges and also make an examination of the lower portion of the Dolly Varden Railway. The railway suffered from washouts last fall when high water prevailed in the Kitsault River. It is the only means of transportation up the Kitsault Valley and unless it is repaired will work a hardship on mining property owners who wish to take in supplies for development work. Its present state of dis-repair would also discourage any mining company from bonding any properties in this section.

After making an inspection Mr. MacDonald stated that at present he could not state definitely just how much repair work would be undertaken this summer. He certainly felt, however, that the railway should at least be temporarily repaired.

Bride-Elect Received Bath Room Shower

Fatal Accident At The Hidden Creek Mine

A fatal accident occurred at the Hidden Creek Mine on Monday, May 14th, when Domenico Marrone lost his life as the result of a fall in a stope. Marrone was helping in the construction of a new trail which was being made from one stope to another on the Zero Level, when he evidently slipped and fell a distance of 120 feet. His body was discovered shortly afterwards and it was found that his skull was fractured.

An inquest was held on May 16th, when a verdict of accidental death was returned. Marrone had worked as a pluggerman for fourteen months, and had been employed at the Hidden Creek Mine for a total period of two years. He was 42 years of age and leaves a wife and two sons in Italy. He was of a bright and cheery disposition and leaves a number of friends to mourn his loss.

The body was interred in the Anyox Cemetery on Thursday morning. The Rev. Father Murie of the Catholic Church officiated.

**Mining Kept Industries
Wheels Turning**

Mining has been the salvation of British Columbia's trade and commerce since the fall of 1929, when prices of commodities commenced to drop to record low levels and the huge stream of international trade shrank to a mere rivulet. During the darkest period of the past four and a half years the large mining companies of the province carried on uninterruptedly, and in the case of the Granby Company the staff was not even reduced by a single man. Since 1929 the people of British Columbia have taken a greater interest in mining, realizing what a valuable asset it is. The recent unprecedented sensational rise in the price of gold has stimulated still further interest. This metal is now being feverishly sought for and is attracting a great deal of publicity. New mines will no doubt be continually created as long as gold remains at present prices. When present efforts are successful in raising silver prices to around an average stabilized price of 55 cents an ounce, then prosperity will have returned again to British Columbia. Silver at 55 cents will mean several extra thousand men employed, and thus a big market will be created for all the necessities of life produced by our farmers, our sawmills, machinery manufacturers and many others.

**Price Rise of Silver
Is Disappointing**

The task of raising silver prices to between 50 and 60 cents an ounce—which means so much to Alice Arm—still seems a long way from being completed. Press reports from the United States state that price raising is being regarded favorably in high government quarters there. But the rest of the world seem very apathetic. Eventually, no doubt, an international agreement will be arranged so that bi-metallism will be universally adopted, but at present it must be admitted that progress is painfully slow. If the United States alone adopted some form of bi-metallism it would be problematical what effect such an act would have upon Canadian silver prices. The price of Canadian silver would no doubt rise, but would it rise high enough to cause the development and operation of our large low grade ore deposits?



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
Where Four Centuries Meet


