Get on the Voters' List Before Next Monday

Applications to be placed on the provincial Voters' List, at the annual Court of Revision, to be held Monday, May 19th, must be in the hands of Mr. J. Conway, registrar, Anyox, before 5 o'clock, on Monday next, April 7th.

All voters already on the list and who have changed their address from one town to another in this constituency, should notify the registrar, so as to avoid voting absentee.

Those who were on the list at the last provincial election, and did not vote must register afresh.

It is very probably that the Voters' Lists will not be open again before another election and it is up to every man and woman over twenty-one years of age to get on the list.

C. N. Railways Show Increased Revenue

The Canadian National Railways for January and February show an increase in gross revenue of \$1,433,778, accompanied by a decrease in operating expenses of \$2,098,650, with a net profit of \$262,276 compared with a deficit of \$3,270,052 making an improvement for the two months as compared with the same months of 1923 of \$3,532,428.

British Empire Forests

According to the Canadian Forestry Assn., the British Empire has 700,000 square miles of "effective forests," the remaining area being unprofitable or inaccessible.

Canada has about 50% of the total, India 14%, Nigeria and the Gold Coast 14%, Australia and New Zealand about 8%.

The Copper Market

The situation is much better than it might appear. Consumption is at highest rate in history of the industry, with everything pointing to world consumption of 3,250,000,000 pounds of copper in 1924, or say approximately 20 per cent higher than in 1923. American consumption promises to stay fully as high as in 1923, when it averaged 125,000,000 pounds a month, and European consumption should increase notably as result of improving situation in Germany and the general change for the better in world affairs as a whole.

Indications are that price of copper definitely turned the corner last month, so that in 1924 copper will probably stage a strong recovery without the setback that followed the runaway market of last year which carried price of copper to 17½ cents in the spring, only to drop to 12¼ by fall. It was this spectacular rise in price that deceived Anaconda and Inspiration into going upon a dividend basis prematurely.

A banker who has been buying good copper shares remarked that electrical development over the next ten years would be record-breaking and there would be a corresponding increase in copper consumption.

"Many large mines," said he, "have reached their limit in production. Others can make little if anything on 13-cent copper. Under these conditions there is a lot of truth in forecasts of higher prices.

"Consumption, which is at a new high record, continues to equal production, which is also larger than ever before. I do not understand why copper producers have been selling their product around 13 cents a pound when they could just as easily obtain 15 cents."

Anyox Safety-First Engineer Receives New Appointment

The Vancouver Daily Province, in a recent issue, contained a photograph of Capt. S. F. C. Sweeney, who until recently was safety-first engineer for the Granby Co. at Anyox.

The photograph is accompanied by a lengthy news item, stating that Capt. Sweeney has been appointed safety-first engineer for the Shipping Federation of British Columbia, at Vancouver.

In commenting on the appointment, the Province says: "Captain Sweeney is a native son, having been born in Vancouver in 1890. He was educated at Haileybury College in England and the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., of which he was B.S.M., passing out with highest honors, the Governor-General's Gold Medal and the Sword of Honor, which entitled him to the one commission available in the Royal Engineers.

With them Captain Sweeney landed at Zeebrugge on October 5, 1914. He was wounded at the first battle of Ypres, and again in 1917, while commanding the field company crossing the Somme. He was twice mentioned in despatches.

Palladium Ore for East

The Elsinore, Captain J. W. Brisbois arrived this week in Prince Rupert with 622 sacks of palladium ore. The shipment represents 60,350 pounds, and carries gold, silver, palladium and copper. The ore was mined in Alaska, and is destined for the Irvington Smelter, in New Jersey.

Prince Rupert experienced a fall of six inches of snow last week, the first snowfall in the fishing town this year. Alice Arm and Anyox also experienced a flurry of the beautiful, but it did not pay us an extended visit, departing almost as quickly as it came.

In August, 1918, he went to Murmansk with the North Russian Expeditionary Force, and for his services there he was awarded the O.B.E. He returned to B.C. on leave in July, 1919, and then resigned his commission to settle here.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations governing pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
