## Two Black Bear Cubs Are Captured Near Alice Arm

A black bear that has been infesting the woods a short distance above the town of Alice Arm along the railway track was shot by J. Studdy last week-end and the two cubs accompanying her were captured. They are being cared for by Mr. Studdy and will probably be shipped east later.

The capture of the cubs was entailed with considerable difficulty, especially one, who every time anyone approached, climbed a tree. It was finally captured by using climbers. Bears are extremely plentiful in the Alice Arm district and those with cubs so near town are not appreciated by the women and children when they are fishing and berry picking during the summer months.

Bi-metallism will be one of the suggestions for the ending of the present depression, offered by the American delegates at the World Economic Conference at London. They have been instructed to strive for an international agreement to secure for gold and silver a definite ratio in value. If they are successful it will mean higher and stabilized prices for silver.

## Semi-Weekly Local Mail Service Will Be Maintained

The service of two mails a week between Alice Arm and Anyox will be maintained indefinitely by the Postal authorities. This advice was received by the Herald this week from Ottawa and terminates the uncertainty that has existed for some time in regard to the local mail service.

This welcome news will be received with great satisfaction by the people of both towns, as one mail a week, as was proposed, would have worked a great hardship on many people.

The schedule will be the same as is now in force, viz., Leave Alice Arm Wednesday afternoon and return Thursday morning; and leave Alice Arm Saturday morning and return same evening. When the change is made in the schedule of the Canadian National Steamships, however, and their boats call at Anyox on Friday, the local service will be changed. The mail will then leave Alice Arm on Friday and return same night or Saturday morning; also leave Alice Arm each Tuesday morning and return same day.

New tenders will be called for this schedule, and pending the awarding of the contract, the present semi-weekly service will be maintained.

We also received a letter this week from Hon. George Black, Speaker of the House of Commons, stating that the semi-weekly service will be maintained, and that he had made the strongest possible recommendation to the Postal authorities for a continuation of the service along the lines suggested in our letter to him.

As we stated in last week's issue, there was no doubt that two mails a week would be continued now that the full facts had been presented to the Postal authorities both directly and through Hon. George Black, M. P. and Mr. Olof Hanson, M. P. Both these gentlemen, who sit on opposite sides of the House worked indefatigably for the welfare of the district, and we again voice our thanks for the interest they displayed. It is indeed refreshing and inspiring to see political opponents join together for the common welfare.

Recent advices from the United States indicate that a strangle hold has been obtained on the depression in that country, and that the forward march to prosperity has commenced. Prices of commodities are rising, and the stock markets are experiencing a boom as investors realize that the bottom of low prices is past and that a revival of business is at hand. In general with all other commodities, prices of copper and silver have risen. Copper is now quoted at 7 1-2 cents a pound and silver at 34 1-2 cents an ounce. The increase in price of these two metals is a source of great satisfaction to everyone in this district, and the flame of hope burns a little brighter in consequence. Copper will continue to rise with other commodities as general business increases, and a bigger demand is created. Silver, however, is in a different category. It still remains the plaything of the world's leading nations. Its fate will probably be settled at the World Economic Conference now being held in London. Strong efforts will be made to induce the nations at the conference to accept bi-metallism, with a definite fixed ratio for silver in relation to gold. The American delegates have been instructed to spare no effort in striving to attain this end. If their efforts are successful--and it is very probable they will be--then the price of silver may be stabilized at somewhere from 60c. to \$1.00 per ounce. It will be a happy day for Alice Arm and every silver mining camp in the province if such prices prevail. The depression, as far as Alice Arm is concerned, will then cease to exist.

## Canadian Tobacco Production 54,000,000 Pounds

Tobacco production in Canada, during the year 1932, reached an estimated total of 54,000,000 pounds, according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. From the Virginias, from which Sir Walter Raleigh brought the weed back in the early days of the beginnings of the North American Continent, tobacco growing has spread until now it is world wide. It has many uses besides being burned at the shrine of Lady Nicotine, among the more important being the balancing of national budgets. Tobacco is also valuable to the agricultural industry as an insecticide.

## Fourteen Million Americans Visited Canada In 1932

More than fourteen million Americans visited Canada last year, according to an estimate received by the tourist department of the Canadian National Railways from the Canadian Government. This number constituted by far the bulk of the tourist traffic to Canada, the number of visitors from other countries being estimated at only 11,000.

The United States, in turn, attracted more Canadians than any other country, the number of Canadians who visited the United States during 1932 being estimated at 1,500,000. Based upon population the percentage of Canadians visiting the United States was about equal to the percentage of Americans visiting Canada. About 30,000 Canadians visited other countries.

## Big Conversion Loan Will Be Made In Fall

While at the moment no announcement has been made, it is currently expected that security holders will be asked to accept an interest rate of 3½ per cent. on the proposed Dominion conversion loan authorised at \$750,000,000.

The loan will be floated in October or November, it is believed. Money conditions at the time of flotation as well as any decisions reached at the coming World Economic Conference will be in the final factors in setting the interest rate as well as the amount of the loan. Authority is being asked of parliament to convert as much as 750 million dollars.

## Mining Is Leader Among Industries

The following facts were recently announced by the U. S. Bureau of Mines and by the Census Bureau of Statistics:

The mining industry supports 12.4 times as many people as agriculture and stock raising.

It employs 16 times as many workers, provides 60 times as much revenue to the railroads, and 140 times as much tonnage.

It provides 19 times as much primary wealth to the world and pays 85 times as much taxes.

## Agricultural Products of B.C. Shows Increase

British Columbia produced the greatest quantity of agricultural products in its history last year, but received for the output, the lowest market prices for many a year, states the annual summary of the Department of Agriculture. The total value of the production was more than \$34,373,000.

Quantity increases are recorded in livestock, apples, tree fruits, vegetables, wool and tobacco.

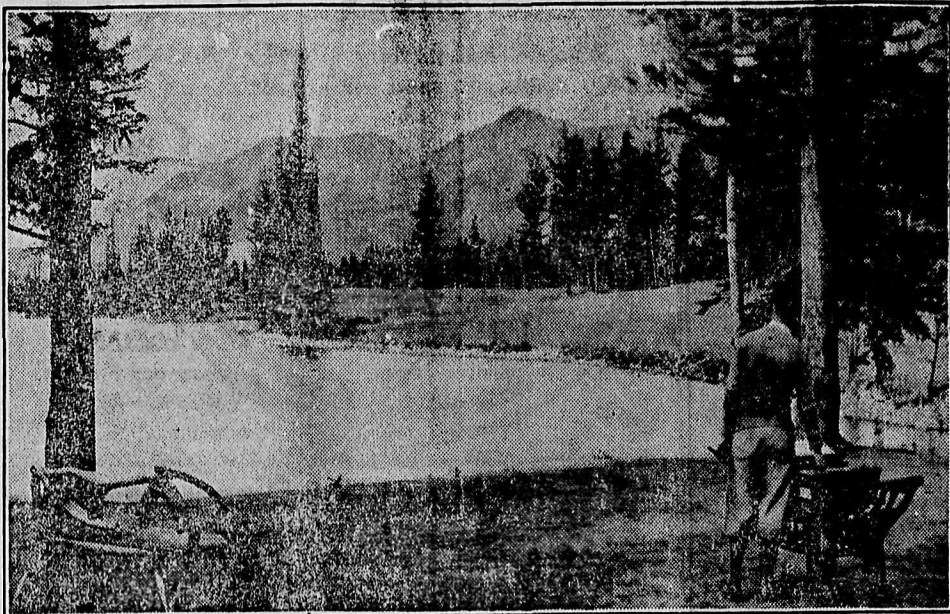

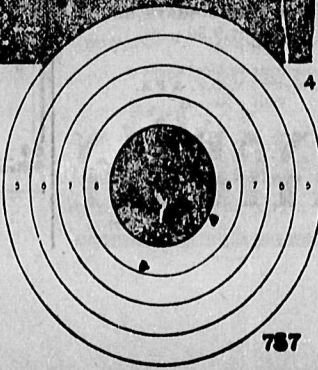
## Great Railroad Has Fine Police Force

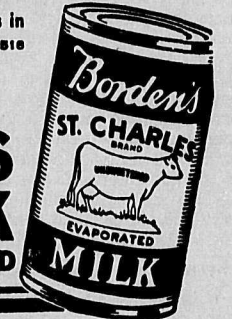
