Noah Timmins Buys Surf Inlet Mine and Mill

Purchase of the property and equipment of the Belmont Surf Inlet Mining Co. by Mr. Noah Timmins, well known Ontario Mining operator, is reported. The deal was effected through Mr. J. B. Woodworth, Vancouver mining engineer, who has been associated with Mr. Timmins in many ventures. The vendors were Tonopah Belmont Mining Co. of Philadelphia. It is the plan of the new owners to work the old mine, and also to use the mill at the Surf Inlet plant to handle ore from a mine on Porcher island, owned jointly by Mr. Timmins and Mr. Woodworth. The mine is located 100 miles north of Surf Inlet, and has been under development for two years, good showings of ore being located. Mr. F. M. Wells and Mr. Woodward recently made a trip to Surf Inlet to inspect the property, but were unable to get to the mine on account of the frozen condition of the inlet.

Government Will Be Asked To Relieve Unemployment

The government of Canada will be approached by a delegation from Western Canada seeking cessation of unemployment difficulties in the Dominion, it was decided at the closing session of the unemployment conference of Western provinces, cities and municipalities. A deputation will be sent to Ottawa to request the formation of a scheme of unemployment insurance and a decision by the Dominion government to bear a share of unemployment relief expenditures. men, who will, without friction, carry on the good work that has marked the present year.

Railway Lands Will Be Soon Returned to Province

Negotiations for the return to the province of British Columbia of Dominion railway lands and the Peace River Block are near to a satisfactory consumation and legislation to complete the transfer will be prepared to go before both the provincial legislature and the federal house, Premier S. F. Tolmie announced in the legislature last week. The premier also said that restoration of the sockeye salmon of the Fraser River could be effected only through a treaty between Canada and the United States.

Holding Of Wheat Shows Adverse Trade Balance

Trade figures to December 31, covering the first nine months of the fiscal year again reflect reduced grain shipments from Canada. Domestic exports for the period reached \$890,465,000 while imports were \$969,698,000. Re-exports were \$19,281,000 leaving a net adverse balance for the period of \$60,000,000.

ABOUT THE STOCK EXCHANGE

A STOCK Exchange is essentially a Public Service doing its best to make trading secure and efficient.

While this work has far-reaching results, the first principles of operation are simple. Somebody gives a broker an order. By cable or phone the broker's "floor"-man gets the order for execution. The price paid for the stock is the official quotation on the "floor" at exactly that time. The seller writes a triplicate record of the transaction, timed mechanically to with a tenth-second. Buyer, seller and Exchange each retain one copy. So every sale is permanently recorded and made known on the ticker.

Stock prices on the floor of the Exchange are controlled by orders received from the Public to buy and sell. The Exchange exercises no control over fluctuations. Like a loud-speaker it simply broadcasts the trading minute by minute. Regulations governing trading were accepted by the Provincial Parliament in session in 1907. No trading can take place between members off the "floor." The Stock Exchange itself has nothing to do with arrangements between brokers and clients. Here and There

The total value of the principal field crops of Canada for 1929 is estimated at \$986,986,000, about \$40,000,000 less than in 1928.

Construction of the new steamer for the service between Saint John and Digby on the Bay of Fundy is well advanced and it is hoped to have it in operation by next August. Grant Hall, senior vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, announced recently on a visit to the New Brunswick city.

Indicating western Canada's importance in the livestock world, 20 head of registered Aberdeen Angus cattle from Glencarnock Farm, famous breeding establishment operated near Brandon by Hon. J. D. McGregor, Lieutenant-Governor of the province, recently arrived at Vancouver by Canadian Pacific Railway for shipment to Australia and New Zealand.

Designed to furnish the immense tractive effort of 83,200 pounds, a new locomotive, first of its kind on this continent, to be operated on a high steam pressure principle, will be immediately placed under construction at the Angus Shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway. It will be one of the most powerful in the world and will supersede the 5900 engine of the railway as the most powerful in the British Empire. Locomotive and tender will weigh 764,000 lbs. or 14,000 lbs. heavier than the 5900 engine and 120,000 lbs. heavier than the 2800 locomotive.

How one \$14,000,000 equipment contract given by the Canadian Pacific Railway to the National Steel Car. of Hamilton, during 1929, resulted in 122 business houses, located in four Canadian provinces, securing valuable supply orders and how this far-flung distribution of the company's contract provided steady work and wages for skilled mechanics and large office staffs over a period of months has been revealed by a study of statistics at the National Steel Car Co. and Canadian Pacific Railway.

T. A. Murphy, M.P., of Toronto, was a passenger on S.S. Montrose recently from Saint John. As an official of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, Mr. Murphy is on his way to Great Britain to make arrangements for the British Empire games at Hamilton next August, at which every part of the Empire will be represented by brilliant athletes.

What is regarded as one of the largest real estate transactions on record was made recently when the Canadian Government reached agreements with the Provincial Governments of Manitoba and Alberta for the transfer to those provinces of their natural resources. These include large areas of land, forests, water powers, fisheries, mines, oilfields, etc., and represent a value in excess of a billion dollars. The agreement will be ratified by Parliament at its next session early this year.

The Wilder Silver Medal, one of the highest awards made by the American Pomological Society, has been given to W. T. Macoun, Dominion Horticulturist, for his work in breeding new varieties in apples and for his contribution to horticulture generally. Mr. Macoun has occupied the position of Dominion Horticulturist at the Canadian Government Experimental Farm at Ottawa for the past 41 years.

Here and There

The largest passenger liner into the port of Saint John in 1928 was the Parisian, of 4,500 tons; nowadays the 20,000-ton Duchess of York is but one of four "Duchess" ships using the port, said Hugh A. Allan, founder of the Allan Line of Steamships, on landing at Saint John recently, and commenting on the growth of the port. He was certain it would continue to grow in the future as it had done in the past.

There is a huge market in Europe for breeding silver foxes which will absorb all that Canada has to offer for many years, is the view of J. S. Wedlock, of St. John, passenger on the Duchess of York, who has been spending some time in Sweden where he established a fox farm stocked from his farm on Prince Edward Island.

Sponsored by Hon. R. Randolph Bruce, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, and under direction of Harold Eustace Key, musical director for the Canadian Pacific Railway, the second annual sea music festival has just been held at the Empress Hotel, Victoria, with great success. Artists of international repute took part in the revival of the sea chanteys that men sang when wooden ships manned by iron crews sailed the Seven Seas.

During the five years that the Canada Colonization Association has been under the control of the Canadian Pacific Railway, it has settled 4,270 families on 844,268 acres at a purchase price including equipment of more than \$33,000,000, was the statement of W. M. Neal, general manager of the railway's western lines, speaking at the first annual meeting of the Saskatchewan branch of the Association held at Regina recently.

A vast amount of serious work is being done along constructive lines in oil development in Alberta, G. G. Ommanney, director of the Canadian Pacific Railway's department of development, stated in a recent interview at Winnipeg. A million barrels of oil had been taken from western Canada last year and prospects were good for greater production in 1930, he added.

Seven Canadian Pacific special trains will be required to carry some snowshoers, members of clubs in Quebec Province and New England, who are coming to the convention of snowshoe clubs to be held at Ottawa February 1-2. Two special trains will be needed to carry the delegation from Maine centres and two more for that from Montreal.

Another new Canadian Pacific steamer took to the water recently at Glasgow when the "Princess Elizabeth", 5,000-ton vessel for the British Columbia Coastal Service, was launched from the yards of the Fairfield Shipbuilding Company at Govan by Mrs. R. B. S. Re'ford, daughter of W. R. MacInnes, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The ship can reach a speed of 16½ knots, will have sleeping accommodation for 465 passengers and day accommodation for 1,500.

Fish caught in the inland lakes of the Province of Saskatchewan have an annual value of over \$500,000. Among the principal kinds of fish caught are gold-eyes, herring, pickerel, pike, sturgeon, mullets, trout, tullibee and white fish.

Trading In Stocks Is Basically Simple

During the past period of intensive trading on the Vancouver Stock Exchange, improvements have been made to the system which makes trading here comparable in efficiency with practices in leading exchanges of the world, according to Charles G. Pennock, President of the Vancouver Stock Exchange.

The Vancouver Stock Exchange operates on the "post" system which permits trading in different stocks simultaneously at the various stations on the "floor". The operation of buying and selling has been simplified.

An investor gives his broker an order to buy stock. This order is conveyed to the broker's representative on the "floor" and offered for sale. Should another broker hold a buying order for the same stock, he shouts "sold" and the transaction is complete. The price paid is the official price quotation for that stock. Records are kept in triplicate and automatically time-stamped to within a tenth-second.

The Vancouver Stock Exchange is merely a machine giving a necessary service to investors. It is operated on a system passed and approved by the Provincial Government.

Noranda Mining Co. Adds To Ore Reserves

It is reported that Noranda has added 1,000,000 tons of high-grade ore to its 2,000,000 tons proven a year ago, and that some 4,000,000 tons of low-grade ore has been blocked out which may be used for operating on a large scale.

The present plan of averaging tourist expenditure at \$10 per head per day is the veriest guess work. Many tourists do not spend that amount and boast of the fact. The system of counting tourists is also to undergo revision, it being shown that the same party has appeared no fewer than four times in the returns as four different parties.
