Two most worthy citizens will be lost to Anyox and district on Monday next, when Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Fricker leave for Northern Rhodesia, where Mr. Fricker will take up a position with the Rhokana Corporation. Mr. and Mrs. Fricker will make the journey via England, leaving Montreal on June 1st. Their place of residence in Rhodesia will be N'Kana.

Coming to Anyox eleven years ago, Mr. Fricker worked as operator in the mill, then as mill metallurgist. He afterwards became Assistant Superintendent and in the spring of 1929 he succeeded Mr. Maxwell as superintendent of that important unit of the plant.

Says Silver Should Be Left Alone to Find Price Level

Silberling Reports
 Were silver to be left entirely alone it is reasonably certain that either a gradual recovery of business and the general price level or an inflation of prices produced by other means would certainly elevate the price of the metal. For many years there has been a consistent correlation of the price of silver with the average movement of commodity prices. There is therefore no inherent reason for granting to silver producers any special benefit such as they are now loudly demanding. The real reason for these demands is to be found in the fact that various groups are exploiting silver to accomplish objectives going far beyond the recuperation of the mining industry or the alleged benefits to the Orient. The silver movement must be judged from its general inflationary implications rather than from the standpoint of benefit to this or that producing or commercial interest.

Noranda Mines Sells All Copper In Britain

Earnings of 70c. a share for the first quarter of 1934, were announced by James Y. Murdock, president of Noranda Mines Limited, when he addressed the annual meeting.

This estimate, prepared from unaudited figures, represents a rate of approximately \$2.80 a share, as compared with \$2.15 a share net profit reported for 1933.

"The principal market for Canadian copper," said Mr. Murdock, is the United Kingdom, and from a Canadian point of view this market has been materially affected by increased production of copper from Rhodesia, the commencement of refining in England of a portion of such copper, and increased production and shipment to this market of copper by South America producers.

Copper produced by smelters and refiners enters the United Kingdom free of duty, but copper rods produced in the Empire enjoy a preference of 10 per cent. Since the Imperial Conference in Ottawa in 1931 there has been a marked preference on the part of the United Kingdom buyer for Empire produced copper.

Canadian copper is all electrically refined and has to meet the competition of fire refined copper made from Rhodesian and South American copper, as well as electrolytic copper from all parts of the world. Your company met all this competition and successfully marketed all of the 1933 production at a satisfactory price."

Liquor Sales Increase In British Columbia

Liquor revenues in British Columbia showed an unexpected gain of twenty-five per cent. both in January and February and forty per cent. in March as compared with the corresponding figures a year ago.

Liquor estimates for the fiscal year commencing April 1 had been placed at \$300,000 less than in the same period last year, but indications now are that they will be up instead of down.

Increasing purchasing power within the province is believed responsible for the changed trend.

Expect B. C. To Default On Interest Payments

Government officials at Ottawa expect a statement from Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia confirming the Pacific Coast province's default on interest payments as a result of the federal government's refusal to loan it \$8,000,000 in order to meet accruing obligations and provide a program of relief work.

Will Develop Independence Mine at Stewart

S. P. Fitzgerald, president of Independence Gold Mining Co. Ltd., announces that Brown-Draper Co. of Seattle has undertaken the financing of the company under terms which will involve no change in the capital structure. The property consists of 25 claims 11 miles up Bear River Valley from Stewart on the west side of the river, about 8 miles south and west of George Copper Gold Mine and half a mile north of the Dalhousie property. Values are in gold, silver, lead, zinc and copper. Work has been confined principally to one of 12 veins disclosed on the property.

Present plans call for running a short distance ahead in the lower tunnel, then running a crosscut to the vein to open up the downward continuation of a good grade of ore found in the tunnel 200 feet above. By drifting east and west and sinking on the vein, it is hoped to prove up a large body of commercial ore.

Over \$200,000 has been previously expended on the property.







"The Friendly Road," by David Grayson, which is well-known to many lovers of nature, depicts incidents and friendliness of people along country roads and in the rural districts. There is, however, a road in the Canadian Rockies the friendliness of which is not due to mortals as in Grayson's book, but to the friendliness of animals. Animals termed wild, but in this instance a word that cannot be applied to those on the Banff-Windermere Highway. There is possibly no more beautiful road than this which runs from Banff to Lake Windermere, in the Columbia River Valley. The distance of 104 miles is spectacular and the scenes are constantly changing. The views from the high passes looking down into valleys, thousands of feet below, tiny lakes surrounded by al-

pine meadows, rivers crossed and re-crossed, and glimpses of cascades tumbling down slopes from dizzy heights are intriguing and beautiful.

To this natural beauty is added that of seeing the animals in their natural haunts. Rocky Mountain sheep are seen on the road along Vermilion Lakes not far from Banff. They are so tame that often motors have to slow down as they will persist, almost to the point of danger, in standing in the middle of the highway.

Bozo, a black bear, is a friend to many motorists on the Banff-Windermere road. He comes out on the highway as if he had sole right to it. He does not resent these invaders in the least and really wishes to

show his friendliness. Sometimes he has lunches handed to him and the remarks of "nice old chap, fine old fellow," please him tremendously, and he will try to come even nearer. Bozo no doubt had many dreams during the winter of summer tourists, and possibly has figured out in true bear fashion just how to get the most out of the tourist season.

Deer are seen, also, on this famous highway, though not as often as other animals. They are regular visitors to Banff, and are frequently seen on the streets of the village. There are hundreds of miles of smooth motor roads through the Canadian Rockies, and devotees of the open road are visiting this region in increasing numbers annually.



Weather Held Up Tennis

Canada May Double Gold Mines This Year

There is every likelihood that Canada will double the number of her producing gold mines during the present year, according to information reaching the Industrial and Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. Whereas at the beginning of 1933 there were only 28 regularly producing gold mines in Canada, this number has now risen to 47 and by the end of the present year it will have increased to 80 or 90. It is estimated that Canada's gold production in 1934 will amount to \$115,000,000 as against the total of \$85,000,000 last year.

Canada's Favorable Trade Balance Increases

Canada's visible trade balance for the year ended March 31, 1934, was favorable to the extent of \$151,903,000, compared with a favorable balance for the fiscal year 1932-3 of \$74,331,000. The improvement, therefore, in Canada's favorable trade balance for the fiscal year 1933-4 compared with the fiscal year 1932-3 was \$77,572,000.

Canadian Exports To Britain Shows Increase

An increase of \$12,031,000 was shown in Canadian exports to British Empire countries for the month of March when the total was \$29,376,000 as compared with \$17,345,000 in the corresponding month last year, according to a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

French River, Home of Wiley "Muskie," Will Soon Echo Cries of Elated Anglers as They Battle Fresh Water Tiger



"Now is the time for all good fishermen to prepare for that summer trip" is an appropriate slogan for disciples of Isaac Walton these balmy spring days. A successful fishing trip depends largely upon the careful selection of location, tackle and even associates, for many a party has been ruined by the last-minute introduction of a "wet blanket" to an otherwise congenial collection of sportsmen.

One of the most interesting fishing streams in North America is French River, Ontario, 215 miles north of Toronto on the Canadian Pacific Railway. This lordly river is celebrated as the habitat of the fighting muscalunge, one of the gamest fish known; huge Great Northern pike, pickerel, an abundance of small-mouth and large-mouth black bass and other finny prizes. To accommodate sportsmen and their families, a fine bungalow camp—a collection of individual cabins centering around a main clubhouse—has been erected on a cliff overlooking the river. Here the fisherman and his family can "rough it in comfort," far from the cares and annoyances of a work-a-day world.

That big "muskies" are plentiful at French River is proven by the fact that one recent summer a monster muskie weighing 55 pounds was taken in the North Channel at the mouth of the Wolseley River. Also, not long ago a party of Ohio sportsmen caught, besides their daily limit of bass, pike and pickerel, no less

than seventeen "muskies" ranging from 10 to 38 1/2 lbs. In 1926 a "muskie" of 35 pounds weight, 50 inches long and 21 inches in girth was taken in the main channel of the French, one mile from the bungalow camp.

The French River Bungalow Camp will open June 15 and remain open until Sept. 15. Jack Strathdee, its genial manager, is an experienced outdoorsman whose chief delight is coaching the uninitiated in the art of luring the fish. French River also has a fine 9-hole golf course so that devotees of the royal and ancient game who are also fond of fishing need not entirely forego the former sport in favor of the latter.
