H. M. S. Delhi Has Had Very Adventurous Career

Laid down in 1917, and commissioned in 1918, H. M. S. Delhi has undertaken a number of commissions, even in peace time. She is the Flagship of the America and West Indies Station, Rear-Admiral R. P. E. E. Drax, C. B., D. S. O., being the Commander-in-Chief. She is 496 feet in length, and has a beam of 44 feet and carries 437 officers and men.

In 1923-24 she made a complete world cruise, in company with the battle cruiser and light cruiser squadrons. During this cruise she broke all speed records for any kind of vessel by travelling from Malta to China in fourteen days. Her average speed was 26 knots.

She proceeded to Bias Bay to take part in the attack on the stronghold of Chinese pirates there. Their modus operandi was to dress up as passengers, board ships on that pretence, seize the vessels by force, run them into Bias Bay, take everything they wanted and then turn the vessels loose.

During a commission in 1927-28 this ship took King Fuad, of Palestine, together with his wives and retinue, as an exile to Constantinople. In 1930 she travelled farther up the Amazon River than any ship which carried the British Flag had gone.

On her present cruise she started from Bermuda and travelled up the coast of California and British Columbia, Anyox being the farthest point north. From this port she returned to Esquimalt, and thence back to Bermuda.

The more one reads the report of the Kidd Committee the plainer it appears that they made a mess of it. Cut, slash, abolish and reduce is the keynote of the report, but it is too one-sided to receive the general support of the people of British Columbia. They would take too many of the privileges and liberties of the poorer class away, but none of the rich man's privileges. They recommend that all school children when attaining their fourteenth birthday should pay half their schooling cost, and at 16 years of age the full cost, which the government estimates at \$120.00 per year. The government has rightly decided to turn this recommendation flatly down. Another of their brilliant ideas is to repeal the Minimum Wage Laws. A repeal of these laws would be a return to the pre-Victorian period when sweated child labor under the worst of sanitary conditions was used to swell the employers' profits. An explanation from the Kidd Committee as to how the repeal of the Minimum Wage Laws would help the government balance the budget would be welcomed by the people of the province. The Committee would reduce the wages and salaries of all government employees, whether reductions were justified or not. They would close the B. C. University, thus depriving brilliant scholars of the poor and middle classes the benefits of a university education. The wealthy being able to send their children to outside universities.

The Kidd Committee did not recommend that the big incomes should be more heavily taxed in order to increase the government's revenue. They didn't recommend that the high interest rate paid on borrowed money--some of which is 6 and 7 per cent.--should be reduced, as was done in Britain when the interest rate was cut from 5 to 3 1-2 per cent. and which enabled the government to save millions of dollars. Further reductions in Britain and other countries are also being considered.

If the Kidd Committee had been sincere in their efforts to reduce expenditure and balance the budget, they would have recommended the above measures. They studied only their own class. Many of their recommendations would be an added burden to the poorer classes and the rich man would escape unscathed. The Kidd Commission had a splendid opportunity to win the support of the masses, but they failed lamentably.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept 3rd—After completing forty-two years of service, during which time he has witnessed tremendous strides in the development of the use of the telegraph, George Stead, Superintendent of the British Columbia Division, Canadian National Telegraphs, retires from service with the company at the end of this month. He has made no future plans, except that "I will now be able to enjoy a holiday."

Mr. Stead is well known in business and commercial circles all through the west and especially in British Columbia. He arrived in Vancouver in May 1927 to open the superintendent's office and has remained here since that time. He has had charge of the company's telegraph business not only on the mainland, but also on Vancouver Island.

It is understood that with the retirement of Mr. Stead the Alberta and British Columbia districts will be merged under the jurisdiction of W. J. Rooney, superintendent at Edmonton.

Granby Company Examined Alaskan Property



More Exports To Britain Than U. S. A.

Canadian domestic exports to the United Kingdom in July, amounting in value to \$16,047,000, exceeded the exports to the United States by \$3,525,000. Ever since November 1928, with the exception of November 1931, the exports to the United States each month have exceeded those to Great Britain.

Canadian Crops Are Good This Year

Harvesting will be general in British Columbia early in September, says the weekly crop report of the Bank of Montreal. Grain crops are satisfactory, a 100% yield is estimated. Roots and vegetables have been greatly benefited by recent rains and promise better than average yields. Apples are in good condition, a 100% crop is indicated. Other fruits are of good quality. A 75% yield of hops is anticipated from a reduced acreage, picking will start about September 1st. Pasturage is ample and in good condition.



Welcomed to Scotland


