Officers of Silver Crest Mining Company Re-elected

The annual general meeting of Silver Crest Mines Ltd. was held in Vancouver on July 19, when the accounts for the year's operations were presented and adopted. Retiring directors were all re-elected, the board consisting of A. S. Thomson, president, G. Armitage, J. E. Fitzgerald, C. O. Wickenden, P. Mallett and G. A. DeHaseth.

A very encouraging response had already been made to the proposal put before shareholders for further financing, by means of the purchase of treasury stock in the proportion of 30 shares for every 100 shares now held. This new financing by the shareholders of the company themselves, will permit of the carrying out of the recommendation of the Company's engineer, Mr. P. E. Peterson, for the continuation of the present drift on the Saddle property near Anyox, another 300 feet to intersect the five-foot vein at the bottom of No. 3 shaft, whence a raise would be driven for ventilation and the drift continued to intersect the main vein.

No work is being done on the Silver Crest group owned by this company in the Portland Canal district and located near the Big Missouri.

Output of Minerals In British Columbia Shows Increase

Gain Made During First Six Months of This Year

British Columbia produced gold, silver, lead and zinc in greater quantities in the first half of 1930 than in the first half of 1929. Copper was the only one of the major metals to show a decline, due to curtailment by the Granby Company at the Hidden Creek and Copper Mountain mines. The decline in metal prices was responsible for a decline of 12.3 per cent in the gross value of the output of metals and minerals despite the greater production. The estimated output for the first six months of this year is \$29,909,487, compared with a half-yearly rate in 1929 of \$34,122,722.

In releasing a summary prepared by John D. Galloway provincial mineralogist, from statistical information collected and from reports submitted by the resident mining engineers, Hon. W. A. McKenzie, minister of mines, emphasized that conditions were remarkably good, despite the world-wide depression in mining caused by abnormally low metal prices.

Important features of the period were:

1. Increased quantity production in the aggregate.
2. Four new mines entered steady production—Union and Reno (gold); Prosperity (silver); and the Monarch, an important lead-zinc producer.
3. Continuation of development, exploration and prospecting at a fair rate.
4. The success of certain development programmes, particularly at Big Missouri and Monarch properties. Big Missouri bids fair to become an important gold producer and the success attained at this property should result in renewed investigation of many similar type properties in the Salmon River area.

Fatal Accident Occurs At Concentrator

A fatal accident occurred at the Concentrating mill on Saturday, when Richard C. Bray was instantaneously killed, by the breaking of a drive belt.

Deceased was 41 years of age, and was a native of England. He was in the employ of the Granby Co. since August 1928, and was employed as a repairman at the mill. He leaves to mourn his loss, a wife and baby daughter.

The funeral service will be held in the United Church today, and the body taken south this evening. Mrs. Bray will accompany the body to Vancouver, where interment will take place.

An inquest as to the cause of death, was held on Monday, and a verdict of accidental death was returned.

5. The tremendous activity by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company in connection with the construction of the chemical fertilizer plants at Trail which has provided much employment when badly needed and will within a year be an important addition to the industrial activity of the province.

6. The mooted plans to interest capital in an iron and steel plant somewhere on the coast of British Columbia are of decided interest. In this connection the report of the Freyn Engineering Company, of Chicago, that such a plant could be profitably operated from British Columbia raw materials is distinctly encouraging. It is not believed, however, that the financial proposals have progressed beyond the investigational stage. The importance of such a plant to the industrial life of the province can be readily appreciated.

Offsetting to some extent these favorable features is the rather uncertain outlook for any material improvement in silver and zinc

prices for some time to come, which condition may cause certain hitherto productive mines in British Columbia to remain closed in definitely. Another disturbing factor is the continued decline in the production of coal which fell away approximately 18 per cent. as compared with the similar period in 1929. The chief cause of the distress in the coal mining industry is undoubtedly the continually lessened demand from the railways which are steadily replacing coal with fuel oil. The coal men are doing their utmost to obtain new markets and win back some that have been lost, and it is hoped their efforts will soon bear fruit.

While the Canadian Chamber of Commerce is completing plans for its official tour of China and Japan leaving Vancouver October on S.S. Empress of Russia, an important group of Japanese manufacturers and merchants is due to arrive at the same port July 25 on board the Empress of Canada for a tour of Canada and the United States.

To remove the prejudices of men women want to be regarded as their partners and to be rewarded on merit regardless of sex, is the view of Miss Helen Cleveland, of Toronto, holder of a "man's" job with an internationally known bond house and recently elected president of Zonta International at the 10th annual meeting of this world-wide women's organization. With forty members of that body she is taking the Alaska trip aboard S.S. Princess Louise.

The greatest living golfer is Bobby Jones and the most enthusiastic golfer in the world is probably the Emperor of Japan, according to Walter Hagen, colorful U. S. golfer just back aboard S.S. Empress of Russia after a tour of Australia, Japan and China. Both Hagen and Kirkwood who accompanied him, voiced high appreciation of Japanese golf courses.

A million dollar contract has been offered the Torbanite Products Co., Ltd., of New Glasgow, for Torbanite residue as it comes from the G'net retort. This order comprises 250,000 tons at \$4 a ton and becomes effective sixty days from July 5.

Nova Scotia fisheries in 1929 had a product valued at \$11,455,491 according to a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Value of the preceding year's catch was placed at \$3,504,583.

Prospects are that Canada will this year advance into second place among the gold-producing countries of the world. South Africa holds first place and United States, second. Last year the value of gold produced in Canada was approximately \$40,000,000. This year it is expected to be about \$60,000,000.

A short course for departmental judges was held recently at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. Over 125 were present, including judges of ploughing matches, standing field crops, heavy and light horses, beef and dairy cattle, and sheep and swine. Classes were started some 15 years ago, and are primarily to get judges together for purposes of demonstration so that a uniform standard may be maintained for judging at shows and competitions.

The Provincial Royal Commission on State Health Insurance and Maternity Benefits proposals is to hold an open meeting at the Prince Rupert Court House, Saturday evening, August 16, to hear any representations that may be made by residents of the northern areas touching matters within the scope of the Commissions' investigations. The Commissioners invite the attendance of all interested in the subjects of the inquiry and will be glad to hear as witnesses individual citizens or representatives of public or semi-public bodies, industrial organizations, fraternal orders, trades unions, social or hospital workers, medical men, etc., who may be able to offer constructive suggestions as to the possible economical operation of public health insurance or maternity benefits in British Columbia, or give any new reasons for or against state health insurance proposals as they now are fairly well understood in this province. 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

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
