## First Alice Arm Exhibition Huge Success In Every Way

Labor Day, Monday, September 7th, marked a new epoch in the history of Alice Arm, when the residents of the town held their first Exhibition of garden and farm products, etc. The wonderful exhibits proved that in addition to the untold mineral wealth locked in the hills, the rich alluvial plains of the Kitsault and Illiance rivers also contain wealth, which, judging from the samples displayed on Monday may some day rival even our mineral riches.

Everything combined to make the Exhibition a huge success. The spacious floor of the Kitsault House was crowded with exhibits. The sun shone brilliantly throughout the day, the whole town participated in the event and the sports that followed the opening of the Exhibition were greatly enjoyed.

The vegetable exhibits were the chief attraction of the exhibition. Exclamations of astonishment were heard on all sides as the eyes of the visitors beheld the enormous potatoes, pumpkins, cabbages, etc. that were displayed in lavish profusion. In the potato section competition was very keen, as was also the carrots, beets and cabbages. Competition was also very keen in the floral section.

Everything grown in Alice Arm was on display: every garden vegetable in their natural state and also in glass sealers. Apples, berries, flowers, potted plants, etc. were temptingly displayed, while the suitability of the valley for farming was shown by the splendid exhibits of fully ripened wheat, oats, rye and barley. Truly it was a wonderful exhibition of the fruits of man's industry and the chests of the Alice Arm citizens swelled with pride after viewing their first effort.

The judge for the horticultural and agricultural exhibits was Mr. A. E. Ironside, and Mrs. G. W. McGowan of the Esperanza mine and Miss Agnes Wardrope of Anyox judged the the canned exhibits, home cooking etc. and flowers. Their decisions were very popular.

Following the opening of the Exhibition a sports programme was carried out including a baseball game. A very enjoyable dance was also held in the evening at T.

## Work Now Available In Relief Camp

J. A. Anderson, district superintendent of Public Works paid a short visit to Alice Arm on Sunday. During his stay here he made arrangements for the commencement of relief work.

A temporary camp, consisting of tents was constructed during the week. Anyone wishing to engage in relief work can now do so. The wages are \$2.00 per day, 8 hours a day and 6 days a week, and 85c. per day will be charged for board. Family men will be granted 80c. per day extra. An extra 50c. per day will be paid to fallers, buckers and drillers. A permanent camp will be built as soon as possible. Work undertaken this winter will be the construction of the Illiance-Naas road.

Some dissatisfaction has been caused in regard to the low wages paid. This matter was recently taken up with the Minister of Public Works by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce. The Hon. R. H. Bruhn in reply stated that all we can do is to make a subsistence allowance. He also said: "I understand from a recent survey that there are 44,000 unemployed persons in the province today. You can figure it out for yourself what it would mean to the people of the province by way of taxation if these 44,000 persons were to be put to work at \$4.00 per day for probably the next 12 months, as there seems to be no immediate likelihood of any abatement of the present situation."

## Contraction Due To Depression

We are sorry to announce that it has been found necessary to reduce the size of the Herald. Due to the falling off of advertising it has been increasingly difficult to continue publishing. There were two alternatives open to us, one was to discontinue publishing and the other to reduce the size. We chose the latter as we believed that the people of Anyox and Alice Arm would prefer a smaller paper rather than no paper at all. As soon as the present depression passes which will result in an advance in metal prices, thus putting more money into circulation we will increase the size of the Herald. At the present time it is impossible for us to give our readers a full size paper and still carry on.

## Will Stock Alice Arm Lakes With Trout

Mr. J. Boyd, who is in charge of the Federal Government Marine and Fisheries Department for Northern British Columbia with headquarters at Prince Rupert arrived at Alice Arm on Tuesday by seaplane.

His visit was in connection with the stocking of several lakes with trout, which was taken up with the Department by the Chamber of Mines some time ago.

Attempts were made to land on Caribou Lake and also Clearwater Lake. The former was too small and a strong down draft made landing conditions dangerous on the latter. The plane returned to town, and Mr. Boyd left on Wednesday morning for Clearwater

Lake, accompanied by O. Flint as guide.

During the afternoon Mr. Boyd hiked to the lakes on the hill on the west side of the town, but owing to the stagnant state of the water he was of the opinion that trout would not propagate successfully there.

The visiting plane is owned by the Western Airways Ltd. and is under charter to the Marine and Fisheries Department. It was piloted by A. Cheeseman, who is a veteran aviator. Two years ago he was a member of the British South pole expedition, and did considerable flying in the difficult country surrounding the South Pole.

The plane left on Wednesday for Prince Rupert, but Mr. Boyd will return by boat at a later date.
