Anyox Hunters Return With Spoils of Chase

Others Not So Fortunate

That it is possible to leave Anyox in the morning, reach an elevation high enough to shoot a mountain goat and bring it home in the evening, was proved last Sunday when Harry Selfe, Wm. Eve, Alex Davie and Alan Morkill did the trick.

They embarked on board the launch Effie in the grey morning dawn, and slipping their cable, steered a course for Hastings Arm. They landed on the east side and scaled the bald topped mountains to an elevation of 4000 feet. As noiselessly and stealthily as any Indian hunter they got within rifle range of a band of unsuspecting mountain goat. A rifle shot; a bound in the air, and a magnificent specimen of the lords of the high altitudes lay stretched on his native heath. Burdened with the spoils of the chase the hunters returned, and the resultant stiff joints on the following day were somewhat relieved by copious portions of roast goat, fried goat, goat stew, etc.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

No Radical Changes are Expected in Radio Sets

The day of rapid changes in radio receiving sets has passed, and radio is now definitely established as a practical, dependable, permanent utility for everyday use, according to Dr. J. H. Dellinger, Chief of the Radio Section of the U. S. Bureau of Standards.

"Following the period of experimental development, during which the market was flooded with scores of sets of all degrees of receptivity, the industry has now settled down to the production of a relatively few standard high-class sets, expertly designed and substantially built, which may be expected to give as good results five or ten years from

now as they do when new," said Dr. Dellinger.

"There is no more reason for waiting to buy a good radio set than there is in waiting to buy a piano. While there doubtless will be occasional refinements in receiving equipment, these are not likely to affect the comparative values of the standard sets of today. Tubes of course will lose their efficiency after from 1,000 to 2,000 hours of use, but most of them can be reactivated at small cost. The set as a whole, however, will retain its efficiency and value indefinitely."

Bunting and 'Stampede' Bonds Property

The Hecla mining company operators in the Coeur d'Alene has bonded the Stampede group of claims in far northern British Columbia, near the Alaskan boundary line for \$100,000, it is announced by Wm. Bunting, part owner of the property, who has returned to Vancouver from Spokane.

Bunting with the widely known "Stampede John" Steinbraten of Klondyke fame, who located the ground, will retain a one-eighth interest.

The property is about 50 miles inland from Haines, on the Alaska coast. A large body of gold-silver ore carrying values from \$10 to \$70 a ton is said to be exposed. Mr. Bunting will leave next Wednesday for the north, accompanied by engineers representing the Hecla Mining company. Programme of development for next spring will be arranged.—Vancouver Sun.

Good Progress Being Made at Dunwell Mine

Portland Canal News

The Dunwell Mines Co. have about completed the construction of their concentrator at Glacier Creek, and are now putting on the finishing touches and erecting the terminal bunkers, after which everything will be ready for installing machinery. Good headway is also being made on the tram towers five of the thirteen having been erected. In the meantime the mine is being shaped up for actual production, and thousands of tons of ore are now ready for the mill.

The biggest real estate deal consummated in Stewart in years is being concluded this week in Vancouver, whereby the entire subdivision of D. L. 443, comprising some 800 lots, adjoining Stewart on the east side of the railway track and locally known as the Mann Town-site, is being sold. No particulars other than these are yet available. It is believed locally that this deal portends important developments in this district in the very near future.
