Three Accidents Occur in Alice Arm Logging Camps

A very unfortunate accident occurred on Wednesday at the Granby Company's logging camp, on the Kitsault flats, when Mr. Steve Anderson was struck by a log and suffered a broken leg.

Pilings were being hauled in for the railroad trestle and the front end of one log struck a stump swinging the other end around and striking Mr. Anderson, who arrived here on Monday and had started working Tuesday. He suffered a triple fracture of the large bone, and a smaller bone was broken in three places.

Mr. Sid Davis rendered first-aid and Mr. Anderson was taken to the Anyox hospital on the Awake.

A second accident occurred during the week in the logging camp of the Granby Co., when Mr. Holmes was struck by a falling limb, on the back of the neck and rendered unconscious. He was rushed to the office of Mr. Sid Davis, who rendered first-aid, and upon examination found that he was paralyzed. He was conveyed to Anyox Hospital with all possible speed, and an examination showed the spinal column to be smashed. Little hope is held for his recovery.

Mr. Holmes was employed as a second-faller and only recently left hospital, where he had been treated for blood poisoning. He is a man of fine physique and well known around town.

Mr. Wm. McLean had the misfortune on Thursday to severely crush his right hand while engaged in logging operations for the Alice Arm Freighting Co. The accident occurred when he was throwing the hook round a log. He was taken to Anyox hospital where he is receiving treatment.

Port of Anyox Has Busy Week

Shipping in and out of Anyox continues to be good, a steady stream of raw material and supplies coming in and the manufactured goods being shipped south.

On Saturday the S. S. Marmion arrived in port from Thurston Harbor, Q. C. I. towing a scow, containing the big yarder donkey engines, which will be used by the Granby Co. for their logging operations at Alice Arm.

The Marmion arrived Sunday from Maple Bay with 250 tons of ore on board and towing the barge, J. C. Potter, containing 11,000 tons.

The Griffco arrived on Monday midnight from Stewart, with 1600 tons of ore from the Premier mine. She is loading 250 tons of copper for Tacoma, and 100 tons of sulphide of ammonia for James Bay. The latter will be used in the manufacture of explosives.

The S. S. Anyox arrived yesterday from the south with a miscellaneous cargo of lump coal, coking coal, and general freight. She has in tow the barge Granby containing 1900 tons of lime rock from Blubber Bay.

The oil tanker S. S. El Abeto arrived in Anyox in the early hours of Tuesday morning, from Stewart. She discharged 5030 barrels of oil at Stewart and 3500 were discharged at Anyox. The El Abeto left the same day for Buckley Bay, Q. C. I. where she will load timber squares for Los Angeles.

Capt. Sinclair piloted the S. S. El Abeto to Stewart and Anyox from Victoria. Capt. Sinclair is an old resident of Anyox, being at one time Captain on the Azurite.

Interesting Address on "The Birds of B. C." Given in Anyox

Although far removed from the more populous, and shall we say more privileged parts of our Province, at times even Anyox can share in their cultural treats. Credit is due our Community League and Parent-Teacher Association for bringing to the town under the Extension Dept. of the University of B. C., Dr. Williams of its Dept. of Geology. The first of the two lectures was held on Monday, April 14 in Recreation Hall. Mr. Manzer, Principal of the High School, occupied the chair and in his usual happy style introduced the speaker.

Dr. Williams explained that the subject of his address, "The Birds of B. C." was merely a hobby with him, his profession embracing the study of Paleontology. The slides he used were loaned by the Geological Survey of Canada; almost all were actual photographs that had been colored by artists.

There are three hundred and sixty-two species of birds in B. C. about the same number as in Ontario, though the commoner species embrace but one hundred and fifty. It is a pity that the white man has so often misunderstood the birds and their work, upsetting the balance of nature, and making himself responsible for the extermination of various species; two now extinct are the Esquimaux curlew and the Passenger Pigeon, once found in large numbers in the East. Each bird should be judged upon its merits. It is sometimes a mistake to introduce a species from one country to another; we never know what harm it may cause; for instance the English sparrow would have been better left at home.

The birds were divided into various groups sea-birds; shore-birds; waders, marsh birds, birds of prey, song birds etc. and valuable information was imparted concerning each, so that even some little people present were kept interested.

Dr. Williams showed himself a speaker of charm and ability and it is hoped that he will favor Anyox again in the future. Just before his lecture Mr. Dresser added to the evening's pleasure with a pianoforte solo.

Anyox Train Accident Ends in Death

From the result of injuries sustained in a train accident a week ago J. Christoff, a native of Armenia, passed away at the Anyox hospital on Saturday morning.

Deceased was 35 years of age and has been employed by the Granby Company for nearly six years, during which time he has made many friends.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
