Visit to Toric Mine Confirm All Previous Reports of Richness and Size of Ore Body

Survey Made of all Activities, both Uderground and Outside.
Toric Will Rank Among Big Producers

It was the pleasure of the editor during the week to visit the Toric mine and witness the developing of that now famous property at close range.

The company speeder, which makes a daily trip to Camp 8, left Alice Arm shortly after 8 a.m. carrying six passengers and 1000 pounds of general freight.

The ride from Alice Arm to Camp 8, over the Dolly Varden railway on a bright summer morning, such as was the case last Tuesday, was most enjoyable. The scenery along the banks of the Kitsault is rugged and magnificent, and for those who desire thrills their wish can be gratified generously by gazing to the depths of a few of the canyons passed en route.

On the way up we noticed the new storage buildings for supplies for the La Rose mine, which is now being developed, and which is connected by a good horse trail from the Dolly Varden railway.

A short distance past the La Rose, Robt. Henderson was busily engaged in driving a tunnel on his property. The portal of the tunnel is close to the track and good progress is being made. The new tent house of Tony Surbich was conspicuous near West Creek. He is also driving a tunnel near the

railway track, and expects to develop a large ore body in the near future.

On arrival at Camp 8 we traversed the new government road, crossing the river on the new suspension bridge which was completed last year, and which is of great assistance to mining property owners in the upper Kitsault country.

A distance of three quarters of a mile brought us to the Toric, and the first object to catch the eye on approaching was the big ore dump, which we later explored with excellent results, by discovering samples of native silver and galena ore.

Prior to reaching the camp buildings we came upon the excavations that are now under way for the concentrating mill. A hundred yards further brought us to the camp, and although we expected to see a change since our last visit, we did not expect to behold such a number of new buildings as has been recently constructed. The compactness, cleanliness and general air of activity are among the first things that strike the visitor as he tops the slope and enters the camp.

The buildings at the camp comprise a compressor house and

blacksmith shop, bunk house, a stable for three horses and a feed box, wood shed, meat house, etc., also the kitchen and mess house to which an addition is being built and which is almost completed. This addition comprises two stories, the ground floor will be used as a mess house, and the upper floor as a storage room for supplies.

Power is supplied to the drill in the mine and also at the excavation of the mill site by a Sullivan portable compressor, which supplies 154 cu. ft. of air per minute, and the drill now being used in the mine is a Sullivan D. X. 64, using 1½ hollow round steel.

The chief object of our visit was to look over the underground workings, and it was with pleasure that we took our light and in company of general manager A. C. H. Gerhardi, left the bright sunlight and entered the bowels of the mountain.

For about 80 feet the crosscut tunnel went through slide rock, which necessitated close timbering. The prevailing country rock was then traversed to a point 215 feet from the portal, where the foot wall of the ore body can be easily recognized by the layman, as it is so

Development Work Commenced on Matilda Property

The Kitsault River Mining and Development Co. commenced their programme of development work during the week. A large stock of mining supplies arrived on Monday's boat, and on Tuesday this was freighted over the Dolly Varden railway to the end of the steel, from which point pack horses will convey it to the Matilda, which is situated at the Kitsault Glacier.

Everything is now in readiness for a commencement of development work, and a crew of men will be employed under the supervision of O. Flint. The first work to be carried out will be surface stripping of the ore bodies, in order to determine where tunnels shall be driven at a later date, and also to ascertain more fully the width and dip of the ore bodies.

The Matilda is in the midst of the rich mineral zone of the Kitsault Glacier district. The property has a number of first class ore ledges, and it is expected that these will be proven up to such an extent as to leave no doubt as to the value of the property.

Reports reached Alice Arm on Friday that a new strike of steel galena ore had been made on the Standard property by the Granby Co.

The exact size and location could not be ascertained from the Granby Co. officials, at the time of going to press.

 well defined. We followed the foot wall in a westerly direction for a distance of 50 feet, and then traversed the ore in a horizontal direction for a distance of 97 feet at which point the hanging wall is exposed, and which dips at an angle of 45 degrees into the hill. This crosscut tunnel exposes the actual width of the ore body, which is 64½ feet.

Returning to the main crosscut tunnel, we then followed the No. 1 east drift, which is developing the ore body east of the fault, and the writer saw for himself the galena and native silver ore that is being intersected at each round.

From the amount of work that has been done by intersecting the ore body in these crosscuts, and the amount of lateral work done it is plain to the layman that there is a considerable tonnage of ore exposed, which will run into hundreds of thousands of tons.

Further development work will be done on the east side of the fault. In an easterly direction the backs become greater which gives a greater ore tonnage.

After examining and marvelling at the mineral wealth of the mine, an examination of the concentrating mill excavation was made. This work is now well under way. Its location is about 80 feet south of the portal of the tunnel. Present plans call for the construction of a mill having a daily capacity of fifty tons. Excavations, however, will be made so that the capacity of the mill can be increased to one hundred tons per day.

The Homestake Mining and Development Co. own two gasoline speeders, which transport supplies from Alice Arm through to Camp 8. This mode of transportation has given every satisfaction, the cost being exceedingly low.

The development of the Toric is in charge of A. C. H. Gerhardi, who holds the position of general manager, and to whom great credit is due for the efficient manner in which he has handled affairs at the Toric since the company bonded the property last August. Great efficiency has been shown both underground and outside, and we feel sure that under the present management the Toric will be developed along sane lines, and that ultimately the Toric will develop into one of the big wealth producing mines of the province. Since ore was encountered last fall no dead work has been done, and the blocking out of the ore body has been carried on since that time. For the amount of work done and the ore tonnage blocked out, the Toric probably holds the record for the development of a new property in British Columbia.

Forestry Department Issues Fire Warning

The Provincial Forestry Officials are sending out a warning regarding the forest fire situation which is becoming exceedingly grave owing to the present dry hot weather. Weather reports forecast a continuance of the heat with decreasing humidity resulting in dangerous conditions with regard to forest fires. In spite of this however, conditions are at the moment very satisfactory but great caution is required. So far this year there have been 488 fires reported as against 837 last year, but in 1923 the number of fires at the same date had only been 393. Campers and others frequenting the woods at this time of year are asked to use great care.

No Stamps Necessary For Small Checks

Much of the annoyance that has been caused the public by the affixing of stamps to small checks has been eliminated. Under the regulations that have been enforced up to this time a two-cent excise stamp had to be affixed on all checks, postal orders, and other negotiable paper when the amount was up to fifty dollars, with an additional two cents for every fifty dollars over that amount.

Beginning July 1st, there was a modification of the law. From that date all checks, money orders, travellers' cheques, postal notes and the like will not require a two-cent stamp to be affixed when the amount does not exceed five dollars.

Among others who have recently moved back to Copper Mountain are the families of Mr. W. Munroe and Andrew Anderson. Mr. Corsi has also moved up from Allenby and will fill the requirements of the camp in the dairy line.

In order to permit their employees to bring their families in, the Allenby Copper Company have already allotted several houses. It is understood that this was not to have been done until after construction work had been completed, but the change was made for the convenience of their staff. —Princeton Star.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
