## Alice Arm Receives Favorable Publicity In Mines Report

The Annual Report of the Minister of Mines for the year 1929, which was recently published, gives a mass of information regarding the mining industry of the province.

Total production of all ores, their value and the future outlook of the industry is contained in the Report. Every resident mining engineer gives a clear cut report of mining operations in his district, and hundreds of prospects are reported on.

J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer for the North-Western district, gives a very illuminating report of the progress and potentialities of the Alice Arm District. He published reports on nineteen properties, which are as follows: Esperanza, Alice, Anna Mack, Acadia, Billy Barton, Utopia, Wolf, La Rose, Homeguard, Dolly Varden, Toric, Tiger, Vanguard, Lucky Strike, Moose, Red Bluff, Fox, Observer, Sunrise.

In his introductory report, Mr. Mandy states that:

"In the Alice Arm section, Nass Division, the advent and activity of the Britannia Mining and Smelting Company in the thorough exploration of the Toric, Dolly Varden, and Wolf properties in the upper Kitsault valley offers a well-founded promise for the eventual materialization of stable producers from this promising but much-neglected section. On McGrath mountain the enterprise of the Kitsault Eagle Silver Mines, Limited, in the exploration of the Sunrise group zinc-deposits is an important step in the proving of the commercial possibilities of the McGrath Mountain deposits. Although this work has not as yet met with the success anticipated, the results are still inconclusive.

"This Division is also important as a potential silver-producing area. The Alice Arm section particularly the area of the upper Kitsault, harbours the most important potential silver area so far discovered in the district. In this area the old Dolly Varden property during its short operation between 1919 and 1921 produced 1,301,238 oz. of silver from 36,620 tons of ore.

## The Conservative Tariff Policy Discussed By T. S. Baxter

The Conservatives opened their campaign in the forthcoming election this week, when T. S. Baxter of Vancouver delivered a convincing and instructive address at Alice Arm last night in the interests of Mr. J. C. Brady.

Mr. Baxter, who has spoken here on previous occasions confined his remarks to the tariff platform of the conservatives. He marshalled an imposing array of facts and figures to prove his contention that a low tariff, such as advocated by the Liberal government is not to the best interests of Canada.

He stated that while the Conservative party did not favor a high tariff, they advocated a tariff sufficiently high to allow Canadian manufacturers to successfully compete with foreign manufacturers who have a much lower wage scale. This policy, he contended, would increase employment for Canadian workmen, who are now idle, while foreign goods are flooding our markets.

A full report of the meeting will be published next week.

Canada is a country of optimists. It is well that we are. It takes men of vision and enthusiasm to build a rich and prosperous country out of a wilderness. It, however does not help our future prosperity to shut our eyes to the fact that unemployment is rife throughout the country. We have an army of unemployed this summer, and this army will increase as the winter months draw near. Whatever government is elected on July 28th., they will have to deal with the unemployment problem, whether they want to or not. At the present time the Immigration Department of the Government is busily engaged in bringing immigrants into the country, and throwing the burden of feeding them onto the municipalities and provincial governments. It is an unfair procedure. Canada is not the only country that has an unemployment problem on its hands. The United States of America, that land of prosperity which for several years has been held up to us as a pattern, has a much worse problem than Canada. Hard times in Canada are a reflection from our southern neighbor's trade depression. Canada's case however, was aggravated last fall by the holding back of the western wheat crop. If we have a bountiful harvest and it is marketed this year, the worst of the hard times period will be over, and next spring should see us on the high road of our old time prosperity. But next spring is a long time to wait for those who are unemployed. They must be fed by some one, or allowed to starve on the streets of our cities. The Federal government should do its share of providing relief without any pressure being brought to bear.

**Copper Companies' Big Profit Last Year**

The annual report of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company and subsidiaries, including Andes Copper, Chile Copper, and Greene Cananea, showed a net income for 1929 of \$69,115,728 after deducting all taxes, depreciation, the proportion accruing to minority interests, and charging off \$4,080,866 in discount and interest on bonds redeemed on Aug. 1, 1929. Net earnings in 1928 were \$24,174,780.

Kennecott Copper, operating mines in Utah, Alaska, and Chile, made a net income of \$52,066,365 in 1929, after all charges except depletion. In 1928, the corresponding profit was \$45,651,533. The company had an earned surplus of \$131,939,919 at the end of the year.

**Dept. of Labor Gives Gives Figures On Unemployment**

Ottawa, June 5th; (Special to the Herald.) Thirteen Canadian workmen out of every hundred who were working last summer are to-day out of jobs.

This information is contained in the last issue of the Labor Gazette, issued by the Federal Department of Labor. It indicates the continuing severity of depression.

The figures of the Department of Labor show that the employment index for May is 111.4, while for August of last year it was 127.8. These figures deal mainly with the employment of workmen registered in trades unions, and do not cover either the "white collar" worker or of the unskilled laborer, both of which classes have perhaps felt the pinch of unemployment more severely than has the union man.

From the beginning of the year, until May employment figures continued to drop steadily according to the statistics of the Department of Labor. During May there was a slight improvement but it did not bring the index figure to within 5 points of May 1929.

**Canadian Export Trade Below Last Year**

Ottawa, June 5th; (Special to the Herald.) The decline in Canadian trade, export and import, which began during the latter months of 1929, continued unabated in April and May, the first two months of the current fiscal year.

Trade reports for this period are barren of anything in the nature of figures that auger well for the immediate future. A comparative table listing twelve items shows that in only four of these is trade keeping to the level of the same period a year ago. In a number of items the decline is of 50 per cent. and over.

Total exports of Canadian produce during April and May 1929 were valued at \$173,200,426, while for these two months in 1930 they have fallen off to \$128,006,696, a loss of \$45,195,730.

The value of wheat exports for April and May has declined by \$18,568,336, or more than 50 per cent. During these two months in 1929 Canada exported wheat to the value of \$36,499,592 while for the same period this year only \$1,793,256 worth was sent abroad.

The value of wheat flour exports have declined from \$8,628,093 to \$5,259,514. Export trade in automobiles and parts suffered drastically, declining in value from \$7,405,820 in April and May 1929 to \$2,982,980 this year. Meat exports were almost cut in half, dropping from \$2,566,123 last year to \$1,323,708. Fish and cheese exports also declined seriously.

A new queen of the Pacific will pay homage August 24 to a former Empress of the seas when the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Japan, new 26,000 ton flagship of the company's Pacific fleet, steams through the Narrows to receive Vancouver's vociferous applause. Just before reaching Brockton Point the new Empress, gay with flags and bunting, will dip her ensign to the dragon-carved figure-head which rests on its pedestal in Stanley Park overlooking the waters of Burrard Inlet. The figure-head is that of the old Empress of Japan, scrapped and sold in 1922 after 31 years of service between Canada and the Orient.

Impressively simple ceremonies were held at Fort William recently for the late F. E. Trautman, for the past 18 years Canadian Pacific Press representative in Western Canada. He was buried in the city where a large part of his career as a pioneer western newspaperman was passed as editor of the Fort William Times-Journal. The cities of Port Arthur and Fort William were officially represented as was also the railway company while a large number of private citizens paid their last respects.

S.S. Princess Joan, new 5,000-ton steamer of the Canadian Pacific Railway's British Columbia coast fleet, became a floating hotel at Vancouver recently when 425 members of the Grand Masonic Lodge of British Columbia swarmed aboard for their 59th annual convention at Powell River.

The Algonquin Hotel at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, has opened ahead of its usual time with three conventions booked prior to the official opening of the St. Andrews season the last week in June.

Fifteen years ago the average hen in Canada laid 50 eggs annually, according to Professor E. A. Lloyd of British Columbia. This number has now grown to 70. From extra eggs alone, Canada has produced an increased revenue of more than \$200,000,000.

Nearly one billion dollars was invested in central electric power stations in Canada at the end of 1928, or \$956,919,603 to be exact, according to an official report issued by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics. This is twice the amount of the investment in this industry in 1920 and over \$90,000,000 more than the total in 1927.

At the fourth World's Poultry Congress to be held at the Crystal Palace, London, July 22-30, Canada will have a total of 853 birds in competitive entries, also 453 exhibition birds and 244 production birds. Exhibits of ducks, geese, pigeons, and rabbits will also be there from the Dominion. Birds from the ranch of H.R.H. Prince of Wales at Pekisko, High River, Alta., will be among the many interesting exhibits.

The first four months of the current year saw 503 homesteads filed upon in western Canada than during the same period last year. The increase was furnished almost entirely by Alberta, though British Columbia showed a small gain.

### Excellent Recipe for Salad Dressing

Warm weather and plenty of vegetables combine to make the tempting salad a frequent dish on the menu. The secret of a delightful salad is the dressing and here is the recipe for an uncooked salad dressing that will be relished by every member of the family—and it can be made up quickly, and, once made, it will keep for weeks:

- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoonful salt
- 1 teaspoonful mustard
- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 can Eagle Brand Milk

Beat vigorously all ingredients except vinegar, for a few minutes. Add vinegar, stir well and set aside for a few hours to thicken.

There is little danger of copper production in Rhodesia becoming a competitive factor against the American output, despite the large deposits which have been discovered there and the plans for large production, in the opinion of F. H. Brownell, who recently was elected chairman of the board of the American Smelting and Refining company.

He said labor conditions in Rhodesia, due to the primitive character of the natives, would prevent any sizeable production for at least two years, and it is more likely that it would be five years before these copper properties began to supply any great part of the world's demand for the metal.

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

Three months of hard labor which included the levelling of 21 acres of rolling waste land and the laying of approximately 12 miles of new track, terminated June 5 when the Canadian Pacific Railway finished the construction of "Fez City," Toronto, for the accommodation of the huge army of Shriners who held their convention in that city recently.

Lake Minnewanka, famous sheet of water in the Canadian Rockies, not far from Banff, has entered angling history with the capture recently of the largest trout ever taken from the lake. It weighed 40 lbs. 8 ounces and was 41 inches in length and 32 inches in girth. It has been stuffed and is now in the Banff museum.

A. M. Jones, economic supplements editor of the Morning Post, London, England, who is making a several months tour of Canada studying conditions here.

During the course of the forthcoming World Power Conference to be held in Berlin, Germany, June 26, C. Lefebvre, delegate for Canada, will propose that the next convention shall be held in Canada in view of the rapid strides made in matters electrical by the Dominion. Mr. Lefebvre sailed for Europe recently on board S.S. Empress of France.

June 2 saw the furnishings of the new central tower extension of the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, completed. Altogether there are 152 guest rooms in this wing, including six period suites, art moderne, flower, Dutch and Tudor. The Royal York is the largest hotel in the British Empire and with this addition numbers 1,156 rooms.

Fenwick Saunders, riding his bicycle at Tuskent, N.S., recently, saw a salmon disporting itself in shallow water near Tuskent Dam. He crept cautiously up, grabbed the fish which almost escaped, dragging him into deep water, but although out of his depth, succeeded finally in getting a 10-pounder fish safely ashore.

Radio continues to advance in popular favor in Canada. At the end of March, 1930, there were 423,557 radio receiving licenses issued by the Canadian Government radio branch of the Department of Marine, compared with 296,926 on March 31, 1929, an increase of 126,631 in the 12 months.

The number of motor vehicles registered in Canada during 1929 was 1,193,889, an increase over the 1928 registration of 117,070 or 10 per cent. This was an average of one motor vehicle to each 82 persons. Canada ranks third among the countries of the world in the number of automobiles in proportion to the population.
