Granby Company Close Logging Camps At Alice Arm

The logging camps of the Granby Consolidated Mining Smelting and Power Co. Ltd, that have been operating at Alice Arm, since early last spring were closed down on Monday evening. The closing down of the camps was quite unexpected, word being received from Anyox the same day as the close-down went into effect. It was expected that the camps would be operated for at least two more months. The depression of the lumber market, was one of the chief causes of the close-down. It was also found that a market could not be found for logs that would give the company a return on their investment. While the management of the company regret the suspension of operations it was the only alternative.

The Granby Co. were employing a force of seventy-five men at the time of the close down, a number of these were engaged in railway construction work.

During the week, all equipment has been gathered up for winter storage. At the present time it is not known whether operations will be commenced next spring, it depending to a large extent on market conditions.

The Granby Co. still have a large area of land to log off, containing some fine spruce timber, and there is no doubt that if it is by any means possible this ground will be logged at an early date. The closing of the logging camps will necessitate the cessation of operations of the sawmill at Larcom Island in the near future.

Anyox Footballers Gave Rupert Scare

The Anyox football team, which visited the Prince Rupert exhibition last week, came within an ace of capturing the cup, emblematic of the Northern B. C. Championship.

In their first match they suffered defeat two goals to one, Prince Rupert being the victors. In their second encounter they emerged winners over Ocean Falls, three goals to two. Rupert drew with Ocean Falls, one all. Therefore Rupert gained possession of the trophy by virtue of one win and a draw. The players representing Anyox were:—Craggs, Stilly, Stewart, Campbell, Carter, Buntain, Jack, Dearlove, Scott, Robinson, Ingram, Dewar.

Two baseball games were staged, between Rupert and Ketchikan. The Alaskans took the first contest six to one. Rupert annexed the second game eight to seven.

Two local players assisted Prince Rupert in the games against Ketchikan. They were Cy. Greenwell who received an S. O. S. call from Rupert to come down, and A. Sinclair, who was spending holidays in the town. Cy. received a cheque of \$50 for his services.

Fox Property Shows Good Ore During Development

The Fox group of claims, which is situated at the headwaters of the Kitsault river, is looking more promising than ever. Mr. Oscar Flint, who arrived in Alice Arm yesterday has been doing development work on the property.

A new ore vein has been located, containing high values in silver and gold. Several open cuts were driven across the vein, which is over one foot wide.

A tunnel 12 feet in length has also been driven on another vein. At the present time, ore has just commenced to come in, and consists of galena, ruby silver is also found in the ore in considerable quantities.

High Grade Shipment From Esperanza

Four hundred sacks of high grade ore is being brought down the hill from the Esperanza mine by Mr. Al. Falconer, and taken to the wharf. The ore will be shipped tomorrow or Monday as it is expected that it will be all down by tonight.

Development work at the Esperanza is being carried on by a small crew, which will be increased in the near future.

Prominent Mining Man Looks Over District

Mr. R. R. Wilson, who spent nearly a week in the upper Kitsault country, at Alice Arm, examining mining properties, left on Saturday for Anyox, leaving there on Monday on board the S. S. Cardena.

This is the first visit of Mr. Wilson to the camp, and he was here merely to look over the ground with a view of sending in an engineer to thoroughly examine different properties, if they appeal to him. His impression of the country was that it was well mineralized and the formation was similar to the Salmon river district at Stewart.

New Residence Under Construction

Alice Arm is growing steadily all the time, both by new buildings that are being built or additions added to existing buildings. The latest addition to the building boom that never dies is a 5-roomed residence being constructed by Mr. Al. Falconer. It is being built on the site of his former residence, on Falls Creek Boulevard. It is two stories high, and commands a fine view of the bay and both shores, and when completed will be among the most handsome residences of the town.

Big Development Programme For Engineer Mine

Leasing System Will Be Adopted

New York and Eastern capitalists headed by Thomas F. Cole, are now in control of the famous Engineer mine, Atlin district, and it is being again brought into the production stage by the addition of extensive equipment. It is reported about seventy-five men are employed. The mine was recently inspected by a noted group of capitalists who are interested with Mr. Cole. These include Clarence Mackay, the cable and telegraph magnate; Wayne Darlington, mining expert, who looks after Mr Mackay's mining investments; Isaac Benedict, of the Consolidated Gas Co., New York; George Peabody, head of the investment department of the New York stock exchange firm; Donald Percy, New York real estate operator; Gideon Boericke of the mining firm of that name operating in Colorado, Montana and Nevada; Dr. Harvey Weed, geologist and author of a handbook on mines. Substantial Increase To Trail Smelter Capacity

An eighteen months' construction programme at the Trail smelter is being put into force by the Canadian Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company. It includes 130 tons additional capacity for the lead refinery, a dressing and casting plant for the lead furnace, and additional roasters. A substantial increase in the zinc refinery is being made. Enlargement of the silver refinery is taking place and a plant installed in connection with it for recovering antimony.

Development Of Engineer Mine

Continued from page 2. of the company.

Development Planned

It is reported that, following the examination of the old mine, it was decided to go about development on a large scale. Although the mine has been a big producer during the years it was operated under control of the late Capt. James Alexander, it was never equipped with sufficient machinery to mine the property in the most economical manner.

Of particular interest to mining men, in connection with the development plans of the new owners, is a report that it has been decided to adopt the Goldfield leasing plan in the operation of some of the ground. Leases are given to reliable miners to work the high grade veins to a depth of 200 feet or more on a royalty basis. It is said in favor of such a plan that not only is a good class of miner obtained but development is rapid.

Increase Power Plant

The new owners are putting in a large mill. Leases are to be given on the Mickey vein, Boulder vein and Governor vein, where rich telluride ore show. The company will mine the famous "E" vein, where development is considered about two years ahead of the mill capacity.

Electrical machinery is now being installed at the Wayn River, three miles from the mine, for development of the necessary power for the mine and mill.

The history of the Engineer mine is one of the romances of the mining industry. The property has been the source of much litigation and is even now in court in the Eastern States where an action is being carried on by the Smith heirs, who were awarded the property by the British courts, following the death of Capt. Alexander, who was drowned when the Northern liner, the Princess Sophia, was sunk off the Alaska coast.

Lengthy Litigation

The mine was located by a group of engineers who called the ground the Engineer mine and equipped it with a small stamp

mill. Capt. Alexander finally obtained the mine on relocation and his ownership was challenged after some years by one of the original locators. A Vancouver lawyer also sued the estate on a claim of part ownership under agreement with Capt. Alexander. At the time of the sinking of the northern passenger boat, Capt. Alexander was accompanied by Mrs. Alexander and both were drowned. A man named Smith, who claimed to have been Capt. Alexander's backer, sought title to the property and he died while the matter was in court. Now, the Smith heirs are being sued by the brothers of Mrs. Alexander.

Meanwhile, under the receivership arrangements, the famous property has passed into the present control.

A red rock sent by a Lytton man to the provincial chamber of mines, as a curiosity, may prove to be a rich find for him. He forwarded the sample as being "where the Indians got their war paint." It is a natural pigment, valuable in the manufacture of high grade paints. Investigations are being made to determine if there is any quantity of the stone.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.


LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING


Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
