Prominent Visitors To Toric Predict Great Future for Mine

H. J. Reade, who is a director of the Consolidated Homestake Mining & Development Co., A. W. Yount, who is a large shareholder in the company and J. B. Otto, sailed for Vancouver on Monday last, after inspecting the Toric mine now being developed by the Homestake Co. with such spectacular results.

In an interview with the Herald previous to their departure, all were enthusiastic over everything they saw at the Toric. Mr. Yount stated that although he had anticipated seeing a large quantity of ore developed, he had not expected to view such a tremendous ore body, or of such richness as had been his pleasure during his visit to the mine. He predicted a wonderful future for the Toric, and felt confident that future development work would disclose ore bodies that would place the Toric among the big producers of British Columbia. He spoke highly of the efficient manner in which development work had been carried out under the direction of A. C. H. Gerhardi, whose method of developing a property might well be copied with advantage by others developing a mine from the prospect stage, and was sure that under the present management successful operation of the mine will be attained.

Mr. Otto is a member of the mining fraternity, who understands the business from A to Z, also spoke highly of the Toric, and said in reply to a question that if quantity of ore and values made a mine, then the Toric will be a producing mine after the majority of us have run our natural span of life and passed to other spheres. He deducted this assertion from investigations made by himself while spending five days at the mine.

Mr. Reade, who is also a much travelled mining man, stated that he was taking south with him seventy-two samples of ore from the mine for a general analysis. The uniformity of values throughout the ore body was one of the chief characteristics, and argentite and native silver were conspicuous everywhere. Such an extensive ore body as has been developed at the Toric is without parallel in the mining history of the north, and that there was no question but that one of the largest mines of the province would shortly be opened up. He was extremely pleased with the business-like manner in which operations were conducted at the mine, and stated that the Toric holds a record for the amount of ore developed at such a small cost in so short a space of time.

Anyox Beach Football Wins Trophy

Hunter, in goal for the winners, was tested a few times, making several nice saves off shots that were tagged for the net. O'Donnell was the pick of the Beach eleven, Robertson and Wilson also turned in a nice performance. Evans handled the whistle in a manner satisfactory to all.

A fatal accident occurred on Tuesday at Anyox, when Josys Lovric met almost sudden death as the result of a simple accident. Deceased was using an iron bar in order to move a heavy skip, when the bar slipped and hit him under the jaw, and he expired a few minutes afterwards. Deceased was 33 years of age, and was a native of Syria, in which country he leaves a wife and child to mourn his loss.

At the inquest held on Wednesday afternoon, a verdict of accidental death was returned, with no blame attached to anyone. The funeral was held from the Catholic Church, on Thursday evening at 5 p.m. and was attended by a large number of friends of the deceased. Interment took place at the Anyox cemetery, Rev. Father J. Fleck officiating. The funeral arrangements were in charge of Geo. E. Tate.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

Alice Arm Properties Give High Values

Some samples of ore picked at random from the dump on the Ouray group of claims and recently sent out for assaying by S. Dumas, one of the owners of the property, have given the gratifying results as follows: gold, 0.04; silver, 54 ozs. per ton and copper 11.5 per cent. The Ouray, which joins the Wolf on the south-west, is owned by S. Dumas, J. B. Robertson and A. E. Egan, who have at different times done considerable work on the property, chiefly stripping and open cuts. It is the intention of S. Dumas to construct a roomy log cabin on the ground this year, and later a tunnel will probably be driven so that depth can be obtained on this promising ore body.

Returns received a few days ago from samples of ore sent out for assaying from the Billy Mac property. The values received were very encouraging, and were as follows; gold, 0.04; silver, 10 ozs. per ton; lead, 22 per cent; zinc, 20 per cent. The Billy Mac is situated on McGrath Mountain, and is within easy distance of the town of Alice Arm.
