All Anyox In Gala Dress At Mine Club's First Masquerade Dance

Ballroom Was Scene Of Unsurpassed Brilliancy

A brilliant social event was held in Anyox on Tuesday, when, attended by over three hundred people, and the most ambitious function yet put on by the Mine Club, the much heralded "Master Masquerade" was voted by all the best danced in town. From the earliest advance advertising of the affair—each poster depicted a suggestion of fancy dress—to the last detail, the boys were out to beat all records, and, with the co-operation of the ladies, the result was top notch, and an entertainment that will be difficult to surpass.

For a decorative scheme, the interior of the Mine Hall was converted into a veritable rose garden, blooms of all shades covering the walls, leafy bowers twining the balcony rails, surmounted by garlands of daffodils on the roof supports. These, in contrast to a profusion of huge sun-flowers covering the rear wall, backed by a design in black and gold, decorated lights, the whole framed by Japanese lanterns, presented a picturesque blaze of color, that was a delight to the eye. With the floor crowded by dancers, dressed in clever and fantastic costumes, each moving with swaying measure to music from the Elks' orchestra—who generously obliged to a request for extended time—the effect was a kaleidoscopic variety of shade and movement.

Whimsical, grotesque, ingenious, every imaginable costume was there. The craze of the hour was represented by a number of crossword puzzles, and these, mingled with clowns, niggers, witches, fortune-tellers, Irish colleens, waiters, old-gossips, Indian princes, scouts, coons in all stages of prosperity, peasant girls, Turkish delight, a Mine Club mascot, fairy-tale heroines, Gypsies, perriots, a jail-bird, ghosts, Klu-klux-klanmen, departed spirits, sailors, and Scotchmen.

From such a list—and space only prevents us mentioning all—the judges had no easy task, but the gathering was delighted when the names of Mrs. J. Hawkes was announced as the winner of the ladies most original costume. The dress was half a Red Cross nurse and half a soldier; the novelty of the idea being cleverly carried out. Other ladies gaining prizes were Mrs. Bob Stewart (best dressed) and Miss Victoria (Sis) Deane (best comic).

Among the men, prizes finally fell to Messrs. Robert Strand (most original) Leslie Brown (best dressed) and Tommy Evans (best comic). The judges of the costumes were Mrs. F. E. Anyox Community League Hold Their Annual Meeting

Nominations for New Council Are Made

Activities Of Past Year Outlined By Secretary

The Annual Meeting of the Community League was held in the Recreation Hall, on Wednesday evening, February 25th. The attendance was fair, the fact that there was no kicks to register having something to do with the small turn-out; but those who were present were enthusiastic enough. The President, Dr. Harper, occupied the chair until the report of the Secretary was read when he retired, and Mr. George Warwick was selected by the meeting. The minutes of the preceding Annual Meeting were read and adopted. The Secretary's report outlined the various activities of the League for 1924, told of what revenue was produced in all branches as well as what the different departments had cost. A balance sheet as at December 31st, 1924, was handed to the members attending as well as a copy of the newly printed Constitution and By-Laws, which the last Annual Meeting had authorized the council to prepare. Apart from the information on the balance sheet, and showing the financial standing of the League, total expenditures on all accounts for the year had amounted to \$80,000.00, while receipts from all sources were slightly in excess of \$84,000.00. In general activities covering athletics, gymnasium, library, entertainments, etc., the League had spent over \$11,000.00, while receipts from these sources had been about \$6,000.00. The balance sheet would show that the cash assets alone would show a balance in the bank of \$3,500.00, as against a balance of \$2,300.00 in 1923. At that time there had been paid out on deferred expense account some \$300.00, which gave us actually \$2,600.00, while at December, 1924, there was over \$700.00 to the credit of the League in deferred charges, which made the amount really to our credit at present \$4,200.00. There had been one particularly heavy expense in 1924, the re-making of the tennis courts, which had cost slightly over \$2,500.00, while the expenses in replacing fire losses were also heavy. During the coming year we cannot hope to get the revenue we received in 1924, but expect to make both ends meet, and a little better, by judicious management. The swings on the children's playground will have to be renewed, there will be expenditures to make at the ball grounds, while a summer camp will possibly be established at Alice Arm, where the camps built by the Granby Co. a year ago for lumbering purposes may be available.

From all appearances, the mining industry is due for a prolonged period of prosperity. The price of copper has advanced to nearly 15 cents per pound. Lead and zinc are demanding record prices, and nearly all other metals have advanced in price, or are demanding prices that make their mining profitable. The dull period following the close of the war is now over. Now that the world is settling down to work, the pendulum has swung in the opposite direction, and good times for the mining industry seems to be in store. Investors are now turning again to the mining industry as an investment for their capital. These hard headed men of the world have already sensed a world shortage of some metals, and shortly there will be a scramble for such metals as lead and zinc. The world is using an increasing amount of all metals each year, and this increase will be bigger as the population of the world increases, and people demand more comforts, and more rapid transit, which can not be obtained without a supply of different metals. In view of these facts, as time goes on, capital will be clamoring for mining properties, and every ore showing will be developed. This state of affairs may not take place until after we have been measured for our wooden suit, but the fact remains that capital for the development of mining properties was never so plentiful as it is today, and this healthy state is likely to be perpetual.

Salt Chuck Mine, Ketchikan Will Increase Production

The Alaska Platinum and Palladium Company, at the head of which is J. E. Chilberg, plans to increase the milling capacity of the Salt Chuck mine by the installation of a big ball mill. The Salt Chuck mine, which is located near Ketchikan, long since passed from the prospect stage into a producer of no mean proportions, and sufficient ore bodies are now blocked out to justify a much greater production capacity. Values in the mine are chiefly platinum and palladium, both of which metals belong to the rare class, and are very valuable. If memory serves, the Salt Chuck mine is the only one of that particular kind in the United States. It is a property of potential value.

Mineral Production Falls Off In Western States

The Total value of mineral production of the western states of U.S.A. fell of the extent of \$9,886,210 last year as compared with 1923. Arizona holds first place, Utah has taken second place, which was held last year by Montana. The latter state taking third place this year. During 1924 Arizona produced 676,000,000 pounds of copper. Montana produced 150,182,000 pounds.

Wealth Brought By Settlers

The United States gave 6,477 settlers to western Canada during the year 1924, according to figures announced by the Winnipeg office of the Dominion department of immigration. Immigrants from the republic to western Canada for 1923 totalled 8,704. The wealth brought in by these settlers during 1924 amounted to \$1,995,347 in cash and \$344,251 in value of effects. During 1923 \$1,875,786 in money and \$496,053 in effects were brought in from the United States.



Portland Canal News

V. F. Lade, better known as "Vince," one of the most popular mining men of the district, was married in Prince Rupert on the evening of February 11th. to Mrs. Ida Fleming, who came from Vancouver to meet him. The ceremony was performed at the home of M. M. Stephens, by Arch Deacon Rix. The newly-weds arrived in Stewart Thursday, and that night were tendered an old-fashioned chivrairi. They have established a home near the east end of fifth street. The News joins with the entire population of the Portland Canal district in extending felicitations.

Ernie Armstrong suffered a serious accident Monday morning, and is now in the hospital under the care of Dr. Williams. He was climbing into the rear of his bobbed in Hyder, and a sudden jolt threw him backwards to the ground, injuring his spinal column just below the base of the neck. A. W. Kelly, his teamster, is carrying on the business while Ernie is laid up.

The main estimates for the coming fiscal year tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance, contain a sum of \$500,000 for the grain elevator at Prince Rupert. Halifax gets \$575,000 for an elevator, and Esquimalt drydock is provided to the extent of \$1,600,000.

The hope of every ski fan in Revelstoke, as well as that of those who may not be enthusiasts in this popular winter sport, was realized last Wednesday, when all records on skis were broken and the marvellous one of Nels Nelson, who jumped 240 feet, was hung up.

Canadian immigration figures for 1924, just published, fall short of those for 1923 by 12,800, but taking in the 37,317 repatriations, the gain is 24,447, in a total of 161,767. The 1924 figures from overseas are 57,612 from Britain and Ireland; 50,510 from other countries, and 16,328 from the United States, a total of 124,450. In December, the repatriations from the United States outnumbered immigrants, 31,167 to 2,765.

A despatch is to the effect that the embargo on the export of gold from Canada be not lifted in July, but extended for another year, that no permit for the export of placer gold be granted in British Columbia, and that the present Mining act as it effects gold exports be renewed when it comes up for revision a year from next July, was passed at a meeting of representative mining men and wholesale merchants in Vancouver recently.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
