Red Bluff Property Will Be Developed

Some development work will be done on the Red Bluff property this year by the newly formed syndicate stated Mr. J. N. McPhee, who arrived in town on Wednesday from Butedale.

Mr. McPhee stated that not as much will be done this year as originally planned. But a commencement will be made as early as possible, and much valuable information is expected to be obtained.

The Red Bluff Mining Syndicate was formed during the early part of the year for the purpose of developing the property. It is situated about seven miles north-east of Alice Arm, and indications are good for the development of a big tonnage of copper ore.

During the past few months Mr. McPhee has received enquiries from several mining companies anxious to examine the property.

Production Of Outsider and Golkeish Mines

During 1928 the Outsider mine, which was operated by the Granby Consolidated Mining Smelting and Power Co. Ltd. produced only 2,564 tons of ore.

The Goldkeish mine produced 13,111 tons of silica for the Anyox smelter. The values derived consisted of over 1000 ozs. gold, 6000 silver. Both of the above-mentioned properties were closed down during the year. Their place will be taken by the Quartz Point mine and Bonanza, both of which are situated close to Anyox smelter.

The metal production of Anyox for last year amounted to 34,605,833 pounds of copper, 4075 ozs. gold, and 246,930 ozs. silver.

Production Of Anyox Coke Plant For 1928

During last year the Coke Plant of the Granby Co. at Anyox produced 28,680 tons of coke; 230,107 cubic feet of gas, 246,579 imperial gallons of tar, 200,555 pounds of ammonia, 659 imperial gallons of solvent naphtha, and 58,253 pounds of naphthaline.

Lieutenant-Governor Visits Alice Arm

The Lieutenant-Governor was met at the wharf at 10 o'clock by B. Brock, who is in charge at the Toric mine, and O. Evindson, president of the Alice Arm branch of the British Columbia Chamber of Mines. The former extended an invitation to visit the mine, and the latter welcomed the party on behalf of the local Chamber of Mines.

The party left shortly after ten o'clock for the Toric, and following luncheon inspected the mine.

The return trip was made in the evening. A reception was held at the Alice Arm Hotel, followed by a dance, which, owing to the late hour we are not able to report in this issue of the Herald.

Homeguard Prospected By Radiore

F. F. Clark and J. Reid, who were in charge of the ore finding device for the Radiore Electrical Prospecting Co. left on Friday for the south after prospecting on the Homeguard property.

It is understood that satisfactory results were obtained, and that all data will be forwarded to the Dalhousie Mining Co. of Victoria, who are developing the property.

Alice Arm Building Is Being Moved

The buildings of Alice Arm that are not on streets are being gradually brought into line to conform with the street system that exists. The latest building to be moved is the old bank building, owned by the Alice Arm Freighting Co. Moving has been carried on during the past few days. It will be located on First Avenue, near T. W. Falconer's store and opposite G. W. Bruggy's store.

If several more buildings in the lower part of the town were moved onto streets it would greatly improve the appearance of the town.

By value, the various products of the mineral industry of British Columbia produced in 1928 are ranked in the following order: Copper, lead, coal, zinc, silver, gold, structural materials, miscellaneous metals and minerals. The quantities of copper, lead and zinc produced in 1928 were the highest in the history of mining in the Province.

Copper-mining recorded a prosperous year in 1928. The production for 1928 was 97,908,316 lb., valued at \$14,265,242. This is a record output, but is a lower valuation than recorded in the three war years, 1916, 1917, and 1918, when the price of copper was nearly double that in 1928. The sharp advance in the price of copper towards the close of the year is reflected in the average yearly price, being 14.57 cents, as compared with 12.92 cents in 1927. During recent years the large copper mines of the Province have been brought up to a high state of efficiency, with modern equipment resulting in lower costs. With an assured outlook for the price of copper metal to stay at 18 cents or higher for some time to come, the copper mines of the Province will make very satisfactory profits. No expansion of production is expected in 1929 from the three main producers, but a full year's output at the rate shown in the last quarter of 1928 is expected, which would result in a production somewhat in excess of 100,000,000 lb.

The silver production for 1928 was 10,627,167 oz., valued at \$6,182,461. This output is slightly greater than in 1927 and slightly less than in 1926. The two largest contributors of silver are the Sullivan and Premier, the former maintaining its position as the largest silver producer in Canada. Approximately 80 per cent.

Development Speeded Up On Georgia Gold

Stewart News

Steady progress is being made with the freighting and installation of machinery at the Georgia River Gold Mines. The Crawford Transfer Company have five men and fifteen horses engaged in packing and go-devilling the freight over the eight miles of trail between the beach and the mine, a difficult task during the spring break-up and their efforts in this direction are worthy of special mention. At the mine the engine room site has been cleared and graded and the concrete for the engine foundations is now being poured. The plant will consist of two 40 h.p. Petters oil engines operating two air compressors delivering a total of 350 cubic feet of free per minute. For the time being work underground is being carried on by hand and an average advance of 65 feet per month is being made on the Southwest vein. The results from this work obtained so far are considered satisfactory as in the last hundred feet of drift driven on the vein, the general average of samples taken every five feet on the vein is \$39.60 per ton. These values are chiefly in gold, the silver content being about 2 oz. to the ton with lead averaging two per cent.

of the silver production of the Province comes from mines in which the silver value is of less importance than the other metals, such as gold, copper, lead and zinc, contained therein.

Of the 6,241,310 tons of ore mined in 1928, less than 8 per cent. was treated by direct smelting of the crude ore, the remainder being first concentrated for the elimination of waste material.

In general, throughout the mills of the Province, greater efficiency was attained in the extraction of minerals, and in several instances notably high extractions are being obtained.

Music hath charms to soothe the savage breast, and jazz has now exercised its well-known effect on animals, since the deer at Banff have been listening to the dance strains from the orchestra at the Banff Springs Hotel. Three mule deer were seen the other night listening with astonished ears to the syncopation within. Both deer and elk are unusually tame this season and guests are going hunting with cameras in lieu of firearms.

Aviation is coming into its own in Canada and Canadians are becoming thoroughly air-minded. Three airports were opened early in June at Ottawa, Kingston, and Hamilton, at which a great assemblage of planes took place and large crowds witnessed the proceedings. Many took advantage of the opportunity to send mail and parcels by air express during these functions and the Canadian Pacific Express Company used the planes to advantage.

Richard Barthelmess, moving picture star, accompanied by his bride, made a three-day honeymoon stay at Banff Springs Hotel early in June. He says he will be back in the Fall to get some big game hunting in the Canadian Rockies.

Dock dues on parcels from Cherbourg are now lifted under an order from the French Government and there will be consequently a great increase in despatch of these parcels from France to Canada, according to word recently received by the Canadian Pacific Express Company. Prior to this, parcels from France had to be shipped from Southampton causing a loss of a couple of days' time in reaching Canada.

Loans to harbor boards totalling nearly \$30,000,000 to be spent on programmes of extensions and developments have been approved by the House of Commons. Of this amount, ten millions each goes to Montreal and Vancouver, \$5,000,000 for Halifax, and balance for Three Rivers and Chicoutimi, Quebec.

The average cash income per farm house in the Prairie Provinces was \$2,544, exclusive of the value of seed, feed, meat, vegetables and other commodities produced and retained by the farmer for his own use, according to the Nor' West Farmer, Canadian farm journal published at Winnipeg.

The younger generation, we are often told, is apt to be left to find its own way around these days, but not quite to the extent of the woman who left her 7-months old baby asleep in the Windsor Street Station, Montreal, while she went shopping in the city. It was taken to the ladies' waiting room and cared for. Several hours later the mother returned and was told of its whereabouts. It was still sleeping and she decided to have her supper before she "disturbed" it.

Wheat from the Prairie Provinces of Canada is the finest received in Germany from any country in the world, according to Johann Lange, one of the seven German millers making a tour of the North American wheat-growing and milling centres. "Canadian mills are second to none, if mills visited in Winnipeg may be accepted as representative of Canadian plants," said Mr. Lange. "In operation, cleanliness and the beauty of the flour turned out we have seen nothing better since we arrived on this continent."

Consolidated To Treat Big Slag Dumps

Work on the construction of two large furnaces for the treatment of lead-smelter slag has been started at the Tadanac smelter of Consolidated Mining & Smelting, at Trail, B. C., following the successful operation of a pilot furnace for several months. Details of the process have not been released, but it is understood that fuming of the lead and zinc content of the slag will be done in huge water-jacketed furnaces, 10 x 10 x 20 ft., and that the fumes will be collected in a bag-house. Those escaping from the bag-house will be electrically precipitated. The heating is understood to be by a mixed electrical and powdered coal process devised at the smelter. The slags, which have been accumulated for several years, are said to average 15 to 20 per cent zinc-lead, the former metal predominating.

New Mining Engineer For Kootenay

B. T. O'Grady has been appointed to succeed A. G. Langley as district mining engineer for the Kootenays with headquarters at Revelstoke, it is officially announced by Hon. W. A. McKenzie, minister of mines.

Dr. Dolmage Will Quit Government Service

Dr. Victor Dolmage, head of the British Columbia office of the Geological Survey of Canada, has severed his connections with the Survey to become associated with the Vancouver mining engineering firm of Stewart & Batten. Dr. Dolmage will conduct for that organization a certain amount of geological work in the oil fields of Alberta and will consult on geology for the company's operations in British Columbia and Washington state.

Fishing Starts In Naas and Skeena Rivers

Reports from the Naas River indicate that sockeye fishing there is very fair for the opening of the season, the high boat having taken sixty-three fish.

It will be a week before the sockeye run gets in full swing on the Skeena, boats averaging meantime from 4 to 6 fish.

There are now approximately 600 boats fishing on the Skeena River and 200 or 300 on the Naas.

Copper Stabilizing At Present Price

Several events in the last week or two have again centred interest on the coppers. The Anaconda group announced a curtailment in production of 10 per cent not many weeks after prominent officials of other companies had stated that stocks of the metal were dangerously low and that output was none too large. On May 20, copper securities were particularly weak, Anaconda dropped over 7 per cent of its value in one day, Kennecott close to 6 per cent., and Nevada over 4 per cent. But on the same day Kennecott increased its dividend again, and the next day Phelps Dodge did likewise.

World copper production figures just released show a daily rate of 6,547 tons in April, the highest in history, compared with an average of 5,236 last year and 4,642 tons the year before. Another step in vertical integration of the industry has just been made in the absorption by Kennecott of Chase Brass. It is no wonder that those interested in copper are somewhat in the air, without any clear idea of what to expect.

Certain it is that the urgent demand that sent copper up to 24c. a pound less than two months ago has evaporated, and orders either here or abroad have not even taxed the custom smelters to supply. The situation seems rapidly to be getting back to that which existed last year, when the buying was almost entirely for early shipment.—Engineering and Mining Record.

Government Will Build Trails in Northern District

Details of the expenditure of \$100,000 by the provincial government on mining trails were discussed at recent conferences between Hon. W. A. MacKenzie, minister of mines, with district mining engineers. One of the important routes to be opened up will be a trail from the active mining district at Stewart into the mineralized area of the interior.

It is planned to extend the present trail from Stewart up the Bear River to Meziadin Lake into the region directly north of the Portland Canal and to connect it with the old Telegraph Trail at a point known as Mile 23. Lateral trails east and west from this main trail will give access to a mineral belt of which the possibilities have been stressed by Dr. Kerr of the geological survey and by George Clothier and Dr. H. T. James, former provincial government engineers in the district.

When completed this programme will open up the entire territory from Portland Canal to the northern boundary of the province in which it is believed minerals of enormous value exist.

Stock Market Enters Quiet Summer Season

The Vancouver stock market is entering the quiet season. July and August are distinctly the off-months on all exchanges and usually the dullness begins to manifest itself as midsummer approaches.

This is not peculiar to any one market; it is common to all on the North American continent. It pertains to bonds as well as stocks, and is likely to continue to be felt in the oil stocks as well as in the mines.
