Twenty Stamp Mill.

For some time past it has been under-  
stood that the owners of the Tuhorn  
claim in Fairview contemplated bring-  
ing in a 20 stamp mill to work the ore  
taken from this claim. Now, however,  
this matter is a certainty, as some of  
the machinery has already arrived at  
Penticton, and a contract has been let  
for its removal from that point to the  
camp on teams, a distance of about 30  
miles. The contract covers 100 tons to  
be moved so by this it will be seen this  
plant is an extensive one. As soon as  
this mill is set up and is running, it  
will be the second in operation in  
Fairview, and this alone should give  
an earnest of the future there is in  
store for this camp and more particu-  
larly so when it is remembered that at  
at no distant date it is quite possible  
the number of mills in operation at  
this point may be increased by at least  
another one, which will be placed in  
connection with the Joe Dandy prop-  
erty.

## MINING NOTES.

The claim adjoining the Cariboo and  
Amelia on the south in Camp McKinney  
is called the Saw Tooth, and is owned  
by Andy Commons and Mr. Graham.  
On this property work has just been  
started and as a result of very little  
prospecting a fine ledge of ore was on  
Wednesday last struck, which from its  
position and trend and surface showing  
promises to be of immense value, that  
is if assays show it to be as good as it  
looks. The ledge is some 3 feet wide  
and clearly defined between good walls  
even on the outcrop, so it should be an  
easy matter to carry on development,  
which in this case takes the form of a  
shaft, which has already been started.  
The Saw Tooth will undoubtedly be  
heard from as work progresses.

The owners of the Big Bug claim in  
Camp McKinney have decided to com-  
mence the development of this prop-  
erty, and are now calling for tenders  
for the sinking of a 30 foot shaft. The  
Big Bug lies south of and corners on  
to the Minniehaha claim, and also  
adjoins the Mountain sheep which lies  
to the north and west of it.



# EDITORIAL NOTES.

WE notice in a recent issue of the Colonist, the question of the location of the international boundary line between the Kettle River section of British Columbia and the State of Washington, U. S. A., is touched upon. This question has received our attention at intervals during the past three years, an attention given to it not with the object of fomenting trouble between two governments, but solely for the purpose of endeavoring if possible to find out as to whether any foundation really exists for the belief entertained by many that the commission appointed about thirty-five years ago to establish the location of the 49th parallel, the line of demarcation between the two countries, only imperfectly performed their duty. If at the time of the survey any mistakes were made which were not subsequently rectified, then the sooner it is found out the better, and if on the other hand the errors which are believed to exist by many are only fancied and not real, the sooner this too is made clearly apparent the better it will be for all concerned, as it is unpleasant to the citizens of both countries the entertainment of the feeling of insecurity which the agitation of this question gives rise to.

HAVING during the past year paid attention to the Kootenay and other mining districts of British Columbia, Professor Carlyle is now on a tour of inspection of this section, and will in the course of his examination take under consideration all the principal properties in the Vernon, Osoyoos and Kettle river mining divisions of Yale District. In his official capacity Mr. Carlyle has been able to render valuable services to the province, as by the issuance of reports bearing the stamp of authority, much confidence has been engendered among those paying attention to British Columbia, as a field for profitable investment in mines, a confidence, it may be said, which could hardly have been created in any other way. That his reports should engender confidence, however, is not to be wondered at, for the simple reason that they are compiled from cold hard facts and reflect only the true state of the mines and mining industry in the portion of the province so far brought under observation. In the section of the province now receiving attention, Mr. Carlyle will find plenty of material upon which to base an interesting report, and if every facility is offered him by mine owners and other for gathering information, no doubt the result of his labor now begun will not only interest themselves but will be of interest to the multitudes outside the province, who are ever and anon seeking just such information as these bulletins compiled by Mr. Carlyle contains.

What a strange government it is! A man was shot and wounded last February by a civil servant. To quiet the popular demand, opinion and floating a wink-the-other-eye treatment of the matter, a sort of investigation into the cause of the shooting was held early in March. From that date to this no further steps have been taken by the proper authorities, the man who was injured being forced in the end to take the initiative and lodge information. As a consequence of the preliminary hearing before the magistrates last week Mr. McMynn was committed for trial. But what people want to know is: Are we living in the ninth or the nineteenth century? Because a man happens to be a Government official is he therefore above the laws or under a special protection if he disregards them? Mr. McMynn may or may not have been justified in the act which he acknowledges to having committed the question is now sub judice where it should have been long ago. And this is precisely the point.

The foregoing extract appeared in the Boundary Creek correspondence of The Province. It is to be regretted that a newspaper of the standing of The Province should have such a maliciously mendacious correspondent as "Blazer." The correspondent must have been familiar with all the proceedings leading up to the trial of Constable McMynn. He must have known that Hood, the person wounded, had been waited upon by a local justice of the peace and asked to commence proceedings with the object of having a preliminary hearing. He must have known that Hood refused to lay an information until after the return from England of G. T. Hodgson, J. P. He must have known that Hood would not take any steps in the case until after G. T. Hodgson, J. P., became a member of the Greenwood Citizens' Committee, the object of which was to prosecute McMynn. He must have known that although the charge was laid before G. T. Hodgson, J. P., on the 31st March, the case was not brought to trial until the 30th April. That this delay was not caused by the government, but by Justice of the Peace Hodgson, a member of the Greenwood Citizens' Committee. These facts "Blazer" must have known, as they were all brought out in evidence at the preliminary hearing before C. A. R. Lambly, S. M., James Kerr, J. P., and G. T. Hodgson, J. P., a member of the Greenwood Citizens' Committee.

## The Minnehaha.

Recognizing the fact that the fame of the Minnehaha mine in Camp McKinney was gradually spreading throughout the land, and all authentic mining news is eagerly sought after by at least a section of the population and THE ADVANCE representative being a visitor in the camp during the past week, a call was made upon the local manager of this company, Mr. Ansley Megraw, who as might be ex-

pected, was found at his post ably directing the many operations attendant upon the commencement of work upon an important property, upon which a large amount of development is to take place. Having made known his mission the servitor was affably and courteously invited to inspect the outside and inside working of the property and during the course of inspection, the fact was noted that all improvements are being carried out systematically and with a view of insuring great stability, and this was magnificent not only in the class of buildings being provided for the accommodation of the miners, but as well in the development of the mine, as upon descending the shaft which is now down a depth of about 60 feet, the reporter saw for the first time in this section of the country a really well timbered shaft, and one which is intended to insure absolute safety to the men working under ground.

Having arrived at the bottom of the shaft the visitors presence occasioned a cessation of work for a few minutes while the miners with their lighted candles, pointed out, and that too with love and pride, the course and extent of the ore body, which is now visible in this mine and which was found to be a well defined vein extending on the east end of the shaft the whole width of the face, clearly and well defined between good walls, while on the west side although the ore body hardly filled up the whole side, yet there were signs visible that this would take place as soon as a few more feet of depth were attained. The reason of this being more ore on one side of the shaft than the other, needs a little explanation and is accounted for from the fact that the shaft is being sunk perpendicularly and is gradually owing to the dips in the vein, cutting through it. Although this will not be attained entirely until quite a depth has been reached as the dip of the vein appears only to be slight, and also from the further fact that the vein corners across the shaft as it were to some extent.

From this vein is now being raised to the surface ore that is identical in character with that always taken from the Cariboo mine near by, with one exception, and that is it is not at present so highly mineralized. The same class of mineral however being present, gives promise that as depth is attained the ore body will contain a greater amount of concentrating matter, and indeed the ore body and the dump already give evidence of such being the case. Without being over sanguine it can be said that the prospect ahead of this mine at present look extremely bright, and would it be believed be enhanced if the management would install machinery, which at any rate will soon be necessary, in the shape of a small pump, hoisting works, and a small compressor plant, thereby enabling a more convenient and rapid development of the property.

## LOCAL AND DISTRICT.

An addition is to be built to the Miners Home hotel at Fairview, and a licence is being applied for by the proprietor Mr. Morris.

H. C. Carrassayer at Camp Fairview, was in town Wednesday, giving testimony in the case, Jemyn v. Guess, and left for home Thursday.

Mr. Morrow has secured a contract for the building of several miles of log fence for Thos. Ellis, of Penticton. The fence is being erected between Meyers flat and Fairview.

Mr. House, an old time resident and business man of Nicola, was a visitor at Fairview a few days ago, at which point business in connection with some of the mining propositions of the camp necessitated his presence.

Plans have been drawn for a very fine hotel to be erected at Fairview, by the townsite company, the management is in the hands of Messrs. Dyer and Davidson. The plan discloses a handsome and commodious building and one which would be a credit to any place, no matter how pretentious.

G. Shurson has bought Mr. Featherstone interest in the Fairview sawmill, which is at present located just east of the camp. Mr. Shurson although not an old hand at the sawmill business, has yet had some experience, and having good business qualities and contracts on hand for a large amount of lumber, will no doubt make a success of his new venture. He expects shortly to move his mill closer to Fairview.

Mr. Hammond, one of the principal share holders in the Strathgry Mining company of Fairview, recently paid a visit to this district, taking in the camp named also Camp McKinney. In conversation Mr. Hammond expressed the belief that the Strathgry company may again at no distant date resume operations upon the property they own in this section. This company's mill is at present leased to the Smuggler company, but as soon as the lease expires it is expected they will make use of it themselves.

The enormous amount of mail matter that is being passed through the Penticton office has necessitated the employment of an assistant by Mr. Wade. This being the case the authorities should not be slow in appreciating the necessity of furnishing all the necessary help to the rendering of an efficient service at this point, as the office is really a very important one, and one in which a vast amount of work devolves upon the shoulders of the occupant.

A good road and a much needed one is being graded from the steamboat landing at Penticton to the bridge crossing the Okanagan river. This will allow of a free handling of freight between the foot of Okanagan lake and head of Dog lake. The bulk of the freight destined for Boundary creek points is now being carried to Okanagan Falls, the portage between the two lakes being made by teams, after which it is carried by steam to the foot of Dog lake a distance of 12 or 14 miles.

## MINING NOTES.

The company having in hand the Joe Dandy property in Fairview, are already mining on an extensive scale, as they employ about 30 men, and are opening up the property with shafts and tunnels at five different points. Soon however the number of men will be increased as a result of the installation of machinery, which is to take the form a 20 stamp mill for the treatment of ore, the erection of an electrical plant at Okanagan Falls, and a tramway for the carriage of ore between the mine and the point at which the mill is to be erected upon the Okanagan river, about 3 miles east of the mine. Even at the present time engineers are employed surveying the tramway line, and as soon as this is done no doubt a site will be selected, and the necessary surveys made in connection with the electrical plant. The necessity for an electrical plant will be readily understood when it is explained that this company intend operating their 20 stamp mill with electrical power, and will make use of it in connection with the tram line, and for all other uses in and about the mines. The power will have to be transmitted for a distance of about ten miles between the points at which it will be generated and used, but this will be attended with little difficulty or loss of power, as has already been demonstrated many times over.

The contract has been let for a considerable amount of development work to be done on the Adams Company's group of claims on Kruger mountain. John McDougall of Fairview secured the contract, and under his personal supervision the work will be done. The property consists of the Divide and other claims, all of which contain quartz of a free milling character, from which very satisfactory assays have always been obtained. Should the shafting and tunneling to be now done prove of a satisfactory character, it is quite possible some means will be provided for the working of the ore, which from the position and extent of the veins can be mined in large quantities and at a very nominal figure. The treatment of the ore would also be an easy proposition as there is a splendid sight for a stamp mill upon the property, close to a small lake, which would afford ample water for reduction

purposes, a question of first importance in the handling of a free milling property.

D. A. Carmichael is steadily pegging away at the Victoria claim in camp Fairview, and with fairly good results. From the claim about 50 tons of ore was milled when first Fairview sprung into life, the returns from which were entirely satisfactory. The ore that was milled was taken from two enormous pockets which were situated about 150 feet apart on the claim. Having mined this the owners commenced to cast about for indications of a true ledge, but without success, and no wall could be discovered. Recently however good walls have made their appearance in which are encountered small pockets of rich ore, carrying iron pyrites, galena, and some free gold. are indications which point to the fact that at any time work will disclose the vein, which the present owner is confident is not now far off. Altogether the outlook for the Victoria is very promising.

Although placed in position the compressor plant at the Cariboo mine in Camp McKinney has not as yet been started up, owing to the fact of an insufficient amount of power being available, the boilers upon the ground having proved of a capacity unequal to the task of running the compressor and at the same time the hoist and pumps. It has therefore been decided to install a new boiler, and this, it is said, is now on its way and will soon be in the camp and in position, and as soon as it is in operation, sinking another 100 foot level will commence.

Work has been started on the Gold Dollar a property situated on Kruger mountain near Fairview, and owned by T. Elliot and J. McDougall. As the name implies, the Gold Dollar is a free milling gold proposition, and from assays received from the ore treated would indicate that the name is well deserved. Although little work has so far been done upon the claim, yet there has been discovered a good strong vein of ore, the true extent of which the present work is calculated to give a fair indication.

Some fine samples of ore are on exhibition at Fairview, taken from claims recently located near and to the north of Meyers flat. The ore is of a free milling, concentrating character, the gangue being a quartz carrying iron and copper pyrites, but owing its value principally to its gold contents.

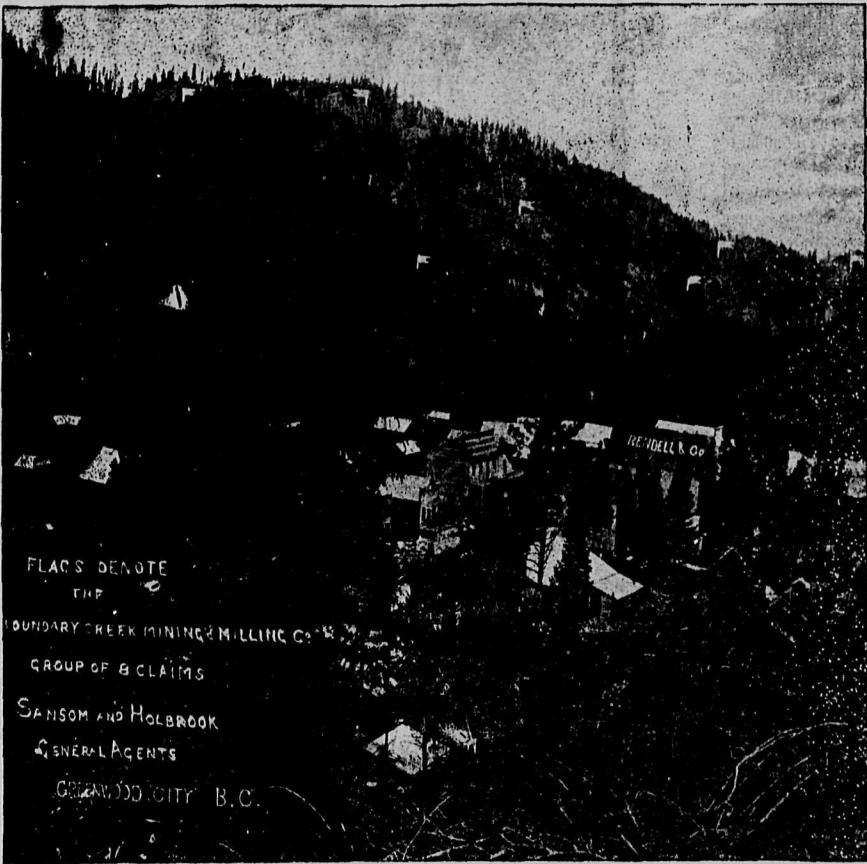

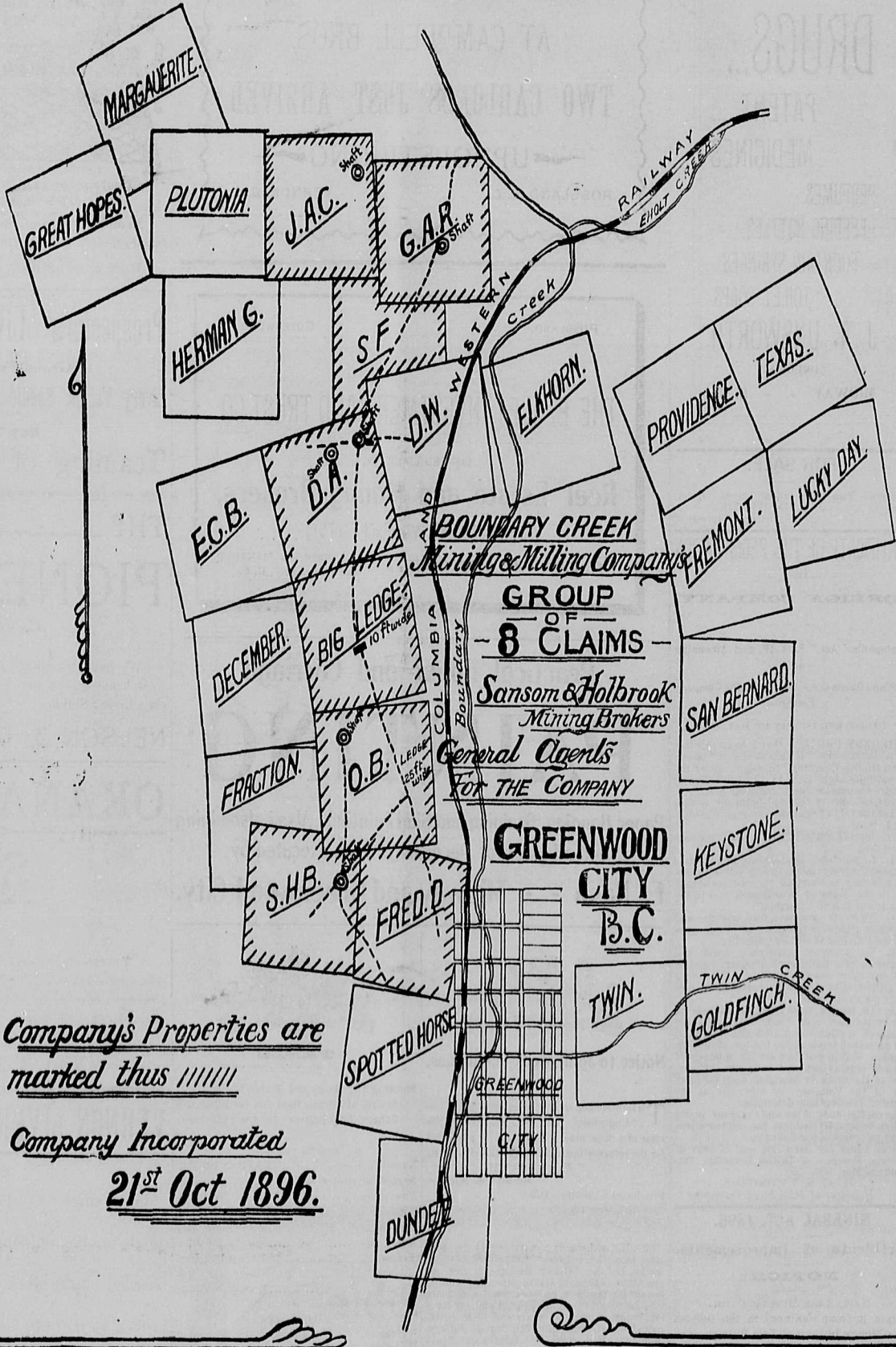

## DESCRIPTION.

On the "D. A." is a vein about 20 inches wide, with a pay-streak of 4 to 12 inches; from this 8,653 lbs. of ore was shipped to the smelter, giving \$103.15 gold per ton, silver 74 7-10 ozs., and 2 per cent. lead. A tunnel is being driven on this vein from which ore is being taken. On the same property is a larger vein (quartz) carrying galena and pyrites.

The "G. A. R." has a 30-foot shaft sunk on a 2-foot vein, heavily mineralized with an intimate mixture of iron and copper pyrites, galena, blende and silverglance. The finest pieces of wireilver found on Boundary Creek were taken from this shaft. On the "Big Ledge" is a 10-foot quartz vein, mineralized with iron pyrites. This vein has been opened up by cross-cuts on the surface for 500 feet. A narrower vein has been

opened up, being one foot wide, carrying considerable copper pyrites, and runs into the main ledge as a spur, on which a tunnel of 40 feet has been driven. Average assays gave \$33 gold and 11-10 ozs. silver, and \$40.35 gold, 17 1/2 ozs. silver, 2 per cent. copper.

The "O. B." has two distinct veins; one 25 feet wide which, from its strike and general character would seem to be the same vein as that on the Big Ledge, although sufficient has not been done to make this conclusive. The second vein has at present a width of nearly three feet. Assays have shown values in gold from \$4.00 to \$170.53, while a conservative sampling by Mr. S. S. Fowler, M. E. gave \$20.00 in gold.

On the "S. H. B." are two converging veins of copper and iron pyrites, on which work is now being done. An average assay gave, gold \$1.50, silver 16 1/2 ozs., copper 11.00 per cent., or \$40.44 for all values.

The "Fred D." was located in December, 1895, more as ground for a basis for mining operations for the other claims than for its present value, although there is little doubt that the large vein on the O. B. runs through it. There is a small vein of galena on this claim.
