It was there efforts that organization of the Legion was made so that veterans could band together and offer assistance to their comrades.

Chairman Alex Sommerville introduced the Charter Presidents of the Branch, Jack Rowley and Arthur Bullock. There were two presidents during 1926 and 1927 when the Branch received its Charter.

The veterans of the Vimy Ridge Battle were introduced to the meeting. There were 12 of these veterans at the banquet.

Presentations were made to the chairman of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Branch, Miss Myrtle Patterson and past president of the Branch Malt MacMath.

ALDERGROVE STORE HOURS FOR EASTER WEEKEND

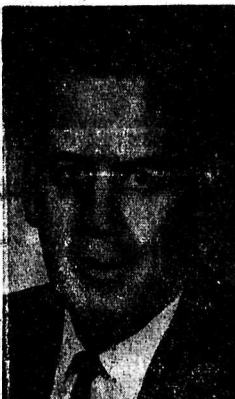
Thursday, April 11th the stores will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

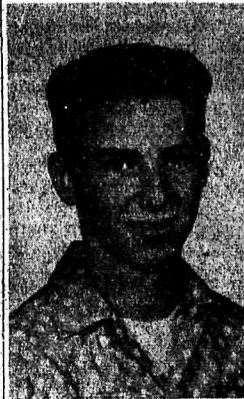
MAN INJURED IN TRUCK ACCIDENT

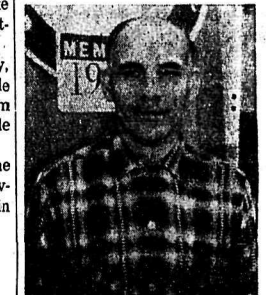
Dr. B.G. Barkman credits the quick action of the two with saving McConnell's life. He is in good condition.

A panel of doctors will be on hand to answer questions. The forum will be held April 21st at 2 p.m.

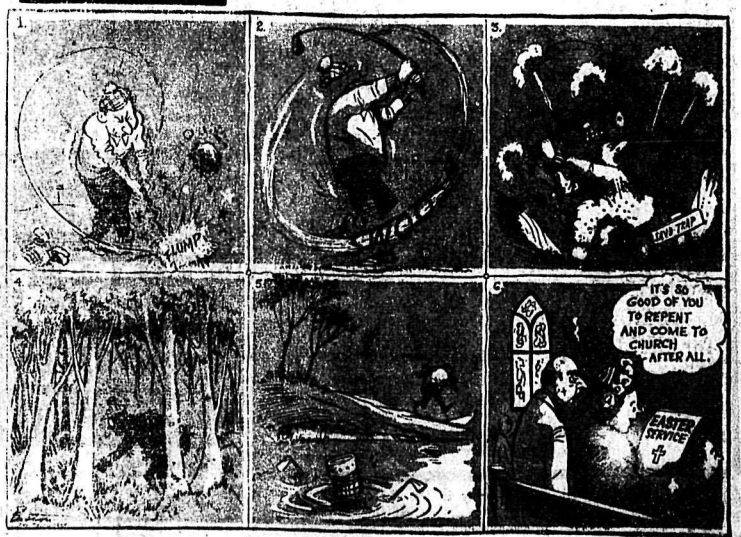

I know where a great collection is going to be - at least on Friday, April 19th. This is the occasion for the Evergreen Garden Club of Ladner to hold their 8th Annual Spring Flower Show at United Church Hall.

This is the only amateur spring flower show in the Lower Mainland, and offers door prizes, tea, draws, as well as the delight of seeing a charming collection of early blossoms and flower arrangements. Each year the show has been lovely, with special emphasis placed on the various narcissi. These flowers have come a long way from early yellow trumpets and the white scented blooms, and each year more varieties are evolved for our gardening fingers.

The flower arrangements are most interesting and are the result of work by men and women of all ages, from school children to old age pensioners. Last year I noticed some dainty lady-slippers in a wild flower grouping. Trilliums can be found in abundance if you know where to look, but these shy and exquisite treasures are harder to come by. Entries are welcomed from all the municipalities, and Mrs. Stan Bremner at 943-2400 will be glad to give any further information.

It is encouraging to find the interest by public officials and industrial concerns in regard to the importance of landscaping. The Municipal Hall at Richmond has been beautifully planted and the masses of Pampas Grass and background of shrubs is exotic as well as gracious.

As the new Municipal Hall in Surrey was being completed, the gardeners kept pace with the carpenters. The result is a pleasant display of colour and the promise of a garden plan of dignity and interest. The location of the Municipal Hall of Langley on the Trans Canada Highway and the big bed of flowers command attention for many months of the year.

The old idea of war-houses and

industries being dark and forbidding structures with no softening amenities has changed in the last few years. Now these business spreads are called "Industrial Parks". Surely this is a far cry from the original conception of strictly functional buildings. Cities are becoming more and more aware of the need of landscaping. One-year Aldergrove had containers of daffodils around each lamp standard I am sure it took some effort to do this, but the effort was well worthwhile and attracted the approval of both resident and traveller.

The City of Langley has planned a pretty triangular rockery on the main street. All these things help to soften the outlines of buildings, break up straight lines and provide the eye and mind with a picture of beauty.

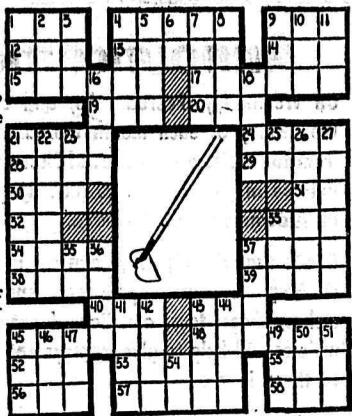

The Fraser Valley's 100,000th telephone was installed this week in Mission City.

Helping the Valley and B.C. Telephone Company make telephone communication history were Mr. and Mrs. L.D. (Len) Fegan of Clay Road, Mission, in whose home the "milestone" instrument was installed Tuesday April 2nd.

The Fegans, with their two children, moved to Mission last week from Whonock. Mr. Fegan is manager of the Overwaitea Market's meat department in Mission.

To mark the historic installation of the Fraser Valley's 100,000th telephone... and Missions 3410th... the New Westminster District Commercial Manager S.R. Hartney, presented the Fegans with a commemorative plaque.

The Fraser Valley first started making telephone history in 1884, when a line was built from New Westminster to Port Moody. By 1910, there were 2,000 telephones scattered about the Valley from Agassiz to New Westminster. Mission City and district began to make telephone history in 1907, when a grounded line was built between Mission City and Hatzic. It served 11 telephones.

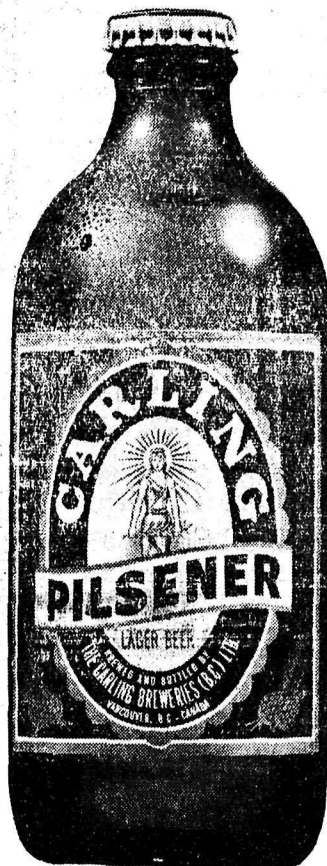

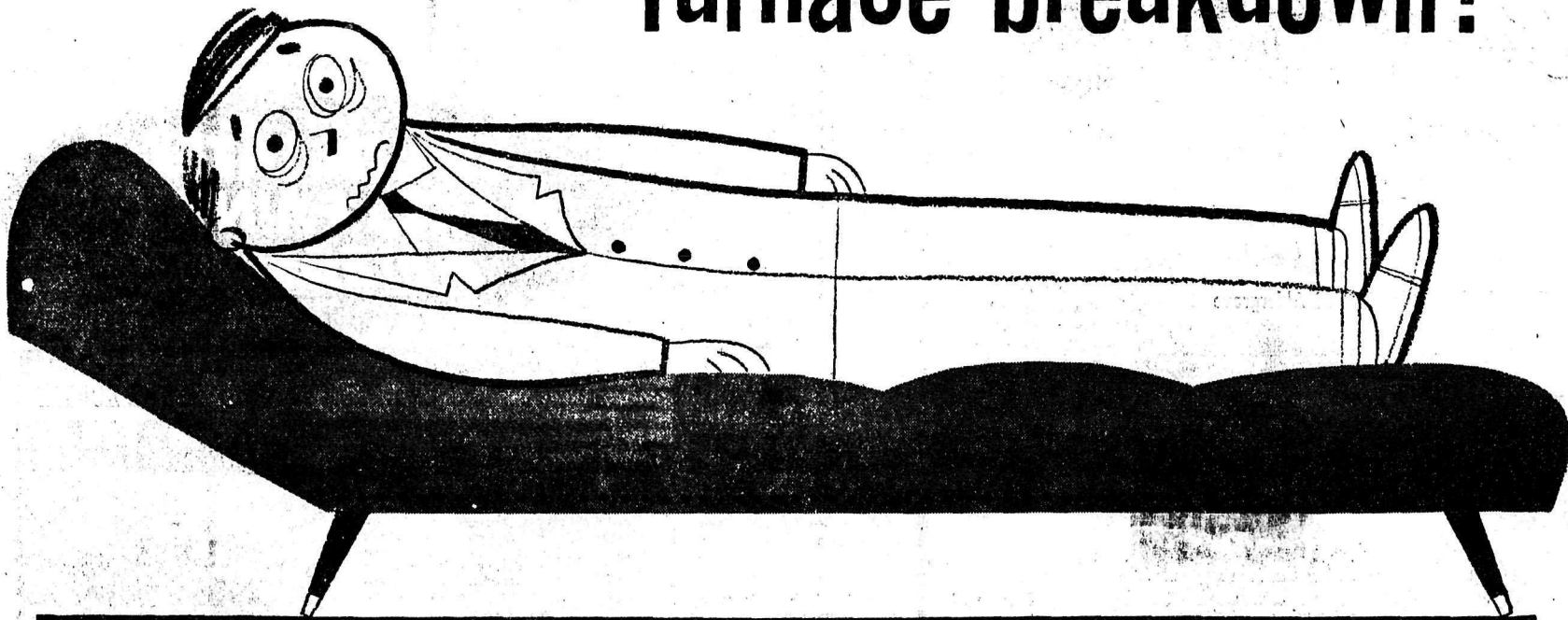

Thomas J. Robertson, pioneer B.C. agriculture leader, died at his home in East Delta on April 1st. At the age of 70 years. Mr. Robertson's death followed by 10 days his retirement from the Board of Directors of the Fraser Valley Milk Producers' Association, a post he had held since 1938.

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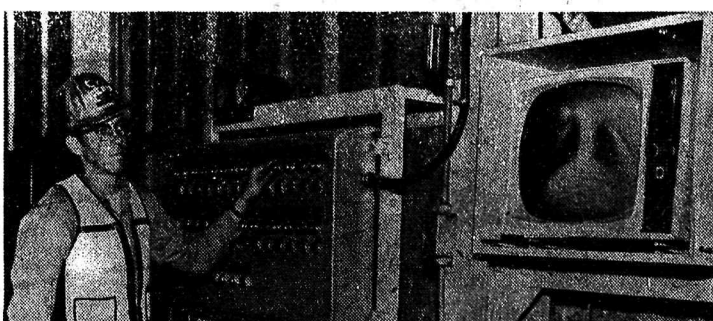
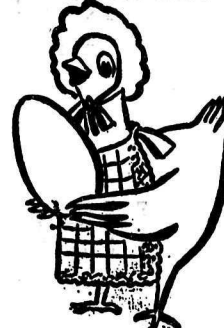
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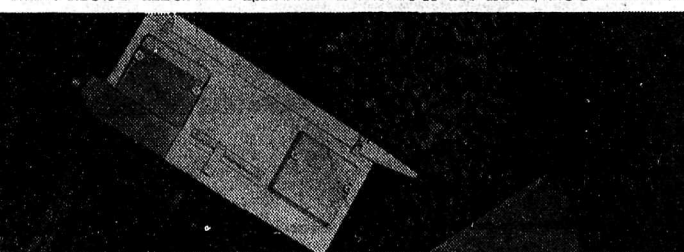
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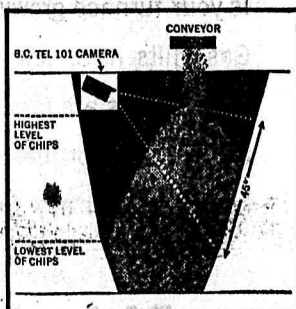
It's a TV show that is watched 24 hours a day (though only at the CELGAR pulp plant at Castlegar). It's a program that has no commercials, yet pays for itself hundreds of times over.

Installed by B.C. TEL, closed-circuit TV helps chip handlers and the main control room constantly see the chip level in two bins, each two storeys high. This initial step in pulp manufacture is closely controlled.

Before closed-circuit TV, chip level was controlled through periodic manual checks by a handler who climbed a steep ramp to check port holes.

Since B.C. TEL installed closed-circuit TV, the CELGAR pulp plant control room and handlers have greater efficiency.

This is another of the many ways in which B.C. TEL helps manufacturers and businessmen to operate more economically.

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NATURE'S SCRAPBOOK

"In an expanding economy, we of the Canadian Forestry Association must continue to enlarge our youth training programs and our efforts to make people, all the people, conscious of their duty to this and coming generations for the wise management of our 'renewable natural resources'."

The Association's familiar "KEEP B.C. GREEN" and "SMOKEY BEAR" campaigns were stepped up almost twice their former intensity in '62 and Association's Conservation Railway Car travelled 3,800 miles over B.C. rail lines visiting 65 communities with showings on the car for the general public and special programs for 39,601 children in 214 schools.

CFA's latest campaign is the "GOOD FOREST MANNERS" program through which the Association seeks to meet the challenge of increasing recreational use of the woodlands. Multiple use forestry has introduced many problems for government at both provincial and national levels: problems of education, problems of control and problems involving priorities in the use of the forests that need to be studied and solved, says the report. The Good Forest Manners program now being developed across the nation, is seen as one answer to the problem of public education to promote controlled development of multiple-use practices.

Other achievements in line with its policy of encouraging new forestry techniques and educational programs to meet the demands of changing times included the introduction of a distinctive symbol to identify CFA projects at sight. This symbol has now been adopted nationwide by the Canadian Forestry Association Federation. Also on the national scale, the B.C. Association laid the groundwork last year for the new Canadian Council of Forestry Youth Clubs to co-ordinate allied young people's activities from coast to coast.

In the past 30 years the Canadian Forestry Association of B.C. has invested \$365,000 in the training of over 40,000 Junior Forester and other facilities. In 1962, forty Warden, including costs of camp nine Junior Warden Clubs were active in B.C. with a total enrolment of 1,675 boys, while another 3,825 youngsters received their training by correspondence in the Lone Patrol. Nine hundred and thirty three Wardens attended Warden camps at Evans Lake and Point Atkinson on the Coast and Rock Lake in the East. Kootenays.
