

WITH DEWEY IN THE PHILIPPINES

Continued Capture of Steamers--Rebels Fear to Attack Manila.

Spanish Sentries at the Gibraltar Boundary Fire on British Soldiers.

The American People Unite With Their British Cousins in Paying Tribute to the Memory of Gladstone.

London, May 19.—A Manila dispatch dated last Friday is as follows:

"Despite the worries of the blockade the spirits of the Spanish officials are well maintained. The vessels of Admiral Dewey's squadron keep their places and content themselves with preventing all supplies from reaching the beleaguered city. In addition to the cables the Americans have taken some steamers which were making for port and several coasting vessels. Nothing has yet succeeded in passing the blockade. Dewey is credited with the desire to capture the Spanish str. Leyte, as launches have been scouting around the coast. The Leyte is at present anchored in the river Pam-pango.

"The rebel forces have not yet summoned up courage to attack the city. They are in no condition to do so but ravage the country outside. Foreign residents believe that if the city fell into the hands of the rebels the result would be deplorable. The government is waiting for a royal native legion to assist in keeping off the rebel attacks while the Spanish regulars are reserved to meet any American force that may be landed.

Spanish Fire Upon British at Gibraltar.

Gibraltar, May 19.—A number of British soldiers while boating yesterday afternoon attempted to land on Spanish soil, whereupon a sentry fired upon them wounding one man.

America's Tribute to Gladstone.

Washington, May 19.—The following telegram was sent by Secretary of State Day today:

"To Hay, American Ambassador, London.—Through appropriate channels express to Mr. Gladstone's family the sympathy and sorrow of the American people at his passing away. In ripeness of years and fullness of honor he was the most notable figure in modern civil statesmanship."

Eulogies on Gladstone.

Hawarden, May 19.—The press and the statesmen of Great Britain, both political friends and foes, are unani-

mous in expressing the opinion that in Gladstone the greatest statesman of the age had passed away, and pay glowing tributes to his many brilliant qualities. Lord Salisbury last night said that Gladstone's was the most brilliant intellect devoted to the service of the state since parliamentary government began.

To Expel American Correspondents.

London, May 19.—A special from Madrid says that the new cabinet will expel from Spanish territory all correspondents of American newspapers and such British correspondents as are suspected of sending objectionable matter.

Cruiser Charleston Had to Return.

Vallejo, Cal., May 19.—The cruiser Charleston, which sailed yesterday for the Philippines with ammunition and supplies for Dewey had to return to dock this morning on account of her condensers being out of order.

Now for an Anglo-Japanese Alliance.

Yokohama, May 19.—The press of this city in discussing the recent speech of Mr. Jos. Chamberlain advocating Anglo-Saxon alliance expresses the opinion that the time is ripe for the formation of an Anglo-Japanese alliance.

U. S. Ladies Boycott Parisian Shops.

London, May 19.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "A flutter is caused by the reported French sympathy with Spain which led the ladies of the American colony here to boycott the local shops."

Southern California Town Badly Scared.

Hueneme, Cal., May 19.—Great excitement was created here today by cannonading sufficiently heavy to rattle the windows. It was apparently taking place at sea, but no war vessels were in sight and the source of the firing is a mystery. Forty shots in all were fired. Only one vessel is known to be in this vicinity, viz: the U. S. S.

Alert. She may be indulging in target practice.

Spanish Story About German Warship.

Madrid, May 19.—A Havana dispatch announces the arrival there of the German warship Gier. The dispatch says that the vessel did not salute the American squadron either by guns or flag, but paid the usual compliments to the Spanish forts, and her commander made lengthy and extremely cordial visits upon Spanish authorities.

KUSKONOOK ITEMS.

R. Balfour, superintendent of bridges, arrived here from Macleod Friday.

W. A. Galliher, one of Nelson's legal lights played an engagement here last week.

Mr. Lott Willey returned to Kaslo Monday. He intends running his horse in the 24th sports there.

W. H. Armstrong who has been lying sick at Nelson for the past week is rapidly improving and is expected home shortly.

The steamer Nelson got stuck at the mouth of the outlet with a barge of lumber last Thursday and had to put back to Nelson after getting clear.

C. Campbell, manager for S. A. Hartman, returned from Rossland accompanied by his family, Monday. They intend starting housekeeping here for the summer.

Alf. Ramsdale had the misfortune to lose one of his horses while unloading them off the boat at Sanca last Sunday, a mare breaking her leg and compelling him to shoot her.

The steamer Ainsworth will hereafter take the inland passage through Duck lake. This route will enable her to touch at the camps along the line of construction. This route is about six miles shorter than by going around by the mouth of the river.

M. J. Haney, the whole works of the Crow's Nest railway was here last week inspecting the work at this end of the line. He was perfectly satisfied with everything and gave orders to push the work on the trestle out to the slip at the mouth of the river with all possible speed. Fully 300 men will be put to work on it as soon as possible. He maintained that the rails would be laid to Kootenay lake by August 1.

Cannon Got Two Months.

John Cannon, a section hand on the Kaslo & Slocan railway, was before Judge Forin Friday morning upon the charge of committing an aggravated assault upon a fellow sectionman named McDougall, says the Nelson Tribune. The offense consisted in striking Mr. McDougall over the head with a crowbar. The prisoner, on the advice of his counsel, pleaded guilty, and received a sentence of two months imprisonment.

SENIOR POLO PLOTTING IN CANADA

Spanish Minister Arranging for Coaling Station at St. Pierre.

French Steamer Ferdinand de Lesseps Reported Aiding Spanish in the Caribbean.

The Spanish Cape Verde Squadron Is Said to Be Flying North to Cuban Waters.

Montreal, May 19.—It is reported here that Senor Polo has arranged for a coaling depot near St. Pierre, a French colony on the south coast of Newfoundland at which the Cadiz squadron will coal previous to attacking the Atlantic seaboard of the United States while the Cape Verde squadron draws off the squadrons commanded by Sampson and Schley.

St. Pierre Coaling Story Confirmed.

New York, May 19.—A Montreal special to the World confirms the London report that Senor Polo has arranged for coal at St. Pierre, near Newfoundland for the Spanish fleet.

French Str. Reported Helping Spanish.

New York, May 19.—The Evening World has a dispatch from Colon, Isthmus of Panama, saying: "The French steamship Ferdinand de Lesseps which sailed from here yesterday cleared for Port Limon and Costa Rican ports. It is reported that she has a big cargo of arms and ammunition for Admiral Cervera's fleet. Newspapers here report the Spanish squadron in close proximity to Port Limon."

Warships Flying North to Cuba.

New York, May 19.—A special from Kingston, Jamaica, says that a telegram from Port Morant timed 4 p. m. advises that a large number of steamships, apparently warships, are passing going northward at a tremendous rate of speed heading in the direction of Santiago de Cuba.

Spain Still Hoping for Intervention.

London, May 19.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Telegraph expresses the opinion that Senor Sagasta remains in office because "something is still hoped for from the intervention of the powers."

Thrall and Jones to Be Exchanged.

Washington, May 19.—Arrangements have been completed by which newspaper correspondents Thrall and Jones will be exchanged for Col. Cortijo and

Surgeon Julian, Spanish officers now at Fort McPherson.

Results of the Illinois Cyclone.

Rockford, Ill., May 19.—Eleven people are known to be dead, and two score badly injured as the result of the destructive cyclone which swept over the country last evening. The storm came from the northwest and was from 300 to 400 feet wide. It leveled every thing in its path and demolished hundreds of farm houses and barns and killed much live stock. The storm was severest at Stillman Valley where it wrecked fifteen buildings, two churches and a depot.

Affect of the War.

It was not thought that the war would have any effect on mining business in Rossland, but it has. Mining men and brokers state that never before has business in their line been so dull. Absolutely no stocks are selling. March was so much better than the preceding months that it was believed the expected improvement had commenced, but on the declaration of war between the United States and Spain a reaction set in that has been increasing in intensity ever since. Hopes that war will soon come to an end are to be heard on all sides.—Rossland Times.

PAJAMAS AND COFFEE.

The wires bring a Spanish semi-offi-
cial explanation of the defeat at Ma-
nilla, which ought to satisfy any rea-
sonable person that the Castilians have
been placed in a very uncharitable light
and that Dewey's morning salute was
both rude and abrupt.

It appears that the officers were only
clad in their pajamas and were waiting
for their morning coffee. It is cer-
tainly very uncivil to expect a man to
fight in pajamas and before he has had
breakfast, to say nothing of coffee.

Now, if this man Dewey had shown a
proper sense of appreciation for the
flower of Spanish chivalry, he would at
least have permitted the Dons to in-
hale a little strength from the aroma
of the brewing beverage. But no; in
that shockingly direct and coarse
American manner, which proclaims it-
self as destitute of delicate sensibility,
and thoroughly unacquainted with the
finer usages which should prevail,
without the least semblance of diplom-
acy he began plunking the Spanish
ships with shot and shell weighing
from one to 250 pounds, and not only
upset the coffee but also broke the
crockery.

In spite of the earnest signalling of
the Spanish fleet to give the officers
time to dress, he rudely ignored their
requests, and did not even give them
time to find their collar-buttons. And
this is the character of the victory that
the Americans are boasting about.
Shame upon modern civilization that
such things should be permitted!

"BIRTHS, DEATHS AND MARRIAGES REGISTRATION ACT."

THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL DESIRES TO call the attention of the Public to the following requirements of the Revised Act:

1. The Act now applies to all persons within the Province, Indians, Chinese and Japanese included.

2. DEATHS. The Public are reminded that every householder is bound, under a Penalty of \$20 and upwards, to report to the District Registrar every death occurring in his house. The Undertaker in charge may, if he has a personal knowledge of the facts, make the registration as hitherto, but the householder is liable if it be not done.

3. CLERGYMEN, UNDERTAKERS and others are desired to bear in mind that no person can take any part in burying a dead body, under a Penalty of \$25 and upwards, without a certificate of the due registration of the death, unless in the belief that it is impossible to register the death, or if registered, to obtain the certificate; and that in such case it is their duty, under a like Penalty, themselves to register the death within seven days in the usual form.

4. CORONERS are requested to register all deaths on which they hold inquests.

5. MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS are reminded that the signed certificate of the cause of death must be delivered or posted by them within 48 hours of notice of decease, instead of within thirty days as hitherto, and must be forwarded to the District Registrar of the District in which the person died, and not, as heretofore, that in which the Practitioner resides.

6. MARRIAGES. Ministers, and other persons authorized to solemnize marriages, must now send in quarterly returns of marriages solemnized by them. Such returns must be forwarded to the District Registrar within 15 days after the end of each three months. The old forms may be used if it be remembered to insert under "Remarks" the Place of Celebration, and whether church or residence.
