CALL FOR 75,000 MORE VOLUNTEERS

McKinley Surprises the Country---New Military Appointments.

The First Pension Voucher Issued as the Result of the Explosion of the Maine.

Russia Is Said to Be Getting Ready to Build Ships on the Pacific, at Port Arthur.

Washington, May 25.—The event of the day in the war situation was the issuance of a proclamation by the president calling for 75,000 more volunteers. It added a new and striking phase to the lethargic conditions which have prevailed of late, and came with almost startling unexpectedness, even to many of the high officials in the army.

The proclamation means not only the assembling of a large force of troops but also the appointment of a large number of major generals, brigadier generals, colonels, majors and staff and field officers for the organization of this additional force of 75,000 into army corps, divisions, brigades and regiments.

First Pension Voucher.

Chicago, May 25.—Colonel Jonathan Merriam, the U. S. pension agent at Chicago issued today the first pension voucher of the war with Spain. It is for Mrs. Elsie A. Montfort of Council Bluffs, Iowa, mother of Seaman Wm. Montfort who was a victim of the Maine explosion in Havana Harbor, February 15.

Russia to Build Ships at Port Arthur.

London, May 25.—The Navy League Journal says it is informed that Russia is negotiating with an American firm for the laying down of a complete ship-building yard and plant at Port Arthur.

Cuba Thoroughly Blockaded.

Associated Press Dispatch Boat off Havana, May 24, via Key West, May 25.—The situation as to the blockade from Cardenas east, and Matanzas to Mariel west and the city of Havana, remains unchanged. The American squadron continues to maintain a strict blockade.

The light of Moro Castle which has recently been burning at night for the benefit of the Cape Verde squadron

under Admiral Cervera, has not been lighted since Monday.

McCoy-Choynski Maher-Goddard Match.

New York, May 25.—Kid McCoy and Joe Choynski have been matched for 25 rounds for a purse of \$10,000, the fight to take place in this city June 27. Peter Maher and Joe Goddard have also been matched for 25 rounds at the same club for July 5th, for a purse of \$8,000.

At the highland fling competition, held at the Olympic, Tuesday evening, Mrs. McKay of Sandon, took first prize and Prof. Beaton second. There was a big crowd, and Archie Fletcher and R. W. McIntosh acted as judges.

WHERE, OH, WHERE IS CERVERA?

Some Say Cooped Up at Santiago and Some at Cienfuegos.

The Cutting of the Cable from Santiago to San Juan, Porto Rico, Is Denied.

Cuba Is Said to Be Under a Thorough System of Blockade, Both North and South.

New York, May 25.—The Herald's Washington dispatch says Spain's flying squadron will fly no longer. Its race is run. Cooped up in the harbor of Santiago de Cuba its destruction or capture is considered by officials here to be merely a matter of time. Before the harbor are the armorclads of the American navy, ready to give Admiral Cervera battle the moment his ships poke their noses out of the channel leading to sea.

The naval authorities emphatically deny the reports that an action occurred in windward passage.

Bottled Up by Schley.

Washington, May 25.—There seems no longer any doubt about the Spanish fleet now being at Santiago harbor, hemmed in by Commodore Schley's squadron and their escape is quite impossible.

Cervera Said to Be at Cienfuegos.

Cape Haytien, May 25.—A rumor which cannot be confirmed is circulated here to the effect that the Spanish Cape Verde squadron under Admiral Cervera, generally believed to be at Santiago de Cuba, is now at Cienfuegos.

Denies Cutting of Santiago Cables.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 25.—The West India and Panama Cable Co. denies that the cable lines from Santiago de Cuba to San Juan de Porto Rico and Ponce have been cut. The company adds that messages for Porto Rico will be received.

Cruiser Resolute Goes to Sea.

New York, May 25.—The U. S. auxiliary cruiser Resolute, formerly the Old Dominion line steamer Yorktown, which it is said is going to be used for transporting troops from Tampa to

Cuba, weighed anchor at 3:25 p. m. and proceeded to sea.

Failed to Answer Summons.

Ottawa, Ont., May 25.—H. C. Howell, Q. C., of Winnipeg, who was summoned to appear before committee in connection with the Manitoba election prosecutions, was called three times and no reply being given, Sir Hibbert Tupper wanted him reported to the House. The committee did not hear Tupper out, and there the matter stands.

New Governor-General for Soudan.

London, May 25.—A dispatch from Berlin to the Standard says it is declared that Slatin Pasha will be appointed governor-general of the Soudan after the capture of Omdurman, the seat of the Dervish rover, by the Anglo-Egyptian expedition. The official residence of the governor-general will be Khartoum.

To Protect Foreigners at Manila.

London, May 25.—A Hong Kong dispatch says that Manila is tranquil. The foreign cruisers have agreed upon concerted action for the protection of foreigners in any emergency.

THE IMPULSE OF PATRIOTISM.

The proper observance of days like May 24th in Britain and July 4th in the United States tends largely to keep glowing the fires of patriotism in the human breast. Those who have read Edward Everett Hale's "Man Without a Country" have seen vividly depicted the almost personal bereavement that belongs to him who is deprived of the sight of a flag and a government which he may love and honor.

Springing from a common stock, the large percentage of U. S. citizens in Kaslo and vicinity found it very easy to enter into the spirit of celebrating the anniversary of her whom all mankind honor. This feeling is especially observable at the present—a time when the two great nations are nearer to each other in ties of sympathy than ever before. The constant intertwining of the Union Jack with the Stars and Stripes, everywhere visible, easily shows this.

If the words of the national anthems differ, the music and the sentiment are the same. There never was a time in history when the English speaking people were as near to a purely world-patriotism as at present.

Love of country is a noble attribute. Such days as last Tuesday strike and keep in vibration responsive chords that will ultimately—perhaps with our children's children—lead up to the grand altruistic harmony whose sweep and majestic movement shall include all mankind.

"BIRTHS, DEATHS AND MARRIAGES REGISTRATION ACT."

THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL DESIRES TO call the attention of the Public to the following requirements of the Revised Act:

1. The Act now applies to all persons within the Province, Indians, Chinese and Japanese included.

2. DEATHS. The Public are reminded that every householder is bound, under a Penalty of \$25 and upwards, to report to the District Registrar every death occurring in his house. The Undertaker in charge may, if he has a personal knowledge of the facts, make the registration as hitherto, but the householder is liable if it be not done.

3. CLERGYMEN, UNDERTAKERS and others are desired to bear in mind that no person can take any part in burying a dead body, under a Penalty of \$25 and upwards, without a certificate of the due registration of the death, unless in the belief that it is impossible to register the death, or, if registered, to obtain the certificate; and that in such case it is their duty, under a like Penalty, themselves to register the death within seven days in the usual form.

4. CORONERS are requested to register all deaths on which they hold inquests.

5. MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS are reminded that the signed certificate of the cause of death must be delivered or posted by them within 48 hours of notice of decease, instead of within thirty days as hitherto, and must be forwarded to the District Registrar of the District in which the person died, and not, as before, that in which the Practitioner resides.

6. MARRIAGES. Ministers, and other persons authorized to solemnize marriages, must now send in quarterly returns of marriages solemnized by them. Such returns must be forwarded to the District Registrar within 15 days after the end of each three months. The old forms may be used if it be remembered to insert under "Remarks" the Place of Celebration, and whether church or residence.
