SIR, -I beg to report that John N. Muir, the holder of a First Class, Grade A, Certificate.

is at the present time employed as teacher of English Public School.

I further beg to report that the said John N. Muir has persistently neglected, in his capacity of teacher, to obey the Rules and Regulations prescribed for the government of the Public Schools of this Province, which is proved by appended copies of monthly reports made by him now on file in this office.

I still further beg to report that the attention of the said John N. Muir having been called to neglect of his duties as a teacher by official letter of November 23rd, he not only replied in an indifferent and insolent manner, but published both letters in the Daily Times of this city, bearing date November 27th. (Copies of letters as well as excerpt from newspaper referred to are appended.)

Such publication is calculated, and was doubtless intended, to bring this Department into

disrepute and lessen its influence.

In consequence of continued and wilful neglect to fulfil his duties as a teacher, as well as gross insolence shown in his communications with this office and through the public press, I have, this day, by virtue of the provisions of Sub-section (9) of Section 13 of the "Public School Act," cancelled the certificate of qualification to teach in the Public Schools of this Province held by the said John N. Muir, and I beg to recommend that the said cancellation be approved.
