PETITION.

To the Honourable the Speaker and the Members of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia.

Your petitioners, having settled on unsurveyed land in the railroad belt of British Columbia, and having made improvements thereon, and having paid taxes to the Provincial Government thereon, are desirous to obtain some title to the land so occupied and improved.

As, in this particular instance, your petitioners are in an isolated position, being about eight miles from any waggon road or settlement, and all the lands that are tillable in this particular spot being occupied by your petitioners, and none of your petitioners will have the amount of tillable land the Dominion Government permits them homestead.

Your petitioners therefore pray that a respectful address be presented to the Dominion Government to cause a re-survey to be made in this place, and at the same time cause the survey to be made in such manner that your petitioners may not be disturbed in the possession of the lands they have been residing on for two or three years, and on which they have made their homes.

And your petitioners, and other settlers resident in the neighbourhood, and acquainted with the circumstances, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
