"Don't you dare touch the Virgin Mary!", I shouted, and made a lunge. Her head came off in my hand.

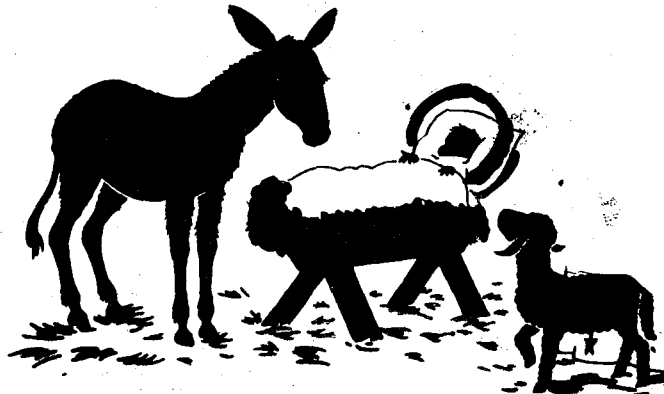
"Join the triumph of the skies!", sang the boys from Vienna.

Mrs K. asked several questions about the University of Alaska and we tried to answer her as best we could being completely mystified as to the reason for her queries. After a very long conversation she finally offered to explain.

She had no intention of enrolling as she explained, she was rather old for that, but she had a problem. Apparently she was driving along the endless Canadian Highway in the Interior of B.C. around the Burns Lake area and with her was a friend from Manitoba, her homeland, who was interested in Botany. 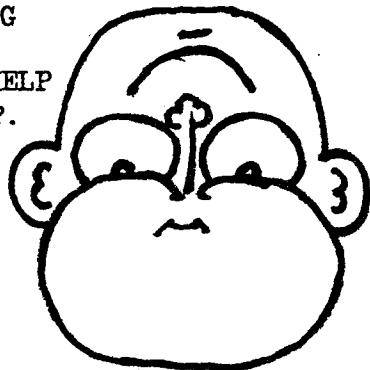
Mrs K. notified us that the Gold Ring of Burns Lake had been returned to its rightful owner.

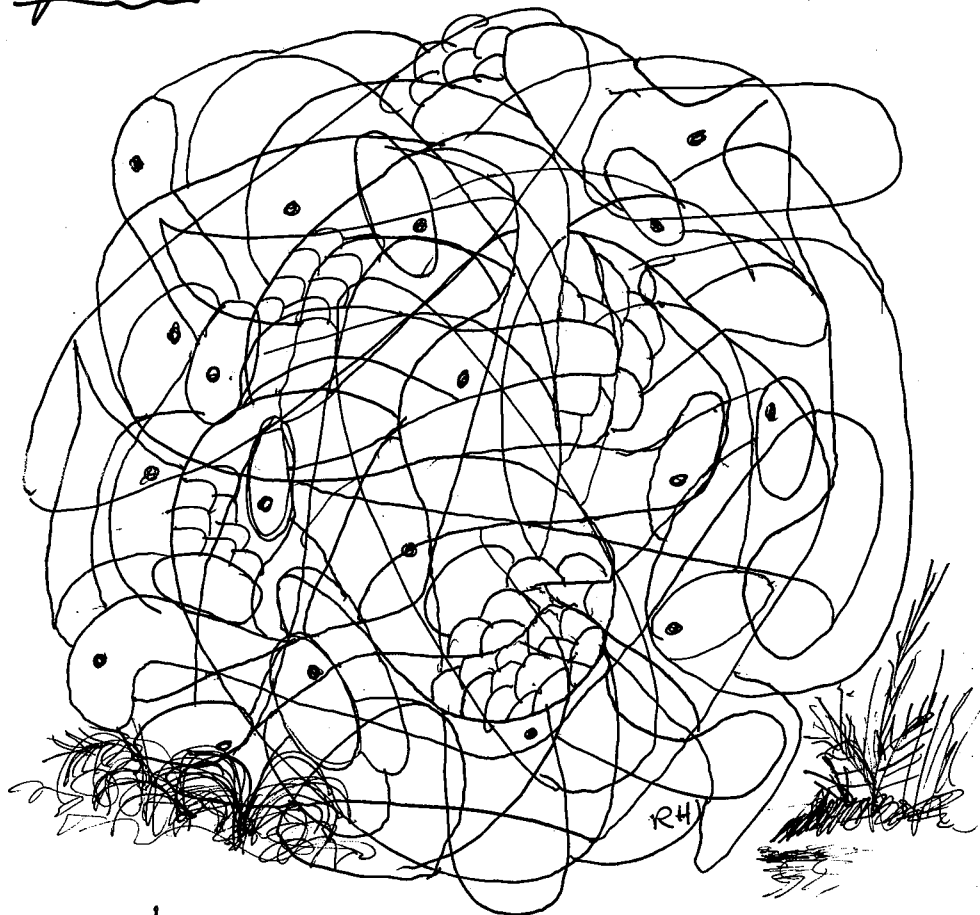

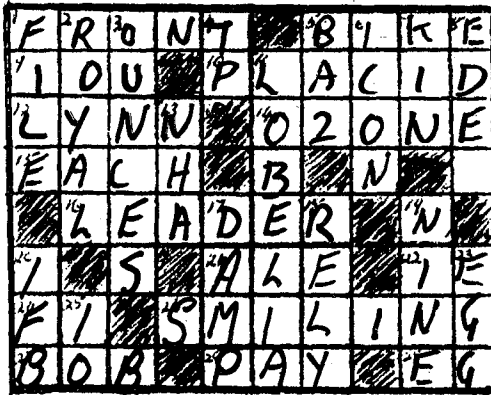
