


The cowpuncher, riding long trails through the bunch grass country, will wave a glad hat, or grasp the hand of the passer-by, in joyous goodfellowship.





PRE-EMPTIONS Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, condi-tional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes

LAND ACT AMENDMENTS



Secret sessions of British Parliaments have such sessions were more or less common during the war, they were looked upon under stress of circumstances, as more or less necessary. Howally concluded such procedure would not, in the ordinary course of events, be resorted to; therefore great was their surprise when the British Labour Party, in the House of Commons moved, at about 4 o'clock in the morning, for the exclusion of all visitors, even the press reporters, which mo tion carried, and the House continued in secret for three hours.

No doubt such action on commercial legislation was necessary, nevertheless it was a surprise and one that will have far-reaching effects; for Parliaments throughout the British Empire take for their procedure, precedents established by the British House of Commons.

ull information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timber-land, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Com-missioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be ob-tained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further infor-mation regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage. of

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, Lot exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and im-provement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial pur-poses areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a

company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Prov-ince is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are svallable for settlers, campers and travellers, up to tes head.
