The Committee of Council beg to submit for the approval of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor the following Resolution, passed during the present Session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, namely:—

"That a respectful Address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor praying him to move the Dominion Government to increase the per capita tax on Chinese coming into this country to one hundred dollars, and also to give to this Province at least seventy-five per cent. of the said tax."

His Excellency the Governor-General in Council on the 16th May, 1893.*

The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration a despatch, hereto attached, dated 7th April, 1893, from the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, transmitting a copy of a Minute of his Executive Council covering a Resolution of the Legislative Assembly of British Columbia praying that the per capita tax on Chinese immigrants might be increased to one hundred dollars, and that at least seventy-five per cent. of the amount derived therefrom be given to the Province.

The Minister of Trade and Commerce, to whom the matter was referred, states that having given careful consideration to the subject-matter of the Resolution, as well as to the question in general, he is of the opinion that in view of the commercial relations of Canada with China and its possible extension, it is not expedient to change the provisions of "The Chinese Immigration Act" as it at present exists, nor to take any action that might be construed by the Chinese Government as unfriendly thereto, nor does he consider that, keeping in view the responsibility and expense incident to the administration of the Act, the proportion of the tax now by law made payable to the Province should be increased.

The Committee advise that a certified copy of this Minute, if approved, be forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia.
