THE central and most prosperous town in Southeast Kootenay is Cranbrook, which has a population of nearly 2500; during the summer months this is increased by a floating population of not less than one thousand prospectors and miners. Cranbrook is the town of the district where the Dominion and Provincial Government offices are located. The most central and most accessible point to and from all mines. Cranbrook is the distributing center and the source of supplies for the district, it is the banking, commercial, lumbering and railway center, and the County Court holds its sitting at Cranbrook.

The people of Cranbrook extend an invitation to the traveling public to visit the town and district. As a summer resort the district is without a rival and cannot be surpassed. It is a sportsman's paradise. Game, large and small are abundant, and the mountain streams are well stocked with trout.

Cranbrook has been very busy all spring with its building boom in the business part of the town, and the residents are now awakening to the importance of getting the residential portion in shape. A large number of handsome homes are under construction, and many more will be erected before the snow flies.

A great deal of attention is now being directed to this district through the ore production, and development of such mines as the St. Eugene, North Star, Sullivan Group and others, and also by the active placer operations now going on at Perry creek, Wild Horse and Bull river, and there is a wide spread demand for accurate and authentic information. We learn of many people of means who intend coming here this year with a view to investment, and it is in the interest of the country at large that they should be supplied with such data as can be supplied by the Provincial Government and local government officials, also by the leading mine owners in the district.

The lumbermen of British Columbia are agitating for a duty of \$2.00 per thousand on rough lumber, and 30 cents per thousand on shingles. It is a matter of regret that certain influential papers in Manitoba and the North-West are still maintaining a vigorous opposition to the proposed tariff.
