MEETING OF COUNCIL

What the City Dads are Doing to Promote the Welfare of the City.

The City Council held its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday evening. There were present Mayor James Finlay, and Aldermen Pink, Ryan, Jackson, Gill and Hickenbotham.

Minutes of last regular meeting and special meetings were read; and on motion adopted.

A communication from J. South, re the paying of a stenographer in a case in the police court was read and on motion referred to the Police Commissioners.

A communication from J. P. Leslie, re a claim for damages, for injuries sustained by Mrs. Leslie caused by a defective sidewalk was read; and on motion the city clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Leslie that, according to the opinion of the city solicitor, the city was not liable for the accident to Mrs. Leslie.

The accounts of the Electric Light, Telephone and Water supply Companies, were ordered to be paid. Alderman Ryan not voting.

On motion the monthly accounts, as presented by the finance committee were ordered to be paid.

Messrs Reid and McCallum was then heard re the expense account of delegates to interview the C. P. R. officials at Winnipeg; and motion of aldermen Gill and Jackson, the account, amounting to \$64 was ordered paid. The question of securing a public pound was referred to the Fire and police committee, with power to act.

The city clerk was instructed to write to the Provincial Government with a view of obtaining for the city jail now in use by the Government.

The Council adjourned at 9:45.

Appointments.

William H. Evans, Wm. Symonds and Wm. Colquhoun have been appointed Commissioners for taking affidavits in the supreme court, for the purpose of acting under the Provincial Elections act, in the Fernie riding.

Commence Operations Monday.

The steel for the spur to the North Star mill arrived on Monday, and on Wednesday track-laying commenced. It is expected that the spur will be completed by Saturday, and the mill in operation by Monday. Some 25,000 feet of lumber has been sawn for the use of the company in putting up buildings for the workmen and other purposes.

Meeting of Police Commissioners

A meeting of the Police Commissioners was held on Monday, at which Chief of Police Dow was instructed to employ a special constable, who shall act as jailor, at a salary not to exceed \$75 per month.

The Canadian Pacific Railway announce May 15th as the opening date for Banff hotel.

June 15th for Lake Louise and Emerald Lake Chalets Glacier, Field, Revelstoke, Sicamous and North Bend hotels are open the year round.

Opening of navigation, Great Lakes, Fort William to Owen Sound. This service will be inaugurated with S.S. Manitoba from Fort William May 7th. Regular service tri weekly will be maintained leaving Fort William Tuesday, Friday and Sunday. Navigation has been resumed on Trout Lake and the tri weekly service Mondays,

Wednesdays and Fridays has been resumed.

Election Friday.

The property holders of Cranbrook were at the polls Friday voting on the question of giving a franchise, or option, to the Cranbrook Electric Light Co., in other words giving them permission to extend, and install new electric light machinery.

The voting on By-law No. 38, as it is known under the Municipal clause, was light, but little interest being manifested, the result was not obtainable at the time of going to press, but it is, according to those who think they know, sure to be favorable to granting the extension to the Electric Light Co.

Strike is Settled.

The long drawn out controversy between the coal operators of the Crows Nest Pass and the miners has at last been settled. An agreement has been reached

that is satisfactory to both parties.

The agreement was finally ratified, signed and adopted Monday, and the men have all returned to work. No coal was shipped Tuesday, as only preparatory work could be done in the mines, but almost all of the mines, today are shipping.

The agreement runs two years from April 1st, and provides for a conference sixty days previous to its expiration for the purpose of considering its renewal.

News of the settlement has been received with joy by all as a prolongation of the struggle meant stagnation of business all over the province.

LOOKING AHEAD

Firemen Prepare Rules to Govern Future Races.

The Firemen of the district appointed a committee to prepare rules to govern all races in the future, which would prevent trouble and discontent such as happened last year between Moyie and Cranbrook. The following rules have been adopted:

RULES GOVERNING WET TEST

1. Each reel must carry 200 feet of 2 1/2 inch regular fire hose.

2. Race one hundred yards to hydrant, lay 200 feet of hose, break at 150 feet, and put on nozzle.

3. Start to pull off hose not more than 40 feet from hydrant.

4. Cap on hydrant, coupling on hose and nozzle to be on three full turns.

5. One second to be added to time for every turn or part short of three full turns for each connection, according to Rule 4.

6. Time keepers to stand with backs to starting line, time to be taken from pistol report to time water comes through nozzle.

7. Judges to have power to make all competing teams to use reel.

8. Nozzles shall weigh not less than — pounds

9. The nozzle men and men breaking coupling must not start ahead of lead men in harness.

10. The captains of each contesting team to have the privilege of appointing a nozzle and hydrant referee.

11. The finishing line shall be 150 feet from the hydrant. The point of nozzle when dropped to be not more than six feet from line. One-half second shall be added for every foot or fraction of same that point of nozzle is behind 6 feet limit line.

RULES GOVERNING HUB AND HUB RACE.

1. To run 100 yards.

2. Pistol Start. Hubs to be over starting line. Captains to draw for position.

3. Race to be run with trimmed wheels, approximately the same weight.

4. The first hub over finishing line to be awarded the race.

Conditions and Rules Governing Hose Reel Races as Agreed Upon by the Representatives of Cranbrook and Fernie

CONDITIONS

1. Teams to consist of not more than 12 men

3. Members of teams to be bona fide citizens of not less than 20 days residence of the town they represent.

3. There shall be three judges, who shall also be time-keepers, appointed by the captains of the competing teams, who shall be sole judges of the race. Their decision to be final and must be given immediately after the completion of the contest.

4. All ties to be run off the same day.

5. The home team to appoint starter.

6. Pistol start with hubs of reel to be over starting line. Starter to be in direct line with the hubs.

7. Teams to start with approximately the same weight reels.

SAME AS BOSTON MAN

Indian Brave Elopers With Another Buck's Squaw— Also Steals a Cayuse.

John Gingle, a Kootenay Indian, who's wigwam is located on the balmy Tobacco Plains, was up before Magistrate Armstrong on Monday charged with stealing a cayuse, and eloping with the squaw of a buck named Pallook. The elopement was truly sensational from the fact that Gingle had no cayuse to carry his new Klutchnan to the land of the free, hence he added insult to injury by stealing Pallooks pony as well as his squaw. The sturdy buck left on an unlucky Friday night, and as soon as the horse was missed, the disappearance of Gingle and Mrs. Pallook noted, the Indian police of the Kootenay started in pursuit. The fugitives had crossed the border into the land of the free, but the Indian sleuths knew no boundary line, no international law, no extradition papers, or mode of procedure necessary to the taking of a criminal in a foreign country.

The fugitives wended there way through Montana into Idaho before they rested. The sleuths followed them closely and caught up with them at Sand Point, where they arrested the guilty pair.

When the "big chief" the reserve policeman, caught up with them he exhibited a star, sent from the bottom of an old tomato can, pulled forth an old rusty pair of handcuffs and snapped them on his prey. The squaw attempted to conceal her identity by wearing a large pair of smoked goggles, but when the officer snatched them off, he grunted a recognizing "whoo."

The squad of Indian policemen with their prisoner arrived in Cranbrook Monday, where a formal complaint was laid charging Gingle with stealing a horse. His answer to the complaint was, me no steal him in Canada; showed that he knew more of international law than his captors. He was remanded for a week for the production of more evidence.

First Steamer for Nome.

Seattle, Wash., May 10.—The steamer Corwin, owned by the L. N. Gray Steamship Company, left this port today for the north mining towns. She is the first vessel to make the trip this season. Although the Corwin is the first boat to leave, the season will practically open with the sailing of the steam ships Ohio, Victoria, Pleiades and Senator, which depart on June the 1. The Pleiades is the only steamer that does not carry passengers, and all available space on the other three steamers has already been engaged. The Corwin has the distinction of having been the 1st vessel into Nome every season for the last six years. The first vessel to arrive at Nome is always greeted with great enthusiasm.

Up Before the Beak.

Chief of Police Dow arrested Jno. Collins on a charged of theft, and Judge Anderson clinched the matter by finding Collins guilty as charged, and gave him three months in the city cooler.

Ben Pugh, was again up for being drunk and disorderly. Judge Anderson gave him 30 days to consider whether he will take the pledge to abstain from using old scotch and bad language.

Sam Baldwin was charged with reckless shooting within the city limits. His Honor, will hear the case on Monday next, meanwhile "Sam" will clean his rifle and put it away until the shooting season opens.

London, May 7.—The month of May will be a very busy one with the Lord Mayor of London, probably the gayest of his merry life. To night he will be one of the patrons of the dance of the Grafton galleries, in aid of the Aida Leigh House in Paris. Princess Christian has given her patronage. To-morrow he will take part in the "Furry Dance," through the streets of the ancient Cornish town of Holston Furry Day is only celebrated in Holstone. Probably for the first time the Lord Mayor of London will trip on the light fantastic toe at the head of a procession of swains and damsels when Sir William Treloar visits the place. At mid day the real revels begin. Then procession of dancing couples, carrying flowers, is formed at the town hall. To the tune of the Furry Times played by a volunteer band, they dance hand-in-hand through the town, passing in the front door of every house and out of the back. To avoid any house is a slight. From time to time the men turn and twirl the girls immediately behind or in front of them.

CANADIAN INDUSTRIES PAY

Another Successful Year of a Leading Canadian Manufactory.

Montreal, Jan. 19.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Slater Shoe Company was held at their offices in Montreal a few days ago. The address of the President laid stress on the continuous upward progress of the Company's business since the standard price Slater shoe became the feature of their business.

The Slater Company were the first Canadian manufacturers to adopt newspaper advertising as an adjunct to the more economical selling of their goods. In five years their business has more than doubled. In 1906 the increase over 1906 was exactly \$200,000. While this year achieves the largest gross increase in a single year, it is also by far the largest percentage of increase in twelve months. The orders for the first two months of their present fiscal year exceed those of the corresponding months of the previous year by \$159,000.

Ninety-eight new agencies were opened by the Company during the year. Orders came unsolicited from many foreign countries, including South Africa, the West Indies and from Newfoundland. The President pointed out the need for more factory accommodation. "We have outgrown our present quarters," he said. The directors arranged to hold a special meeting to deal with factory requirements and extension.

The financial report of the Secretary-Treasurer, with the dividend declaration of 7 per cent, on both preferred and common stock, and a substantial balance added to the rest account, was received with approval by the shareholders.

The Board of Directors were elected as follows: Charles E. Slater (President), William Starke (Vice-President), Anson McKim, J. N. McKim, W. F. Borland, William Smith, J. W. Woods and Major Robert Starke.

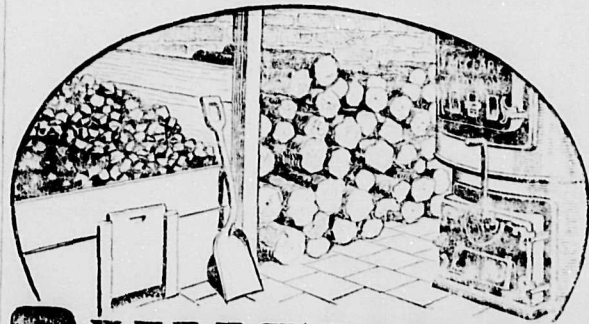

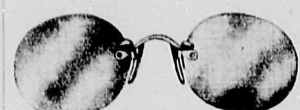

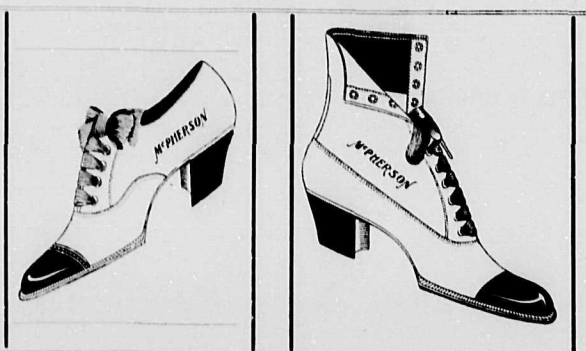
