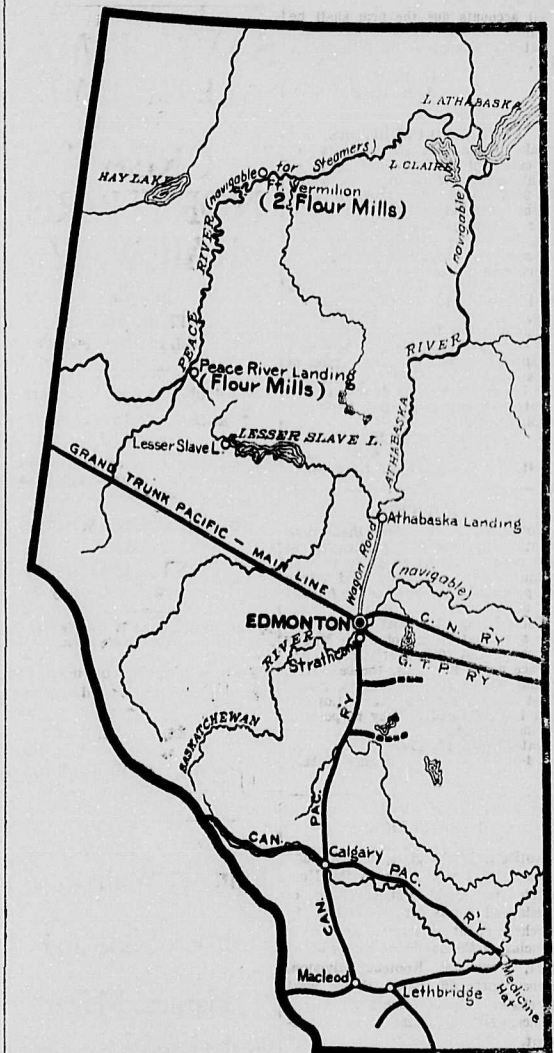

Synopsis of Regulations for disposal of Minerals on Dominion Lands in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory.

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 2 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Persons of eighteen years and over and who are citizens of the Dominion of Canada or who have obtained entry for a mining lease may obtain a right to a mining lease. A mining lease may be obtained for one or more years, not exceeding five, upon payment in advance of \$500 per annum for an individual and \$1,000 for a company, and for each acre of the lease area.

### MOVIE.

MERGER AT A STANDSTILL.  
James Cronin, accompanied by Mrs. Cronin, returned Wednesday morning from Montreal and Toronto. "Everything is at a standstill so far as the amalgamation is concerned," said Mr. Cronin. "The War Eagle and Centaur Star directors are in favor of it, while some of those of the Le Roi are opposed. It will be necessary to get the voice of the shareholders before any definite action can be taken. No, the St. Eugene is not in the deal, nor will it be closed down, either. When our foreign contract expires, the ore will be shipped to the local smelters for a time at least. We are anxious for the new compressor to arrive, as we are behind on development work."

E. A. Hill, who represented Moyle Aerie No. 855 at the convention of the grand aerie held in Grand Forks on June 5th, 6th and 7th, returned home Thursday. Mr. Hill says there were nearly fifty representatives present and they were treated in a most hospitable manner by the Grand Forks and Phoenix aeries. The meeting was presided over by A. W. Von Rhein, provincial grand worthy president. A permanent provincial organization was effected, and the meeting next year will be held at Revelstoke. Following are the officers for the ensuing term: A. W. Von Rhein, re-elected P. G. W. P.; A. W. Goodenough, Kaslo, P. G. W. vice-president; Frank Le Roy, re-elected P. G. W. secretary; J. R. Cameron, Sandon, chaplain; H. Schofield, New Westminster, worthy conductor.

The Moyle Brass Band was duly organized at a meeting held at C. A. Foote's tailor shop Tuesday evening. The officers are C. A. Foote, president, and R. Campbell, secretary-treasurer. Prof. A. G. Scherer was chosen as leader and instructor of the band. The instruments of the defunct Fort Steele band have been purchased and the boys are now in training. Good progress is being made, and from present indications the band will be in a position to render excellent service on Dominion Day.

A very pretty wedding took place at the Catholic church Monday morning, when Miss Maggie Kenney of Moyle, and Mr. Robert Patterson, of Rossland, were united in marriage by Rev. Father Choquet. Miss Ellen Bonner, of Butte, officiated as bridesmaid and Michael Bonner as groomsmen. Mr. and Mrs. Patterson left on the same day for Rossland, where they will make their home. Mr. Patterson is foreman at the Josie concentrator, near that city.

As an evidence of the increased earnings of the C. P. R. at Moyle now over that of one year ago, we give the following figures: For May this year the receipts of the Moyle office amounted to \$41,631.49, as compared with \$7,971.48, for the month of May, 1904. This makes an increase of \$33,660.01.

Peter Luther and Paul Jensen have taken a mile contract near Yakk on the new Corbin line.

Frank Guindon is doing some developing work on the Toronto mineral claim on the west side of the lake.

Joseph Neiderstadt is building a 15x24 foot addition to his brewery, which will be used as a malt room.

James Cronin brought three thoroughbred Irish terrier pups from the east with him, two for himself and one for W. H. Aldridge of the Trail smelter. He procured them from Father O'Gorman, of Gananoque, Ont. The pups' sire is the famous Badger, champion of this special breed in both the United States and Canada. The pups cost nearly \$70 each landed in Moyle.

### FERNIE.

(From the Free Press.)  
Chief of Police Warring went to Nelson on Sunday with three prisoners. They were E. Ralph, sent up for trial for shooting O'Brien. A man by the name of McLeod, accused of stealing a watch at the Roma, and a Chinaman who got 6 months for stealing \$40 from another Chinaman.

The death occurred at Morrissey last Thursday of Daniel McLennan. Deceased left his home near Morrissey Mines on Thursday to look for a deer. Not returning at night his wife became alarmed, and a searching party started out to look for him. The next morning his dead body was found near the government road about a mile from his home and near by was the half of a good sized deer.

James Bennett, of Cowley, and Miss Annie L. Sexton, of Fernie, were married in Fernie on Tuesday. They will take up their residence near Cowley where Mr. Bennett has a ranch.

The local Oddfellows will celebrate Decoration Day on Sunday, June 13th. The local lacrosse team will play an exhibition game with Nelson on the latter's ground on July 1st. The Fernie team is rapidly getting into good shape.

John Hutchison was up from Cranbrook last week to meet the Marconi people.

The moulds for the concrete blocks of the Coal Company office building arrived a few days ago. The blocks will be manufactured on the site of the building and this work will be commenced on Monday.

It is expected that about 200 more coke ovens will be started in a short time at Carbonado.

The by-laws for municipal ownership of the sewer and water works systems, voted on last Saturday, were both carried.

### THREE SERIOUS ACCIDENTS.

Giovanni Orsi, an Italian, was fatally injured in the C. P. R. yard on Tuesday at noon. The unfortunate man was crushed by an incoming freight train. He was removed to the Fernie hospital where he died the following morning.

A fatal accident occurred at Crows Nest near the Summit, last Saturday, when an Italian named Arsenio Garmano, was run down by a freight train. The train pulled up and the trainmen found that both legs had been amputated below the knee. He was taken on the train but died before Michel could be reached.

On Wednesday evening George Reid was brought up from Hosmer on a hand car to the Fernie hospital suffering from a severe fracture of the skull. Reid was employed in the bush camp and was struck by a falling tree. To-day the report from the hospital is that he is much better and hopes are entertained for his recovery.

### PROSPEROUS CANADA.

"The prospects are very favorable that the biggest wheat crop ever raised in Canada will be harvested this fall. The C. P. R. is preparing its plant and equipment with the expectation of having to handle 90,000,000 bushels."

So said Mr. William Whyte, second vice-president of the C. P. R. Mr. Whyte was asked to talk about the E. & N. deal but he declined without thanks. He was much more responsive when invited to tell of the outlook in Manitoba and he glowed with pride and pleasure as he spoke of the vast wheat fields over which the recent rains have brought up the green shoots that will later carry the food of millions. An increase of 25 per cent in the acreage now in wheat, bringing it up to nearly 4 millions, was the figure he gave for the year. Already preparations for handling the crop are being rushed by the railway. At Fort William there is a whirlwind elevator which empties 32 cars of 1100 bushels each every hour. This of course means that more cars are wanted, and they are being built accordingly. The cars require yard room and so a few more miles of track are being built at Fort William increasing the total 25 per cent.

More and better immigrants than ever are coming in this year, the pick of them being the substantial people from the United Kingdom and the practical farmers from the United States. Something like 60,000 will build homes in Canada this year, increasing the demand for British Columbia's lumber, fruit and fish, a fact which Mr. Whyte appeared to think ought to reconcile this province to its own inability to catch the eye of a large influx of new comers.

Asked about the irrigation works at Calgary, Mr. Whyte said the C. P. R. was taking its water from the Bow river and when the vast scheme was completed 3,000,000 acres of land would be ready for the plough. This year 110,000 acres would be put under cultivation. The soil would raise magnificent wheat and two crops of alfalfa could be cut in a year.

### PORTLAND EXPOSITION NOTES.

The attendance at the Lewis and Clark Exposition on Thursday, June 1, the opening day, was but a few hundred short of 40,000. The day was fine and the opening exercises were characterized by an enthusiasm which means much for the success of the enterprise.

A substitution of the Portland post office has been established on the grounds of the Lewis and Clark Exposition, near the main entrance for the accommodation of visitors at the Fair. The station is equipped completely, and visitors may receive their mail there, purchase money orders and stamps, and mail letters.

Early visitors at the Lewis and Clark Fair have been surprised to find that the hotel and boarding-house keepers are making very reasonable rates for Fair visitors. The charges in most cases are but little above those ordinarily in effect. Portland is unusually well supplied with restaurants, and the prices for food have not gone up at all.

A careful estimate made by a Portland florist places the number of roses now in bloom in Portland at 10,000,000, while other estimates are twice as high. The Lewis and Clark Exposition grounds are decked with the fragrant blossoms, which are found everywhere in great profusion. The magnificence of Portland roses has been a source of astonishment to early visitors from the east.
