ITEMS FROM MOVIE

It is said that R. E. Kinsey is
making favorable progress with
his scheme to install an electric
and power plant on Lamb Creek.
Karl Neitzel, president of the
St. Eugene Mountain Mines who
has been in Colorado for some time,
has been promoted by the com-
pany for which he is working. He
is now assistant superintendent at
Portland mill near Victor Colorado.
The big rock drilling match for
the \$100 purse will be pulled off
next Saturday Sept. 24. in Moyle
at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The
rock is in position, the money has
been raised, and everything is
ready for the contest. It will be-
gin sharp on time and will be well
worth seeing.
Another pump will be put in at
the St. Eugene mill to pump water
from the lake just as soon as one
can be procured. Several efforts
were made to get one from the
east but without a satisfactory re-
sult. G. A. King, superintendent
of the mill, is now in the Cour-
d'Alene district and will probably
get a pump that has been used by
one of the mines there. If so it
will be brought here and installed
as soon as possible. The old boil-
ers, which were taken out last
summer and repaired, are being
installed to furnish additional pow-
er. The mill is running steadily
on a reduced feed, and the mine is
being worked to nearly its full
capacity.

Letter on Early Closing.
Editor Herald: Surely the
Cranbrook merchants are not se-
riously thinking of keeping their
places of business open late,
every night in the week. I am
glad to see that one merchant has
had the temerity to stand out
against this movement, and I ven-
ture to say that he will be a direct
gainer for having done so. The
best policy for any merchant desir-
ing success, to adopt, is a liberal
one, the more liberal his actions
towards customers and employees,
the more business he will surely
do. The worst paying investment
for any merchant is that of an
underpaid, overworked employee.
Employ good help, pay them well,
be firm and just in your attitude
toward them, and your employees
will be true winners. Work any
man behind a counter or at a desk
for sixteen hours a day, and you
crush his ambition, his manner
soon becoming indifferent, he loses
interest in his work, and under
those conditions is not in shape to
be bright and cheerful with cus-
tomers. It is a well known fact,
that upon entering a store, if you
are met in a bright cheerful style,
not "fresh," but pleasant and
bright, your impression of that
store is a good one, and you are
apt to go again. On the other
hand, if the salesman is slouchy,
and shows evidence of that tired
feeling, "a condition brought about
by over work, and long hours,"
your impression of that store is
not a good one, and you are not
apt to go again. The proprietors
of large eastern stores have awak-
ened to the necessity, in their own
interests, of lessening the hours of
work for their employees and of the
particular advantage and direct
gain to their business in making
their surroundings pleasant and
congenial. The sweating system
has been pretty well abolished in
the east, surely Cranbrook, a rising
western town will not revive it.

Railways For This District.
A despatch from Vancouver,
speaking of an interview with Sir
Thomas Shaughnessy, president of
the C.P.R., now on a trip over the
company's lines, says that Mr.
Shaughnessy was very much pleased
with the appearance of things in
British Columbia. In the course
of the interview the president said
that the high rate of assessment by
the provincial government militated
against any notable extensions of
the railway system in this province.
However, he foreshadowed con-
struction of a line from Penticton
to Ruby Creek and also branch
lines into the Flathead country
and the Windermere district.
William Whyte, manager of west-
ern lines, said he regards the with-
drawal of interior and coast lum-
bermen from the western retailers'
combine as a distinct benefit to the
Northwest.

C.P.R. management. The build-
ing of the Kootenay Central and a
line to the Flathead means much
to this district.
