On this same basis Germany is far less populous than France. It is France, says the writer we are quoting, wherever the Frenchmen thus interpreted is 70,798,083 (of whom 58,218,903 live in France-in-Europe), but that of the Germans is only a little more than 47,000,000. The total number of British subjects, we may add, is put at 306,271,514.—Pall Mall Gazette.

Mr. Jas. Ellwood, of Semiahmoo, reports that salmon are swarming in the water east of Point Roberts, and in many of the bays along the coast. Last Monday it is estimated that not less than 10,000 fish were taken between Point Roberts and Semiahmoo. The net used is known as the brief net. It is short, and is let down between two boats and in a few minutes becomes filled with in a few minutes becomes filled with fish. The water is clear, and thousands of fish may be seen swimming about. People in that region say that a similar spectacle was never before known. About he group of islands known as the San Juan group, fish are equally plenti-Juan group, fish are equally plenti-ful. So many are taken some days that the fishermen are not able to dispose of them. It is the opinion of many people that the unusual numbers of fish in these bays is the result of too much fishing at the entrance to the Fraser. So many nets are stretched across the mouth that the fish, finding entrance barred, go elsewhere in search of The coarse. spawning grounds. The conse-quence of this practice, it is feared, will be disastrous to the river fish eries. It is believed that when fish come to maturity their instinct leads them to the river where they were hatched; and if large num-bers of salmon are diverted from hers of samon are diverted from the spawning grounds of Fraser River, they will seek other rivers where they can deposit their spawn, and our river supply will in time become greatly reduced. It is claimed that the decline of the fish-individual control of the fish-ical diverse of the Sarrament and ing industry on the Sacramento and Columbia rivers is due to this very cause. The Sacramento is practi-cally played out as a fishing ground, and the output of the Columbia seems to be steadily growing less. In view of the large interests at stake, it is surely time this matter received the earnest attention of the fishery authorities. Conversion of India. Dr. Chamberlain, an American medical missionary who has spent some years in India, brings back very hopeful reports respecting that vast field for missionary endeavor. He has come to the conclusion that such changes have taken place in the religious sentiment of India that, if proper efforts were made, she might, easily be won for Chris-tinty. The masse of India have become convinced that Buddhism convinced that Buddhism and the various systems of idolatry which prevail are not the kind of religion that will satisfy human wants, and thousands of them are ready to embrace any new religious belief that can be shown to be better than the one they now possess. There are at least 3,000,000 young men in India, the doctor tells us, who have graduated from various educational institutions, who are well acquainted with the English language. To reach the people of India, therefore, it will be necessary only to win these young men and make them agents for the conversion of the race. Many of these educated young men have read the wants, and thousands of them are educated young men have read the bible, and have lost faith in the creeds of the country. They will embrace Christianity or stand in danger of drifting into infidelity. Dr. Chamberlain makes an earnest appeal to the people of America to send missionaries for the instruction and conversion of these young men. He predicts that if American Christians do their duty in this resconsistants do their duty in this res-pect, it will not be many years be-fore the conquest of India is com-plete. He appeals to Mr. Moody, the evangelist, to give a year of labor to India, believing that no can more successfully deal with the situation. He points to the marvellous success of Buddha complished by earnest effort. Five hundred years before the Christian era, this reformer, whose creed era, this reformer, whose creed contained the great truth that there is one God, that no human mediation was necessary between God and man, and that all men constituted one brotherhood, went out to pro-claim the new doctrine. Tired of priestcraft and polytheism, the peo-ple everywhere welcomed the faith of Buddha. Kings and princes beof Buddha. Kings and princes became devoted missionaries. India, Ceylon, Burmah, Siam, Nepal, Thibet, Siberia, China, and Japan all became, practically, Buddhists. If the grain of truth contained in the system of Buddha kindled such enthusiasm, Dr. Chamberlain thinks that Christianity, embracing the whole truth, may look for even greater conquests. He appeals to Mr. Moody in the following forcible words: "In the name of 650 missionaries struggling on; in the name of 700,000 converts, already gathered; in the name of 3,000,000 young men who know English, but who know not God; in the name of 250,000,000 who could be brought to Christ, were the 3,000,000 converted; I stand before you in this waking vision and echo the call—Come over into India and help us!"

In the early days of confederation it was contended by some that the power of Disallowance was, in some cases if not in all vested in the Governor-General pear in the DAILY COLUMBIAN. It has himself, who might or might not invite or accept the advice of his dealings, and many persons make it a rule to give preference in their dealings to years, as all students of Canadian history know, the Governor-General, acting under the Royal instructions, himself decided what structions, himself decided what should be done in many cases.

In the R N A Act the word should be done in many cases. In the B. N. A. Act the word Governor is used in some cases and the words Governor-in-Counand the words Governor-in-Council in others, and it was contended that these words were so used intentionally and for the purpose of distinguishing between what the Governor-General may do and what he must do according to the advice of his Council. The presselling opinion in Canada was prevailing opinion in Canada was that the words Governor and Governor-in-Council, as used in the Act, were synonymous. The Earl of Carnaryon, who intro-duced the Bill into the House of Lords and who must be supposed to have known what the intention of Parliament was, inclined to the opinion that the Act en-trusted the guardianship of Provicial rights to the Governor-General in person, as did Lord Granville, who wrote to Sir John Young that nothing could be done to relieve the Governor-General from the responsibility of deciding in each case whether an Act of a Provincial Legislature should or should not be disallowed. In a despatch dated June 1st, 1876, Lord Carnaryon -"In Sections 10 and 13 the distinction between the 'Gov-ernor-General' and the 'Governorn-General and the Govern-or-General-in-Council' is care-fully drawn, and this distinction is closely observed throughout the Act. It may therefore be urged that if 'the Governor-Gen-eral-in-Council' had been intended in Section 90, that expression would have been used, especially as the object of the section was to declare in what manner the powers, which, after much nego-tiation, had been reserved to the Provincial Legislatures, were to be exercised. It is further sug-gested that if the Dominion Leg-islature, or those members of it who for the time being are selected as the advisers of the Governor-General; could be said to have the power of controlling the enactment or operation of Provincial Acts, the consequence would be a virtual repeal of the section of the British North America Act, 1867, which gives the exclusive right of legislation in certain matters to the Provincial Legislature." His own opinion he expressed as follow—"It would seem not improbable that would seem not improbable that the intention may have been to entrust this function to an authority in Canada not directly representing that majority of the Do-minion Parliament from whose jurisdiction these particular questions had been excepted. would be utterly incompatible with the legislative independence of Canada did such an authority exist. Better a thousand times that the Government elected by the majority of the Canadian people should abuse the power of Disallowance than that any authority not derived from the people of Canada should override, even for good, the decisions of a government support-ed by a majority of the people's representatives in Parliament. The true remedy is the curtailment or the abolition of the power of Disallowance. While an Act of Provincial Legislature Act of Provincial Legislature respecting any of the matters in which the B. N. A. Act professes to give to those bodies the exclusive right of legislation may be annulled by the Federal Government, the provinces do not enjoy the right of self-government in as full measure as is especial to the permanence of the

They are in a very different position from the Indians elsewhere who receive considerably bounties annually from the federal government. We are of opinion that it would be better in the circumstances to abandon the proposed Indian tax. Squatters Meeting at Chilliwhack.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of the squatters and others of Chilliwhack was held on Saturday afternoon, the 29th July. Our member for the district, Mr. D. Chisholm, was present invitation. Mr. Samuel Cauley, our municipal reeve, was voted to the chair, and James Patterson acted as secretary. Mr. D. Chisholm, M.P., was called to address the meeting. He said with regard to squatters' rights everything was being done by his government that could be done to settle the question. That it was now left for the chief justice of British Columbia to decide whether the Dominion or provincial governments shall administer the dyking reserve lands at Sumas and Chilliwhack. That the Hon. Thomas White would be here in a few days and Mr. Chasholm advised that a deputation of squatters be appointed by this meeting to wait on the Hon. Thos. White at Westminster on his arrival in the province and he would assist the deputation in urging the immediate administration of these lands. He felt sure that the Hon. Thomas White, minister of the interior, was as anxious to settle this matter as any person in the hall, and that it was a great hardship that the large number of farmers of this place had resided on their farms for nine years and not even a scratch of a pen had been given to assure them of their holdings though an untiring application had been made to both governments. He also understood that the management of municipal matters was scriously interferred with as the council had no power to levy taxes on these lands. He stated that the Dominion government intended discontinuing the telegraph service to Chillshall administer the dyking reserve conneil had no power to levy taxes on these lands. He stated that the Dominion government intended discontinuing the telegraph service to Chill-whack, and while at Ottawa he asked that the line be continued in operation till the lat of September next until he could see the people and know what arrangements they wished to make.
