INTERIOR LANDS.—A memorial was presented to the Dominion land board, at its meeting which took place at Kamloops a few days ago, making certain suggestions respecting the administration of lands in ranges 12 to 21 inclusive. The suggestions were as follows: (1) No lease to be granted of said lands; (2) lands to be exempted from sale except according to clauses 4 and 6; (3) lands to be open to preemption according to Dominion Lands Act, excepting that parties can have 320 instead of 160 acres; (4) any parties pre-empting will have the right to bond 640 acres adjoining his pre emption, which they can purchase at \$1 per acre, on completion of their titles and patents for the land; (5) proces of land to be: Meadow and agricultural land, \$2.50 per acre; pasture land, \$1 per acre; (6) all parties holding land by pre-emption from the local government shall have the right to purchase 640 acres, and no more, adjoining the pre-emption.
