MADE FROM BEDSTEADS.

New York Bomb Thrower Explains How He Operated.

New York, April 7 .- The bomb thrown by Silverstein in Union Square park a week ago last Saturday, following the dispersal by the police of a crowd of New York's unemployed, was made out of a bedstead. This statement was made by Silverstein to an attendant at the hospital where the bomb thrower lies hovering' between life and death.

"I made the bomb from the top of a bedstead. It was a round brass ball and hollow. I bought a quarter of a pound of nails, broke them in half and put them in the ball. I put nitro-glycer ine on top of that and on top of the nitro-glycerine I put some gunpowder. When I got to the park I saw a police man who had beaten me. I put a fuse in the bomb and walked over to the fountain. I had a lighted cigarette in my hand and I tried to touch off the fuse, but in my excitement I put the cigarette in the wrong hole, causing the explosion.

Silverstein said this bomb was the second one he had made but declined to tell when the first one was made or the use to which it was put. Silverstein was said to be much worse last night and he was suffering great pain.

Immigrants to Canada Are Above Average

INSPECTOR'S DECISION

Report That Newcomers Fill Asylums Is Disproved - Canada From Ocean to Ocean.

Toronto, April 7.-Dr. Bryce, Domin ion inspector of immigration, is making an investigation of a statement contained in an Ottawa paper, that of 326 nsane patients committed to the Ottawa asylum last year, 136 were foreign born and a majority of those recent arrivals. Dr. Bryce makes the statement that one out of every 496 immigrants of British birth are deported for some reason, while only one Italian in every 1,600. Last year he says 116 persons were deported out of many thousands that come to Canada.

Toronto, April 7.-The committee appointed to decide whether the Ontario oank actions for about \$2,000,000 against the former directors should be continued, it is understood, will report in favor of proceeding with the acions in view of the decision of the supreme court of Nova Scotia holding the directors of the defunct Bank of Yarmouth responsible to shareholders.

London, April7 .- Percy Minton, who came to Canada from Wales two years ago, is dead as a result of injuries received by a fall from an apple tree on a farm near Belmont a few days after his arrival. He had been in the hospital ever since.

Winnipeg, April 7.-Emma Goldman, the anarchist queen, attempted to re-turn to the United States last night but was stopped at the Manitoba boundary line by immigration officials and returned to Winnipeg. It is said here that she will not again be permitted to enter the United States.

St. Catherines, April 7—A determined effort was made early this morning by three or four men to rob the Imperial Bank of Canada at St. Davies, a village near here. Several strangers came to the village early last night and were seen around town for several hours.
They stole a couple of horses at Doyle's hotel and, breaking open a blacksmith shop, stole tools with which they pried open the front door of the bank. While two men with revolvers stood on guard other blew open the vault. A bank clerk named Hamilton, attracted by the explosion, came up to see what was the matter. He attacked the robbers with stones. They returned his charges with revolvers. The noise of shooting awoke the village and everybody was astir. The robbers were determined, however, and held off the populace, who, being unarmed, stood under cover. When, however, the robbers failed to open the inner door of the vault, they gave up in despair and drove off. It was found afterwards that the inner door of the vault was so badly wrecked that it could be pulled off with the hands. Behind it

Boston Bank Closed.

Boston, April 7.-The National Bank of Republic, one of the latest and best known financial institutions in the city. closed its doors yesterday and its business and assets were liquidated by the National Shawmut bank. The announce-

ceased to exist came as a great surprise to business men. The institution has a capital of \$2,000,000 and deposits of nearly \$15,000,000. No reason is given to the public as to the liquidation of the National Bank of Republic. The of the National Bank of Republic. The transfer of the business of the National Bank of the Republic to the Shawmut bank was done on a cash basis, the Shawmut agreeing to pay a bonus of \$30.50 a share above the liquidation price to the stockholders of the National Bank of the Republic.

AMERICA INTERFERES

Reported Protest Against Attitude of Japan in Manchuria

Tokio, April 7.-Negotiations beween the United States and Russia concerning the administration of affairs at Harbin are being closely watched by Japan. The alarmist newspapers suggest Japanese administration of South Manchuria as the real object of Am erican action. The sensationalists connect the coming of the American fleet with probable future representations concerning South Manchuria.

A Washington special says the government has decided to oppose the action of Russia and Japan in Manchuria A despatch from Harbin quotes Consul Fisher as saving that the American government on its own initiative demands the abandonment of the Japanese present status in Manchuria. Thes telegrams have aroused much comment

The Japanese foreign office, however, refuses to accept the sensationalist view and said to the Associated Press representative that it is not pre pared to believe that the American government is opposed to Japan's present attitude in South Manchuria. It is believed here that the report quoting the Washington officials is not founded on fact and is circulated for the purpose of creating a fresh cause of ill feeling.

BURGLARS IN CALGARY

Cracksmen Caught With Money Stolen From Alberta Laundry-Owner an Old Nelsonite.

Calgary, April 7.-Last night at 11.15 Detective Hardie, of the Calgary police force, with the assistance of P. C. Campbell, arrested Jasper E. Curtis, and Charles Amazon in the rotunda of the Yale hotel as suspects in connec tion with the safe cracking in the Alberta steam laundry which occurred in the early hours of Monday morning. The robbery occurred on Mon day morning but was not discovered until Mr. Templeton reached the office about 6 o'clock. He found the safe lying in pieces all over the floor and a part of the office in a wreck. The police were notified and made a careful earch. It did not take them long to decide that the perpetrators were experts at the job. They had filled every crack in the safe with soap, and had drilled a small hole, put in the explosive and ignited it. Missing from the safe was \$200 in cash and some small checks. When searched at the police station Curtis had \$100 in his pocket while \$100 was found upon Mason. Cur tis claims to come from Chicago, Mason claims he has only been in town one day and came from Winnipeg. BUY BRAZIL'S SHIPS.

British Government Negotiating for Purchase of Two Battleships.

London, April 7.-Interest has been aroused in naval circles by the report that the British admiralty is consider ing the purchase of the two big battle ships now being built in this country for Brazil. It is pointed out that Brazi has no need for two such powerful ships which, in addition to their original cost, will be expensive to maintain. It is certain that Great Britain will buy these vessels, should this be the only way of preventing their falling into the hands of another European power.

Rio Janeiro, April 7.-Information ob tained from an official source today leads to the belief that Italy is ready to seal to the Argentine Republic for \$20,000,000 three battleships. Argentina is thought to be contemplating this increase in her navy to counterbalance the projects of Brazil to augment her strength at sea.

The miners and operators present at the informal conference be tween the miners of the whole central held and the operators of Onio, indiana and Western Pennsylvania were most unanimously in favor of holding a general convention for the purpose of renewing contracts. A committee composed of ten miners and operators was appointed to report to the con was appointed to report to the con-ference this morning, when the session convened. The real work of this com-mittee however is to agree on a date for the general resumption of busi-ness in the central competitive field, pending an interstate settlement. This date will probably be next Monday.

Indianapolis, April 7.—The conference of coal operators of Western Pennsylvannia, Ohio, and Indiana, and representatives of the miners of these three districts and Illinois, adjourned at 11.15 a. m. today after a two hour session. 
