[Continued From Jan. 21.] Forty-one miles east of Mouse w, we reach the beautiful town of Regina, the capital of the Northwest Territories, with a population about ${ }^{2,000}$. It is the home of esses, also, tue government puild ings. A few miles out of build ings. A few miles out of town is
the headquarters of the Mounted Police, numbering about 850 "red ackets."
Regina is a distributing centre or the country north and south, where a ready market is found for kinds of produce. The eleators were taking in wheat quite eely and the threshing machines were boasting of doing extra good ork, one machine having threshed s,oos bushels of oats from Friday time to Saturday noon, in which four tive machine moved three or ome up.
