SURREY COUNCIL.

Council met in the Town Hall, Surrey Centre, June 3rd, the Reeve and all members being present.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS:

From the Mayor & Aldermen of Victoria, an invitation to attend the "Victoria Day" celebration. Received with thanks.

From F. Stanley Spain, a bill for \$10.40 costs searching for Hinze's horses. Received.

From the Mayor of Kamloops asking the opinion of the Council in regard to forming an "Organization" or "Union of Municipalities" and that if the majority favored it, he would arrange with Mayor Kearry to call a meeting to arrange it. Received, Council favor the idea.

On motion the following Resolution to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries was passed: "Whereas, considerable friction exists between loggers and navigators on the Nicomeckl and Serpentine rivers, and as no one seems to have control of same, we would respectfully request that a Harbor Master be appointed at New Westminster for the Fraser river and the navigation of the Nicomeckl and Serpentine rivers be included in his district and under his control; and whereas, the navigable portions of the Nicomeckl and Serpentine rivers are all in Surrey and the question of constructing and maintaining draw bridges is a serious burden, delaying the construction of roads and the development of the country, and as the government is building bridges and wharves in other places; therefore we the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the District of Surrey respectfully request that a grant of \$2,500 be made toward the construction and maintenance of the said draw-bridges; and for this your petitioners ever pray."

From W. Williams, et al, a petition to the council to widen the Blackie Spit road. Received and referred to Coun. Lawrence.

From A. Archibald requesting to have the Liverpool road made passable as he had rented the Patterson ranch for a term of years and that was the only road to it. Received and referred to Coun. Burnett.

From G. Scatter, re water on his land, the N. W. ¼ of Sec. 9 Tp. 8, and opening ditches to remove it. Received.

From W. J. Walker, tendering \$40 each for lots 11 and 12, of subdivision of N. W. ¼ Sec. 19, Tp. 2. Received and on motion accepted, he to pay costs of registration and conveyance.

From Thos. R. Pearson tendering \$40 each for lots 16 and 17 of Subdivision of Sec. 16. B. 5, N. R. 2, W. Received and on motion accepted, he to pay costs of registration and conveyance.

The following appropriations were made:

Ward 2, \$30 for the Hunt road for grading and corduroy; \$100 for the Liverpool road for graveling and corduroy.

Ward 3, \$60 for ditching Johnston road south of McLellan road; Tenders to be called for slashing McInnis road.

Ward 4, \$60 for corduroying C. V. road south Cloverdale, and the Reeve and Coun. Boothroyd were empowered to open tenders for said

Lewis - Clark

Sir H. G. Joly de Lotbiniere, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, Victoria, B. C.

Dear Sir, On behalf of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition, I take pleasure in stating that with a view of doing honor to the great Province of British Columbia and organizing a systematic movement by which the people of the various communities in the Province can, in substantial numbers, arrange to visit and enjoy the manifold educational advantages and other attractions at the Exposition, the Exposition Management has decided to set apart the period commencing Monday, July 3, and ending July 8, as "British Columbia Week." Separate days in the week can be designated by municipalities of the Province for their respective special celebration at the Exposition. A "Dominion of Canada Day" has already been arranged for Saturday, July 1st.

If this plan meets with your approval, we would request the issuance by you of a proclamation a month in advance of the suggested period, calling attention to the people of British Columbia to these auspicious events, and urging every patriotic son and daughter of your great Province to assemble at the Exposition during this time for the purpose of honoring the occasion and by their presence insure the success its importance deserves.

In this connection, permit me to add that the Mayor of each City will be invited direct by the Exposition Management to make appropriate arrangements for the visit of his City's delegation to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition and all are assured of a hearty welcome.

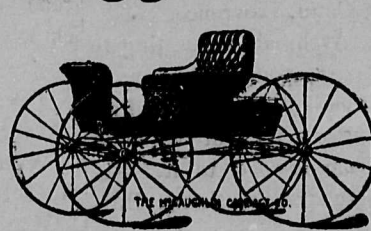

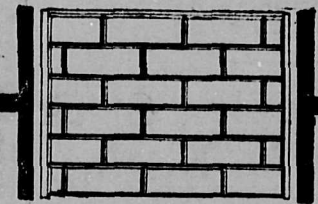

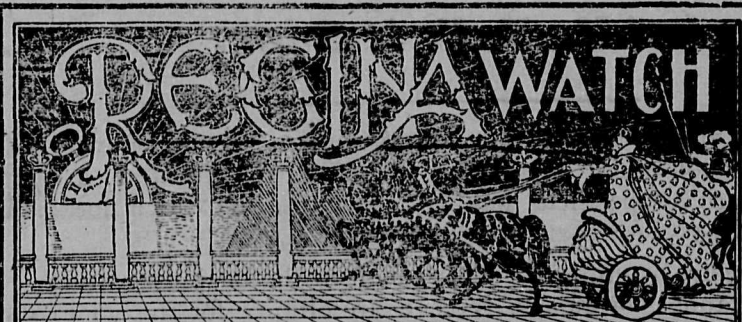
