A LUMBER COMBINE

Alleged Restraint of Trade Here.

PROVINCE ASKS PROTECTION

Opposition Develops From Prominent Lumbermen of East Ontario.

Ottawa, May 5.—Aulay Morrison brought up in the house yesterday the condition of the lumber trade in British Columbia. He said that the prosperity of British Columbia largely depended upon the lumber trade. At present there was stagnation in that business and the remedy to bring about the change lay in the hands of the government.

Rough lumber was admitted free of duty into Canada. That class which was admitted free consisted of 75 per cent of all. If British Columbia wanted to send the same class of lumber into the states it was met with a duty of \$2 per thousand. Not only was this the case but the British Columbia manufacturers had to import his machinery because it could not be got in Canada, and had to pay a duty of 25 per cent. If British Columbia manufacturers tried to get a market in the Northwest and Manitoba for lumber they were met with a 55 per cent rate, which gave that market to the states. It was said that this state of affairs was necessary because the farmers of the Northwest must have cheap lumber. He objected to one part of the country living at the expense of the other. He did so all the more readily because the farmers of the west in a few years made a competency.

Mr Mackle (Renfrew), one of the leading lumbermen of Canada, protested against the imposition of any duty which would give encouragement to a combine which existed in British Columbia, the Northwest and Manitoba. Until that combine existed there were no importations of lumber from the states.

Walter Scott (Regina), approved of what Mr. Mackle said.

R. S. MacPherson (Vancouver), strongly supported Morrison's plan. Any increase in the price of lumber in Manitoba and Northwest territory points went to the wholesale lumbermen in that province, it did not go to British Columbia. There was no combine in British Columbia. The combine was in Manitoba and the Northwest. All that he asked for in this matter was fair play. British Columbia had to pay for protection for the product of the Northwest and therefore the Northwest should not object to extending the same treatment to British Columbia.

Mr. Davis opposed the proposal and blamed the combine for permitting lumber to come from the states.

Minister Fielding promised consideration.

REALLY A VICTORY

Russian Account of the Yalu.

BLOODIEST BATTLE IN HISTORY

Japs Success Eclipsed by the Prowess of Tsar's Soldiers.

St. Petersburg, May 5.—The gloom which prevailed yesterday was almost completely dispelled this morning when the people read the story of the glorious fight made by General Sassulitch against the flower of the Mikado's legions at the Yalu and of the utter defeat of Admiral Togo's new attempt to seal the entrance to Port Arthur.

It is now plain that not more than 8000 Russians were actually engaged in the fighting at the Yalu against the Japanese army of a total strength of between 30,000 and 40,000. Losses on both sides which are expected to reach a 1000 and possibly 1200 in the Russian forces and twice that number for the Japanese, make it one of the bloodiest fights in history.

At the river crossing, the Japanese dead lie piled up literally in heaps, and General Kuroki's success was purchased at such a heavy cost that the Russians are disposed to regard it as rather a defeat than a victory for him.

General Kouropatkin's despatch says that the Russians fought with such bulldog tenacity and bravery against the overwhelming superiority of the enemy that the latter's nominal victory was eclipsed by the prowess of the Tsar's soliders.

St. Petersburg, May 5.—The appointment of Vice Admiral Bezobrazoff to command the first Pacific squadron and Vice Admiral Rojestvensky to command the second squadron are confirmed.

A story is circulated here of a striking episode during the fighting on the Yalu river and the desperate bravery of a Russian regiment which, without artillery, attacked two and one half divisions of Japanese.

The Russians, headed by a chaplain bearing a cross, fought like lions, but were crushed and almost annihilated by overwhelming numbers, the scene after the fight resembling the shambles.

The Highland

Norman Carmichael, in charge of the Highland mine at Ainsworth, said last night that as a result of the work done for the past month 320 tons of concentrates arrived his mine for the Hall mines smelter on Sunday night. This is the largest shipment for a month ever turned out from the mine. "Further than that," said the manager. "I have no comment to make. We are at present employing about 60 men, and all mining operations are proceeding smoothly and satisfactorily."

SLATED FOR SENATOR

Hewitt Bostock May Don Toga.

SENATOR REID DIED YESTERDAY

Will Galliher's Predecessor May Be Called to the Upper House

Vancouver, May 5.—Senator Reid died at his residence here yesterday. He has been ailing some time and was very sick when brought home from Ottawa by Mrs. Reid about ten days ago.

Ottawa, May 5.—News of Senator Reid's death was received here early yesterday morning. Later in the day it was unofficially stated that Hewitt Bostock, ex M. P. for Yale Cariboo, would be his successor.

Mr. Bostock is very highly esteemed here and it is felt in all quarters that his acceptance of the vacant senatorship would not only be beneficial to British Columbia but would strengthen the Liberal party all over Canada.

As a member of parliament he gained an enviable record for probity and close attention to the public. His fearless attitude in all matters pertaining to the public welfare as opposed to corporate interests gaining him a very high place in the estimation of members of the party who appreciate the importance of keeping the big railroad influences within reasonable bounds.

WORKED FOR THE CHURCH.

Enterprising Backslider Holst With Own Petard.

Alaska mines are apparently rich, but the harmless missionary may not exploit them for his own benefit, judging from the tenor of the following despatch from Chicago to the New York World of the 15th ult:

"A board of arbitration has just decided that when a missionary is sent out by a church to save souls and incidentally finds a gold mine, which he partly develops with church funds, the mine belongs to the church."

"The missionary in the case is P. H. Anderson. While in Alaska two Esquimaux showed him the mine. He stopped preaching and began digging gold."

"The arbitrators further commanded Mr. Anderson to turn over to the mission \$232,200, said to have been realized from the working of the mines since 1898, and also rendered judgment for \$26,000 against C. W. Johnson, of the White Star Mining Company."

"The Evangelical Lutheran church is the organization to which Anderson must turn over the money."

Silver is 54½ at New York.

Lead is quoted at £12 on the London market.

Colonel Younghusband has resumed his march on Lhasa.

The reorganization of the Sault works is practically completed.

Two parties have left Ottawa for the survey of the Alaskan Boundary.

The Mexican government has purchased the Vera Cruz and Pacific railroad.

The natives of Manchuria are rising on the Russians and cutting off stragglers.

The Russian generals are recriminating as to whose fault was the loss of the Yalu battle.

The plumbers and steam fitters of Montreal have been locked out. Five hundred men are idle.

It is said that the North German Lloyd have sold of the steamers of their line to the Japanese.

Togo reports that Port Arthur is finally bottled up. The Russians are occupied drawing the cork.

The Chinese are uproarious over the victory gained by the Japs and General Ma says it will be difficult to hold his men back.

The Russians admit to have lost 2000 men and 40 officers out of the 11th regiments alone during the battle of the Yalu.

No medals are to be given to the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles, nor to those of the 2nd Rifles who served twice in South Africa.

The Russians attribute their defeat to the masked position of the Japanese batteries which did not declare themselves until exactly the right moment.

The lamas of Lhasa have for years past elected a boy to the position of Grand Lama and then murdered him as soon as he was old enough to govern for himself.

It seems that the Chinese Amban, the representative of Chinese authority, never dares to approach Lhasa unless escorted by a force at least equal to that of Colonel Younghusband's.

ACHIN.

There has been a continual little war waged in Achin, or more properly Aceh, since the sixties, between the inhabitants and the Dutch with little or no success on the side of the latter. The Dutch are in possession of a portion of the northwest coast, but the southwest coast and all the interior, is still in the hands of natives. At the extreme point is Achin Head where all passing vessels as they enter or leave the Straits of Malacca are reported to Lloyd's. This station is in charge of the English, and has never been molested by the Achinese, who desire nothing better than British control. Our local contemporary stated yesterday morning that the Dutch had killed a number of Javanese in their capture of Jenton, which is a fortified mountain in some 3000 feet in height, near the northwest coast. This is a geographical mistake arising from the telegram, on which the assertion was based, coming from Batavia, which is the capital of Java, and also the capital of all the Dutch possessions in the East Indies, running from the Philippines to Achin Head, some 2000 to 3000 miles apart. Batavia's position is about central. The Javanese, however, have little in common with the Achinese. Java has some ancient pretensions to civilization—the Achinese none. However, they are a race of brave fighters. The Imperial Dutch army has nothing to do with the reduction of Achin. A colonial army is recruited, principally in Java, and all kinds of inducements, not too strictly moral, are offered beach-combers, i. e. "Happy Hooligans" of the East to go and fight the Achinese.

The Dutch East Indies lies south of the Straits of Malacca, the British possessions to the north of those straits. Up till 1824 the Dutch held Malacca on the north side of the Straits between Penang and Singapore, and the British held Achin on the south side. An exchange was made without consulting the natives of either Malacca or Achin. The Malays of Malacca had no objection to British rule, and Malacca is a pretty little place just now completely overshadowed by its near neighbor, Singapore and is generally known as "Sleepy Hollow" by the bustling people of the other Straits Settlements. Behind it is Mount Ophir where Solomon is said to have sent his ships when building the Temple at Jerusalem. Whether that is true or not Malacca is very anciently known and very quiet.

The Dutch did not try to make much of Achin till the Sumatran tobacco fields were discovered. These adjoin the Achinese mountains, and an effort for the submission of the Achinese was made. The Achinese refused and are still refusing. They have constantly asked for a resumption of the British sovereignty as the price of their submission to the white men and

at one time they seized the captain and crew of the British ship Nisero, wrecked upon their coasts. The captain's wife was with the prisoners, who were kindly treated in the mountain fastnesses in the interior. The idea was to embroil the Dutch with the English. This did not succeed and, on the British threatening to make common cause with the Dutch, the crew of the Nisero were surrendered. But the fighting has now been going on for nearly forty years and seems likely to go on for forty more.

THE MORRISSEY MINES

Close Down Temporarily
and No Reason is
Assigned

Nelson, May 5.—The last issue of the Morrissey Despatch contained the following:

"The mines here, as also at the other collieries, Coal Creek and Michel are practically closed down at present. The reason why the Great Northern are not taking any more coal is not made public, but it is surmised that there is something going on beneath the surface, perhaps the use of pressure to accomplish a purpose.

"It is well known now that the coal at Morrissey is excellent and just what Hill wants. Is he after the ownership or control of the colliery?

"How long the shut down will continue is not known, but indications point to some weeks of it. Work on the company's cottages and coke ovens, continues, however, and it is shown in a number of ways that this camp will be going ahead as expected this summer, in fact, there is reason to believe the company intend building fifty more cottages here, which, if true, is an evidence that they expect a great many men here.

"We are assured of the excellent quality of coke turned out here, and have been informed that the ovens here, of different build to Michel and Coal Creek, are superior and most satisfactory. A thorough test of the ovens at each colliery is to be made at once, and, as the construction work on those at Michel is stopped, the result of this test may be depended upon to decided whether the work of that build will continue or not.

"Something definite is regard to the recent surprise will doubtless be learned soon."

Taking advantage of Managing Director Lindsey's presence in town yesterday the Daily News enquired of him what there was in the foregoing rather pessimistic statement of affairs at the Crow's Nest coal fields.

Mr. Lindsey stated that there was nothing unusual in progress at the collieries. It suited the company to close down at Morrissey at this time and consequently they did so. The mines will be working again shortly. As to the talk of J. J. Hill attempting to secure control of the collieries, Mr. Lindsey intimates that is all moonshine. J. J. Hill has no control of the collieries in any way and does not seek to get control.

Mr. Lindsey left for Fernie this morning.
