BOUNDARY MINES

Shipments for Past Week
and Year to Date.

GOLDEN CROWN AGAIN SHIPS

Growing Prosperity of Wellington
Camp—Steady Output From
Phoenix.

Phoenix, Feb. 1.—Shipments of ore from the Boundary for last week totalled 7824 tons, or 28,210 tons this year. This week's shipments are as follows: Granby mines 4558 tons, Mother Lode 3056 tons, Winnipeg 30 tons, Golden Crown 180 tons. The two Boundary smelters treated this week 3094 tons of ore, as follows: Granby smelter 5070 tons, Mother Lode smelter 3024 tons.

After more than a year of inactivity in this regard the Golden Crown mine in the Wellington camp, near Phoenix, has rejoined the list of Boundary shippers. Shipments of ore have been started part going to the Granby smelter and part to the Greenwood smelter. Thus far some four or five cars have been sent out and shipments will probably be maintained with a greater or less degree of frequency for the time being. The ore now being shipped is taken from the new development work at the 100 foot level and no stopping has been done. At this level Superintendent Duncanson has a force of men drifting in a good quality of ore for some time past, which work is being continued.

CLUTE'S GREATEST BREAK IS MYSTERIOUS

Dismissed Ingram Last Year and
Now Puts Him Back.

RAMPANT RING RULE IN ROSSLAND

Public Indignation Over the Walker-Ingram-Clute
Deal—A Shameful Transaction—The Mayor's
Friends Promptly Repudiate Him.

Ingram reinstated chief of police.

Ingram! who was dismissed from office in disgrace less than a year ago, by the police commissioners, of whom "Jack" Clute was one.

Ingram! who Mr. Clute declared less than year ago, was an impossible official for fifty different reasons, any one of which was sufficient for his removal.

Ingram, Walker and Clute, three of a kind.

Naturally people are frightfully indignant, but what else did they expect when they elected the "ring" candidate.

"Are we here for our health or—"

Poor Sergeant McPhee after years of office was not allowed even to tender his resignation, and one can imagine Frank J. Walker's joy when, as the board of new police commissioners, he informed the sergeant very curtly yesterday afternoon, that his services were no longer required. "The push" don't condescend to mere "reasons". The job is wanted for a better man and out you go.

The appointment of one of the War Eagle detective force was a

pleasant compliment to the union, doubtless, and we wish the new policeman joy of his job.

An outrageous and a shameful job? Of course it is, but what have the public got to do with such matters—damn the people.

Rossland is going to have a whole souled civic administration this year beyond a doubt. People who remember Mayor Scott and all that has happened here during and since Mayor Scott's term of office, are respectfully requested to watch carefully the unfolding of the ring policy.

You are getting your first taste of it now. Do you like it? Was it for this you elected honest, manly Jack Clute? Was it for this that you were hoodwinked and befooled into supporting some one else's tool? Well, you have elected Mr. Clute and you shall have a year's dose of ring rule and possibly next January you will be properly prepared to tar and feather any "closed door" candidate the ring may offer you, but in the meantime take your medicine with the best grace you can, and oh! support the mayor, for he needs your support very, very badly.

THE VOICE OF LABOR

Keep Out Chinese Cheap
Labor, Say Railroad
Employees.

Washington, Feb. 1.—The hearing on Chinese exclusion was continued today before the committee on foreign affairs. H. R. Fuller, in behalf of the Brotherhood of Railway Employees, spoke in favor of strict exclusion. He said the objection to the Chinese from the labor standpoint was that they came in to competition with American workmen, the Chinese having such habits of cheap living that they work for wages which respectable American workmen could not afford to take.

Andrew Furuseth, of the Seamen's union, San Francisco, gave the extent of Chinese labor on the Pacific coast, showing that they practically monopolized the labor field in the salmon canning industry and were competing with American labor in cigarmaking, tailoring, laboring and many other branches. He said the Chinese workers in these cases accepted wages so much lower than the white man that the former secured

the work. Mr. Furuseth said the labor organizations would not be satisfied with any bill which did not protect American workmen from Chinese coming from the Philippines as well as from China.

The Verdict of the Coroner's Jury.

HOW WAS HOLCOMB KILLED?

Mine Management Exonerated From
All Blame—The Evidence
Tendered.

The jury on the coroner's inquest on the death of Peter Holcomb came to a verdict last night, which while it exonerated the management of the mine, threw little light upon the exact manner in which the unfortunate miner came to an end.

It would seem by the story told by Foreman Tippet, Electrician McVicar and the hoist engineer, Trembath, that the deceased had been working in the shaft during the noon hour, but at a quarter to one he had come to the hoist engineer and stated he was through with the skip. Nothing further is known of his movements up to the time his body was found, still warm.

After the deceased had warned Trembath that he was done with the skip, it was used in hoisting timbers. On the third trip the skip was accompanied by the foreman and electrician; it was then that the body was discovered. Whether the deceased had first fell down the shaft, into which he had evidently entered after reporting his work closed, or whether he had been hit by the skip while leaning through the ladder way to oil the rollers and so was precipitated down the incline, will probably never be known. In either way the accident could have happened. The gloves and candle of the deceased were found on the 300 foot level. All the injuries were found to be on the right side of the body. There was a severe wound on the head, the right leg was fractured and the neck broken.

After viewing the body and deciding that no autopsy was necessary, the jury was taken to the scene of the accident, and then being on the ground took the evidence of the mine employees, adjourning till this evening for any further evidence to the city hall where the verdict was recorded.

THE "SEDIMENT."

The first official acts of Police Commissioners Clute and Walker, have been to re-instate ex-Chief Ingram as chief of the Rossland police force, to discharge Sergeant McPhee and Policeman Macdonald, and to appoint a private detective from the War Eagle force to a position on the city police.

The "reorganization" of the force as carried out yesterday, is merely another result of the election of John Stillwell Clute.

Rossland people who supported Mr. Clute's candidature, say that they cannot understand his present attitude and they are extremely outspoken in condemning in the most unqualified terms, the whole of this outrageous job.

It is an outrage, of course, and those who looked for a decent record from "Jack" Clute have good reasons for speaking as plainly as they do, but what else could they expect? Mr. Clute was quietly pushed upon the people at the celebrated "closed door" meeting by the ring which rules the city at the present time. Every one at all conversant with the way these matters are regulated, must have been quite aware last month of the prospect in store for us all. It is true that many who gave Mr. Clute a reluctant support, fancied he would do his best to give us "clean, honest and conservative" city government. Are they satisfied now?

Mr. Clute is a weakling at best and as mayor of Rossland, is merely a tool in the hands of an unscrupulous gang of ringsters as exist in Canadian civic circles today.

Less than twelve months ago, Ingram, who is now Rossland's chief of police, was dismissed from the force in disgrace, by the then board of police commissioners, of whom Clute was one, Messrs. Lalonde and Goodeve comprising the rest of the board.

Of the three commissioners last year Mr. Clute was foremost in insisting on Ingram's dismissal and he gave to his friends fifty reasons why it was impossible to retain the services of the man he yesterday reinstated in office. Was the World not fairly within the mark when it described Jack Clute as a weak, good natured man? Weak! why he is a jelly fish, pure and simple, and at the first opportunity he has proved it.

The Honorable Thomas Mayne Daly, K. C., is commonly credited with being the power which obtained the appointment of Frank J. Walker and the reinstatement of the former discharged chief of police. Is he the man? We did not know that Mr. Daly went in for Tammany politics, but if he is the gentleman who is really responsible for all this pretty piece of business, the public should know it, and at once.

It is quite unnecessary to waste any time over Mr. Clute, as he simply obeys orders. The public wants to know the man who is behind the civic "push" at the present moment and when they do know him they can be left to deal with him as he deserves.

Alderman Hamilton's absence from the board yesterday, does not in any way absolve him from the responsibility of the "reorganization." The community had a right to expect something different from a man of Mr. Hamilton's standing, and he may be quite sure that his position on the board

will not be overlooked in the future.

The whole affair is such a shameless piece of business, that we are not surprised at the indignation it has evoked. An indignation, be it well noted, that comes largely from the element, which elected Mr. Clute two short weeks ago.

Only a tenderfoot would have defined a wide open town as one where "crime and criminals of all sorts are the permanent factors." The Whiner was not happy in its definition.

The Whiner says this morning that "the installation of Mr. Ingram will meet with the approval of a vast majority of the citizens." The statement is false, and false to the knowledge of the Whiner.

If Alderman and Police Commissioner Hamilton wants to test public opinion over the Ingram and Walker deal let him resign his position on the city council and run for ward one again—if he dares. Even if the labor people abstained from voting he could not be re-elected.

"The changes in the police force will doubtless come as a surprise to many citizens who have not followed the trend of events closely during past six months. The Miner does not propose to discuss the changes further, beyond stating that the commissioners had ample justification for their desire to improve the local police system by sweeping changes."—This morning's Rossland's Whiner. Pretty, is it not?

IN LABOR DISPUTES

A New Scheme for Ontario--Details of the Plan.

A new scheme for conciliation in labor disputes has been introduced in the Ontario legislature. It is called a conciliation and arbitration act, and provides that upon the request of the mayor, or other head of a municipality, in which a lockout or a strike is threatened, the secretary of the provincial labor bureau shall forthwith proceed to such point and use his best endeavors with both parties concerned to avert the threatened strike or lockout. Whatever else may be said of this suggestion it must be conceded that it has one very important advantage over somewhat similar enactments which vest the initiative in provincial government executives. If the bill before the Ontario legislature is given force of law it may be accepted as assured that in the event of threatened trouble its merit will at least be put to the test. This is more than can be said for any enactments in which provincial authorities alone were vested with authority to set the legislative machinery in motion. The first thought that comes to most provincial ministers, in event of industrial troubles, is the ordering out of the militia. British Columbia as well as other provinces has found out by experience, that difficult as it may be to secure the passage of conciliation and arbitration acts, it is easy compared with the difficulty of forcing administrations up to the point of putting them into effect when conditions are such as to require them. —Nelson Tribune.
