MACKINTOSH IS FAVORITE

Conservative Convention Today In Nelson.

NOMINATION FOR THE DOMINION

C. W. McAnn, the Delegate From Kaslo, Is the Strongest Competitor for Honors With the Rossland Man.

Nelson, Jan. 6.—"Yes sir, I am here with my friend, Mr. Orde, to attend the Conservative convention tomorrow, but you know me, I am not canvassing for any nomination, nor will I lift a finger to get it."

This was the way Hon. C. H. Mackintosh, of Rossland, greeted the Daily News man last night at the Strathcona, just after his arrival at 11:30 o'clock.

Nelson is full of Conservatives today for the Dominion nominating convention of Kootenay, comprising nine provincial parliament districts, which opened in the board of trade rooms this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The Hon. Robert F. Green, chief commissioner of lands and works, was one of the first of the delegates to arrive.

Differing from most of his fellow delegates, Ex-Governor Mackintosh, bright and cheery as ever, made no secret of his own position. His name has already been mentioned very prominently for the party nomination, but the ex-governor will make no effort to capture it.

C. W. McAnn, of Kaslo, who is presumably another favorite for the nomination, is being backed by his supporters.

THE VOTERS' LIST.

It is stated sometimes that there are fewer people in the camp today than there were a year ago. It is hard to see on what such a statement is based, for if reference is made to the school attendance, a fair criterion, the reverse would seem to be the case. The voters list this year, a still better criterion, shows upwards of 141 names more than last. Of course there are many of these absentees, but such was the case last year. The mines put out about 12 per cent more ore this year than last, and the voters list shows just about the same increase in the number of voters. More ore cannot well be put out by fewer men. Nelson with 20 per cent less of a population than Rossland, according to the voters list, is making a much bigger noise than is Rossland. But her citizens hang together.

THE SISTERS' HOSPITAL.

The Sisters Hospital, the only institution of the kind that we have in Rossland, is in need of funds. A sacred concert is being arranged by Mrs. Fitz-Patrick which, if well patronized, as is likely, will help out. The Municipal Reform party have also a political method of helping. They wish to raise a campaign fund which, if not used, in the event of their ticket being returned by acclamation, will be turned over to the Sisters. It is not every day that charitable institutions get help of such a nature and, indeed, the scheme is certainly novel. The Sisters Hospital has done such excellent work for Rossland, that one way or another it is to be hoped that they will get all the financial assistance which they desire.

THE CASUS BELLI.

It is not always that a nation waits for the formal declaration of war by its opponent before attempting to strike the first blow. If Japan thinks that by allowing the Russian fleet in her waters to be so strengthened by delay, that Japan would have a smaller chance afterwards, that country would probably be justified, under international precedent, if not law, in striking before the answer to her note arrived, especially if she was of the opinion that that answer would be unfavorable, and was only being delayed in order to further the interests of Russia. Still, as Japan is probably desirous of carrying the good will of the Western world with her and of observing, on this account, every possible punctilio, it is probable that the answer to the Japan note will be formally awaited.

THE WAR SCARE.

It is thought by some Rosslanders that a war between Russia and Japan, in which it is possible that

China and Great Britain may each take a hand, is likely to be inimical to the interests of the mining industry. Such, however, would not seem likely to be the case. For supposing that the Empire were at war, Canada would be untouched. Russia has not the fleet that can menace the Dominion. The immense superiority of the British navy would practically clear the ocean of vessels flying the Muscovite flag. Besides this consideration the nations at war would require an enormous amount of provisions and munitions of war, clothing, etc., which directly and indirectly would help all producing countries, especially those which are nearest to the seat of war. The effect of war is greatly to increase the spending of money by the nations involved. It is after war that these payments in excess of income must be met, and it is then that the markets are correspondingly curtailed.

As to the effect upon investment of capital that would rather tend to the advantage of the mining industry than the reverse. Much money that is being put into shipping would perforce lie idle or find a new place for energy which would not be interfered with by the war. And what better place could be found than in Kootenay?

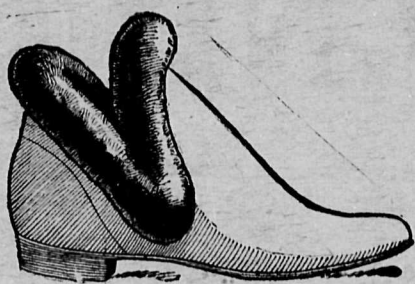
FADS.

Others that a diet should be only of fruits and nuts (it is hardly apparent why not raw meat and uncooked vegetables.) It is useless for physiologists to point out that the teeth show man to be carnivorous as well as graminivorous. The faddists have their catholicon and preach it in and out of season. And so the list could be indefinitely extended and then would require daily additions whether the subject were religion or morals or manners or clothing or habits. 10. The prompt collection of all taxes, water rates and city revenues.

VOTERS ARE CLAMORING

Revision Takes Place Too Late

LODGERS TO BE DISFRANCHISED

Committee of Officials Hard At Work During the Present Afternoon

At half past two this afternoon the following officials gathered together in the city offices to revise the voters list: Returning Officer McQueen, City Solicitor Nelson, Mayor Dean and Alderman Armstrong. Tom Long and George Heron were onlookers at the play.

It seems that under the bylaw all voters who have not paid their water rates or road taxes can be struck off. It is true that during 1901 a bylaw was passed exempting such disability but it is claimed that that only applied for that year. Further all lodgers are doubtful voters. Lodgers are defined by the city solicitor to be those people who do not lease a room or rooms in a separate house. People living in hotels who are liable to be changed from room to room are lodgers. People who live in a lodging house where they lease a room or set of rooms having separate entrances and exits are not, inasmuch as they are capable of being distrained for rent.

It is probable that the names struck off will be published or stuck up some where tomorrow. An application can be made as late as Friday. Judge Forin will be in town for chambers on Friday morning and application by disqualified voters can be made to him at the Courthouse or to the Police Magistrate at any time with in his office hours.

There is a great deal of strong comment current at the revision of the list which, it is declared, if attempted, should have been done not later than January 2, instead of January 6. The delay has meant that quite a number of voters will have no opportunity to challenge the decision arrived at this afternoon.
