## NEW SIXTEEN TO ONE

Concentration on the Le Roi No. 2.

IS TREATING FOUR DOLLAR ORE

Loss Per Ton is Trifling—Oil Used is Reduced to a Minimum.

The second ordinary general meeting of the Canadian Ore Concentration, Limited, took place on February 22 at Salisbury House, London Wall. Mr. Ernest E. Sawyer, who presided, said that the royalties from orders already placed and now being executed should, as soon as they came into force, meet the company's expenditure. Any fresh orders would therefore, represent profits, and these, though not yet in sight, could not be very far off. The Le Roi No. 2 decided upon the erection of a two-unit plant to treat 50 tons daily. The opinion on its working was set forth in the report of that company, and, though favorable, did the barest justice to the plant. Of course, only when a plant of, say eight or ten units, was erected, treating suitable ore of \$7 or \$8, instead of \$4, as at present, could the full advantage of the process be obtained.

Mr. Stanley Elmore had spent several weeks in Canada, with very satisfactory results to the company. Orders have been secured for the White Bear mine at Rossland, the Massey mine in Ontario, and others are in negotiation for plants. If the number of plants in operation increased in proportion to what had been done within the last few months, the company should soon be in a prosperous condition. Mr. Elmore added that with the permission of Lord Ernest Hamilton, chairman of the Le Roi No. 2, he was able to give the result of the working of the plant at that mine. The oil loss was 103 gallons per ton of ore treated; there was a concentration of sixteen tons into one; the final tailings assay was three-fourths of a dwt. of gold, and less than 1/2 oz of silver per ton and one-tenth of one per cent. of copper, which must be regarded as being extremely satisfactory. The report was unanimously adopted.

In regard to the experimental plant erected for Le Roi No. 2 at Rossland, the chairman was able to state that \$2 per ton should be the very outside cost of working, even at such an expensive place as Rossland, and with the present small plant. With regard to the oil consumption, although it was originally estimated at 1 1/2 gals. per ton, since the works have started it has been reduced to very slightly over 1 gallon.

To show the advantages which are gained by increasing the plant the inventor stated that with a 6 or 8 unit plant, oil, royalty, all charges should not greatly exceed 3s. per ton. The adoption on a

## AN AFFAIR OF OUTPOSTS

Russian Column Driven in Near Pingyang.

## RUSSIAN REINFORCEMENTS SLOW

Yet More Troops for the Invasion of Korea and Manchuria Are Being Sent Forward.

Shanghai, March 11.—Japanese merchants here anticipate a battle at an early date upon the Yalu. They declare that the Japanese will have at least 200,000 men to confront the Russians who cannot number half that strength. The Russian statement that 3000 troops are being sent daily from the west is utterly discredited. According to recent accounts the railway is unable to bear the strain of despatching four trains daily and troops are over a month on the journey from Moscow to Manchuria, a distance of 5000 miles. The best the Russians can do is to average 400 men daily and bring the proper supplies of food, ammunition, horses and artillery. At this rate it would take nine months for the Russians to equal the present Japanese army already landed.

Yinkow, March 11.—The ice is already showing signs of breaking up and Newchwang will be open to attack from the Japanese within the next week or so.

Port Dalny, March 11.—The Japanese made another determined torpedo boat attack last evening, but were driven off with loss.

Tokio, March 11.—A second army is being prepared which will consist of 50,000 men. It is thought that this is destined for Possiet Bay but no accurate news has leaked out.

Seoul, March 11.—Reports from Pingyang state that another Russian column has been driven in and has fallen back upon Wiju. An advance from Chensampo is threatening the flank of the Russian forces in Northern Korea.

Newchwang, March 11.—It is now thought that the Yalu river will be free from ice by March 15. Many correspondents are here, awaiting permission to go to the front but so far the Russians commandant has declined to discuss the question.

Col. Leo Nekhe, the Norwegian aide to Gen. Yuan Shai Kai, of the Chinese Imperial army, who was granted permission by Admiral Alexeieff to accompany the Russian advance, is still here, and it begins to look as though Russia would not permit China to have a representative with the Russian army in the field. All accounts agree that the Russians are commandeering all of the available Chinese railway cars and are using them to carry troops to the mobilization grounds near the Yalu river.

Paris, March 11.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris cables that he has had an interview with Finance Minister Kohovisoff, who declared that the issue of the war was not doubtful. The minister said that, even assuming the most unfavorable hypothesis, the vital resources of the country will not be touched. The expenditure, he said, must not be compared with Great Britain's enormous expenditure in South Africa. Russia will not have to buy \$76,000,000 worth of horses abroad. The most that will be spent in this direction will be \$2,000,000, and it is all to be spent within the empire. Similarly the cost of transporting the troops will not go out of the empire, but will swell the receipts of the state railroads.

The minister denied that there was any danger of panicky withdrawals from the savings banks, and said that the greater risk of panic would be among the foreign holders of Russian securities, but, he added, these foreign holders appear to be reassured by the events of the past few weeks.

## WESTERN FEDERATION

Elects New Officers for the Ensuing Year and Adjourns

Nelson, March 11.—The annual convention of district No. 6, of the Western Federation of Miners, which has been in session since Tuesday, finished its labors yesterday and adjourned.

A large list of routine business was transacted yesterday, the publication of which would not be interesting to the public.

The convention elected officers as follows: president, E. Mills, of Greenwood; vice-president, Frank Phillips, of Nelson; secretary-treasurer, A. Shilland, of Sandon.

It was decided to hold the next annual meeting in Nelson.

The delegates to the convention speak enthusiastically of the many courtesies shown them by the people of Nelson. They also desire to return thanks to Rev. E. H. Holman and to those who assisted him in the reception tendered them on Tuesday evening in the Congregational church.

## LATEST TELEGRAPH BULLETINS

The Doings of Conspicuous Persons Affecting Canadian Interests.

The Pacific coast has been visited by a severe storm.

All able bodied men over 18 are told to report for the Russian army.

Lord Roseberry has attacked Premier Balfour in the House of Lords.

Six Jews have been shot for trying to escape the sweeping Russian conscription.

The French are perfecting their coast defenses to be prepared in the event of war.

A. W. Puttee has been chosen unanimously as delegate for Winnipeg for the Labor party.

Russia is threatening China because of her massing troops along the Manchurian frontier.

The soft coal workers are asked to accept a slight reduction in wages offered in the Eastern States.

It is declared that the Abbe Loise will be excommunicated by the Vatican for his methods of Biblical criticism.

It is rumored that Commander Booth-Tucker of the Salvation Army in Canada, will shortly retire to London to take up literary work.

Shortage of provisions in Southern Manchuria is compelling the Russians to move all reserve troops possible to the main line at Kirin and Harbin.

The Amur is open to attack along its entire length as the Russians have neglected to provide gunboats to defend the reaches of that river.

It is reported that the Siberian railway can only send four trains each way daily and that the journey speed of these is from 70 to 200 miles per diem.

The Grand Trunk Railway put up its deposit at Ottawa yesterday of \$5,000,000, a guarantee of its building the transcontinental railway.

## ANGLO SAXON ALLIANCE.

It is sometimes stated that the dollar is the only ideal in the United States and that being the case, as it is evident that the nation which keeps out of a general war and sells the combatants the necessities they want is going to make money rapidly, the United States would be foolish to join in were even the Empire involved and thought likely to be worsted. Recently the Seattle Post-Intelligencer shows that these ignoble motives were not in accordance with its views. Now the P. I. is not Anglophile. Recently the Victoria City Council boycotted Seattle merchants owing to the unfriendly spirit shown by its press. The New York Sun follows suit. Both papers are Anglophobe, the latter particularly so. Both papers, however, are among the leading few of the Union. This is what the Sun says: "A coalition of Russia, France and Germany against England is, of course conceivable. In that event should England lack an ally, her sixty-three battleships would be decidedly outnumbered by those of her opponents. The balance would be redressed, however, if, in her hour of peril, England could count on the assistance of either the United States or Japan. It would scarcely be for the interest of either of the last mentioned powers to remain an impassive spectator of England's defeat upon the ocean. For two reasons: first, because the United States and Japan could not hope to withstand the new maritime triple alliance in either the Atlantic or the Pacific; and, secondly, because, if England were beaten disastrously at sea she would almost certainly be subjected to invasion. The invasion and conquest of the British Isles would mean for the civilized world irreparable calamity."

## WAR EAGLE DEPORT.

One or two friends of the War Eagle have doubted the accuracy of the criticism published in yesterday's WORLD. Premising that that the WORLD has nothing to say against the War Eagle mine, which it has reason to believe will yet be a great shipper, the critique made is wholly based upon the report. The report states that the gross smelter value of the ore is \$9.87. It then explicitly states that the cost of freight and treatment is \$4.58, the cost of stoping \$2.82, cost of development 44 cents. Inferentially it can be gathered that the cost of depreciated machinery took 63 cents, unaccounted for items 91 cents, and net profit 51 cents. If these various items are added together the gross smelter value of \$9.87 is totalled. Some of the items are explicitly stated, the others can easily be deducted. The mine makes a total profit over expenditure of \$68,000 in round figures. Out of this \$38,000 are written off for depreciation of machinery, which amounts to 63 cents

per ton, the results obtained by dividing \$38,000 by the total tonnage marketed, viz: 60,093 tons, which is the amount stated in the report itself. The balance, 51 cents per ton, is that which is arrived at by dividing the balance of \$30,000 odd by tonnage. If these figures are added together it will be found that they total \$8.96. The other 91 cents between what is here accounted for and the price the report states was got for the ore does not figure in the report. In the profit and loss account there are certain expenditures aggregated which may or may not have been included in the charges for mining. There is nothing to show that they were. They might have been expended in any direction.

The point of the matter is that other mines are paying on just such ore, and so is the War Eagle. The War Eagle pays a profit because it has brought down its development charges to 44 cents on each ton of ore marketed. If it continues to do this it will pay in any case. If it cannot keep the development down to this mark, and its other charges remain the same under the same management, it can only pay by getting the difference either out of the profit of 51 cents per ton, out of the 91 cents unaccounted for directly, or out of 63 cents chargeable against depreciated machinery by buying machinery which will not deteriorate so as to have to be written off one-fifth in value in one year.

## A NEW HENDRYX MILL

Republic Camp Can Now Produce 1000 Tons of Ore Daily.

Republic, Wash., March 11—Now that it is demonstrated, after many thousands of dollars spent in experiments and in plants, that the Hendryx process is perhaps better suited to the reduction of the ores of Republic and vicinity than any other that has been so far tried, the entire section feels that a new area of prosperity will set in for the camp. The news of the success of the method has spread and a number of mining men from adjoining mining centres in British Columbia and Washington have come here to examine the plant in which the method is being used with a view to adopting it in other places. Dr. W. A. Hendryx in a recent interview stated that in treating the ore of the Mountain Lion he used only .964 of a pound of cyanide of potassium to the tons of ore. This, he says, is less quantity than he had anticipated using, and the average duration of the treatment was only eight hours. Dr. Hendryx says that sulphides of iron, copper, lead, etc., would offer no obstacles to the treatment under his method. It is claimed with the expense of mining and treatment not exceeding \$4 to \$6 per ton that Republic and vicinity can produce about 1000 tons of ore per day, and that there is no chance for diminution of this quantity for several years to come.

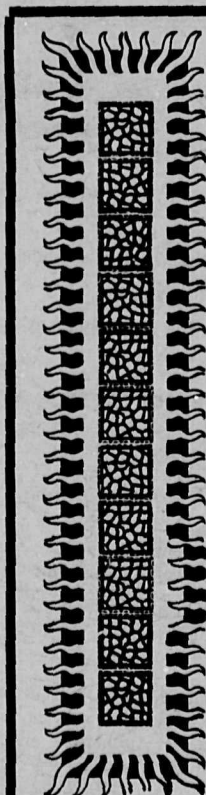
