## HAS STOLEN DOCUMENT

Leader Borden Creates a Sensation.

### LAURIER AND FIELDING FURIOUS

Apparently Do Not Deny the Accuracy of Blair's Private Notes.

Ottawa, April 18.—In the House of Commons, on Saturday, R. L. Borden, Leader of the Opposition, made an explanation as to the charge against him by M. K. Cowan on Thursday night, that he (Borden) gave to the house quotations from a stolen document, namely Mr. Blair's private and confidential memorandum to his colleagues on the railway policy and the Grand Trunk Pacific project.

Borden said it was placed in his hands by one who was not a confident of the Government, who was not either a member of the Government or a civil servant. It was not stolen.

Laurier said that the man who might have given it to Borden may not have stolen it, but who gave it to him? It was certainly stolen by some one, as members of the Government were not going to violate their oath of office to give it out. Fielding said that Borden was in the position of a man with stolen goods in his possession and it was up to him to explain where he got it.

## FLOODS IN THE EAST

Danger From St. Lawrence Over At Montreal

Montreal, April 18.—The water in the St. Lawrence is gradually receding and all danger of flood is now thought to be over. Verdun is still under water, but it is expected to go down as soon as the river reaches its normal level. Low-lying places on the south side of the St. Lawrence, which were flooded yesterday, are now clear of water.

A large proportion of the Grand Trunk tracks between Montreal and Lacolle, on the south side of the St. Lawrence, are under water and trains are using the Canada Atlantic Railway from Lacolle. Junction is made with the Grand Trunk main line for Montreal.

### The Law Takes Its Course

Ottawa, April 18.—The capital case of Clement Goyette, now in L'Original jail awaiting to be executed for the murder of a farmer, John Corrigan, and his son at Alfred, Ont., will come before the cabinet today or tomorrow. There will be no interference. The law will take its course.

## MORE RUSSIAN DISASTERS

Rumored Sinking of Battleship Sevastopol.

## CANARDS TOLD AT ST. PETERSBURG

Cheering the Hearts of Russian People—Frightful Sanitary Conditions Obtaining at Harbin.

St. Petersburg, April 18.—Unconfirmed rumors of the sinking of the battleship Sevastopol and another vessel off Port Arthur today occasioned fresh dismay and for a time the populace was almost panic stricken by what appeared to be a continued run of disasters.

Later in the day official denials were made of these rumors and whilst this relieved to some extent the public anxiety, there is still a feeling that more bad news may be anticipated at any moment.

London, April 18.—There has been no confirmatory report received here of the Standard's St. Petersburg's correspondent's report that a Japanese force of 12,000 men had been driven back to their ships whilst attempting to land to the westward of the Yalu river.

It is believed here that the report was simply circulated in the Russian capital to stem the tide of depression that has set in among all classes.

St. Petersburg, April 18.—The terrible sanitary condition of Harbin, which will lead to an epidemic is revealed in a despatch to the Novosti. The matter is of particular importance in view of the fact that Harbin is the centre of Russian military and civil authority in Manchuria.

All troops pass through this point, and all provisions and medical supplies are brought there. An arrangement has been made for Harbin to become the first station for the sick and wounded during the war. During a dry spring or summer, and peaceful conditions in the territory last year, there were cases of cholera and typhoid, and further development of which was stopped by the November frosts.

The chief source of contagion is the dirty water of the Sanguari river, and the shallow wells, which are located in unsanitary places. Another source of contagion is that the ground filth of the winter had not been disposed of, but lies exposed in the heart of the city, the streets of which are filled with refuse. Protests have proved unavailing, because of the policy of the railroad in prosecuting persons for publicly referring to the existing conditions.

The warm weather which caused disappearance of the snow has shown the true state of affairs. The local sanitary hospital cannot comply with all the demands made upon it even in ordinary times. The

drug stores have not sufficient medicines and disinfectants, and cannot get more. The correspondent of the Novosti adds that the near future will show an extremely dangerous condition.

A head on collision has occurred on the Grand Trunk line near Simcoe, Ont. Four passengers were injured.

The proposal to guarantee by government the Philippine railway bonds is opposed in the United States Senate.

The British torpedo boat destroyer, Teaser, has been wrecked in some night naval manoeuvres off Portsmouth.

The Germans fear that another of their columns sent to wipe out the Hereros in Southwest Africa has been annihilated.

Nine hundred Austrians have landed at Halifax bound for Winnipeg. The immigration laws ought to be strictly enforced.

Stratford labor unions are considering sending a delegate to England to point out the true state of labor conditions in the Dominion.

The Empire and the United States have each about 200,000 tons of new battleships building, and Russia and Germany each about 100,000 tons.

## A SUMMER SESSION.

There is one thing that the city can do very well in view of the probable summer session of the legislature and that is to get through an amendment, or rather a clearing up of the meaning of the Water Clauses Act, so as to leave no doubt as to the right of the city to use water for industrial purposes. The City Council is doing its best to get the co-operation of other cities concerned and procure a special act conferring upon this and other cities similarly situated the power to tax railway lands and improvements within the limits of their respective municipalities. If it obtains this it will add to the revenue possibly a couple of thousand dollars per annum, possibly more, possibly less. But to have the right of the city to the use of adjacent waters for industrial purposes confirmed will mean far more than this. It will mean the building of more concentrators and the enlargement of those that exist. One mine manager informed this paper that he would rather take the concentrator, which was mooted for his company, down to Sheep Creek Falls where there was no doubt about the water than to have it where there was such dubiety. Another asked whether the WORLD thought his company would like to run into a lawsuit by building a concentrator. And there are dozens in the same position. John Houston of Nelson has taken the Act under his wing and has declared more than once that the city has such a right. The WORLD does not doubt John's word but it does say that those who oppose the industrial rights of the city to such water find legal opinion which confirms them in their interpretation of the Act and who are quite prepared for fight for such interpretation. So whether John Houston is right or not it still is patent that the Act is considered open to doubt by some. If concentrators are built here it means the employment of many more men in getting ore for them. It means the opening of many mines. And all this means much more revenue to the city than can be got by going after the railroads. In fact their contribution would not be regarded as largely important in comparison with the other revenues accruing from such a policy as that here adumbrated.

The City Council can act directly by resolution. It can act indirectly and effectually by representing the matter to their member for this city who occupies the powerful position of Leader of the Opposition, whose case would again be strengthened by the existence of a resolution passed by the City Council, who are the representatives of the city. The Board of Trade can act similarly. The local branch of the Provincial Mining Association can do the same, and as the matter is of provincial importance, as well as being the one, particular, pressing, and all important local issue,

and show that it is really alive to the interests of the country.

## DO WITHOUT MORGAN

## Cunard Doing a Rushing Business Making Americans.

New York, April 18.—Advice received by the Oceanic last evening contain explanations of the current warfare which make the situation much clearer. It appears that the Cunard Line is making extensive arrangements for Continental as well as Mediterranean business. The Liverpool Daily Post of February 23rd contains the following account of an important concession obtained from the Hungarian government by the Cunard company: "It is reported that the Cunard company have obtained from the Hungarian government and import-concession with regard to carrying emigrant traffic from that country to the United States.

By reason of the concession granted, it is stated that the Cunard Line have now a complete monopoly of the third-class emigrant traffic from Hungary to the United States, the emigrant agents there sending all such passengers by the Cunard steamers. The Cunard company, it is said, can please itself whether it gives to the German lines any of the business as the German lines cannot now book Hungarian passengers.

The amount of the Cunard subsidy is thought to be about £20,000 a year and it is believed that four or five steamers will be placed on the Mediterranean service. From Hungary the emigration to the United States is very large.

We understand that about two years ago the government of Hungary offered certain concessions and a subsidy to another Liverpool line of steamers if they would put on a service of steamers from Hungary to the United States.

The overtures, however, did not come to anything. Since then there has been a large increase in Continental emigration.

## Sealing Regulations

Washington, April 18.—President Roosevelt has signed joint resolutions extending the invitation of congress to the inter-parliamentary union and providing for the entertainment of its members, and requesting the president of the United States to negotiate with the government of Great Britain for a revision of the regulations which now govern the taking of fur seals in the open waters of the North Pacific ocean and Behring Sea.

## KUROKI THE FIGHTER

## Old Samurai is Made Commander of Army in Korea

New York, April 18.—The Tribune says: General Kuroki is now reported to be in command of the Japanese army in Korea. He is Baron Kuroki, Lieutenant-General, and an Inspector-General of the Centre and the West.

He is a member of the formidable Kagoshima Clan, to which Field Marshal Oyama and General Nogi also belong, and began his career as a samurai, or professional soldier.

He is 59 years old, scarcely more than a dwarf in stature, but as cool and imperturbable in the thick of the hottest battle as though on dress parade. There is no general in the Japanese army who is more esteemed either as a fighter or as a commander.
