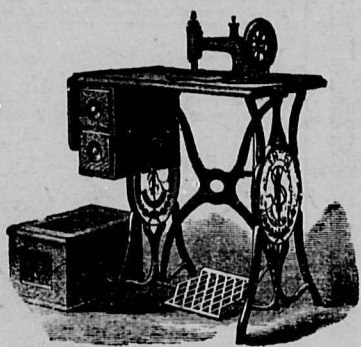

SESSION'S WORK

Viewed From the Specta-
tors' Gallery.

AN APPRECIATION OF CURTIS

Lack of Principle Shewn by the Fol-
lowers of Joe
Martin.

Victoria, June 21.—(Special.—
The first and most important ob-
servation that could be made by a
spectator in the gallery during the
recent session is that the house is
governed, and laws passed, by a
minority representation of the
whole people, in two ways; first
and most offensive is the fact that
Mr. Martin with his one lone fol-
lower Mr. Gilmour, (for it is con-
ceded that Messrs. McInnes and
Staples are now out and out sup-
porters of the government), repu-
diated so pronouncedly at the gen-
eral election, is the dominating
factor against the wishes of a ma-
jority of the voters. Second, the
show of hands by the government
majority of members only repre-
sents about forty per cent of the
voters of the province.

This is a serious condition of
affairs for our province.

The next thing that strikes one
very forcibly is the hard working,
energetic and sincerely honest
member for Rossland. He is ever
on the alert with amendments to
black and legislation, and if knock-
ed out, with other amendments, to
make such legislation of the least
harm possible. After several of his
bills and amendments had been
knocked cold by the government,
they have actually been submitted
again by government supporters so
that they might get the credit for
it, notably Mr. Gilmour's amend-
ment to the Trades Union bill. Mr.
Gilmour was heard to rise and con-
fess that he had copied his amend-
ment from Mr. Curtis' Trades
Union bill. It apparently makes
no difference to Curtis in whose
name a bill or amendment is sub-
mitted. So long as the principle is
sound it gets his support without a
murmur.

The other day Mr. Curtis called
upon Mr. Martin and those mem-
bers of the house supporting the
government, who were elected on
the Martin platform, to stand by
the principles of that platform
with reference to railway legisla-
tion, and he scored them most un-
mercifully. But they kept their
seats and were dumb as oys-
ters, but voted against those prin-
ciples just the same. Curtis has
placed them in a most awkward
position if they ever show their
faces for re-election, for their rec-
ord has gone before them at this
session of the house.

The leader of the opposition, Mr.
McBride, is somewhat of a cold,
hard headed Tory, which is ac-
counted for, no doubt, by his en-
vironment, and while his sym-
pathy for labor is not at all pro-
nounced, he is working faithfully
and honestly for the interests of
the whole of the people, and, when
he learns that labor is not looking
to grab the whole pie and wants
only what is fair and just, the peo-
ple will have in him a man who
will deal fairly by all. He is so
cutting and hard-hitting in debate
that he makes Messrs. Eberts,
Prentice and Prior wobble in their
seats like a fish on a hook. He is
very polished and smooth and has
the confidence and respect of the
opposition. It is said that the

CORONATION POSTPONED

Alarmist Report by the Associat-
ed Press.

HIS MAJESTY IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Bulletin is at Present Lacking Further Official
Confirmation--An Operation Per-
formed.

London, via New York, June 24.

—3 p.m.—Serious rumors are cur-
rent regarding the King's health.
The alarmist reports which have
been current during the past few
days have been generally discred-
ited, and an optimistic public were
inclined to think that the slight
cough His Majesty incurred at Alder-
shot was greatly exaggerated.

The news this morning that the
King was suffering from an attack
of peritonitis (?) has completely al-
tered the situation and the public is
alarmed as to the state of his health
and fears that the Coronation cere-
monies may even at the eleventh
hour have to be postponed indef-
initely.

An operation was performed this
afternoon at 2 o'clock and the
latest bulletins state that it was
successful, and that the King is
now asleep. The outcome of to-
morrow morning is being anxiously
awaited by crowds of his subjects
now gathered together in the met-
ropolis of the Empire.

Local Celebration.

Mayor Clute has announced that
Thursday having been declared an
official holiday the banks and public
offices, etc., will remain closed, and
that the public rejoicings will take
place as usual in this city even if
the actual Coronation ceremonies
have to be postponed.

The merchants on Columbia
avenue are rising to the occasion
and already have started with the
work of decoration. It is evident
that the whole of the principal
thoroughfare of this city will be
lined with greenery, and that the
buildings will be decked with col-
ored bunting and flags. Many of
the shops have already made taste-
ful displays in their windows, and
on Thursday morning this will be
seen to be general throughout the
business section of the city.

The railway companies announce
that there will be no interference
with the excursions that are being
run in honor of Rossland's cele-
bration.

THE TARIFF ON LEAD

Ex-Mayor Coodeve Reports
Progress Made at
Toronto.

A. S. Goodeve, who has been at
Toronto attending the session of
the Dominion boards of trade, was
a passenger on the train last even-
ing over the Crow's Nest. In pass-
ing through Nelson he was inter-
viewed by a representative of the
News and is reported as follows:

"The trouble is that the eastern
people do not understand the situ-
ation at all, and the first question
was as to how any change of tariff
could be of material benefit to the
people of the Kootenays. When
the matter was fully explained to
them they were strongly in favor
of the tariff reform asked for. As
an example of this, of the large
number of resolutions that came
up for discussion, ours was the only
one that was passed unanimously,
that is, outside the routine resolu-
tions. The manufacturers of paint
who were at the meeting were es-
pecially enthusiastic, and those
from Winnipeg promised to send
a delegation to Ottawa if it is re-
quired, to back the Kootenays up
in their demand, which they for
the first time understood.

"What I especially explained
was the action of the smelter trust
in the United States in its effect
now, and probable effect in the fu-

ture, on the lead and paint indus-
try for Canada. When shown how
the matter affected, not only Brit-
ish Columbia but also the whole
Dominion, the keenest interest was
displayed throughout, and not only
at the meeting but afterwards, and
personally a large number of the
most influential manufacturers and
merchants present enquired particu-
larly regarding many of the de-
tails of the matter in hand and
promised their support in every
way possible.

THE EMMA MINE RESUMES.

Contract is Concluded With the Hall
Mines Smelter.

Phoenix, June 23.—Work is be-
ing resumed on the Emma mine,
one of the big properties of Sum-
mit camp that has not been worked
for some months.

A contract has been made with
the Hall Mines smelter of Nelson
for shipping ore from the property
at the rate of two cars daily. The
ore contains a large percentage of
iron, and is especially desirable for
fluxing purposes.

W. T. Smith and Mann & Mc-
Kenzie are the owners of the prop-
erty. Mr. Smith is in charge of
the work with a force of ten men,
which will soon be increased to
twenty, it is said.

THE RECEPTION

Historic Gathering at Hat-
field House.

LORD SALISBURY IS UNWELL

Colonial Premiers Assemble at the
Home of the
Cecils.

London, June 23.—There was a
great gathering at the recep-
tion given at Hatfield House
the residence of the Cecils,
now represented by the Marquess
of Salisbury yesterday afternoon in
honor of the visit of the colonial
premiers.

The function was, however, shorn
of much of its interest owing to the
absence of the prime minister, who
at present is, like the King, under
medical orders not to overtax his
powers of endurance.

HEAVILY BRIBED

Serious Charges Are Made
Against a Yukon Cus-
toms Officer.

Victoria, June 24.—A Dawson
special says: D. W. Davis, collector
of customs at Dawson has been
suspended for irregularities in the
customs department. After his
suspension he resigned. A. A.
Cook, formerly of Vancouver, in
the same department, has also re-
signed. It is charged that Davis
received a large sum of money from
the Alaska Exploration company.

It is probable that criminal
proceedings may be instituted against
the officers of the company.

Inspector McMichael discovered
the frauds shortly after his arrival.

E. S. Bushby, formerly at Skag-
way, has been temporarily appoint-
ed to fill the vacancy.

The claim against the company,
with penalties, will reach \$70,000
or more. The evidence secured by
Inspector McMichael is said to be
very clear. Other charges may be
made.

Is Seized by Sheriff Tuck and Offered
for Sale.

Slocan, June 23.—Sheriff Tuck
has seized and taken into his pos-
session the Iron Horse group of
claims on Ten Mile, and will offer
them for sale at public auction at
Nelson on June 25.

The seizure is the outcome of a
suit by W. E. E. Koch to recover
\$1276.15 for lumber supplied and
leaving. There are also claims
against the property for over \$600
for wages. The papers are made
out against Thomas A. Noble of
Pittsburg as the principal owner.
The trouble on the Iron Horse is
resultant upon a dispute among
the principals in the company over
money matters.

CANADA'S RAILWAYS.

The faults and failings of the Intercolonial are well known, says the Toronto Telegram, but perhaps Ontario pays more in dollars and cents for the virtues of the Grand Trunk and C. P. R. than the Maritime Provinces pay for the vices of the Intercolonial.

Canada has had a good long trial of the policy of using public credit to build railways for private benefit. Canada has given more to railways than any civilized country on earth. Canada has written herself down as a lunatic among the nations by feeding subsidies and lands and credits to corporations which give the alien cheaper service than the Canadian can get from the lines he has built.

HARDLY LEARNED.

In the chronicles of the Israelites, bound up within the covers of that sacred volume entitled by all Christians, Jews and Mohammedans "The Book," it is read that when the Israelites sought to escape out of bondage that the heart of their ruler was hardened and the plagues of Egypt were necessary to enforce a lesson that was plain from the beginning.

If any man thinks that the "wage slave," as the worker for wages is termed by the socialist of today, is doomed forever in that bondage to which he is now subject he is mistaken. That thinker is blind to the lessons which the nineteenth century has inculcated again and again. The forces of labor have ever become stronger as that century just passed waxed and waned. The birth of the new century has seen that these forces are gradually growing to a head. They are by no means weakened by the passage of time. They grow stronger from year to year. They must win. Whether the heart of the rulers be hardened or no, the outcome is inevitable.

A strong case in point is the condition of the mine workers in the United States, with especial reference to those Eastern miners now engaged in a strike which dates back some 15 years. Each strike in turn has lost but the conditions have improved. Each year larger and larger numbers join in the strife. In vain has the union been derided and decimated. In vain have these bodies been destroyed. They spring up again. Just so long as the conditions are favorable for their growth, grow they must. They are a necessity. If the conditions are removed unionism must be a thing of the past. It comes into existence to fulfill certain ends and when these are accomplished its end will naturally come. Nowhere perhaps are unions less strong than in the country where apparently they should be strongest. In New Zealand the passage of compulsory arbitration has destroyed their raison d'être. They are there more a name than a force.

The mine workers of Pennsylvania of 15 years ago are not the same people that they are today. They are not even of the same nationality. The old Anglo Saxon breed has migrated west. The workers of Europe imported to fill the places of the men blacklisted from their homes have in turn formed their unions. The only difference is that as the years go by the foreign element grows stronger and stronger. Not on

British soil, as yet, have such deeds that have disgraced the soil of the Eastern States of the Union been done. But who are to blame. Is it the men who are now in the majority in the east, working in the various mines and trades, or is it the blacklisting employer who is responsible for their presence on what was once a free soil?

And what is true of the east today will be true of the west tomorrow. As long as the workers are of the Anglo Saxon breed the tradition of centuries will promote and strengthen methods of conservatism in obtaining reform. But if the workers are not of these breeds but are scions of those European stocks which promoted the bloody revolutions of times gone by, what can be expected of these men but that they will follow the traditions of their forefathers and work out their salvation in the way commended to them by the annals of their past and the dictates of their race?

Their standards are not our standards, but who are we that they should be judged by us?

Whether the nationality be British, or Latin, or Slav, or Chinese, the union exists just as it has existed from time immemorial. But if throats are cut, rulers assassinated and violence and rapine prevail, the direct cause may be the actual committers of the deeds, but the accessories to the crime are those employers who have endeavored and vainly endeavored to kill the unions by importing a cheaper labor to aid them in their suicidal policy.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

New Zealand is figuring on doing away with freight rates altogether and throwing her railroads open to the free use of everyone. This is the country in which, so the monopolists tell us, socialistic legislation is a dismal failure. It certainly is, from their point of view—Paystreak.

The latest in the way of Associated Press telegrams is that that the Northwest is to be purchased by United States financial magnates who are celebrating their coronation at Winnipeg. These financial magnates are not on to their job. All they had to do was to go to Victoria or Ottawa and get all the land they wanted for the asking, and then the government would have given them some cash besides to build a railway to exploit the properties thus acquired.

IMPORTANT DECISION

New York Judge Recently Rises to a Sense of Justice.

The decision of Judge Parker, of the county appeals, in Albany, N. Y., recently handed down, specifically stated that:

"1. Workmen have the right to organize to better their conditions.
"2. They have the right to strike to secure better conditions.
"3. They have the right to notify their employers of their purpose to strike.

"4. They have the right to refuse to work with non-union men, or members of a rival organization, and the employer must take their dictation or go without their services.

"5. A peaceful and orderly strike is not in violation of the law."

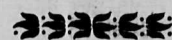

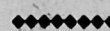

FURTHER EVIDENCE

Railway Deal is Evidently Considered Ratified in London.

The London correspondent of the Vancouver News-Advertiser under date June 7th, says:

The large reductions just made both in smelting charges and freight rates will undoubtedly have a most beneficial effect on the mining industry, and, as will be seen from the cables from the various mines given below, will make a very large increase in the net profits of the Rossland mines.

According to a cable from Mr. C. H. Mackintosh, he has entered into a contract with the Trail smelter to treat the Giant ore at \$4.50 per ton, instead of \$6 a reduction of 25 per cent, and as a rich body of ore has just been opened, the prospects of the Giant look very favorable.

As is well known, the Le Roi companies treat their ores at their own smelter at Northport, but they have obtained reductions in freight rates, both for ore and coke, which will enable them to treat low-grade ore.

first impression formed of a person is the correct one. An adverse opinion was formed of Martin in Manitoba and when he votes against almost every principle enunciated in his own platform forced upon him by Mr. Curtis, the only conclusion is that he is most unscrupulous and utterly untrustworthy.
