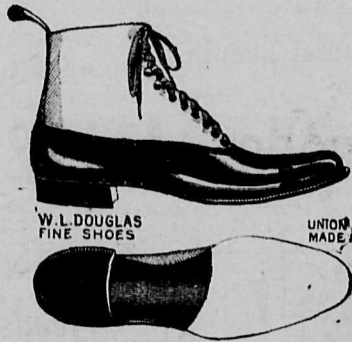

A PRESS TRIAL

The Miner Called Down in Court Today.

COMMENT ON PENDING CASE

Another Adjournment Granted—Thomas Beamish and the Morning Paper at War.

"Your worship, I find that I will require some other witnesses in this case, in addition to those already called," said Mr. MacNeill before Police Magistrate Boulton this morning. "I ask an adjournment until Thursday next," continued Mr. MacNeill, "but while I am on my feet I think it is a good opportunity to draw your worship's attention to the entirely improper comments upon the case which have appeared in the Rossland Morning Miner. The published accounts of the case are incorrect but the comments in the issues of Sunday and today clearly constitute contempt of court and are most improper, as likely to influence your worship and the witnesses in the trial of this case. The law on the case is quite clear and I refer your worship to the O'Brien case in the supreme court of Canada, in which Chief Justice Strong says:

"Contempts of a court of justice being a court of record, other than those committed in its presence (sedente curia), have received the name of constructive contempts and may be classed under two entirely distinct and very different heads. In the first place it is held to be a contempt to interfere with the due course of justice by publishing comments or criticisms on pending litigation which may have the effect of influencing the minds of those who will be called upon to decide either upon the facts or the law, jurors or judges, and thus cause prejudice to either of the suitors whose rights are in controversy."

Mr. MacNeill pointed out the unfairness of trial by newspapers pending the investigation of the magistrate and asked that the matter should be stopped.

The Magistrate—"I quite agree with you Mr. MacNeill, the law is quite clear, and any comment is improper on a pending case. As a matter of fact I have not read the Rossland Miner and do not know what has been said by the paper.

Mr. Daly—"This is not a jury case, and the law quoted by Mr. MacNeill does not apply. I am ready to proceed with this case and oppose any postponement."

The Magistrate—"I granted an adjournment yesterday at your request Mr. Daly, and will grant one to Mr. MacNeill now. I wish to do what is fair to both sides. The case will stand adjourned until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock and the bail bond for Colistro will be renewed until that date."

Thomas Beamish's case of assault was then called and at Beamish's request was also postponed until Thursday, to be disposed of after the Colistro case.

Beamish protested vigorously against the articles in the Miner and said they were calculated to unduly influence witnesses he wished to call on his own behalf.

The police magistrate said there was no case before him, but if the complainant would make out a proper case in the usual way he would be glad to consider it.

The court room was crowded this morning to hear the evidence

in the Horn assault case and the audience was disappointed when postponement was announced.

A. H. MacNeill, K.C., appeared for the defence and Hon. T. M. Daly for the prosecution. Beamish was not arrested, but merely summoned to appear today. He conducted his own defence.

Antigonish, N. S., Aug. 13.—MacDonald's lumber mills and factory were destroyed by fire Saturday night. Loss about \$10,000; no insurance.

EXTENSION EXPLOSION

Naked Lights Caused the Trouble--Looking for the Killed.

Nanaimo, B. C. Aug. 13.—An explosion attended with fatal results, occurred here yesterday morning in the Extension mine. It had been closed down on account of the strike in shipping circles at San Francisco. The fans had been stopped on Sunday allowing the gas to accumulate. Last night Fire Boss Quinn went down to keep watch for the night. The explosion occurred early this morning, wrecking the mine and causing a fire. The work of rescuing Quinn was started promptly, but it took 48 men 10 hours to reach him. The body was badly burnt. It is thought here that the explosion was caused by men with naked lights entering the mine. There seems to be no other explanation and if it is the right one other bodies may be found. Quinn leaves a wife and family.

SANDON NOTES.

An Injunction Applied For--Bush Fires Near the Payne-Bond Thrown up.

Sandon, Aug. 13.—The Star Mining and Milling company's application for an injunction against the Byron N. White company came up in the Victoria court today. The Star Mining and Milling company have a force at work stripping a ledge which they claim to be the Slocan Star ledge on the Rabbit Paw and Heber ground. The Byron N. White company is opening a ledge on the Silversmith which they claim as the apex of the Slocan Star ledge. The question of ownership of the Slocan Star ledge where it dips into Rabbit Paw and Heber ground hinges on the correctness of these contentions. It will probably be the hardest fought mining case ever brought into the British Columbia courts. John M. Harris of Sandon and Drumheller of Spokane are back of the Rabbit Paw.

A bridge burned on the Nakusp and Slocan road between Nakusp and Roseberry last night. Traffic is tied up on the line today.

A dangerous bush fire nearly took out the Payne terminals and office Sunday. Men were fighting fire all day.

The bond of the Mountain Consolidated group has been thrown up. The property belongs to W. W. Warner and was bonded by A. H. Riehel for an old country company.

SMELTER SCRAP

Foreman Violently Attacked by Workman.

THE SCABS ENJOYED THE FIGHT

No Arrests Made--Furnace Again in Trouble All Night--More Men Leaving the Works.

(Special to the WORLD.)

Northport, Aug. 13.—Bad luck appears to follow every effort made by Superintendent Kadish at the Le Roi smelter to run the works with scab labor.

The explosion which took place early last Saturday morning, was followed by a royal row and a disastrous freeze up last night.

For some cause not yet ascertained the only working furnace went cold during the early hours of the night and as a matter of fact remained frozen up to the time the day shift went on work this morning. Connolly who was bossing the job lost his temper with the green hands and it is alleged used very strong language to them. One of the scabs got so enraged at the abuse showered on him that he violently attacked Connolly and beat him severely. The non-union men present did not interfere in the fight but left the two men to settle their differences as best they could. Although Connolly was very severely handled no attempt has been made to arrest the assaulter up to noon today.

It has been reported to the union men that another batch of the men brought here from Leadville to work the plant will leave the Stockade city this evening.

The town is quiet and no disturbance of any kind has taken place among the union men.

A SLANDER REFUTED

Inquest This Afternoon--A Malicious Story Disposed of.

Owing to some malicious reports which were industriously spread abroad shortly after the death of the late Mrs. Angus last fall, the provincial authorities decided to make an official enquiry into the cause of the lady's death.

A month ago a coroners jury was summoned here and the body of the deceased was exhumed and certain portions of the remains were taken and forwarded to the official analyst at Victoria, the inquest in the meantime being adjourned.

The report of the analyst was received a day or so ago by Dr. Reddick and this afternoon the jury were called together at the city hall to continue the investigation.

The medical testimony showed clearly that the deceased came to her death from acute nephritis and a verdict was returned to that effect.

The investigation will put an end to some false and cruel rumors which were circulated in and about Rossland some months ago.

Crispi's Work.

Paris, Aug. 13.—Almost the whole Parisian press referring to the death of Signor Crispi judge severely the political work and private life of the dead statesman.

Wessels is Released.

London, Aug. 13.—Lord Kitchener has cabled a confirmation of the report of the release of the peace envoy, Ries Wessels, who was said to have been shot. Wessels was a prisoner in general Celloer's laager, near Kaalfontein, which the British recently surprised and captured.

Policeman Punished.

New York, Aug. 13.—George E. Bissert, the policeman who was convicted recently on an indictment charging that he had accepted a bribe as protection money from the keepers of a disorderly house, was sentenced to five and a half years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$1000.

TUBE WORKS BOYS OUT

Five Thousand Men Remain Idle--Boys Are Turbulent.

Pittsburg, Aug. 13.—Two hundred and fifty welding helpers came out tonight and crippled the great butt welding department of the National Tube Works at McKeesport. The strikers are nearly all boys under 18 and comprise half of the force of helpers in this department.

Fully 2000 men will be forced to quit work and the entire department, consisting of 4800 men, is expected to be idle. The boys came out against the wishes of the Amalgamated officers. The young fellows are turbulent and it was their strike that began the great steel strike and riots of 1894.

Funeral Today.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Charles C. Rose took place at 2 o'clock this afternoon from the undertakers to the Methodist church and from there to the Columbia cemetery, where the interment took place. Rev. A. N. Sanford held a service at the church and at the grave. There was a large attendance among whom were many members of the miners union.

On the War Path.

Helena, Mont., Aug. 13.—Full to the brim with Helena firewater and in a nude condition, Antone Pasco, a half-breed Flathead Indian, went on the warpath at the Montana Central depot last evening, and, pursued by a score of male and female enemies, fought bravely until he was captured and placed in the city jail by palefaces.

Typos in Session.

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 13.—The annual convention of the International Typographical Union met in this city yesterday, President James M. Lynch, of Syracuse, in the chair. Delegate Govan of New York offered a resolution to consider the relation of taxation to wages, which was referred. The sympathy and moral support of the union was extended to the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Tin and Steel Workers in their difficulty with the United States Steel corporation by a rising vote.

NEARING THE END.

To the onlookers, watching the close of the great conspiracy partly in England and partly, in this camp it is somewhat amusing to note the antics of the "gentlemen on the fence." It has apparently begun to dawn on some of these loyal and spirited citizens that possibly they had better fling to the ground on the winning side of this pleasing controversy and they are making due preparation to declare their true positions.

"Rats leave a sinking ship" say they "and we had better go while yet there is time." But they forget that it is just because that they are "rats" that they crawl away from the losing side. In any real fight neither of the contending parties have any use for the rodents or any of their tribe, and when the fight is over and peace reigns once more the "rats" should be outlawed by all decent folks.

Nothing short of a miracle can save Whitaker Wright and his friends and allies, if the London papers are to be believed. In financial circles in the old country the revelations attending the investigation by the courts of justice of the affairs of the Standard Exploration company, the London and Globe and the British America Corporation have raised such a storm of indignation that it is not possible for Wright or his friends to longer control—openly at least—any financial undertaking. Whatever details may yet be made public in the course of the judicial investigations now in progress, the facts already known are sufficient, and more than sufficient to wreck a far stronger man than Whitaker Wright has ever proved himself to be.

The disappearance of this talented jobber, for a time at least, from company and stock manipulations, holds out a distinct promise of a possible early solution of the difficulties under which this camp is now suffering.

If Wright is swept away from the control of the Le Roi and allied companies the lock-out at Northport and the strike here will probably be speedily ended and the rest of the trouble will mend itself in due course.

When the true facts connected with the labor troubles in Rossland and at Northport are known they will be found to vindicate the level headed action of the union men who, confident in their rectitude and the justice of their cause, can well afford to patiently await the final outcome of the struggle.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The merchants of Revelstoke deserve great credit for the way in which they have stood by the trackmen in their strike.

The Rossland Miner has been en-smalled. The labor troubles in that camp have pinched it to a seven-column folio, but its general appearance has been improved. That cannot be said of its character.—Grand Forks News.

If there is a law on the statute books of British Columbia affecting the mining industry that is not condemned by the Mine Owners' Association in the memorial issued by the organization, it might as well be wiped out with the rest. Laws are obnoxious things, anyway.—New Denver Ledger.

Raising the point that the Ross-

land strike was not legally called brings to mind the story of old John Buchanan, who was called to the county jail to see a client who had been incarcerated for some offense. When asked why he was there, the prisoner gave the details of his arrest, upon hearing which Buchanan exclaimed: "Why, great Scott, man, they can't put you in jail for that!" "I know it," responded the accused, "but they have, all the same."—Spokesman.

NOBLE FIVE REPORT

**Work Done Last Month--
High Grade Ore--\$80
a Ton.**

The manager of the Noble Five Mining company, reports as follows: "During the month of July the following work has been done: In tunnel A the cross-cut we are running to cross-cut the Last Chance ledge has been run a distance of 113½ feet, making a total to date of 200 feet. In Last Chance tunnel No. 3 we have drifted on the ledge 36 feet, making a total from the Last Chance end line of 151 feet. In this distance we have encountered three chutes of ore, A, B and C. We have not upraised on chutes B and C, but in the drift the maximum width of ore was 16 inches, 12 inches and 3 feet, respectively. Assays of ore taken from chute C gave from 174 ounces to 426 ounces of silver per ton, and from 11 to 17 per cent. lead. We shipped during the month to the Nelson smelter 24 tons of clean ore, the net returns for which, after paying freight and treatment charges, were \$1928.32, a trifle better than \$80 per ton.
