THE FIRST VICTORY.

The clean sweep effected yesterday in London at the meeting of the Le Roi shareholders, by which not only Whitaker Wright personally, but all his immediate friends and followers were brushed off the directorate, was naturally very well received in Rossland. The additional news that Mr. Robert James Frecheville, the mining engineer and nominee of the Robinson syndicate had been elected to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Mr. Wright, and that the new director and one other would leave England for Rossland on Wednesday next to confer with Henry Bratnober and re-arrange affairs here, confirmed the opinion already expressed in these columns, and there is now every reasonable probability that in a very short time we will see as complete a change here as was witnessed in London yesterday, and that for some years to come we can all look forward to an era of peace and prosperity.

A very different state of things was at one time feared. It was known that two or three London syndicates had for some time been endeavoring to obtain control of the Le Roi company and it was at least possible that by combining with some of these parties the discredited Whitaker Wright faction might manage to partly continue to control the situation in London and out here.

This unpleasant aspect of the case is now no longer possible and while the views on the strike question, of the English representatives who will shortly leave for Rossland are not definitely known, it is at least certain that they are not unfriendly to the union men and a conference is now assured, an impossibility so long as Bernard Macdonald remained sole arbitrator.

Later news received today not only confirms yesterday's dispatches, but positively asserts that no matter what may be the final attitude of the new directorate toward the union, an absolute change in the mine and smelter management has already been decided on and that the advent of the two directors will be quickly followed by the disappearance of the chief cause of all the trouble here.

This is the natural sequence of events which have led up to the present situation and it would be exceedingly difficult to understand any other ending. Some months ago in London a determined systematic attempt was organized to oust Whitaker Wright and his followers in London and out here. The first part of the program has been successfully carried out. Does any one imagine that a set of keen business men would leave the work on hand but halt done?

Manager Macdonald is well aware—no one better—of his own painful position, hence his rather foolish and indignant action, as sketched in his newspaper this morning. As a beaten and probably discredited mine manager, he might well have remained silent and awaited his ending in a dignified way, a [stand which would at least have won for him the sympathy usually accorded to the under dog in every fight. Mr. Macdonald evidently prefers to die differently but his shouting now will deceive no one or avail him any more than have his frantic cables to London during the past few weeks.

A little more patience and the looked for change will be an accomplished fact here. The WORLD has always expressed the view that if two shrewd business men where dispatched out here having the real interest of the Le Roi shareholders at heart and having full power to adjust the matters, a settlement would promptly arrived at. The men are coming and we have no doubt of the ultimate result of their visit.

NEW ZEALAND.

People who read the editorials in the morning paper, thoughtfully prepared for the nominal editor of that publication, must have been some what bothered by the articles on gold production and on New Zealand, which followed one another today. The first gave the figures proving that the gold production of New Zealand, for the first six months of 1901, showed an increase over the same period of last year, of considerably over half a million of dollars, or 16.7 per cent. The second article was devoted to proving the reverse of the first and to demonstrating that the country in question has really gone to pieces and is in a very bad way.

New Zealand affairs will doubtless be attacked very savagely by all those who fear the coming of compulsory arbitration, but just as long as its government are in a position to conclusively demonstrate, as they certainly can at the present time, that New Zealand is prospering beyond all expectations and advancing by leaps and bounds, they can afford to ignore the attitude of unfriendly and untruthful critics.

As to the real situation in New Zealand, the words of the agent general published in all the leading English papers on the 10th of this month, can be left to speak for themselves, he said:

"There is no 'paralysis of business' whatever. Trade is brisk and condition of business perfectly normal. New Zealand still enjoys to the full the high prosperity which has marked the last few years.

"As for supposing that the arbitration act has 'admittedly broken down and is benumbing the country's industries,' that hardly calls for serious contradiction, at any rate it is quite opposed to fact. The census figures will show the extraordinary progress made by industries all round since the act came in force."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The element in London and on this side of the water, which has ousted Whitaker Wright and his followers is admittedly unfriendly to Manager Macdonald and all his appointees here and at Northport. The element has succeeded in London up to the hilt. Is it at all probable they will retain the services of this end of the Wright combine?

In a lengthy article on compulsory arbitration the Nanaimo Herald says: "Now, would not the arbitrators' decision be subject to the same public criticism as the merits of a strike? If they were unfair would not public opinion condemn them and if they were fair would they not be approved and would not this force of public approval or disapproval have a strong tendency to regulate the verdict of the court within the limits of reasonableness and fairness? Public opinion, therefore, is the great tribunal to which both strikers and arbitrators must bow and there is one advantage on the side of arbitration that the strike can never possess. It is that work is not suspended, labor and capital are not destroyed, women and children do not starve and the whole industrial world is not paralyzed during the progress of the settlement."

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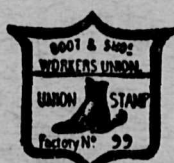
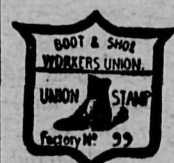

LONDON TANGLE

Correspondent of New York
Paper on Situation.

WHITAKER WRIGHT'S PAPERS

Papers That Formerly Supported the
Manipulator All Against Him Now
—Further Revelations Expected.

The London correspondent of the New York Engineering and Mining Journal writing his paper under date of August 13th, says:

"The Whitaker Wright group continues to exercise a depressing influence on the market. Since the publication of the reports by the official receiver on the state of the British America Corporation and the Standard Exploration company the shareholders in the various other companies of the group have almost given up hope of ever seeing their money again and their chief desire now is to have a good fling at Whitaker Wright and his directors. Strong efforts have been made to remove the whole gang from the directorship on all the companies, with a view of enabling shareholders to ascertain the exact position of the companies. Hitherto the reports and statements of amounts issued by the directors have been always misleading and often quite untruthful, so that nobody ever knew the real positions of the companies. For the last five years, while the companies appeared prosperous, I have pointed out time after time that there was no really solid business at the back of these companies and that the business has been carried on solely for the benefit of one person and incidentally for some of his hangers on.

"During all these years the London press had supported him consistently and it is ludicrous to note their change of tone now that their idol has been shattered. The London papers do not care much about tackling nasty questions and are rather inclined to let them slide. But if they and the shareholders really want to get to the bottom of this present scandal I should advise them to inquire as to the real destination of the immense sums of money lost by the group in stock exchange speculation. The various companies have lost practically the whole of their cash resources, amounting to millions of pounds, in paying stock exchange differences; that is, the money has gone into the pockets of somebody or other who has been bearing the shares of the various companies. A complete list of people benefiting in this way and the publication of the names not only of the nominal creditors, but also of the actual receivers of the money so obtained,

would certainly surprise the shareholders and I sincerely hope shareholders will make inquiries for themselves on this subject."

union labor and its representa-
tives. Instead of, like a good and
faithful steward protecting those
who trusted him, Mr. Bernard Mac-
donald has succeeded in bringing
about disastrous troubles, not only
in Rossland, but throughout Brit-
ish Columbia, for his actions have
created suspicion and distrust am-
ongst investors at a distance.

Attacks on the Union.

Union men, if not in so many
words, to put it mildly by insinua-
tion, have been represented as agi-
tators, dynamiters and anarchists,
and instead of a policy of concili-
ation, one of rabid hatred and per-
secution has been adopted. This
is the view any unprejudiced ob-
server must take of the subject.
This is the verdict that will be
rendered so soon as an unbiased
and independent committee con-
sider the whole subject, and not all
the newspapers that Bernard Mac-
donald can purchase will save him
from the result of his own rash and
inconsiderate action in connection
with the Le Roi Mining and Smel-
ting company's interests.

Too Late Now.

It is too late for him now to
smite the hand that fed him and
repudiate Mr. Whitaker Wright.
It is too late to appeal to Contrac-
tor Geiser of Baker City, Oregon,
or to Ore Sampler Kadish, his old
time pal. Bernard Macdonald
turned journalist in order to prove
himself a mining expert. Instead
of his efforts being crowned with
success, he has proved himself
neither, for he uses his position as
a controller of a newspaper, to
make false statements, and his
position as a mine manager to
create trouble, discord and com-
mercial chaos.

Has Deceived Directors.

Not content with having deceiv-
ed the directors in London since
May last, he continues this decep-
tion by declaring in his newspaper
this morning that the Le Roi mine
will ship 150 tons of ore daily to
the Trail smelter. He calls it a
welcome change, when he knows
the entire effort will prove a fiasco.
At the same time he virtually ad-
mits that the Northport smelter
will lay idle, at a loss, as he has
himself said of \$50,000 per month.

The Cold Truth.

The truth is that Bernard Mac-
donald has lost the confidence of
men who are anxious to be loyal,
and anxious to work. They doubt
his sincerity because they have
experienced the effect of his anti-
pathy. His usefulness is gone and
the sooner he realizes this and
abandons the attempt to bolster
himself up by mistatements and
journalistic eulogies the better it
will be for him and the commu-
nity whose interests have been
crushed by his unbusinesslike meth-
ods.

CENSUS

Has 4610 to Rossland's
6168--Both Are Likely
Below the Mark.

Ottawa, Aug. 30.—Nelson City
has within its corporate limits, a
population of 4,610, with 1042
dwellings and 1085 families. Kam-
loops has 1591 population, 319
dwellings and 323 families.

(Nelson claims an additional 900
in the suburbs and in Rossland
the city boundaries were strictly
followed excluding many bona-fide
residents here.)
